Day of Prayer Touches Campus

DECEMBER 7TH, just 25 years beyond the infamous day of tragedy at Pearl Harbor, became a day of spiritual victory for members of the Bible College family. Classes were dismissed and a Day of Prayer proclaimed for the students and faculty.

The full College family met in Memorial Auditorium at 8 a.m. to sing and share Bible prayer promises. The group was then broken into prayer cells to be presided over by junior and senior students, and dismissed to rooms about the campus. For an hour prayer was offered and testimonies shared. At 9:50 students and faculty reassembled in the auditorium for a challenging message by special guest speaker for the week, Rev. Billy Morris, pastor of Immanuel Church in Durham, N. C.

It has been the school's practice through the years to call Days of Prayer from time to time lest too much study muddle the mind and weary the heart. These days have resulted in the discovery of God's will for many students, a fact testified to by former students now in the pastorate and on the mission field.

In addition to Billy Morris, the students have also enjoyed recent messages by Evangelist Bobby Jackson, who has lately held two revivals in the Nashville area.

Your Church—One in a Thousand by Jack Paramore

JANUARY 1 was set aside as official launch date for the second phase of the Bible College Development Program. As the One Thousand Laymen Campaign appealed to individuals for \$1,000 gifts, the One Thousand Church Campaign will request a like commitment from a thousand Free Will Baptist Churches.

For example: A rural Tennessee church votes to give \$1,000 out of the church treasury. A congregation in North Carolina borrows \$1,000 and repays the sum through prayer meeting offerings. A pastor leads his congregation in observing College Day and raises \$1,500.

And so, even before the campaign is officially launched, churches, eager to participate, have responded in various ways. No single plan will work in every church, but a common interest is already drawing many responses.

The Layman Campaign has yielded nearly a quarter of a million dollars, which is commendable, but we have only begun. Three million dollars is a staggering sum, and to raise the full amount will require the involvement of every good Free Will Baptist across the denomination.

A thousand churches are needed to raise a million dollars. Could yours be one in a thousand?



"Commit thy way unto the Lord; trust also in him; and he shall bring it to pass." Psa. 37:5

The psalmist is talking to us who trust God. He tells us to commit our way unto the Lord. To commit is the same as to surrender. You go down to the bank and commit your money to the teller. It's there for safe-keeping. The child of God knows that it's not safe for him to run his own life, so he takes it to God and commits it to His care.

There are three things I want to suggest that we do:

Every man should **commit his past**, with all of its failures and sins, to God. There is not a thing that we can do to rub out the past. Some men go insane worrying about the mistakes they have made in life. On the record of every man's life are pages that he wishes he could tear out, but he cannot. The only thing we can do with our sins is confess them to Jesus and trust Him to forgive them.

The next thing we are to do is **commit the present**, with its problems and cares. Many times the load gets heavy and the problems mount high and we wonder what to do. Peter tells us to cast all of our cares upon Him because He cares for us. He knows the problems you face today. It may be a problem of ill health or the lack of money to pay your bills. For some young person in love it may be the problem of whether you should marry this person or not. The Lord would have us cast all our cares upon Him and let Him have the honor of working them out for us.

Then, we should **commit the future**, with its unknowns, to the Lord. There is a curtain that hangs over the future so we cannot see behind it. Jesus Christ knows what's behind that curtain, so we should not worry about what is going to happen tomorrow. Jesus said, "Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof." We have enough problems for today without reaching into the future and borrowing from it.

So, let us commit the past, with its sins; the present, with its problems; and the future, with its unknowns to the Lord Jesus Christ.

The Bible College has scheduled its 11th annual summer school for June 6-16, Rev. Charles Thigpen, College dean, has announced.

Registration for the two-week session will be held on Monday, June 5, with classes beginning the next morning. A registration exceeding 70 students is expected. The session will end on Friday, June 16.

The curriculum to be offered is not yet finalized but six courses will be available, in subjects in the fields of Bible, church administration, music, and missions. These courses are designed to meet the needs of Free Will Baptist preachers and laymen, so churches are urged to make it possible for pastors and layleaders to attend the summer school.

New Registrations Expected To Raise Record Enrollment

THIRTEEN STUDENTS who are expected to register for the second semester will bring the 1966-67 Bible College enrollment to more than 400 students, announced Dr. Robert Picirilli. registrar. The total registration is expected to reach 420, including several evening school registrants anticipated. This will be an increase of more than 17 per cent over the record 352 students enrolled last year.

First semester will close with the giving of final examinations from January 19-24. Registration for second semester will open on Wednesday, January 25. Regular classes will resume on the 26th.

While most Bible College students prefer to enroll in the fall for the first semester, spring registrations provide an opportunity for many students to begin their college training, who would otherwise lose a half-year's work.

IBM Equipment Installed

SEVERAL LARGE pieces of IBM office equipment have been installed recently at the Bible College. This equipment, which has been obtained on a lease basis, will facilitate the handling of more than 3,000 bookkeeping entries per month in the College business office. It will also increase efficiency in recording the financial accounts of more than 400 students annually.

In addition to being used in the business office, all registrar's records are being transferred to punch cards for use with the equipment. These IBM machines will make alumni records instantly available, report students' grades quickly, and speed up registration procedures.

The equipment installed so far include a sorter, collator, key punch, and 402 accounting machine. The regular staff members have taken courses in IBM training to operate this equipment.

PT 451s—The Minister's Mission

Several areas of the minister's life and work will be covered in this course, including his calling, personal life, and preaching-pastoral duties.

Bi 232s—Old Testament Highlights This course is intended to give basic guidelines in understanding the Old Testament. Special attention will be given the order of main events, covenants, Messianic prophecies, and the nation of Israel.

PT 450s—Parliamentary Law

The aim of this course is to acquaint the student with recognized parliamentary procedure, especially as it pertains to the transaction of church business.

Paramore Reports to Conference Concerning Expansion Progress

Over \$151,000 has been raised so far toward financing the school's present expansion effort, Jack Paramore, Expansion Campaign director, reported on Wednesday morning of the Bible Conference. Before an audience of more than 500 pastors, students, and laymen, he declared God's blessing to be upon the current drive to raise nearly three million dollars for the Bible College building fund.

Two phases—the One Thousand Laymen and the One Thousand Church campaigns—are presently in operation throughout the denomination, stated the director. It is hoped that each will eventually raise a million dollars, with a third drive to be initiated later. Mr. Paramore then read a list of more than 60 individuals who have given \$1,000 or more to the building program. More than 50 Free Will Baptist churches were also recognized as having either given or pledged to give \$1,000 to the building fund. A special plaque, said Paramore, has been prepared for every church that joins the "One Thousand Church Campaign."

The service was concluded with the receiving of gifts totaling nearly \$6,000 and five new \$1,000 commitments.




Itinerary Planned For College Quartet



School Expecting Enrollment of **360**

A September enrollment of 360 students is anticipated, according to Dr. Robert Picirilli, the College registrar. This figure represents an expected increase of nearly seven percent over the 1966 fall enrollment.

The total enrollment for the 1966 school year reached 430, the largest ever recorded by the school.

Last year students came to Nashville from 32 states and three foreign countries. The following state totals were noted: Tennessee, 68; North Carolina, 64; Michigan, 28; Florida, 27; Missouri, 26; Oklahoma, 21; Arkansas, 20; South Carolina, 18; Virginia and Texas, 17; Illinois, 16; Alabama and Georgia, 15; Ohio, 11; Mississippi and West Virginia, 10; Kentucky 8; California, Idaho, Indiana, and Washington, 5; and nine other states with one each. Two students registered from Canada, one from Argentina, and one from Mexico.

OCTOBER 2, 3, 4, 1967

The Bible College will host its 18th denomination-wide Missionary Conference in early October. The services, under the sponsorship of Free Will Baptist Home and Foreign Missions departments, will be held in the school's Memorial Auditorium.

The conference will open on Monday evening, October 2, at 7:00 p.m. The missions department heads, the Reverends Homer Willis and Reford Wilson, will introduce the missionaries present and give a foreword concerning the aim of the conference and the program to follow. The evening message, "How to Pray for Missionaries," will be delivered by Reverend Dave Franks, returned missionary to Brazil.

On Tuesday, two studies will be conducted on Romanism and Animism, followed by the morning message, "How to Have a Missionary Home," by Reverend Wade Jernigan. Reverend Henry Van Kluyve, Director of Deputational Ministries for the Foreign Missions Department, will bring the evening message on "How to Give to Missions."

The Wednesday morning program will consist of a further study on Romanism, conducted by Dr. Robert Picirilli, Bible College registrar. The 11:00 a.m. message, "How to Have a Missionary Church," will be brought by Reverend Joe Hass, missionary appointee to India. Reverend Bob Shockey, field representative for Home Missions, will preach the final evening message, "How to Determine God's Will."

Other features of the conference will include area prayer groups, missionary displays, personal interviews, and a variety of afternoon workshop programs. A large number of outside guests are expected to attend.

". . the gift blindeth the wise . ."

TWO YEARS AGO Free Will Baptist Bible College ceased participating in the National Defense Student Loan Fund. This was the only Government program to which the Bible College has ever been related. And as time moves on, we see more clearly the wisdom of withdrawing from any programs of Federal assistance. Most colleges accept Federal money. Some presidents of church-related colleges have told me that they were afraid of what accepting Federal money would lead to. But they greatly felt the need for the money and were compelled to take it. Free Will Baptist Bible College has refused to do this. • It is the feeling of the Board of Trustees and the administration (and, I believe, most all Free Will Baptists) that it is better to be limited in our facilities and resources than to have Federal controls shackle this institution. It is true that there are many things that we could be enjoying today in the way of better facilities and more student loan money if we would accept Federal aid. But we have decided to live on income from Free Will Baptist sources. With the cost of education going up, it is imperative that churches and individuals re-appraise their giving. More income is essential. We do not have to accept any money with strings attached to it, but each of us must be willing to pay the price it takes to operate a growing college. • Pray with us about these things. Let us know if you are behind us in this effort. The greatest challenge in our history is now facing the Free Will Baptist denomination. We have come a long way in the last few years. May God keep us true and faithful to His Word in these closing days of this age.

This is what it's like when 380 students suddenly descend, en masse, upon the Bible College.

For three long months the Bible College campus has lain dormant. The halls have been empty; the stairways silent. With only the feet of a few campus workers to disturb, the hot summer sun has finally coaxed up a few blades of grass along the paths between buildings. And everyone revels in the leisurely pace of summer vacation.

But, with the arrival of mid-September, an explosion of activity shatters the tranquil campus atmosphere. Cars, bearing license plates of every hue, crowd one another for parking room. Automobile trunks are thrown open and spew an endless river of suitcases, foot lockers and shoe boxes onto the sidewalks. Squeals of delightful recognition echo and re-echo across the campus. The students are back.

Room assignments are immediately sought out and belongings moved in. Pictures of that special girl (or boy) back home are brought out and prominently displayed. But, of course, there are some who are dissatisfied with their room placements. Ex-roommates complain because they are no longer together (and, perhaps, a few because they are). But through all of this commotion and activity will run the quiet streams of prayer and Christian concern. Veterans, returning for their second, third or fourth years at school, will take the bewildered fledglings under their wings and diligently explain the "shalts" and "shalt nots" of Bible College life. There will be times of prayer and counselling among the students. And the faculty will smile, nod, and look very wise, secure in the knowledge that, miraculously, another school year has gotton off to a smooth start. A TRAINED MIND AND AN EVIL HEART WILL MAKE A DANGEROUS MAN. Education that either ignores God or laughs at Him will be the ruin of any nation. Our nation has had one of the best systems of education in the world. Even in our public school system the Word of God was respected and its moral principles were taught as the guides for moral behavior. The influence of the church affected our entire educational system. • But things have changed in the last decade in this respect and the moral principles taught in the Bible are no longer quide lines for behavior in our school system. With the Supreme Court ruling that prayer and Bible reading would not be allowed in our classrooms, we were given a godless school system that is now educating the mind of American youth without being able to teach the moral lessons from the Word of God. Many fine Christian school teachers are still trying to inject these teachings into their classrooms. but find themselves severely handicapped. The educational system that has brought America to its place of world leadership can be the very system that will be its destruction! 

Bible colleges and Christian liberal arts colleges represent two distinct approaches to Christian education.

Bible colleges insist that every student take a major in Bible. It is felt that a student cannot apply the implications of the Bible to every area of life and thought unless he is well acquainted with the Bible. The conviction is held that we cannot have Bible-centered education without putting the Bible at the center of the curriculum. Christian liberal arts colleges have not felt that it is necessary to require as much Bible in giving the student a Christian education. In most cases they require considerably less than a minor.

The Bible college has taken the approach that every student must be equipped to participate in the soul-winning and teaching ministries of the church. In keeping with this conviction, a Christian Service Department is maintained that involves each student in these vital ministries. Every student is expected to participate, whether he be layman, minister or missionary. Some Christian liberal arts colleges have promoted such programs but they have not been as ardent in their insistence that every student participate in them.

Bible colleges have taken seriously their conviction that our lives should be subjected to the authority of the Bible. In implementing this conviction, they have insisted that each student be a Christian and abide by high standards of Christian conduct. It is felt that a college should be Christian both in its teaching and in its living. While some Christian liberal arts colleges have sought to maintain high standards of Christian conduct, in most cases there has been a hesitancy in insisting on standards as high as those usually required by Bible colleges.

As a rule, Christian liberal arts colleges offer a broader curriculum than is offered in Bible colleges. In many of these colleges a student can find most any course that he would find in a state university. The Bible college has a greater spirit of hesitancy at this point. It is not that Bible colleges object to offering a broader curriculum. There is no objection, as such, as long as teachers are available who can properly relate the implications of the Bible to such courses. However, it is felt that a college's dedication to the authority of the Bible must not be jeopardized in order to expand the curriculum. Another consideration that the Bible college must keep in mind before expanding its curriculum is its conviction that priority must be given first to training students for church-related ministries. When a college operates on a limited income, it cannot afford to branch out into other areas of training if this would weaken the program of training Christian workers. The first educational responsibility of church-supported schools is to train workers for the carrying out of the Great Commission.

While there are some Christian liberal arts colleges that are true to the faith and have an evangelistic passion, the majority cannot have this said of them. Could it be that an analysis of the above things may suggest the reasons this is so?

While there is no guarantee that any school will remain faithful to its divine responsibility, it is felt that the place given to the Bible in a Bible college has an inbuilt safety device that will make a definite contribution to this end.



Furniture Projects Urged To Equip New Buildings

A small-project plan has been adopted to provide furniture for the Bible College's new men's dormitory and classroom building, Development Campaign Director Jack Paramore has announced. State Associations, Quarterly Meetings, Woman's Auxiliaries, Master's Men chapters, C.T.S. groups, and Sunday Schools throughout the denomination are being contacted and encouraged to adopt projects aimed at equipping these two buildings. The suggested projects, ranging from \$16 to \$7,000, are suitable for groups of any size. Projects of \$200 or more may be designated as memorials.

More than \$3,000 has already been raised, designated to furnish portions of the buildings. Sunday Schools, Auxiliaries and individuals have contacted the school, announcing their pledges to raise hundreds of dollars more.

Pressing needs for some items have forced the school to order furniture that has not yet been underwritten, but most of the furnishings will not be ordered until the school receives sufficient indications that Free Will Baptist people are willing to accept the burden of this need. Those planning to undertake furniture projects are asked to contact the Office of Development.

We read that Lot pitched his tent toward Sodom and chose to live in the city of Sodom, which was a modern city of that day. Back of his choice there had to be a conditioning of the mind and an acceptance of certain materialistic values. • The time had come when Abraham and Lot had to separate because their herdsmen were having trouble. Abraham permitted Lot to have first choice and Lot's choice was based on materialism. I have a feeling that Abraham preferred to live the simple life, where he could fellowship with God as he took care of his business. It is always dangerous to let materialism be the deciding factor in our decisions. • In the eyes of modern man. Lot made a wise choice. Perhaps his banker commended him. No doubt he asked Mrs. Lot what she would like to do. If it was a modern family, they had a family council and asked the opinion of the children. Naturally, the children wanted to live in the city where there were bright lights and better opportunities. Mrs. Lot likely felt that her daughters would move in better social circles. Lot may have had some apprehension about the family being brought up in wicked Sodom, but, if he did, it isn't mentioned. Not one time do we read that Lot considered the decision from a spiritual standpoint. He should have asked, "What will the influence of Sodom do to my children?". The well-watered plains for his cattle and the bright city lights for his family were the overwhelming influences in his choice. • As a result we see him in his old age pleading with wicked men to take his daughters for immoral purposes and spare his heavenly visitors from the most sickening, vile and depraved sin known to God or man. Later we see him trying to persuade his family to follow him out of the city to escape coming judgment. They laughed at him and he finally took his wife and daughters by the hand and got out of the city just in time to escape its destruction under the judgment of God. Even then, he lost his wife as she looked with longing and desire back toward the charred ruins of the city. • The long-ago decision made by Lot is still made by modern man. 
Ohio Student's Wife Joins College Staff
