

HAIR LENGTH-DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

In a local grocery store a man stepped into the check-out line behind a short-haired adult in slacks and a long-haired youth. As the line moved forward, the youth stood daydreaming. Being in a bit of a hurry, the man said to the individual in front of him, "Would you please ask the young lady to move forward?"

An indignant masculine voice replied, "I beg your pardon! That happens to be my son."

Quite embarrassed, the man apologized, "Oh, I'm so sorry, sir. I meant no offense. I didn't know that you were the boy's father. It's just that the long hair. . . ."

Interrupting him, the offended parent declared, "What's the matter with you, mister? Can't you see I'm the boy's mother?"

While you may not have faced such a confusing situation, you have probably had some difficulty in recent years in distinguishing young men from young women.

In reference to other heathen practices he again admonishes the Corinthian Christians, "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? . . . Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing, and I will receive you" (I Cor. 6: 14, 17). Following the same principle, the apostle John forbids the church to welcome a false prophet or recognize him as a Christian, for in so doing we become "partaker of his evil deeds" (II John 10, 11).

By the same token, long, hippie-like hair would identify Christian young men with causes from which they should disassociate themselves. Jerry Rubin, the radical youth leader, in his book, "Do It," said, "Young kids identify short hair with authority, discipline, unhappiness, boredom, hatred of life—and long hair with letting go. Wherever we go, our hair tells people where we stand on Vietnam, Wallace, campus disruption, and drugs. We are living TV commercials for the revolution. Long hair is the beginning of our liberation from sexual oppression."

A long-haired teen-ager is reported to have said, "Hair is an effective means of non-verbal communication. I don't need to tell my brothers, sisters, or my enemies, "Hey, Look! I'm against war, racism, poverty and pollution. I dig grass, black power and revolution, like to get stoned, listen to rock and make love!" They look at my hair and they know."

Some Christian young men will say that they do not wish to convey such a message by their long hair and that they just want to be in style (by the way, the trends seem to be moving back toward shorter hair for men). But if the general thinking of worldly youth and of secular society associates long hair with the cause of rebellion and revolution, does the Christian young man honestly want to be identified with such a cause? I hope not.

To Sum It Up

If the Scripture condemns long hair for men, insists on strict distinctions being maintained between men and women in their outward appearance, and warns the Christian against being identified with the wrong causes, it would seem clear that long, hippie-like hair, should be avoided by Christian young men. That may involve being different from the majority of young people.

God give us more young men and women with the attitude of the young man, Daniel, who "purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself..."

Trustee Dies In Truck Mishap

Owen Thomas, an outstanding North Carolina layman and in the middle of his eighth vear as a member of the Bible College board of trustees, died on January 17 when his truck turned over near his home in Four Oaks.

He was elected to the FWBBC board on July 13, 1966. by the National Association of FWB in session at Little Rock. Arkansas. President 1. Johnson describes his service in terms like "faithful . . . dependable." During his eight vears on the board, he never missed a meeting.

His love for the school preceeded his election to the hoard. He was active on behalf of the institution personally and in his church for many vears. Both of his daughters are alumni. His son-in-law, Ted Wilbanks, is on the music faculty.

Owen Thomas leaves his wife, Beatrice, his children: Kay, Beth, and Stanley; and a host of friends across the denomination.



Gain the MasteryA Plea for Purity

God's will for you is that you be chaste.

That fact is a bit out of vogue in 1974. If the pollsters are correct, less than half today's youth believe in premarital chastity as an ideal.

According to the publishers of Who's Who Among American High School Students, only 41% of 2,000 high school leaders polled disapproved of premarital experimentation. A 1971 survey prepared for a government commission on population re-

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ported that more than 46% of 4,611 girls interviewed had lost their virginity by the age of 20. Other than the common cold, venereal disease is the most common infectious disease among young people. Public health experts were calling it pandemic by 1973.

This does not mean everyone is morally corrupt. Most church youth are outstanding in their ideals. Yet, even they are not immune to the effects of the moral revolution.

In 1968 a study of 3,000 young people in evangelical churches was sponsored by the National Sunday School Association. Naturally, the study reflected the basic moral integrity of Christian youth. But it also revealed that the current hedonistic philosophy has made inroads into Christian homes and churches. Almost 12% of the youth polled either were uncertain that premarital sex was wrong or gave it their outright approval. Some 5.8% approved of fornication, and 7.3% admitted to practicing it. Many in this small group attended Sunday School at a Bible-believing church every Sunday. A few were avowedly dedicated.

In the NSSA study, evangelical youth ranked fornication below stealing, cheating in school, swearing, and lying in seriousness. They considered it only slightly more serious than talking back to their parents or skipping private devotions. The respectability of impurity is a new phenomenon in our society.

As a young person in the twentieth century, you are not in a unique position, however. There have been other periods when impurity was quite respectable if not actually considered a

virtue. In I Thessalonians 4:3-7 Paul gave instruction to some people who lived in a similar moral climate:

"This is the will of God, that you should be holy: you must abstain from fornication; each one of you must learn to gain mastery over his body, to hallow it and honour it, not giving way to lust like the pagans who are ignorant of God; and no man must do his brother wrong in this matter, or invade his rights, because as we told you before with all emphasis, the Lord punishes all such offenses. For God has called us to holiness, not to impurity" (NEB).

This is God's word for us today too.

Why Does God Care?

God places great value on purity because He is pure. All sin is abominable, but the sins of immorality seem to come under the particular wrath of God. Under the law such sins as adultery, homosexuality, and bestiality meant death for the transgressor. These sins at their worst represent the depths of the cesspool of human depravity. Romans 1:26-28 indicates that one of the worst judgments of God upon men in this present life is to turn them over to the depths of immorality.

Why does God so abhor impurity? First, it defies His revealed law and is an affront to His own holy nature. Then it is despicable because it is a direct attack upon the marriage relationship.

The home was the first institution ordained by God. It is an illustration of the relationship between God and His people. No matter what form it takes, in or out of marriage, impurity is an attack upon the home. This sin defrauds the future mate of that which he or she has a right to expect. In the case of adultery the robbery is even more obvious.

One of the most terrible things about the sin of impurity is that it is

a sin against the one creature made in the image of God. It destroys the dignity and worth of the individual. More than any other, it is a sin which desecrates the body (I Corinthians 6:18). The body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, I Corinthians 6:19 declares. The Christian person belongs to God in his entirety—including his body. A Christian is not at liberty to be impure. He belongs to God (I Corinthians 6:13b). It is unthinkable that one would take that which belongs to God and put it to such a vile use.

Play Now -- Pay Later

The price tag on impurity is exceedingly high. Those who yield to the enticements of the world and the flesh in this matter are life-time losers. The blush of innocence once plucked from the cheeks of youth is gone forever. The loss is irretrievable. One can never experience that full purpose of purity to which God has called him. The good, the noble, the excellent thing has slipped through his fingers. The sin of the flesh robs the body of health, the mind of peace, and the soul of hope. The Bible plainly declares that all manner of sexual sins are works of the flesh. As such they indicate that the transgressor is under the wrath of God. He has no hope of heaven or eternal life (Galatians 6:19, 20; Ephesians 5:3-6).

Some insist that the standard of Biblical purity is not realistic or practical in our day. Over a decade ago clergymen in certain European countries were advocating that the church refrain from preaching against fornication because over half of the young couples were already expecting their first child at the time of their weddings. That theme has since been

You can and must keep yourself pure even in the midst of a sex-mad culture. To do so you must be alert to the dangers that confront you. Not the least of these is the "playboy philosophy" which puts physical pleasure above all virtues. Do not be misled even by religious leaders who assure you there is nothing wrong with satisfying your desires outside marriage. Time magazine (August 21, 1972) says, "Among liberal clergymen, at least, there is something of a scramble to keep up with youthful ideas on sex." Paul's answer is appropriate: "Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience" (Ephesians 5:6).

A God-Changed Mind

Though it ultimately involves the body in acts of sin, impurity is basically a matter of the heart and mind. The surest safe-guard against impurity is to follow Paul's injunction in Romans 12:2a . . . "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind. . . ." Our minds are constantly bombarded by the media and society as a whole with things that would corrupt. If we would not fall into the world's patterns of thought and practice, we must let God transform our minds by meditating on the Word of God and things that are noble and pure. Proverbs 23:7 warns "For as a man thinketh in his heart so is he." Jesus taught, "For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications . . . (Matthew 15:19). Guard your thoughts. "Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life" (Proverbs 4:23).

To preserve purity in thought and deed, you will have to be particularly discriminating in your choice of entertainment. Television programs, read-

ing materials, music, and scores of other influences can be sources of pollution that corrupt the heart and provoke evil thoughts and impure desires. Provocative dress styles were intended to stimulate base desires. They serve their function well, and every sincere Christian will avoid them when he realizes their effect. Paul warned Timothy to "flee youthful lusts" (II Timothy 2:22). When sexual temptation arises, run from it (I Corinthians 6:18). Do not try to wage a battle of the will. Remove yourself from the scene of temptation.

Moral purity is not an optional matter to be chosen only by a few "supersaints." It is God's will for all His people—young and old. Paul commanded young Timothy to be an example to fellow believers in the matter of purity (I Timothy 4:12). Moral standards are not to be determined by public opinions or practices. The truths of God are unchanging. The Bible is the authority for our moral values. God commands purity. All else is sin, no matter how lightly society views it.

Free Will Baptist Bible College is committed to God and His Word. We endeavor to help serious Christian young people strengthen their moral fiber and preserve their moral integrity through sound Biblical teaching in the classroom and equally sound Biblical standards of conduct. We believe purity has its own rewards—a clear conscience, peace of mind, and God's approval. "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God" (Matthew 5:8).

'73-'74 Student Body Numbers 637

A record 637 students enrolled for Bible College classes during the 1973-74 school year, the Registrar's Office reported recently. This 7 percent above the 1972-73 enrollment of 595 and continues to indicate a healthy pattern of growth for the school.

Within the student body, 201 young men prepared for the pastoral ministry and 57 students planned to enter missionary service.

Sixty-nine seniors comprise the largest graduating class in the school's history. Other classes numbered 224 freshmen, 159 sophomores, 90 juniors and 95 special students.

A healthy number of married students continue to lend maturity to the entire student body. There were 235 married students in the current student body—37 percent of the entire group.

Witnessing Students Win 678 To Christ

Through March 15, Bible College students had preached 1,798 messages, taught 2,070 classes and led 678 people to the Lord during the present school year, according to Religious Activities Director Joseph Ange.

All students enrolled for classes participate in some Christian service every week, as assigned by the Christian Service Department. Fifty-nine different groups go out from the school weekly to such places as shopping centers, the Tennessee State Prison for Women, hospitals, convalescent centers, and church neighborhoods for person-to-person witnessing. They report monthly on their assignments and list what results they have seen.

In this way, Bible College students put to use the tools they are given in the classroom, mature in their Christian witness, and grow in their burden for lost people. This is only one of the "extra dimensions" of education at Free Will Baptist Bible College.



Workers are a priority.

Regardless of the weapons of warfare a nation may possess, it cannot have an effective army without trained men. No matter what amount of machinery any farmer owns, he cannot reap his crops without men. Nor can the Free Will Baptist denomination hope for a spiritual harvest without men.

The Free Will Baptist denomination is growing. New churches are being founded. Almost every state and national mission board is pleading for workers. Churches are in desperate need of educational directors, musicians, teachers for Christian day schools, grammar schools and high schools. Many "part-time" churches are making the transition to "full-time" services and need a pastor. Writers, photographers and artists to work for Christian publications are in great demand. "The laborers are few."

Must we look to the churches alone for these men? Can untrained men lead the trained men of this generation? Will the secular institutions adequately equip men for these places that require dedicated servants with the spirit of Christ controlling them?

If the answer to all of these questions is "As a rule—no!" then the answer for Free Will Baptists must come from Free Will Baptist

Trustees Adopt \$280,000 Gift Budget For 1974-75

A 1974-75 general fund gift budget of \$280,000—just \$5,000 over last year's budget —was recommended for the school by the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting on campus in May. With rising costs and a mounting enrollment, this will mean a tightening of the institutional belt during the next school year.

The reason for the modest increase was the failure to meet the 1973-74 gift budget. Giving to the college fell more than \$17,800 short of the \$275,000 it was estimated that the school would need. Only ten states (*designated below) met or exceeded their quotas. Fourteen states failed to equal what they had given to the school the previous year.


chaplain.

College Buys New Property On West End

The college used the building last school year as a meeting place for some classes under a lease arrangement with the owner. While no announcement has been made as to how the school will utilize the new property, there are indications that some administrative offices will be moved in order to relieve congestion in the Administration Building.

Trustees Approve College's Program Of Teacher Training

A teacher training program, designed to prepare teachers for a ministry in our churches' Christian day schools, has been approved by the Bible College Board of Trustees and the administration has begun work to implement the new program as early as possible. The program will lead to a major in Elementary Education.

Evidence of the need for such a program is abundant. More than 90 Bible College students in school last year indicated at least tentative plans to teach. Ten of this year's 65 degree graduates have minors in Elementary Education, in spite of the fact that this minor has only been available for two years. Representatives of various Christian day schools regularly visit the campus to interview students for possible employment.

The new program will combine the standard Bible major with the Elementary Education major and a core in general education. It is planned to meet all requirements of the Tennessee State Department of for certification. though state approval for the program has not yet been sought.

The faculty judged the new program to be fully in accord with the school's unique purpose as a Bible college. President L. C. Johnson stressed that the program is not so much to train young people for a profession, but to provide workers for a new and growing ministry.





Summer Session,

One hundred students from 17 states enrolled in the Bible College's 1974 Summer Session, May 20-31. While most were regular FWBBC students, taking advantage of the opportunity to pick up a few hours of credit, 17 others came just for summer classes. Dean Charles Thigpen indicated that the college is considering the expansion of summer studies, possibly by next year.



Measure of Our Task



The test of a school is found in what it does to its students. Notice, I said "to its students," not "for its students."

Usually what we do "to" a person is intangible. The test of good teaching is the same. To take "stu-

dents" who are not students at all and stimulate them and get them excited about learning is the first qualification of good teaching.

We sometimes feel that since the students we teach are not the academically elite we can afford to be satisfied with mediocrity. We should warn ourselves at this point. Would it not be the noble thing, the Christian thing, to look upon student deficiencies as a challenge to greater effort on our part?


To take an ideal and measure it to an actual situation is to find the measure of our task.

After such measurement, we can do one of two things: (1) Blame the student for his deficiencies and excuse ourselves for his substandard achievements, or (2) Go to work to fill in the gap between. The latter is our approach.

To do this requires dedication. It requires the extra mile; the giving of the cloak also. There must not be any other assumed duties that will hinder our divine calling to this ministry of training young people to live and work for Christ.



College Alumni Meet in Wichita

Approximately 250 Bible College alumni met for a luncheon during the National Association last July in Wichita, Kansas.

Alumni President Richard Cordell presented a four-point proposal "as the first step in an effort to broaden the effectiveness of the Alumni Association's relationship to Free Will Baptist Bible College." His recommendations included (1) a request that the Alumni Association be granted an annual opportunity to address the student body concerning their future participation in the Association, (2) an Alumni Award to be presented each spring to a selected senior, (3) the recognition annually of an "Outstanding Alumnus of The Year" and (4) a closer relationship between the Association and the school's administration and Board of Trustees. The proposal was referred to the executive committee further study.

Jack Paramore reported that alumni have pledged and given \$76,466 to their \$70,000-pool project and recommended that the Association declare the project fulfilled and adopt a



new project. The group voted to adopt the purchase of the school's new Patton Property for \$95,000, plus \$5,000 in promotional expenses, for a total project of \$100,000. Gifts and pledges totaling nearly \$25,000 were received before the conclusion of the meeting.

August General Fund Sets Record for Gifts

August was a record income month for the Bible College General Fund, the Office of Public Relations reports. Gifts totaled \$28,551, exceeding by nearly \$800 the previous record month, April, 1973.

A spokesman for the office attributed the gift hike to the work done among churches by faculty members during the summer.

School to Host Principals' Conf.

The Bible College will host its third Christian Day School Principals' Conference on cam-**October** 10-11. DUS Dean Charles Thigpen announced recently.



Summer Walk-A-Thons Net \$11,000 For School

Bible College Walk-A-Thons held by churches during the summer have resulted in gifts of \$11,453.15 to the school. Some Walk-A-Thons were held by a number of churches in area efforts, but at least 42 individual churches participated in the drive.

The Canton FWB Church, Canton, North Carolina, netted the largest income from a single Walk-A-Thon with \$2,500.

Jack Paramore, Director of Development, who participated in at least one "Walk" during the summer, expressed his appreciation for every church and individual whose cooperation made the program a success.

T times you hear someone describing an individual or a church, or perhaps an institution, as being evangelistic or not evangelistic. Then perhaps the person might say that the individual, church, or institution is true to the Bible but not evangelistic. If evangelism means the proclamation of the Gospel, it would be impossible to be true to the Bible and not believe in evangelism.

Historically Free Will Baptist Bible College has been active in evangelism. The first year of its operation the ministerial students began an organized effort to evangelize people in the city of Nashville and the surrounding communities. This effort was conducted primarily by going to the small towns in the area and preaching on Saturdays on the courthouse square and handing out tracts on the streets of the city. Later this effort was formalized into what is now the Christian Service Department.


As far as possible every student for the last 30 years who has enrolled in the institution has been assigned some duty directly related to evangelism. For many years this program was assigned as a part-time duty to some professor who was particularly interested in this type of ministry. With the growth of the student body, it became evident that it was more than a part-time job.

Three years ago Dr. Joseph Ange was employed to head this department and to make sure that the ministry of evangelism was not a side issue at Free Will Baptist Bible College. He has organized the student body into 57 groups, each group going out once a week engaged in the ministry of evangelism. The ministry includes every conceivable type of witnessing that a metropolitan area affords: Street groups, tract distribution, child evangelism, house to house visitation directed by local pastors and many others. As our academic program grew, it became necessary for us to place greater emphasis on evangelism to be sure that we did not lose the original purpose for the existence of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

COMMANDED TO EVANGELIZE

The Word of God clearly commands Christians to evangelize.

Let us try to imagine that a Christian was not interested in the ministry of evangelization but was interested in obeying the teachings of the Word of God. His commitment to obedience to the teachings of the Scriptures would compel him to evangelize whether or not his heart was in it. There is no way to argue whether we are responsible to evangelize or not evan-



gelize. The orders are clear. Free Will Baptist Bible College could not be a fundamental Bible-believing institution and not be committed to evangelism.

It is my opinion that there is a greater emphasis on evangelism in the churches of our denomination than at any time in our history. I think that Free Will Baptist Bible College can legitimately share in the credit for this growing concern to reach men with the Gospel.

DEDICATION BEGETS EVANGELISM

Obeying the commands of Scripture to evangelize might lead to a mechanical effort in this ministry, but the dedication of our lives to the Lord Jesus Christ begets the spirit of evangelism. It seems to me that it would be totally contradictory for a person to say that he was fully surrendered to the Lord, yet show no concern for lost people. The very spirit of the Christian experience leads to a desire to share.

If Free Will Baptist Bible College, through its teachings and overall Christian emphasis, can lead a student to a full surrender of his life to the Lord Jesus Christ, that student will automatically believe in evangelism and will have a desire to share the Gospel with others. All that is needed from this point is proper guidance and instructions. This is being provided through the Christian Service Department.

METHODS OF EVANGELISM

Perhaps the greatest point of discussion in the matter of evangelism has been concerning methods. It would not be proper for Free Will Baptist Bible College to attempt to dictate to a church or pastor the methods that he should use in evangelism. I doubt that there is any set pattern that should be used in every church or by every brother.

The only observations that Free Will Baptist Bible College should make to the young ministerial students whom it teaches is that whatever method is used must be compatible with the teachings of the Word of God, as well as the spirit of the Word. Whatever the Word of God has to say to the servant of God about being grave and sober must be considered as we attempt to win men to Christ and to build them up in the faith. No effort to reach men for Christ that would violate the

principle of being grave and sober in the work of the Lord can be justified. The application of these principles must be left to the individual pastor or church.

It is my feeling that there is a reasonable degree of flexibility in the use of methods and, as an institution, it is not our responsibility to be the "setter forth" of methods unless they are clearly defined in Scripture.

Free Will Baptist Bible College strongly believes in evangelism, but would only raise the caution that it must be done within the framework of the spirit and the teachings of Scripture.

Ministerial Students Get Field Experience

Eighteen ministerial students at FWBBC spent the summer applying their classroom lessons to actual situations in the school's summer internship program. The students worked under the direction of experienced pastors in eight states, from North Carolina to Wyoming, doing personal soul winning, directing vacation Bible schools, music programs, teaching, preaching, visiting, canvassing, and performing the full range of pastoral duties.

Dr. Joseph Ange, Director of Religious Activities for the school and initiator of the summer internship program, lists at least five results: (1) Souls were saved, (2) young Christians were taught and encouraged to witness, (3) the interns saw the ministry firsthand, (4) many discerned weaknesses and strengths in themselves, and (5) the pastors were assisted in their work by the interns.

Every intern recommended that other ministerial students enroll in the program. Most pastors also expressed their willingness to continue working with young ministerial students.

College Choir Tours Illinois Churches

The 38 members of the College Choir, with Choir Director Abe Baerg and Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman, made a weekend tour among FWB churches in Illinois October 25-27.

The group left the college aboard a chartered bus on Friday afternoon. Their first service was in Sesser, IL, with subsequent services in Ina, Cisne, and Johnston City. Visits along the way included a side trip to Mr. Ketteman's home and, for some choir members, a trip to some of the coal mines in the area.

The choir returned to Nashville late Sunday night. The Public Relations Office reports offerings of about \$2,200 for the tour.



Fall Banquet On Campus

The Bible College's fall banquet, held on campus October 18, featured a medieval theme entitled "Camelot." Approximately 275 students and teachers attended the affair in the college's Cumberland Cafeteria.

The faculty planning committee put together a program that consisted of Madrigal singers, a pantomimist, a reading of "The Lady of Shallot," and a dramatic account of the discovery of King Arthur as the rightful regent of Camelot. Both teachers and students participated in the program.

The next college-sponsored banquet will be held February 14.

Christmas Goal \$20,000

Over 500 Bible College representatives will scatter across the denomination in mid-December in an attempt to raise \$20,000 in General Fund gifts for the school. These representatives are the entire student body who will be going home for Christmas vacation and hoping to hold services in their home churches and to contact individuals on behalf of the college.

The school's Public Relations Department is busy contacting pastors who have young people in school from their churches in hopes that they will schedule a College Day service for the students while they are home. Director of Public Relations Paul Ketteman says, "Through these services with the students, I hope that Free Will Baptists will be challenged to pray for and financially support the work of the Bible College."

Last year students raised \$11,200 for the school during their vacation period. This year's goal is felt to be within reach but will demand the participation of every student and the cooperation of home churches.

Students Practice Weekly Evangelism

Every Bible College student is either witnessing in some form of individual Christian service or is involved in the activities of one of 57 groups sent out into Nashville by the college, reports Dr. Joseph Ange, Director of Religious Activities.

In his report to the administration on November 5, Dr. Ange listed the following Christian service figures for the current school year:

Accreditation Doors May Be Opening More For Bible Colleges

Potentially significant changes in the accreditation of Bible colleges came to light at the recent meeting of the American Association of Bible Colleges (AABC) in Chicago. These changes could bring greater national recognition of the value of Christian education as practiced by Free Will Baptist Bible College and other schools who are members of AABC.

Dean Charles Thigpen, who attended the meeting with FWBBC Treasurer E. B. McDonald on Oct. 31-Nov. 2, reported to the faculty that on January 1, 1975 two major accrediting bodies will merge to form a new body in which Bible colleges will have representation. This new organization, to be known as the Council on Post-secondary Accreditation (COPA), will result from the merger of the Federation of Regional Accrediting Commissions of Higher Education (FRACHE) and the National Commission on Accrediting (NCA). COPA will consist of a 36-member board on which one member will speak as a representative of Bible colleges across America. This representation could foster a greater appreciation for the philosophy of Christian education that is practiced in the 69 Bible colleges that belong to the AABC.

In addition to the 69 full and associate memberships held by fundamental schools in AABC, 20 colleges now hold applicant status, which could make the organization reach a total membership of 89. These schools represent a 1974-75 enrollment of 33,674 students.

The AABC has worked with Bible colleges for 28 years in an effort to improve the quality of Christian education on the college level. Hopefully, these efforts will eventually result in COPA's recognition of the excellent work being done in these Bible colleges.

Christian Day Schools Organize Fellowship

The principals formally organized a Fellowship of Free Will Baptist Christian Day Schools (FFW-BCDS) to work among the denomination's growing number of churchsponsored schools.

Dr. Stuart Crane, a noted Christian lecturer whose area of specialty is economics, spoke to the group several times during the conference and shared his insights into the results of the Protestant Reformation, the Civil War, and the "big money interests" of modern wars.

Officers elected by the FFW-BCDS were Lorenza Stox, president; Sigbee Dilda, vice president; Mike Boggs, secretary; and Steve Ange, treasurer.

The immediate goals of the Fellowship will be to offer help to existing and future day schools in the form of listings of available books in the field, a directory of present Free Will Baptist day schools, the publication of a newsletter, and announcements of seminars and institutes of help in the field of Christian education. The possibility of both academic and athletic competition among member schools was also discussed.

The next meeting of the Fellowship is scheduled for March 16-20 in Nashville and will be held in conjunction with the Bible College's spring Bible Conference. The college's next Principals' Conference will be held on campus October 9-10, 1975.

Among the criteria considered by the faculty in making the nominations were the students' scholarship ability, participation and leadership in academic and extracurricular activities, citizenship and service to the


college, and potential for future achievement.
