New B.S. Programs Include Major In Christian Education

The college Board of Trustees, at its winter meeting on campus, December 10-11, approved the addition to the FWBBC catalog of several new Bachelor of Science Degree programs.

Briefly, these additions are:

- -A major in Christian Education
- A teacher education program for high school teachers
- "Custom" programs, to be formed by combining existing programs

The Trustees also voted to change the present two-year Business Certificate award to an Associate of Science Degree.

The new major in Christian Education will be to prepare students for a ministry as full-time directors of Christian Education. The 124-hour program supplements two existing B.S. programs offering majors in music and music-Christian education combined.

Another program will prepare students to teach Bible and/or English on a high school level. While they may specialize in either of the fields, most will be encouraged to prepare in both areas since this would make it easier for them to find practice teaching opportunities and employment openings. A total of 124 hours of preparation will be required to specialize in one field, and 134 hours if the student wishes to be prepared in both fields. Programs to prepare high school teachers in other areas—such as music, physical education, history and speech—may be added later.


The custom B.S. programs will allow students to combine training in two fields, much like the music/Christian education combination program. Thus, a custom program in business/Christian education could be formulated for the student who wants to serve as a Christian school Business Manager or Church Secretary, while directing its Christian education program. Other combinations might be business/church music

church music. All custom programs will have to be approved by a faculty committee. This committee will also set the specific requirements for each program.

The growing number of new programs available at FWBBC and the flexibility of the custom programs mean that the young person who chooses the Bible College is even more assured that he can get full training in the ministry to which God has called him.

Spring Enrollment Up From Last Year

A total of 504 enrolled for spring semester classes in early January, bringing the total 1980-81 enrollment to 581 students from 35 states and six foreign countries, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar.

He is especially pleased with the spring semester enrollment and cited several reasons in a recent report. "First, the total enrollment is 504, up from 483 last January. Also, we have an unusually high number of first semester students who returned—451, compared with 421 last year." Other increases he noted are in the number of states students are coming from, and increases in the numbers of men students, married students, and missions students.


Nearly 40 percent of the students who enrolled this year are either training for the preaching ministry or preparing for missionary service. There have been 170 ministerial students and 60 missions students in the 1980-81 student body.

By classes there were 80 seniors, 100 juniors, 144 sophomores, 219 freshmen, and 38 special students at FWBBC this year.

Special College Service Honors Rev. John Welch

The college honored a Free Will Baptist pioneer in a special service December 12 held in Memorial Auditorium. The Reverend John Welch, who served for 11 years on the FWBBC Board of Trustees (10 years as its chairman), has influenced virtually every ministry carried on today by Free Will Baptists. Much of this influence was described in a tribute to Rev. Welch that was written and read by Dr. Mary Wisehart.

The service was directed by President Charles Thigpen and included tributes by family and friends. Those speaking in tribute were Brother Welch's daughter, Mrs. William Henderson; Dr. L. C. Johnson; Dr. Robert E. Picirilli; and the Reverend William H. Oliver. The College Choir and Mixed Chorus, directed by Dr. Vernon Whaley, brought special music.

In the early years of this century, Brother Welch was a strong supporter of Eureka (FWB) College in Ayden, NC. After the college's main building burned, he was elected in 1931 to the Board of Education of the General Conference, and served as its chairman. In 1932 he was elected Secretary of Education and charged with the responsibility of checking out the possibility of starting a school. After the National Association of Free Will Baptists was organized at his church in 1935, Welch encouraged the delegates to consider Nashville as a possible location for a college, and it was his daughter, Jean, who gave an impassioned plea to the National Association, meeting in Bryan, Texas, for Free Will Baptists to start a college for young people like her. As pastor of Cofer's Chapel, he and his late wife, "Miss Mary," were constant friends of the college and those who attended it.

The college is proud to have had the opportunity to honor this choice servant of the Lord, who is approaching his 92nd year. Few friends have been as fine and faithful as

Trustees Hold Mid-year Meeting

The Free Will Baptist Bible College Board of Trustees, including three new members, met on campus December 10-11 to review the school's mid-year standing.

While finding healthy growth in the Development Campaign to underwrite the \$400,000expansion of Memorial Auditorium, the board found reasons to be concerned over general fund income. Gifts are running about 10% behind the amount needed to meet the \$570,000gift budget.

The trustees approved a number of new academic programs and the addition of a teacher in the Music Department. (See related articles.)

The board was pleased with the denomination's response to appeals for support of the new Graduate School, to be opened in 1982. Some \$84,000 in gifts and commitments had been received by the end of November on the \$250,000 drive.

New trustees welcomed at this meeting were Rev. Clarence Burton, Rev. W. B. Hughes, and Dr. Douglas Simpson. Other members are Rev. Randy Cox, Mr. Bobby Floars, Rev. Tom Malone, Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, Rev. Dann Patrick, and Rev. James Earl Raper.

The trustees are scheduled to meet again in May.

Students, Staff Raise \$53,000 In Annual Christmas Project

Nearly \$53,000 has come to the college general fund as the result of the Christmas Project—a drive by students and employees conducted during the holidays. Gifts were added up in a special Tally Day chapel service January 8. They totaled \$45,501.42. Gifts arriving late pushed the total over \$52,000. The final figure, according to Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman, is \$52,972.45.

Students turned their gifts over to Mr. Ketteman, who read the amount and the student(s) who brought it in. The total was announced when all gifts were tallied. The largest single gift was \$3,502.75, brought in by Brian Peters, a sophomore from First FWB Church, Newport News, VA.

Mr. Ketteman was pleased with the results, though the drive fell some short of the \$62,500-goal. "We can underwrite the gift portion of the general operation of the college for a month as a result of the Christmas Project," he said.

The drive has become an important annual event of the FWBBC campus.

Record Number Attend Fall Welcome Days

Following a successful Welcome Days in December, the college is gearing up for a spring repeat of the bi-annual campus "open house.'

December 4-6 the college had 245 visitors from 60 churches in 14 states, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar. This is a record attendance at fall Welcome Days, compared to 232 in 1979, and 172 in 1978. Of the 245, 108 were girls, 70 were boys, and 67 were sponsors.




Nusic, Drama Teams To Travel

College Faces Gift Budget Deficit

BIBLE CONFERENCE 1981: ENCOURAGING THE SAINTS

Hundreds of alumni and friends of Free Will Baptist Bible College joined the college family for the annual Bible Conference, March 8-12. Even gasoline prices approaching \$1.50 per gallon did not seriously hinder attendance. As usual, excellent Bible preaching, soul-stirring music, and fellowship with friends are the words which best describe the Bible Conference. Chancellor L. C. Johnson observed in his opening remarks, "Every conference we have ever had has been outstanding in some way." This conference was no exception.

A sense of need and earnest desire was expressed at the very start of the conference. A musical call to worship, "Count Your Blessings," played by a trumpet trio, seemed to set the mood for the first service. In his opening prayer, President Charles Thigpen expressed the feeling of all when he entreated God to anoint the preachers and to meet with His people. Appropriately, the opening hymn was "Let Him Have His Way With Thee." As he presided over the first service, Dr. Johnson also encouraged prayer for the conference. There seemed to be a definite longing for God's blessings as the congregation sang "All For Jesus" and Dr. Vernon Whaley introduced the conference theme chorus, "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus."

No theme was designated for the conference, but the Lord coordinated the preaching and orchestrated the musical selections in a manner no program committee could hope to duplicate. One pastor noted, "I like the way every message has centered around Jesus." Judging by comments heard during the conference, many were burdened by the pressures and disappointments of life. In a special way, the preaching seemed to be peculiarly addressed to that major need—encouraging the Lord's people.

There was not the great revival that many prayed for, but who will deny that God's Spirit rested upon His preachers or that He indeed met with His people? Not the pastor who declared on Monday night, "I just got here, but if I had to turn around and go home tonight, this message was worth the trip. I needed that." Not the brother who said, "I don't know what I would have done if God had not met my needs as He has through this conference." Not the college students who yielded their lives for full time service for God. Not the teenage boy who heard God's call to preach. Not the many weary soldiers of Christ who received encouragement and new strength to return refreshed to do battle for the Lord.

Speakers for the conference were Dr. Stewart Custer, Rev. Don Pegram, Dr. Robert Picirilli, and Rev. Bert Tippett. Dr. Picirilli and Rev. Tippett are members of the college administration. Dr. Custer is chairman of the Bible Division of Bob Jones University's School of Religion. Rev. Pegram is the director of the newly created Division of Church Growth and Evangelism of the National Home Missions Department.

In addition to presenting practical exposition of the Word, Dr. Custer illustrated various techniques of Bible study in his four messages. Professor Custer built his messages around the theme of The Christian Life. The first two messages presented Christ as Savior and as the Good Shepherd. God's Faithfulness and Providential work in the lives of His people were emphasized in the last two sermons.

No stranger to the Bible Conference platform, Don Pegram directed himself to the needs which he discerned. In his dynamic, colorful style he addressed himself to the concerns of both students and visitors. Rev. Pegram urged faithfulness to God and His work regardless of how we feel, assuring us that it does pay to serve the Lord. He also challenged us to respond to the call of God and proclaimed the fulness of the Spirit as the only adequate preparation for doing God's work. In his final message, Brother Pegram spoke on the essentials for building a growing church.

In his first appearance as a Bible Conference speaker, Bert Tippett brought three timely messages. He addressed himself especially to the needs of the students. However, pastors and other visitors were heard to comment on how helpful they found his messages. Brother Tippett's first message was a declaration that God directs in the lives of His children and that He is faithful to make His will known. In the second message Rev. Tippett spoke on how God makes His will known. The final message extolled love as the logo or badge of Christianity.

Dean Robert Picirilli delivered three edifying expositions from Hebrews 12 on the subject of God's chastisement. Dr. Picirilli dealt with the meaning of chastisement, its purpose, and our response. Not only were the expositions of the Word a blessing, but we were assured that God's discipline is itself a priceless blessing. Personally, I have never felt so grateful for the discipline of the Lord.

Spirited congregational singing was augmented by special music performed by students, faculty members, and conference guests Mrs. Ann Thigpen Maines, Dr. Malcolm Fry, and Rev. Fred Hall. On Wednesday evening the college choir gave a mini-concert which featured a collection of children's songs and choruses.

The 1981 conference included several alumni activities. Prospective 1981 graduates and alumni shared a time of fellowship after the Monday evening service. Alumni were guests at a dinner on Wednesday where they heard brief remarks from Dr. Johnson and Dr. Thigpen. Perhaps the high point of the week for alumni athletes (?) was a one point, last minute, come-from-behind victory on the basketball court over the 1981 senior men.

The staff has already begun work on a supplement to the yearbook that will cover spring semester events.



Seventy-two graduates from 21 states and two foreign countries make up Free Will Baptist Bible College's class of 1981. They were honored at several events during the college's recent Commencement Week, May 10-14.

Commencement Week began on Sunday night, May 10, with the Baccalaureate Service. The messenger for the service was Rev. Randy Cox, chairman of the board of trustees, pastor of the Raleigh (NC) First Free Will Baptist Church, and father of one of the graduates. He took his text from Psalms 57, 108, and 112, speaking on "Needed: Fixed Hearts."

Tuesday and Wednesday evenings were reserved for performances by the Evangel Players drama team and the College Choir.

Graduates and their families attended a breakfast in their honor on Wednesday morning and enjoyed a meal of ham and scrambled eggs.

The highlight of the week was Graduation exercises, held Thursday morning, May 14, in the college Activities Building. The challenge was delivered by Rev. Ralph Hampton, chairman of the Christian Ministries Department and father of one of the graduates. Soon after the final "amen," the students and guests had loaded cars, trucks, and vans, and were scattering across the country. The campus was quiet; the streets empty. But the summer will pass quickly and, should Christ tarry, August will bring a fresh crop of freshmen and the familiar faces of returning students to the Nashville campus, and a new school year will begin.

Mrs. Brown is concluding four years of work as student supervisor and assistant dean of women. She and Kyle, her husband, are going to Ahoskie, N.C.


Mrs. Freeman worked three years as faculty secretary. She and her husband, John, are moving to Muscle Shoals, Ala.

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"WHY NOT HAVE A BIBLE COLLEGE DAY?" by Larry Hughes

If you have already read the news article that accompanies this testimony, you have already seen that the people of the Canton (NC) FWB Church recently raised over \$24,000 for the Bible College and set a new FWBBC record for the largest single gift from a church. We praise God for what He enabled us to do, but it took us eight years to build up the momentum for this year's drive.

Let me tell you how it began, back in 1974, right after I accepted the pastorate of the Canton Church.

Rev. Bob King, who was working with the college's Development Office then, stopped by one day and asked me if I would consider having a walk-a-thon and a College Day. Many others were doing it then, he said, so I agreed to try it, even though I had only been at the church for a few months.

My first efforts at promoting the idea did not meet with much success. My people seemed reluctant to try something so new. Very few volunteers signed up to participate in the walk-a-thon. The apparent lack of enthusiasm threatened to destroy the whole drive before we could even get it started.

I do not like to start something and leave it unfinished. And I did not want to see this drive fail. So, I began to contact people personally and asked them to join our walk-athon. At first, only a few agreed. Then they began to take pledges, and others agreed to sign up. I could feel the excitement begin to build. Our Master's Men chapter and Woman's Auxiliary began to sponsor a picnic to climax the day. By the time our big day dawned, we had 60 volunteers ready to walk!

But heavy clouds hung low over Canton that morning. I held my breath and prayed! We met at the starting line at 8 a.m. and started walking. As we walked, God blew the clouds away and gave us a beautiful day! The fellowship along the route and at the finish line was sweet for all of us.

The church agreed that all Sunday offerings would be added to the walk-a-thon gifts to go to the Bible College. When we totaled up our funds, we had \$2,500 for the Bible College! Our people were nearly as thrilled as I was.

Every year since then, the enthusiasm and the response for the college have grown. We have set a goal every year, feeling like each one was a step of faith. And God has blessed by providing enough to take us over every goal we set.

Perhaps the greatest boost to our drive for the college has been our discovery of the matching gift program sponsored by Champion International Paper Company in

Canton. Several of our people work for Champion. Every gift these people make to FWBBC is matched by the company. I just had one of our men who works for Champion to go by the personnel office and pick up some copies of the matching gift form. which I distributed to our Champion employees. Some were afraid that the forms would be complicated, but they weren't. (Don't let little hindrances keep you from enjoying even richer blessings!) In the past two vears alone, Champion has given over \$17,000 in matching funds to FWBBC! I only regret the years of giving when we could have been doing so much more through the matching gift program. (You may have some matching gift companies in your community. Write the college for a list.)

Perhaps you are where I was eight years ago. You have never had a special Bible College Day, and you may be afraid to try it. Some facets of our drive, such as the walk-athon, may not suit your situation. Let me encourage you to tailor your special Bible College drive to fit your church. I can only say, as I look back over eight special drives for our college, as I consider their impact on our young people and their families, and as I rejoice over some \$80,000 our church has channeled to FWBBC, I must say, "Thank God for the challenge Bob King left with me back in 1974: 'Why don't you have a Bible College Day?' "

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Rev. Hughes, a 1972 FWBBC graduate, joined the college Public Relations Department in July. One of his objectives will be to help churches schedule annual Bible College days.

N. C. Church Raises Record \$24,000 In Special Bible College Weekend

The Canton (NC) FWB Church raised a record \$24,319.93 for Free Will Baptist Bible College in its eighth annual FWBBC weekend June 13-14. According to Public Relations Director Paul J. Ketteman, this is the largest single gift the college has received from a church. Pastor Larry Hughes was delighted to see the church exceed its \$20,000-goal for the drive.


This is the eighth Bible College Day that Rev. Hughes has conducted at the Canton Church since 1974. Total gifts to the college in the annual drive are \$80,566.80. The main features of the event have been a 10-mile walk-a-thon on Saturday and a special representative from the college to fill the pulpit on Sunday.

Rev. Hughes says that one of the key factors in the success of the drive, which has exceeded its goal every year, is the matching gift program participated in by Champion International Paper Company of Canton. This year, 25 employees of Champion who are members of the church made gifts to the college on College Day, ranging from \$50 to \$2,000. Together, they gave \$10,278.70. Champion will match this amount, bringing the total to \$20,557.40. (A free list of all matching gift companies is available. Please write the college.)

This year, 40 people, ranging in age from five to 65, participated in the walk-a-thon. Miss Shannon Cope, age nine, raised the most money by collecting \$1,283 for the college. The pastor's 12-year-old daughter, Miss Sherri Hughes, came in second by raising \$1,269.

Alabama Pastor To Conduct Fall Campus Revival

College Begins Renovation Of Oldest Campus Building

Davidson Hall, the first building owned by FWBBC, is being completely renovated in a two-summer plan that will eventually raise it to the standard of newer college buildings, says E. Bayless McDonald, Treasurer. The work will include leveling the floors, increasing the electrical service, rewiring, air conditioning, and general redecoration. The redecoration includes fresh paint, new flooring, and acoustical wall coverings. The building, now used by the Music Department, will also gain several new practice rooms after the college repartitions the space available.

Work on the building is being supervised by T. L. Burch, a former teacher at the college who is founder of Church Builders, Inc., a Christian contracting firm. The job will not be finished until next summer and is expected to cost about \$50,000. This will be the first major improvement in the building since it was purchased in 1942.

Davidson Hall was bought by the National Association of Free Will Baptists to house the college when the school was just being started. Through the years, the building has served as a dormitory, dining hall, dating lounge, office building, classroom facility, and campus landmark.

Other projects being carried out this summer include a new roof for the Boyce Dormitory porch and new draperies for Polston Hall, as the college prepares for the coming of students in late August.

Free Will Baptists gave \$745,404.50 to the Bible College during the 1980-81 fiscal year (June 1—May 31), according to President Charles A. Thigpen. Of this amount, \$505,623.84 was directed to the general fund, \$176, 932.54 went to the building fund, and \$62,848.12 was designated for the planned Graduate School. President Thigpen noted that this is the greatest annual gift support in the college's history.

In spite of this record giving, general fund gifts fell nearly \$65,000 short of the \$570,000-budget, though gifts exceeded those of the previous year by over \$11,000. Eight states went over their suggested gift quotas, according to Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman. They are: California (132%), Colorado (105%), Indiana (105%), Maine (123%), Minnesota (133%), New Mexico (134%), South Carolina (116%), and Virginia (108%). The board of trustees has set the 1981-82 general fund gift budget at \$580,000. State quotas are listed below.

Support for the building fund is healthy, according to Ronald Creech, Director of Development. He notes that two pieces of property, including a 70-acre tract valued at over \$40,000, have been given to the college this year. Mr. Creech is currently looking for seven men who will join three who have already committed to give \$100,000 each to the building fund in the next 10 years.

In the college's effort to raise \$250,000 before the opening of the Graduate School in August 1982, the President reports that 34 individuals and churches have already given \$1,000 each and joined the Founders Club. The total raised by the end of May, including commitments, checkbooks, and a bond, was nearly \$125,000. Dr. Thigpen pointed out that this puts the drive right on schedule.

Healthy Fall Enrollment Indicated By Total of Summer Applicants

The Bible College may see a "bumper-crop" of freshmen this fall, according to recent statements by FWBBC Registrar Charles E. Hampton. He says, "While the numbers may change, the fall enrollment figures certainly look encouraging." He went on to say that the number of new students coming this August seems to be the highest in several years. "The number of returning students is also high," he added. He expects that the college dormitories will probably be filled to near capacity when school opens August 27.

Dr. Hampton pointed to the college's more intensive efforts to recruit students as one of the factors in the apparently strong interest by new students. "Our fall enrollment should be healthy," he said. "Since it comes on the heels of a good enrollment last fall, I would say that we are seeing some of the fruit we hoped our recruitment program would bring the college."

For the past two years the college has been working harder than ever to contact prospective students. This effort has included two annual Welcome Days, more student groups visiting churches, requests that pastors send the college lists of prospective students, and a higher volume of mail contacts. "We are not trying to attract all kinds of students," Dr. Hampton stressed. "We just want to be sure that our best Free Will Baptist young people know what FWBBC can do for them."

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40th Year Begins With Record Enrollment

A record 587 students enrolled at Free Will Baptist Bible College in August, an increase of 14 percent over last year, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, registrar. President Charles A. Thigpen says, "God has both honored our prayers and rewarded our efforts in this record enrollment."

Last year's enrollment was 513, and the previous record was 562, set in 1977. This year's enrollment figure does not include five FWBBC graduates who are taking the first course that will count for credit when the college opens its Graduate School in August 1982. All five are local ministers.

Students this year have come from 34 states and six foreign countries. While noting that most students have come from states like North Carolina, Tennessee, and Alabama, which usually are well represented, Dr. Hampton noted that other states, like Kentucky, South Carolina, and Virginia, are sending more young people to FWBBC than last year.

"The number of foreign students has doubled since last year," he says. This includes four Canadians who enrolled this fall. Three of these are from the Canadian Association of Free Will Baptists, which joined the National Association in July. Nine students are MK's (Missionary Kids).

The enrollment growth is seen primarily in the number of new students who have come this fall and in the high percentage of sophomores who returned from last year, observes Dr. Hampton. "This speaks well of the recruitment and retention efforts of the entire college family," he says. President Thigpen added, "Our Welcome Days have attracted hundreds of young people to visit our campus, while various college personnel and traveling groups had student recruitment as one of their main objectives."

Two areas where recent increases have been seen are especially gratifying. Ministerial students number 157, up from 141 last year. The number of missions students is also up, 80 this semester, compared to 53 last year. Both of these groups will grow through the course of the year as students answer God's call to these ministries.

With the exploding interest in private church schools across the denomination, college personnel were interested to note that 29% of the freshman class and 21% of the entire student body came from Christian schools. Three of these schools have ten or more students in the present student body (Liberty Christian Academy, Guin, AL-12; Woodbine Christian Academy, Nashville, TN-10; and Faith Christian






Academy, Goldsboro, NC-10). Seven others have sent between five and seven students to FWBBC this fall. Dr. Hampton says that our Christian schools are serving as increasingly effective "feeders" for FWBBC.

Several churches have also figured prominently in the new record enrollment. Gateway FWB Church of Virginia Beach, VA, leads all churches in sending students, with 18 at FWBBC this year. Others with outstanding records are Faith FWB, Goldsboro, NC (12); Woodbine FWB, Nashville, TN (10); and Cofer's Chapel FWB, Nashville, TN and First FWB, Raleigh, NC (9 each).

By classes, this fall's student body numbers 73 seniors, 94 juniors, 158 sophomores, 219 freshmen and 43 special students. This semester's student body is comprised of 225 new students and 362 returnees; 314 men and 273 women.

Home missions will be highlighted October 26-28 when the college hosts its annual Missionary Conference, according to plans announced by President Charles A. Thigpen. The home missions emphasis will be alternated from year to year with a foreign missions emphasis, he said.

This year's speakers will include home missionaries and members of the Home Missions Department staff. The missionaries are Rev. Ernie Ross, who is ministering in St. Paul, MN, and Rev. Bill Fulcher, who will soon begin working with Spanish-speaking Americans. Departmental speakers are General Director Roy Thomas, Associate Director Trymon Messer, and Director of Development John Gibbs.

Pray that God will use this year's conference to challenge the entire FWBBC family.

Eight Staff Workers Added For 1981-82 School Year





Fall Campus Revival Called One of College's Best

The Reverend Tom Malone, pastor of the First FWB Church of Florence, Alabama, conducted an outstanding campus revival October 7-11, according to Dr. Joseph Ange, director of religious activities. He says, "Tom Malone, in his person and in his preaching, truly related to our students and faculty." He went on to say, "His preaching and personal counseling truly hit the mark."

Dev. Director Recovering From Recent Heart Surgery

Ronald Creech, director of development, has made excellent progress following heart surgery performed in Nashville on November 4. Doctors at St. Thomas Hospital replaced the aortic valve with a mechanical tilting disc valve to increase blood flow to the heart. Mr. Creech knew for some time that he had a heart murmur, and has been under medical observation for two years. The valve replacement corrected a condition created by calcium deposits that had decreased the flow of blood.

Members of the college administration and staff have pitched in to continue the work of the Development Office during Mr. Creech's absence. President Charles A. Thigpen and Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman conducted two fund-raising dinners in North Carolina that Mr. Creech had planned and raised nearly \$30,000 for the building fund.

Creech was released from the hospital November 17 and is recuperating at home. He and his wife, Mary Belle, have received numerous phone calls, letters, cards, and telegrams from friends around the country. 'We thank God for everyone who expressed concern or assured us of prayers," Mr. Creech said, "The Lord certainly blessed me during my surgery and recovery. Mary Belle and I will be thanking many friends in the weeks to come for their expressions of concern."

FWBBC Recruitment Team Visits Arkansas Youth Camp

Fourteen FWBBC teachers and students took a sample of the Bible College to Arkansas, October 16-17, and met with teens from across the state at Camp Beaverfork, near Conway. The purpose of the trip was to acquaint the young Razorbacks with the advantages available to them at the Bible College.

The effort was directed, from the college's end, by Dr. Charles Hampton, who supervises the school's recruitment efforts. State Promotional Director David Joslin, working with a planning committee, made all arrangements for the state.

Accompanying Dr. Hampton were Dr. Mary Wisehart, chairman of the English/Speech Department; Dr. Vernon Whaley, Music Department coordinator; and Bert Tippett, publications director. Ten students—The Living Hope Quartet and The Master's Players Drama Team—also made the trip.


The choir's traditional spring tour is being planned now and will follow the annual Bible Conference in March.

Theme verse for the conference was Leviticus 25:10b, "...proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."


