College Announces Conference Speakers

The 1982 Bible Conference will feature four speakers, according to Dr. Robert Picirilli, dean. They are Dr. Alfred Martin, Rev. Dennis Wiggs, Rev. Joseph Jones, and Dr. Kenneth Riggs. The dates for the conference are March 7-11.

Dr. Martin, a teacher at Dallas Bible College, has been active for many years in the American Association of Bible Colleges. He was on the executive committee for 10 years and served as vice president and president. He also served two years on the Board of Directors of the Council on Postsecondary Accreditation (COPA). Dr. Martin served 31 years on the faculty of Moody Bible Institute, where he also was dean, vice president and dean of education. He has written several books and correspondence courses for Moody Press.

Rev. Wiggs has been a highly respected and successful Free Will Baptist pastor for 20 years. He currently pastors the First FWB Church of Beaufort, North Carolina. He is on the General Board of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and has been on the Board of Foreign Missions. Wiggs is a graduate of Bob Jones University and did graduate studies at Columbia Bible College.

Rev. Jones, a member of the English/

Speech faculty, has taught at FWBBC since 1967. He earned his B.A. at the college and received his B.S. and M.A. from the University of Alabama. At FWBBC, he was president of the student body and was chosen Outstanding Student for 1964-65. Jones has directed a number of outstanding dramatic productions for the college.

Dr. Riggs, Chairman of FWBBC's Teacher Education Department, has been on the school's faculty since 1971. He is recognized as an outstanding preacher and maintains an active preaching ministry. After receiving his B.A. from the Bible College, he earned an M.S. at Old Dominion University, an M.Ed. at Middle Tennessee State University, and a Ph.D. at George Peabody College.

The FWBBC Alumni Association will hold its annual meeting during the conference. Association President Gene Outland encourages alumni to attend the conference and alumni activities.

The annual conference has featured great preaching for nearly four decades. This year's meeting will continue that tradition. Plan now to be among the 1,200-1,500 who will enjoy the 1982 Bible Conference, March 7-11,



The Saints also won the college's first tournament, in 1979.

Mark Johnson, the college athletic director said that the teams were well prepared and the competition was good. "This was probably the most balanced tournament we've had to date, in terms of competitiveness," he added.

Mississippi Couple Makes First Annuity Gift

Choir, Drama Tours Schedules Announced





Graduation week begins with the baccalaureate service and ends with commencement exercises. Other special events include a concert by the College Choir and a breakfast for the graduates and their families, hosted by the college.

648 Enrollment Sets New Student Record

A record 648 students enrolled at FWBBC for the 1981-82 school year, according to Registrar Charles E. Hampton. They came from 35 states and six foreign countries, his records show.

The largest number from one state is the 108 from North Carolina. Other states that are well represented in this year's student body are Tennessee (96), Alabama (61), Virginia (51).

The spring semester registration, completed in early January, saw 49 new students join returnees for a total semester enrollment of 533.

It is significant that 40% of the student body is preparing either for the preaching ministry or the mission field. Ministerial students number 175. Missions students total 86.

We thank God for this outstanding group of young people.

Christmas Project Tops \$55,000, Passes 1981 Total

Students, faculty and staff returned from Christmas holidays with nearly \$53,000 in gifts for the college, according to Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman. The funds were raised while the college family was home for the vacation and were turned in and totaled at a special chapel service held on campus January 7.

The total finally reached \$55,290.52 before the drive was officially closed, surpassing last year's total of \$53,749 by over \$1,500.

Except for \$4,500, all of the money raised has been in cash, signed monthly checkbooks, and corporate matching gifts. Mr. Ketteman also pointed out that raising it cost the college virtually nothing, since it was done voluntarily.

The Christmas Project receipts will help the college meet its \$580,000-general fund gift budget for 1981-82.

Graduate School On Schedule, Areas of Study Outlined

Plans for the new Graduate School are taking shape well, according to President Charles A. Thigpen. He sees no barrier to opening the school on schedule in August 1982. Seven students—all FWBBC graduates who live in the Nashville area—have enrolled in the first Graduate School courses, which were taught by Dr. Robert Woodard during the fall and spring semesters of this school year.

The school will open with a one-year program for ministerial students who have already completed an undergraduate major in Bible. The graduate program will lead to a master's degree in pastoral studies. Eight major subject areas will be covered in the program, according to FWBBC Dean Robert Picirilli. These areas will be broken down into specific courses which will be announced later. The eight areas are:

OLD TESTAMENT—A Biblical theology approach will be taken. The Old Testament will be dealt with as a whole and theological themes will be studied in selected books/ portions. Attention will be given to the covenants as providing the basic framework for the progress of revelation.

NEW TESTAMENT—The approach will be Biblical exegesis. Methods of exegesis will be studied and selected portions will be exegeted. The goal is to provide a foundation for the Biblical/expository preaching of the New Testament.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY—The Arminian and Calvinistic systems, as well as the other conservative views, will be compared.

BIBLICAL PREACHING—The preparation

and delivery of expository messages will be featured. The emphasis will be on careful interpretation and application of the Word. Methods of Bible study also will be treated. **PASTORAL LEADERSHIP/CHURCH DEVELOPMENT**—This study will view the Biblical concept of the ministry, interpersonal relationships, various philosophies of church growth, and church administration, including church finances.

BIBLICAL COUNSELING—This study area will include both one-on-one counseling and the preaching and church life that meets people's needs. The Biblical teachings on personality will be examined. Practical counseling experience may be included.

CHURCH HISTORY—The history of the Church in its post-reformation period, especially in America, will be studied.

APOLOGETICS/CONTEMPORARY

THOUGHT—Biblical teachings will be set in and against current thought patterns. The perspective will be Biblical/theological, rather than philosophical. Defense against various forms of Biblical criticism may be included.

Financial support for the Graduate School has been fair, according to Dr. Thigpen. Over \$147,000 in gifts and commitments had come in through February, including 65 Founder's Club gifts of \$1,000 or more. Dr. Thigpen estimates that it will cost \$250,000 to launch the Graduate School.




Excellent Sales Reported For New Choir Album



College Graduates 40th Anniversary Class

Seventy-five graduates received degrees and diplomas at the college's 1982 Commencement Exercise held on campus May 13, bringing to a close the school's 40th year of ministry. Dr. L. C. Johnson, the first president and only chancellor of the school, delivered the baccalaureate message on Sunday evening, May 9, and brought a graduation challenge on Thursday, May 13.

Twenty-nine graduates received the Bachelor of Arts Degree, 25 the Bachelor of Science Degree, 14 the three-year Christian Worker's Bible Diploma, and seven the two-year Associate of Science in Business Degree. One of the largest graduation crowds ever assembled in the activities building witnessed the event.



The Bible College recently bought three pieces of property on Richland Avenue, east of the campus, for \$264,500. This includes three existing brick buildings that, for the time being, will be rented to married students. Eventually, the buildings could be used to house up to 46 single students, if the college's enrollment makes it necessary to add more dormitory space.

The addition of the new property is part of the college's general expansion plan. Property to the west and north of the college is to remain residential, according to city zoning codes, so the logical direction in which to expand the campus is east.

\$41,230 Given To Bible College= In Matching Gift Programs


In 1981-82, FWBBC received more money in corporate matching gifts than it did from nearly 90% of the states that support the college! Only four states—Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee exceeded the \$41,230.27 that came from 67 companies that matched their employees' gifts to the college.

The number of companies sending matching gifts to FWBBC is up by 20 from 1980-81; the total amount of matching gifts is \$13,775 higher.

Over 800 companies in the U.S. and Canada match gifts their employees make to educational institutions. Some match dollar for dollar. Others double, and even triple, the amount given by an employee.

A record \$715,473.87 in gifts to the college's general and building funds was reported recently for the 1981-82 fiscal year. President Charles A. Thigpen thanked Free Will Baptists for their generous support for their college when he addressed the denomination's representatives at the National Association of Free Will Baptists, meeting in Fort Worth, Texas.

General fund gifts, which help to cover day-to-day operating expenses, totaled \$571,144.12. This fell just barely short of the \$580,000-gift budget adopted for the year. Eight states exceeded their gift quotas for the year: California (109%), Colorado (135%), Georgia (104%), Minnesota (117%), Nebraska (129%), North Carolina (121%), South Carolina (104%), and Tennessee (115%). North Carolina led all states in support for both the general fund (\$102,460.44) and the building fund (\$79,514.88) for a total of \$181,974.88 (about 25% of the total gift income for the year). The college's board of trustees has set the 1982-83 general fund gift budget at \$600,000.

The building fund also enjoyed healthy support for the year, receiving \$144,329.75.

Does what again? Breaks another College Day fund-raising record!





College Enrolls 510 For Fall Semester

The Bible College enrolled 510 undergraduate students from 32 states and six foreign countries for the fall semester of the 1982-83 school year, Dr. Charles Hampton, registrar, recently announced. The enrollment is down from the record 587 enrolled last fall.

Compared to 1981-82, of the 32 states represented both years, 12 sent more students this year, 12 sent fewer and nine were the same both years. North Carolina has sent 99 students for the fall semesters of both years and is the state with the most students enrolled.

This semester there are 268 men and 242 women in the student body. Of these, 379 are single and 131 are married.

By classes, the college enrolled 183 freshmen, 137 sophomores, 93 juniors, 75 seniors and 22 special students.

There are 117 ministerial students and 74 missions students in the student body.






