
Statement of Recommitment

(The following was read by President Charles A. Thigpen at the Convocation dedicating the Graduate School of Free Will Baptist Bible College on December 7, 1982.)

Free Will Baptist Bible College began with certain basic commitments. I would like to rehearse them briefly and renew our pledge to those same commitments:

- Free Will Baptist Bible College has been and still is dedicated to a basic loyalty to the Word of God. We consider it to be infallible, inerrant, plenarily inspired. It was given, over a period of some 1,400 years, to some 40 human authors, each one guided by the Holy Spirit as he wrote. We acknowledge again that it is our only rule of faith and practice.
- 2. In addition to our recommitment to the Word of God, we commit ourselves anew to the God of the Bible. He took it upon Himself to fully and clearly reveal Himself to us through both the Old and New Testaments. He is the God of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, David, Peter, Paul, and John. Our God is one Being, ever present in three distinct personalities: God, the Father; God, the Son; and God, the Holy Spirit. These members of the Godhead are co-equal, co-eternal, and co-existent.
- 3. We recommit ourselves to the Gospel that saves men from sin. The Bible tells of sin's entrance into the human family, affecting all of Adam's race. But the Bible also tells us of repentance from sin and of faith in Christ as the means of salvation. This Gospel, when believed in the heart, not only saves from sin, but initiates a new life. Paul says, "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (II Corinthians 5:17).
- 4. We commit ourselves anew to the spread of the Gospel around the world. The Gospel is for the entire world. It is for every creature within that world. Every person is a candidate for salvation. Our commitment includes Christian witness and church planting around the world.
- 5. We also recommit ourselves to effectively train every student for the Christian ministry. This includes ministers, missionaries, and all who are preparing for church vocations. It also includes those who will labor in other fields of service, but will faithfully serve the Lord and His Church. This includes our responsibility to lead, by precept and example, every student to be a true witness and soulwinner for Jesus Christ.
- We recommit ourselves to the concept of excellence.
 Nothing short of true Christian scholarship is our goal.
 God deserves and demands the absolute best from each of us.
- 7. Finally, we recommit ourselves to the type of Christian living that best reflects God's image—separated Christians, living clean, holy lives. God says through Isaiah, "...be ye clean, that bear the vessels of the Lord" (Isaiah 52:11b). Also included is our recommitment to be bond-servants of the Lord, Who reminds us, "Whosoever of you will be the chiefest, shall be servant of all" (Mark 10:44).



Total 1982-83 Enrollment is 569

Forty-eight new students enrolled for the spring semester January 4 and boosted the total enrollment for the 1982-83 school year to 569, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, registrar. This is 79 below last year's record 648, but only 12 below the 581 who enrolled in 1980-81. Students came this year from 32 states and seven foreign countries.

President Charles A. Thigpen noted two factors in the decline. "The economy is definitely a factor," he said. More and more students face financial difficulties as their parents are laid off work, he observed. The college's Financial Aid Director, Tom Sass, says that over a third of the students in school have taken loans with his office and many more have secured loans elsewhere. Dr. Thigpen also cited recent denominational tensions as an obvious factor in the enrollment picture.

The spring semester enrollment is 460. This is a decline of 9.8 percent from the fall semester's 510. This is a fairly typical spring drop, according to Dr. Robert Picirilli, dean.

By classes, this year's enrollment was 204 freshmen, 148 sophomores, 98 juniors, 79 seniors, and 40 special students. The college enrolled 126 ministerial students and 81 missions students, according to Dr. Hampton.



FWBBC President, Dean Chosen by Accrediting Association

President Charles A. Thigpen and Dean Robert Picirilli were both tapped for posts in the American Association of Bible Colleges (AABC) at the body's annual meeting in Kansas City, October 28-30. Dr. Thigpen was chosen for a four-year term as association vice president/president elect. Dr. Picirilli will serve on the AABC's Commission on Research.

AABC Executive Director Randall Bell described Dr. Thigpen's service to the association as long and distinguished. Dr. Thigpen was a member-at-large on the Board of Directors and served as AABC treasurer. He has been both chairman and member of the Accrediting Commission and a member of the AABC Task Force on Long Range Planning. Dr. Thigpen will serve for two years as vice president and another two years as AABC president.

The AABC serves 100 member Bible colleges in the U.S. and Canada. It is recognized as the representative accrediting body for such schools and is a member of the Council on Post-secondary Accreditation (COPA).

Christian Service:

At The College's Heart

"...the Christian Service Department of FWBBC thrives at the very heart of the school's life and purpose. It serves as the channel for the practical, the experiential; it functions as the 'on-the-job' training ground for students."

FWBBC students reported leading nearly 600 people to Jesus Christ during the first four months of the 1982-83 school year, according to a report released by the school's Christian Service Director. While commendable, this number is not viewed by Garnett Reid as good enough. "Many doors are open to our students, yet many adversaries would keep them from entering these doors," he reported recently to President Charles Thiappen.

The task of directing some 500 students as they preach, teach, and witness in the Nashville area has fallen on willing, able shoulders. Rev. Reid, who resigned the Cross Timbers FWB Church in Nashville to work for the college, has taken to the job with enthusiasm. During the fall semester, he organized 62 groups of students and placed approximately 100 others in individual assignments.

Some students were assigned to work in the 21 FWB churches in the area. They taught, preached, led singing, visited, and performed numerous other tasks. Others carried on prison/jail ministries, visited hospitals and nursing homes, conducted services in various places, and held scores of Bible clubs for children.

The results speak for themselves. In ad-

dition to those who were saved, students dealt with over 5,600 people about spiritual needs and saw 614 other decisions. They passed out over 28,000 tracts, preached 1,052 messages, and taught nearly 1,500 classes.

In a recent weekend revival, three students reported over 200 decisions for salvation and rededication. "Even though we were there," one of them says, "we can't take any of the credit...The church had been praying for months. We dare say that their prayers were answered!"

Rev. Reid has listed several goals for improving the effectiveness of the Christian service program. First, he wants to improve follow-up on decisions. People who make decisions for Christ are directed to local FWB churches. Special follow-up materials are also sent to them. But there is much room for improvement, Reid says. Second, he wants to publish a Christian Service Handbook for every student. He has already begun to write it. Finally, he wants to train students to do a better job in their specific assignments. He envisions how-to sessions in which students can learn door-to-door witnessing, street tract distribution, hospital ministering, etc. One of his ideas is to hold a "Personal Evangelism Weekend" on campus during which students can be challenged and instructed.

Mr. Reid's burden for his ministry was evident when he recently reported to President Thigpen: "I sense, as I know you do, an everincreasing urgency in 'being about' our Father's business. The task of reaching people for Christ is awesome and our time for fulfilling that task is fleeting."

College Graduates 73 In Spring Commencement

Regardless of any personal opinion on the technicalities involved, no teacher will be permitted to make any effort of any kind to influence any student to believe that there was fermentation involved, or otherwise to make any issue of it.


Denomination Picks New FWBBC Trustees



Free Will Baptists gave nearly \$684,000 in general and building fund support to Free Will Baptist Bible College during the 1982-83 fiscal year, according to E. B. McDonald, Treasurer of the school. Alumni Association projects and Graduate School gifts pushed the total for the year to a record \$727,672.45.

General fund gifts totaled a record \$589,212.60. Although this was barely short of the \$600,000 gift budget, Public Relations Director Paul Ketteman was pleased. "Twelve states and the Virgin Islands exceeded their quotas for the year," he observed. Trustees, meeting on campus in May, set the 1983-84 general fund gift budget at \$650,000.

The college's building fund received \$94,690.53 during the year. Much of this came from three states: Georgia, North Carolina and Tennessee. Development Director Ronald Creech is busy raising \$264,500 to underwrite a 1982 campus expansion.

Alumni project gifts to the Dr. and Mrs. L. C. Johnson Student Loan Fund and to help pay for new college property totaled \$18,440.52. Graduate school gifts were \$25,328.80.

Christian Service Groups Report 2,500 Decisions

Students led 1,059 people to Christ and reported 1,511 other decisions during the 1982-83 school year, according to Garnett Reid, Christian Service Director. His report to President Charles A. Thigpen spanned eight months of Christian service activities, September through April.

He also reported that students gave out more than 55,000 gospel tracts, sang 4,100 specials and preached more than 2,300 sermons.

Mr. Reid was involved as both planner and participant in the Christian service activities, going out with some 20 groups during the year. Other faculty members have participated regularly in Christian service groups, he reports.

Some 65 different student groups conducted services at Nashville Union Mission, the Metro Jail and at other places around the city. They also conducted Bible clubs, including one especially for Asian refugee children. Other groups ministered to runaway teens who have made their way to Nashville.

Looking toward the future, Mr. Reid plans to have a Christian Service Handbook ready for students by this fall. He also wants to improve follow up on people who make decisions. He says, "I feel we could and should be discipling through our churches more of the 1,000-plus who make professions of

Trustees Approve New Programs, Set \$650,000-Gift Budget

The college's board of trustees met on campus May 10, during Commencement Week, to review the 1982-83 school year and to lay plans for the future.

The board approved two new programs for school teachers that will be offered this fall, says President Charles A. Thigpen. One is a program for music teachers. It includes preparation to teach music from kindergarten through grade 12. President Thigpen noted, "More and more of our Christian day schools are providing various music opportunities, so there is beginning to be a demand for teachers prepared in this field." The other new program is one to train teachers for kindergarten. (See more on these new programs elsewhere in this issue.)

Trustees set the 1983-84 general fund budget at \$650,000, up \$50,000 from last year's budget. State quotas are listed in this issue of the Bulletin.

President Thigpen said that the trustees directed special attention to the college's Christian Service Department. They gave high praise to the director, Garnett Reid, who is completing his first year as head of this ministry. (See a special report elsewhere in this issue.)


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




"Excellent Spirit" Seen In Fall Student Body

"We have never had a better school opening than we had this year," said President Charles A. Thigpen as he analyzed the beginning of the college's 1983-84 year.

Free Will Baptist Bible College enrolled 467 students from 29 states and seven foreign countries on August 23-24, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, registrar. This includes ten men who are enrolled in the Graduate School. However, the enrollment figure does not include 33 who are registered but are not taking classes for credit, Dr. Hampton says.

North Carolina, with 83 in the fall student body, has the most enrollees of any state. Tennessee is close behind, with 82. Indiana, running a distant third with 32, is to be commended, however, since this fall's Hoosier enrollment is 88 percent higher than last fall's.

Foreign countries represented this semester are Brazil, Canada, France, Haiti, Ivory Coast, Japan and Spain. Twelve students enrolled from foreign countries.

At first glance, this fall's 10 graduate students do not appear to represent much of an increase over the nine from August, 1982. However, Dr. Robert Picirilli, dean of the Graduate School, points out that six of this year's graduate school students are full time, compared to only one who was full time last fall. He also especially is pleased to note that all three Free Will Baptist colleges—FWBBC, Hillsdale and California

Christian—are represented this semester in the Graduate School.

The college enrolled 99 ministerial students and 66 mission students at the beginning of the semester. Both figures generally grow considerably through the school year as young people answer God's call to these ministries.

Concerning the enrollment, President Thigpen says, "Our fall enrollment is larger than we expected, even though it is down from last fall. We are pleased with this enrollment. There is an excellent spirit among the students."

Pray for the students and workers at Free Will Baptist Bible College this year. It is a joy to be a part of this great ministry.

Area Free Will Baptists are invited to join the Bible College Family for this special evening of sacred music.





Bible Conference To Feature Evangelist, Pastors, Teacher

The college's 1984 Bible Conference, scheduled for March 4-8, will display a full-spectrum program of preaching that will include an evangelist, two Free Will Baptist pastors and one of the college's own teachers, according to President Charles A. Thigpen. The speakers are Dr. Monroe Parker, Rev. Hobert Ashby, Rev. James Puckett and Rev. Garnett Reid.

Dr. Parker will bring with him the experience he has gained in more than 1,200 evangelistic campaigns conducted in 46 states. He is truly one of America's leading evangelists. His lifelong service to Jesus Christ has included the presidency of Pillsbury Baptist College and membership on the boards of several Christian schools, including Bob Jones University, Mid-Western Baptist College and San Francisco Baptist Theological Seminary. He is a great preacher and a fervent soulwinner.

Rev. Ashby, pastor of Dayton First FWB Church, is one of Ohio's leading preachers. In nearly 30 years of preaching, he has pastored only two churches, including 23 years spent at his present pastorate. Ohio Free Will Baptists have twice elected him state moderator, and he presently serves on the National Home Missions Board. He and his wife, Betty, have two children, both of whom attended FWBBC. Stephen is a preacher, now in seminary, and Pamela is a teacher. Rev. Ashby's pastoral experiences qualify him to be a preacher to preachers, as well as to laymen.

Rev. James Puckett is a 1962 FWBBC graduate who has enjoyed God's blessings on pastorates in Florida, Georgia and Oklahoma. He is in his seventh year as pastor of the Southern Oaks FWB Church in Oklahoma City, where he is preaching two Sunday morning


services each week. A native of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, Puckett has also pastored the Deerfield Beach FWB Church in Florida and the Bellview FWB Church of Colquitt, Georgia. He served on the Florida State Home Missions Board and now serves on the National Home Missions Board. He is also a member of the Oklahoma State Sunday School Board. He and his wife, Judy, have three children.

Rev. Reid is widely acknowledged to be one of the best young preachers among Free Will Baptists. His burden for soulwinning and love for people attracted the attention of FWBBC personnel. In 1982 they asked him to join the faculty as Director of Christian Service. Prior to that, he served four years as pastor of the Cross Timbers FWB Church in Nashville. Reid is a 1977 summa cum laude graduate of FWBBC. He was student body president, yearbook editor and was on the dean's list for all four years. He earned his M.A. at Bob Jones University in 1978. His warm heart and intellectual depth will make his Bible Conference messages worth hearing.

The college's Music Department will provide a host of musical delights, from solos to productions by the College Choir, Mixed Chorus and Concert Band.

Alumni have traditionally considered Bible Conference to be annual homecoming time. Alumni President Gene Outland is planning times for alumni to conduct business and enjoy fellowship throughout the week.

The college's annual Missionary Conference was held on campus October 31-November 2. The missionary speakers were Rev. Larry Russell from Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Rev. Ken Walker from Deerfield Beach, Florida; and Rev. Jerry McClary from Omaha, Nebraska. Home Missions General Director Roy Thomas and Director of Evangelism Connie Cariker also spoke.

Scores of young people responded to invitations to do the will of God. The front of the auditorium was full and many knelt to pray in the aisles.

The Home Missions Department's attractive booth, set up in the lounge adjoining the auditorium, displayed an abundance of material on evangelism and church building. and others.

Finally, Bobby Aycock, a former missionary who now teaches missions for the college, described the speakers as "able and enthusiastic." He felt that the students responded to the invitations without coercion.

Aycock feels that the cause of missions is strong on the FWBBC campus. "Missions used to be somewhat isolated on campus," he said. "But now an interest in missions seems to have infiltrated all aspects of campus life. A lot of people, even outside of the missions department, are emphasizing missions."

Spring Welcome Days Set For April 5-7



Academic Building Reroofing Costs College \$30,000

When Free Will Baptist Bible College personnel inspected the roof of the college's Ennis Academic Building this fall, they were only expecting to find a few places to repair before winter. After all, the 16-year-old building's roof should have been good for 20 vears.

But, their inspection determined that a complete reroofing would be essential to protect the college's investment in the building. The \$30,000 cost of this project had not been anticipated in the 1983-84 budget, but the job would have to be done nonetheless.

A contractor was secured and now the roof is done, with great improvement to the building. The coal tar pitch roof was applied over three inches of insulation to enhance the building's energy efficiency. New flashing was also installed, matching the structure's aluminum window trim. The new roof should last considerably longer than the original, according to the contractor.

The college's financial burden has been considerably increased, however, according to E. B. McDonald, FWBBC's business manager. Special gift support is essential between now and May 31, he says, to underwrite this \$30,000 expense.


