

# **Objectives In Focus**

It is essential to keep objectives in clear focus. This is true in a life, a home, a church or a Christian college. Everyone connected with a college should know what the college is really attempting to do. Free Will Baptist Bible College has existed for more than 40 years. What has been its purpose? What has been its mission?

One of the objectives has been to teach a clear understanding of the gospel. In earlier days there were pockets of Free Will Baptists who were confused about how one received salvation. Some would have added water baptism or even church membership as a part of the plan of salvation. The college has forcefully taught that salvation is provided by God's grace—His favor toward man which is totally unmerited and undeserved. The means of receiving salvation—repentance and faith—have been consistently taught.

The college and its influence have been successful. It would be almost impossible today to find a local church, a group of Free Will Baptists or even a single Free Will Baptist minister who could not clearly state that a person is saved by repenting of sin and believing on the Lord Jesus Christ as personal Savior.

The college has consistently stood for and taught *separated Christian living* as the Biblical standard. (Inashamedly, the college has held to clear, Christ-like living. Wholesome behavior and neat, well-groomed appearance have characterized the faculty and students. The college's view of separation has historically been two-fold: separation unto the Lord and separation from the world. It has always maintained a strict observance of social proprieties and Christian standards between those of the opposite sex. The college has insisted that wholesome and profitable recreation be chosen to the exclusion of worldly amusements and worthless pleasures.

There has been a warm-hearted approach to evangelism. Christian service has never been optional; every student participates every week. The student learns the theoretical in the classroom and puts what he learns into practice through his Christian service experiences. The goal of the Christian service department is to win souls and build up believers. This personal, warm-hearted approach to soulwinning has always been the heartthrob of the college.

There has also been the desire to share the gospel with the entire world—a genuine commitment to world-wide evangelization. When the college started, there were no home missionaries and only one foreign missionary. Now there are scores of both. The college has played a vital role in bringing this about. Missions is kept before the students

# Bible College Enrolls 526 for 1983-84

Free Will Baptist Bible College has enrolled 526 students from 29 states and seven foreign countries for the 1983-84 school year, according to Dr. Charles E. Hampton, registrar. The total includes 513 undergraduate students and 13 who are studying in the Graduate School.

The spring semester began in January with 44 new undergraduate and three new graduate students. By classes, the enrollment for the year is 168 freshmen, 114 sophomores, 107 juniors, 80 seniors, 44 special students and 13 graduate students.

This year, the Bible College was privileged to help train 108 young preachers and 75 who are preparing to be missionaries.

Dr. Hampton noted that there was an increase in the numbers of students from Indiana and Illinois, especially. The number of Indiana students has risen from 21 last year to 32 this year. The number from Illinois has grown from 21 to 27

# Trustees Approve New Systems, Grant Sabbatical Leave

All nine FWBBC trustees met on campus December 6-7 and approved the installation of new telephone and energy control systems for the college. They also granted a half-year sabbatical leave to Dean Robert Picirilli, according to President Charles Thiggen.

The new telephone system will replace one that the college has been leasing for several years. The old system, which was being used to capacity, could only accommodate 67 phones. The new one will service up to 400 phones and will be owned by the college.

A centralized energy control system to be installed will automatically adjust campus thermostats and will save the college money on energy bills, even if costs continue to rise.

Dr. Picirilli will be on leave for the spring 1984 semester to write a textbook on the life and letters of the Apostle Paul. For many years, Dr. Picirilli taught the course on Pauline Writings at the college, and his class notes are still used by the college and others.

Trustees also approved the hiring of Mrs. Eugene Waddell, a 1963 alumna, to teach English courses for the spring semester. She will fill in for Dr. Mary Ruth Wisehart, who is taking a semester sabbatical to write a history of the college and a book on the history of the Woman's Auxiliary and the contributions of Free Will Baptist women to the denomination and the cause of Christ.

The college's trustees are Rev. Clarence Burton, Rev. W.B. Hughes, Rev. Bob Ketchum, Rev. Tom Malone (chairman), Dr. J.D. O'Donnell, Rev. James Earl Raper, Dr. Douglas Simpson, Rev. Sam Truett and Rev. Ken Walker.





# **Five Student Teams** To Make Summer Tours



#### Student Loan Investment Plan Draws Good Early Response

Initial response to the college's Student Loan Investment Plan, first announced in the last issue of the *Bulletin*, has been excellent, according to Tom Sass, director of student financial aid. "Over \$20,000 has already been invested in the loan fund," he says.

The funds have come from widely varied sources, including retired laymen, military personnel, churches, auxiliaries, and the college's own faculty and staff.

The plan opens the door for people to deposit money at seven percent interest, which the college can loan to students who need to borrow for their education. "Everyone benefits," says Mr. Sass. "The investor earns a good return on his deposit and the student borrows at a lower interest rate than the banks charge."

The money invested in the Student Loan Investment Plan makes it possible for Christian young people to get the training they need in their service to the Lord. Also, these investments do not hinder the depositor's program of tithing or giving to other causes.

#### Missions Major Program To Be Offered

A new 30-hour major in the field of Missions will be available at the Bible College, according to Ralph Hampton, chairman of the Christian Ministries Department. The new program will be offered in addition to the 20-hour Missions minor that has been available for a number of years.

"The time has come when we must do more for future missionaries," he said. "Foreign missions work is increasingly complex. The missionary needs to know more, and there is more to be known, than ever before."

Missions teacher Bobby Aycock, who spent more than 20 years in Brazil, pointed out that two new electives—Missionary Internship and Roman Catholicism—will be available in the program. Five of the eight foreign fields on which Free Will Baptists are established are predominantly Roman Catholic, he observes, and it is important that our missionaries be acquainted with the errors of Romanism.

Dr. LaVerne Miley, who served for 19 years as a medical missionary in Ivory Coast and now teaches at FWBBC, says that the new program "should be a tremendous asset to our missions enterprise."

Missions students in the 1983-84 student body numbered 75. The interest in missions is growing among FWBBC students.

Free Will Baptists gave \$721,118.94 to Free Will Baptist Bible College in its latest fiscal year, June 1, 1983, to May 31, 1984, according to E. B. McDonald, treasurer. Total giving was \$6,000 less than the record \$727,673 the college received in 1982-83.

The biggest drop was in general fund gifts. The general fund received about \$40,000 less than it did the previous year. However, gifts to the building fund were up by about \$5,000.

Eight states surpassed their 1982-83 general fund gifts, but 11 states dropped in their support. The states showing gains are: Alabama, California, Florida, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, South Carolina and Tennessee. Those whose gifts decreased are: Arkansas, Georgia, Kansas, Maine, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

The settlements from two estates were a great help to the college this year. The school received about \$40,000 from the estate of the late Rev. and Mrs. M. L. Sutton of Texas. Another \$6,600 came from the estate of an Arkansas layman, Mr. Arville Pride. President Charles A. Thigpen said, "Income from these wills and estates came when there was great need at the college." We thank God for His provision through the generous foresight of these godly Free Will Baptists, who are now with the Lord.

The general fund gift budget for 1984-85 was recently set by the board of trustees at \$660,000.

The college enrolled 110 summer school students, 21 percent of its student body. Another 17 students took internship studies for summer credit. These included eight foreign missions interns, eight pastoral interns and one music intern.

The total number of students receiving summer credit is 127.

The most popular course was a five-week study of Bible Doctrines taught by Dr. Ken Riggs, which enrolled 30 students.


# 417 ENROLLED FOR FALL SEMESTER

FWBBC enrolled 417 students from 26 states and seven foreign countries in late August, kicking off its 1984-85 school year.




Student Body President Len Davenport leads in prayer.







# Wilcox, Wolfenbarger To Be Featured In College's Bible Conference

Rev. Willard Wilcox and Rev. Floyd Wolfenbarger will be guest speakers for the college's spring Bible Conference, March 10-14, according to Dr. Robert Picirilli, dean. The program will also feature messages by President Charles A. Thigpen and Dr. LaVerne D. Miley, former missionary now teaching at the college.

Rev. Wilcox, a native of Paintsville, Kentucky, who now lives in Greeneville, Tennessee, has been an active evangelist and pastor for more than 32 years. His pastorates have included churches in Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Florida. For 26 years he has produced "The Lower Lighthouse," a weekly television outreach to six states. He is a graduate of Asbury College and Seminary.

Rev. Wolfenbarger began preaching at the age of 12, although he was not ordained until he was 20. He has pastored Free Will Baptist churches in Oklahoma and Ohio, and is now pastor of the First FWB Church of Russellville, Arkansas, which he has served since 1982. He has attended several colleges including the Bible College, Hillsdale FWB College and Ohio State University. He has been on the General Board and the Executive Committee of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

Dr. Thigpen maintains an active preaching ministry, even while serving as president of the Bible College. He became the college's third president in 1979. He also serves currently as president of the American Association of Bible Colleges.

Dr. Miley served Free Will Baptists for 19 years as a medical missionary to Ivory Coast, West Africa. He served the Bible College as teacher and dean in 1950-55 and returned to the faculty in 1979.

During the conference, Rev. Wilcox will speak four times, Rev. Wolfenbarger five times, and Dr. Thigpen and Dr. Miley will each speak three times.
