FWBBC Enrolls 388 For 1986-87 School Year


The Bible College enrolled 388 students from 25 states and five foreign countries for the 1986-87 school year, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar.

The undergraduate enrollment is 364, with another 24 taking graduate studies. By classes, the undergraduates total 111 freshmen, 99 sophomores, 69 juniors, 65 seniors and 20 special students.

Ministerial students total 84 and missions students number 43.

Tennessee produced the most FWBBC students (81) with North Carolina coming in second (39). Other states with 20 or more are Arkansas, (23), Illinois (23), Michigan (21), Missouri (23) and Virginia (20).


Second place was taken by Pleasant View Christian Academy, Pleasant View, TN. Third place went to Woodbine Christian Academy, Nashville, TN.



Pass The Torch A Bold, New Step

The time is right for Free Will Baptist Bible College to take a bold step, in faith, to become the best college it can possibly be.

On Tuesday, March 10, we announced that the college is embarking on a two-year growth strategy for just such a purpose. We have named this campaign, *Pass The Torch* —*Light for tomorrow's leaders today*.

Already, excited responses are coming from all over the denomination. Phrases like "this is the best thing the college has ever announced" are being heard almost daily. Our people are ready to see their school expand and grow, and they are ready to help make it possible.

Some Changes

Through this effort of growth will come some changes. The most obvious change will be the emphasis in our fund raising. We will be gearing all of our efforts to focus on the needs of our students. A new Department of Student Support will coordinate all fund raising efforts for one purpose: to keep the cost of education as low as possible for our students.

Another important change will be how we plan to raise these funds. For the next two years, the total financial need of the college will be \$3 million. Through a carefully selected network of state and district



leaders (see next page), we hope to find a volunteer in every church who will help us promote this effort.

This is designed to involve new churches and individuals in giving, instead of going repeatedly to the same ones. This network will also be a valuable line of two-way communication between the college and Free Will Baptists. Ideas and suggestions can be passed to the college through the network. The college will also count on these volunteers to help give special promotion to their entire congregations and not just to the ones on our mailing list.

Scholarships

Other exciting changes include the use of the gifts people give to us. The most significant use will be a \$79-per hour scholarship for every student. On top of that will be a program of rebate scholarships through which Free Will Baptist students can receive tuition discounts of up to \$7 per semester hour, based on the gift income to the campaign. If Free Will Baptists respond, tuition will decrease for the first time in the history of the college!

And there is more!

An entire bank of scholarships will be offered by the college. All of these will be tuition scholarships and will be true discounts, not subtractions from inflated prices. These, together with a tremendous financial aid program and a wide-open Nashville job market, will make it easier than ever for a young person to attend FWBBC.

New Programs

The most exciting change will be the plan the college has to expand into new programs of study. Serious consideration is presently being given to degree programs in the fields of business, physical education, youth ministry and others. A successful *Pass The Torch* campaign will make it possible for us to acquire the teachers and other resources we need to offer these programs.

There are some changes that will *not* take place...and that is just as exciting. Our commitment to God's Word as the center of our curriculum is still firm. Every teacher will still be a Christian, mature in the Word and an example of Christian dedication. High standards of conduct and appearance will still characterize everyone at FWBBC.

This is an exciting time of change and challenge for Free Will Baptist Bible College. We cannot do it alone. We must rely on God to guide our steps. We will also need His people to give and pray. There is a place for you in this campaign. Take the challenge now to grow with us to build our college into the strongest institution possible. 





Paul J. Ketteman With The Lord

Paul Jackson Ketteman, 62, Public Relations Director of Free Will Baptist Bible College for 25 years, died May 21 in Nashville, winning his final victory over a three-year bout with bone cancer. His death came seven days after the college honored him at graduation exercises for his quarter century of service.

The funeral was held Saturday, May 23, in the auditorium of the college he loved and to which he gave so much of his life. Dr. Charles Thigpen, Dr. Robert Picirilli and Dr. L. C. Johnson spoke of the impact of Paul Ketteman's life on themselves, the college and the denomination, as a whole.

President Charles A. Thigpen later noted several things about his friend and helper:

Brother Paul was always honest and open—you always knew where he stood on any issue. He was a good preacher of the Word and possessed a deep feeling for people. No one could ever be more accommodating to others than Paul. He saw needs and offered his help before most of us were even aware that a need existed.

No member of our college team will ever be missed any more than Paul. We thank God for his influence on this college.

Although noted most for his association with the college, Mr. Ketteman also had a rich, successful pastoral ministry. He twice pastored Mt. Elon Free Will Baptist Church, Pamplico, SC.

He also pastored Edgemont Free Will Baptist Church, Durham, NC, and First Free Will Baptist Church, Columbus, MS.

He served four years as clerk of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and nine years on the Bible College board of trustees.


The Illinois native left home in 1942 to become Free Will Baptist Bible College's first student. Dr. L. C. Johnson, the college's first president, loved to tell how, as he drove up to 3609 Richland Avenue in Nashville to assume leadership of the infant school, he found Paul sitting on the steps, waiting for classes to begin. Mr. Ketteman graduated with the Bible diploma in 1945 and received his B.A. from Columbia Bible College in 1947.

If any love rivaled that for his Lord and his college, it was his love for his family. On the back of a college form used for keeping employee biographical data, is a space for listing outside activities. Mr. Ketteman wrote on his, "Husband, Grandfather, and father." When the college honored him recently at graduation, as the audience of 900 stood in tribute, he said, "I'm just glad Helen (Mrs. Ketteman) is here to see this!"

His son, Greg, said, "I've lost more than a father; I've lost my best friend." We are sure his daughters, Mrs. Carol Reid and Mrs. Joy Corn, feel the same.

During the last two weeks of his life, Paul delighted in sharing with all his friends a new truth the Holy Spirit had given him from Psalm 32:8-9. There, God promises to teach and guide His children, but He warns them against mulish stubbornness. Paul told several friends, "He is teaching me some precious things in these days and I'm trying hard to learn them, but I still find a lot of the mule in me."

We are confident our friend, Paul J. Ketteman, learned the Lord's lessons well. After all, God used him to teach so many of us the way to enjoy living and, finally, how to die victoriously.







Bible College students went to the polls before school was out and selected four officers to lead them during the 1987-88 school year.



First New Program Of Study Available This Fall

PHYSICAL EDUCATION MAJOR

We are pleased to announce the addition of another new program, this time in physical education. This four year Bachelor of Science degree program is designed to prepare teachers who will specialize in physical education for school grades K-12.

The addition of this program represents our continuing commitment to prepare school teachers. Free Will Baptist Bible College entered this field of education several years ago, largely because of the burgeoning Christian school movement in our ranks. Our first program in this field was for elementary school teachers. Then we added other programs, including one for those teaching at the high school level, with certification to teach either Bible or English.

Now we add list. Many schools need someone to teach physical education as a special subject, across all the grades, and to coach one or more team sports. This program will provide qualified young men and women for such responsibilities.


We believe strongly in Christian schools and believe God led us to prepare teachers so that our Christian schools could have godly teachers, well prepared both in Biblical studies and in teacher education. The results have been beyond our expectations. Scores of teachers in Free Will Baptist Christian day schools have been prepared at FWBBC.

From the very beginning, we emphasized that those prepared for teaching in Christian schools should be as well prepared as their counterparts in public schools--even better, since most teachers in public schools have not been prepared Biblically and spiritually. For that reason, we have always made sure that our programs also meet the standards of the Department of Education of the state of Tennessee. Therefore, although the state does not certify teachers for private schools, students who graduate from our approved programs can receive formal certification to teach in Tennessee and may teach in public schools if they choose to do so. That, too, is a worthy Christian vocation.

The program in physical education will include everything needed for its purpose. In addition to the Bible major required of all FWBBC graduates, and a thorough core of courses in general education, 30 semester hours in physical education and 25 in teaching methods are prescribed. The physical education courses include Personal and Community Health, Health and Safety Education, Lifetime Fitness, activity electives in individual and team sports, methods courses in elementary and high school physical education, Administration and Supervision of

Some people choose a verse of scripture and call it their "life's verse." Others choose a verse for each year.

For a few years now, the college has selected a motto for each year. Last year, the college budget had been cut to the extent that many jobs were done by students, faculty and staff who volunteered their work. Therefore, we called it *"The Year of The Volunteer."*

A motto for this year had not been chosen before the opening of the school year. However, during faculty in-service training, held the week before the opening of school, the first hour each day was spent in Bible study and prayer. Dr. Robert Picirilli, our Dean, had asked a different teacher to lead each day's opening hour.

Dr. LaVerne Miley was first. He was led to deal with the fruit of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5). He gave a special emphasis to the joy of the believer as a definite manifestation of that fruit. He pointed out that, as the Holy Spirit works in the believer, He produces the joy of the Lord.

The next day, Dr. Robert Woodard led our study. Even though he and Dr. Miley had not conferred, he, too, presented an even fuller treatment of Christian joy. When he finished, we all felt like saying, with the Apostle Paul, "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice."

In my own preparation for the first week's chapel services, I had already developed two messages around the statement in Nehemiah 8:10, "The joy of the Lord is your strength."

Nehemiah's thrust is that the believer's joy is produced by being right with God. Because of this relationship to the Lord, the people of Nehemiah's day gathered around the Word of God as it was read to them in a careful way so that they could understand its truth. They worshipped God and fellowshipped with His people. Then, they spontaneously reached out to others as they shared God's abundance with them.

As these people of God experienced the joy of the Lord, it was so natural for them to reach out to others in deeds of sharing. They discovered the joy of the Lord—which was truly their strength—and it overflowed to those around them.

Dr. Charles R. Erdman said, "Faith in Christ and obedience to Him are the sources of abiding joy....Blessed are those who have discovered the sacred duty of being happy and who are seeking with divine aid to rejoice in the Lord always."

And so it seemed quite appropriate to choose the motto "The Year of Rejoicing" for the 1987-88 school year.

My prayer is that all of us who have discovered "the sacred duty of being happy" will let our joy overflow to those around us. Major Steedley

Missionaries To Preach In November Conference

CAMPAIGN GIVING SUMMARY

ugust 15th marked the arrival of our first goal in the Pass The Torch Campaign. We were aiming for a goal between \$375,000 and \$550,000. When all the gifts were tallied, our total came to \$383, 452.62! This qualified our stu-



This is the first year FWBBC has entered a team in regular intercollegiate competition.

Torch Campaign Director Leaves College Staff

Frank Breeden, Student Support Director for the college and director of the \$3-million Pass The Torch campaign, announced October 8 that he is resigning to pursue a music marketing ministry. The resignation took effect November 8.

He says the decision came "after much prayer, careful consideration and thought." In a letter to President Thigpen, he said, "I pledge my friendship to this institution and will do what I can to lift her name high..."

Dr. Thigpen responded, "I am grateful for the more than 10 years Frank Breeden has been a part of the Public Relations team of the college." Mr. Breeden joined the staff in 1978 when he served as assistant to Paul Ketteman, Director of Public Relations. He became the college's first Student Support Director in January 1987 and assumed leadership of the two-year Pass The Torch campaign.

His new work is with Lexicon-Spectra Music Company in Nashville, where he will be director of church choral music marketing.

College Family Adopts \$7,500 Missions Project

The student body has adopted a \$7,500project to help missionaries build churches, according to Michael Gragg, a junior ministerial student who is president of Foreign Missions Fellowship on campus.

The fund is being raised initially to help national Christians and missionaries in St. Nazaire, France, build the church they are scheduled to begin in December. The project will operate as an interest-free loan fund which, when repaid, will be made available to other missionaries.

Rev. Jerry Gibbs, missionary to France who is home on furlough, spoke in chapel Oct. 9, the day the project was announced. "What you are doing is an answer to the prayers of French Christians who have asked God to provide money to build their church," he said.

More than \$1,000 had been raised by late October. Faculty commitments totaled more than \$1,200. Gragg feels the project stands a good chance of being completed by May. "We hope to exceed our goal," he said. "I sense our students are excited about this."

Home Missions Conference One Of College's Best

President Charles Thigpen called the recent Home Missionary Conference "one of the best ever." The conference was held on campus Nov. 1-4 and featured several home missionaries and members of the Home Missions Department staff.


Rev. Roy Thomas and Rev. John Gibbs also spoke.
