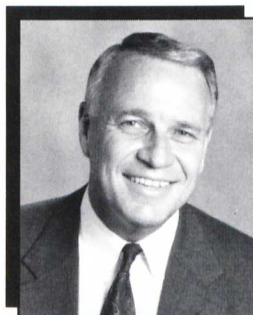

1993 SUMMER CAMP

June 13-19, 1993

Summer Camp '93 will be held on campus June 13-19!

Hundreds of Free Will Baptist young people have attended and profited from the annual Summer Camp ministry at FWBBC. Neil Gilliland, Recruitment Director, has made the event one of the summer highlights on campus.

Four camps make up the composite Summer Camp: Music Camp, Drama Camp, Basketball Camp, and Missions Camp.

Music Camp provides training for Free Will Baptist young people who want to develop their skills in vocal and instrumental music. It is directed by members of the FWBBC music faculty, assisted by members of the Rejoice! ensemble.

Drama Camp features training in staging, costuming and performing on stage as a Christian ministry. Speech teachers and members of the Evangels Drama Team provide

the instruction.

Basketball Camp is traditionally the largest of the four camps. Members of the Flames basketball team and FWBBC teachers help young athletes sharpen their court skills.

Missions Camp, begun last year, is to help young people gain a global vision of God's plan for evangelism. If Christ tarries, our mission fields will someday feel the impact of those who are trained here.

The cost for a week of learning and fun is just \$160 (\$135, if five or more attend from the same church or church school). That includes rooms on campus, meals, a day at Opryland, a camp T-shirt and more.

Former Employee With The Lord

Mr. E. W. Tippet, Sr., who served for 11 years (1966-77) as Food Service Director for the Bible College, went to be with the Lord at his home in Raleigh, NC, on January 5.

Mr. Tippet served for 31 years with the U.S. Navy before joining the food service staff at East Carolina University, Greenville, NC. A few years later he came to the Bible College to supervise its kitchen and dining hall. He was highly respected, both for his work and for his character.

All three of his children—Bert, Kathy Henderson, and Richard—attended FWBBC and are deeply involved in Christian service today. His wife, Kathryn, continues to live in Raleigh.

Mr. Tippet was buried with full military honors at Friendship Free Will Baptist Church in Middlesex, NC. As he was laid to rest, his family sang, "How Great Thou Art," in celebration of his home going.

Business Department Launches Leaders Group

The Christian Business Leaders Association (CBLA) was founded on campus September 30 by business students and teachers. It will provide a forum for exchange between FWBBC business students and Christian professionals in the Nashville area, according to Lowell Sturgill, Chairman of the Business Department.

Officers elected are Tom Strickland, President; Donald Myers, Vice President; Lori Badder, Secretary/Treasurer; and Ben Evans, Chaplain. Mr. Sturgill and Rebecca Deel, who also teaches in the department, are sponsors.

One of the first actions of the group has been to start a scholarship fund for business students. Mr. Sturgill wants to raise a \$10,000 fund, with its interest going annually to a business student to be chosen by officials at the college.

Gifts to the CBLA scholarship are tax deductible and may be sent to the college, earmarked for the fund.

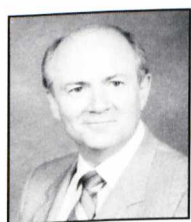

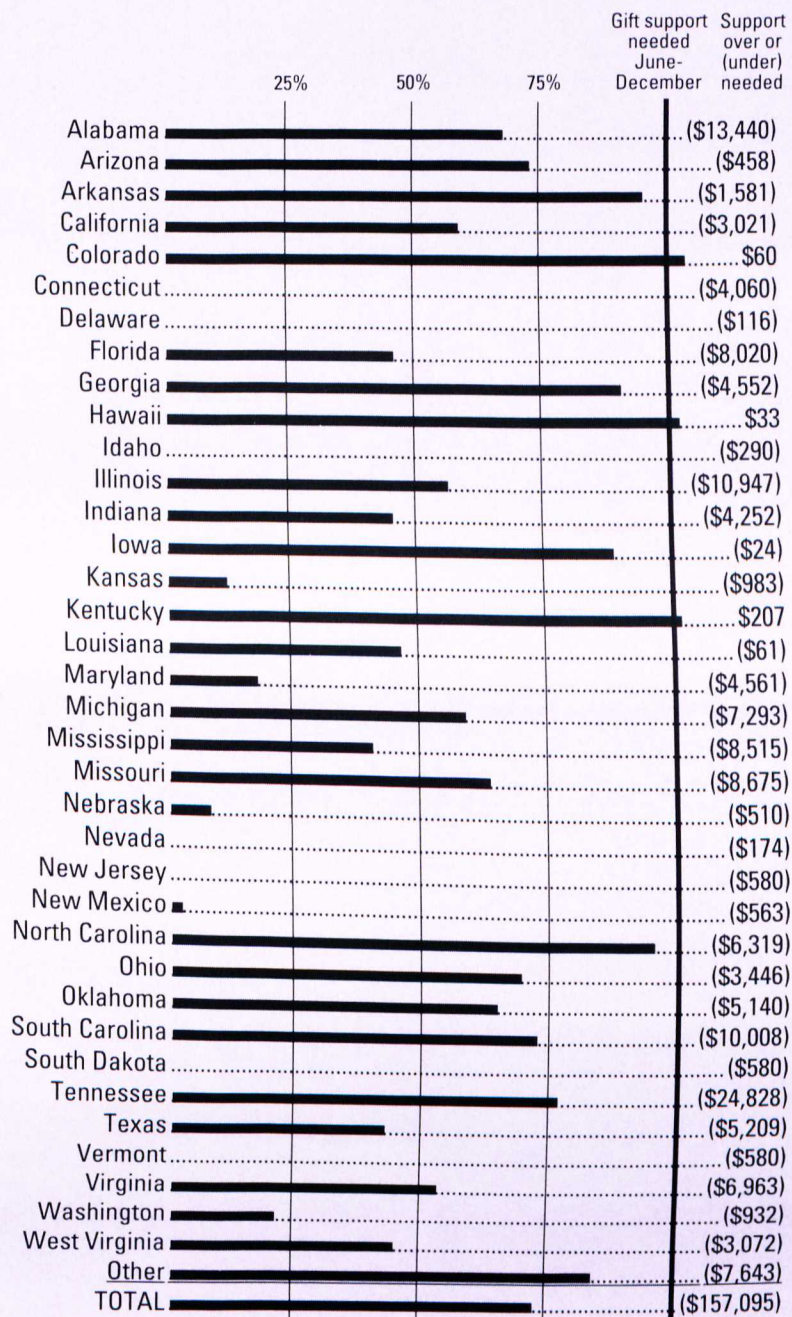

Gifts \$157,000 Behind Needs

In spite of excellent December gifts in response to the Paul Kettelman Memorial Christmas Fund Drive, the college is still running more than \$157,000 behind what it needs to operate. Only three states—Colorado, Hawaii, and Kentucky—are on pace with FWBBC's gift budget.

The chart below shows how each state is doing:



Spring Enrollment Exceeds Fall's

An exceptional surge in spring student enrollment drove the total to 322, a substantial increase over the fall semester's enrollment of 300.

In January, the college enrolled 300 regular students, exactly equaling the fall semester enrollment. Then 22 more students enrolled for a special night course for pastors and music directors. They brought the spring semester total to 322.

Last year the college picked up nine students for second semester. This year's increase was 24, up by 167%!

Significant growth was seen in the numbers of students from Tennessee (41%), Virginia (50%), California (67%), Texas (67%), Florida (67%), and Kentucky (80%).

Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar, says, "We thank the Lord for a net increase of 41 students over last spring and for the significant state growths."

The total number of students enrolled for the year is 343 (+ the 22 night course students above), an increase of 12% over the 307 who enrolled in 1991-92.

The 1992-93 student body represented 25 states, the Virgin Islands and five foreign countries (Pakistan, Canada, Côté d'Ivoire, China, and Uruguay).

We thank God for the opportunity to serve a growing number of Free Will Baptist young people, who will enter many fields of service for the Lord.

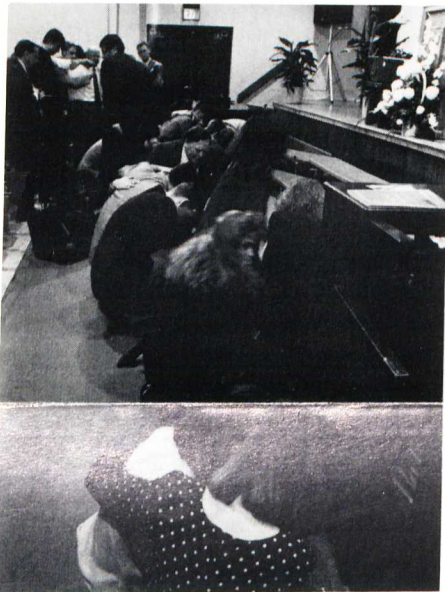

Pleasant View Rally Raises Over \$20,000

The good people and churches of the Northern Quarterly, Cumberland Association, have done it again! This year's FWBBC Rally, held Sunday night, February 28 at Pleasant View Christian School, produced over \$20,000 for the college!

Dr. L. C. Johnson, FWBBC's founding President, spoke to more than 900 who attended the service. The College Choir and Rejoice! ensemble provided special music.

Owen Thomas Scholarship

In 1974, the Owen Thomas Scholarship Fund was established in memory of the late Owen Thomas of Four Oaks, North Carolina.

Mr. Thomas, who served for many years on the FWBBC Board of Trustees, was killed in a farm accident that year. Memorial gifts from many friends, as well as family members, provided the funds for this scholarship. The principal is invested and only the interest is awarded each year. This provides a perpetual scholarship in honor of this faithful servant of the Lord.

A scholarship is awarded in both the fall and spring semesters each year to a North Carolina student who shows financial need and scholastic ability. Twenty-seven awards have been given since the fall of 1980. A total of \$7,450 has been awarded to 22 students in the past 13 years.

Christmas Drive Exceeds \$205,500

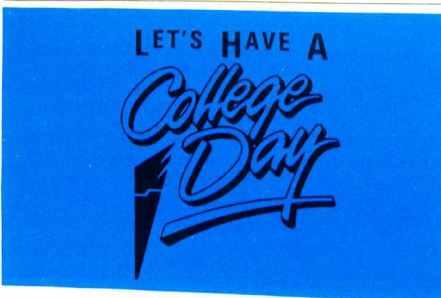
The 1992 Paul Kettelman Memorial Christmas Drive broke all previous records, resulting in more than \$205,500 for the Bible College and eclipsing the previous record of \$197,889, set in 1990.

"We pulled out all the stops this year," says Bob Shockey, Public Relations Director, "and our people across the denomination responded in a very generous way."

Students and FWBBC employees did an incredible job in the drive, raising \$102,965 and surpassing their goal of \$100,000.

The denomination at large contributed another \$102,560 to the drive.

This year's Christmas Drive was crucial as the college bends every effort to avoid finishing the year in the red. FWBBC Treasurer Tom Sass has cut spending to the bone. Needed repairs to buildings have been postponed—again. President Tom Malone points out that the college has also incurred extra expenses pursuing regional accreditation.

Flames Enjoy Best Season

Coach Byron Deel's Flames basketball team finished the season with the best record yet for FWBBC. The team posted a 21-5 season overall and finished in first place in Division II of the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA).

Coy Gammon, of Nashville, and Darin Gibbs, of Pleasant View, Tennessee, were selected for the All-District Team at the climax of a year that saw the team spend more time on the road than ever.

Nashville's largest daily paper, *The Tennessean*, picked up both on the team's excellent season and its unique approach to sports, and ran a feature on the Flames in the February 5 issue. People at the college were especially pleased that Jim Wyatt, the reporter who wrote the article, zeroed in on how members of the team seek to minister in churches when they are on the road. He liberally quoted team members as they described how the Lord comes first in their lives, not basketball. The article prompted a number of calls to the college and inquiries from at least two prospective students from the area.

Everyone at the college is proud of the Flames, both for their outstanding record and their testimony across the conference.

The success of this venture into intercollegiate athletics has prompted college officials to test the water in other areas. This spring the college will field a baseball team, according to Coach Deel, and will sponsor a girls volleyball team in the fall.

Free Will Baptist Bible College graduated 50 students from 15 states and Canada in Commencement Exercises held on campus May 13.

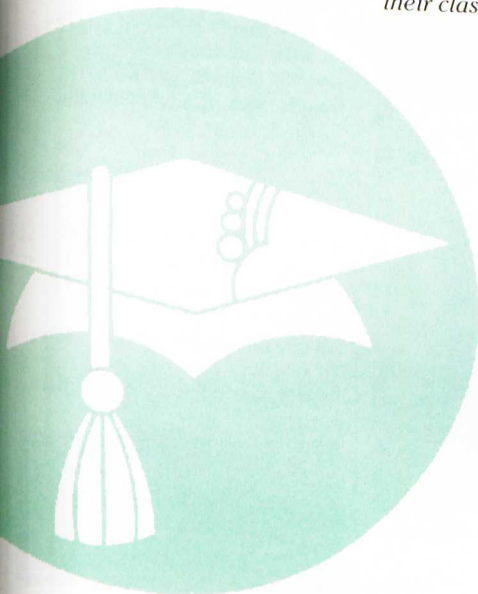

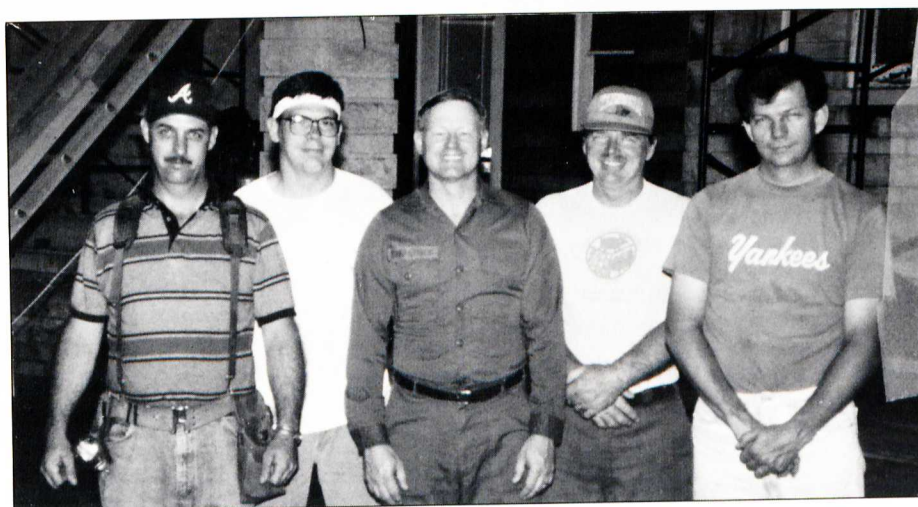

Thank God for volunteers!

Three laymen, a student, an alumnus and a pastor volunteered to help the college re-roof Davidson Hall, the original building the college acquired in 1942.

The massive project was more than the budget could bear, but the men, working alongside FWBCC employees, saved the college some \$25,000 in labor costs!

The volunteers worked under the direction of Bruce Bilbrey, FWBCC's Physical Plant Director. The laymen, all members of Providence Free Will Baptist Church, Hampton, Virginia, were: Steve Faherty, David Kirkpatrick, and Tim Austin. The student volunteer was Mark Kiepke, a junior, who is also from the Providence Church. Providence's pastor, Rev. Richard Barnes, was a tremendous promoter of the project. A conflict at work prevented another layman in the church from coming. So he sent a week's pay to help underwrite the cost!

Rev. Wade Parker, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church, Glasgow, Kentucky, came down for the week to lend his assistance. More help came from Bob Bass, a 1992 FWBCC graduate who lives in Nashville.

The days were scorchers. The workers started early, broke for the middle of the day, and worked into the evening. In spite of the heat, they completed the job ahead of schedule.

They encouraged college officials to designate June 1994 "Volunteer Month" and to invite laymen from across the denomination to help with projects on campus. They suggested that men could help to paint buildings, assist with landscaping, and do whatever the college needs at the time. Gifts Fall Short of College Needs

In spite of the good response to an 11th-hour appeal from President Tom Malone, the college closed the fiscal year May 31 more than \$225,000 short of its unrestricted gift budget, according to Tom Sass, Treasurer. By cutting back on budgeted spending, the college managed to finish the year in the black—*barely*. The audited report shows FWBBC's income was just \$1,691 more than its expenditures.

Free Will Baptists responded to a letter from Dr. Malone with gifts of over \$23,000. Coupled with other gifts in May, the total for the month was nearly \$90,000.

However, it was not enough to make up for slow giving earlier in the year. As a result, the FWBBC trustees decided to leave 1993-94 state quota budgets where they were last year.

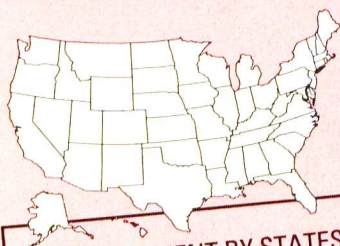

Fall Enrollment Up 11%

For the third straight year, Free Will Baptist Bible College has seen its student body grow. This fall, the college registered 334 students from 27 states, the Virgin Islands and four foreign countries, according to Dr. Charles Hamp-

shire. Inadequate enrollment in the fall semester growth over the last three years has been reversed. This year, increases were seen from 17 states, including three new ones to be represented at FWBBC.

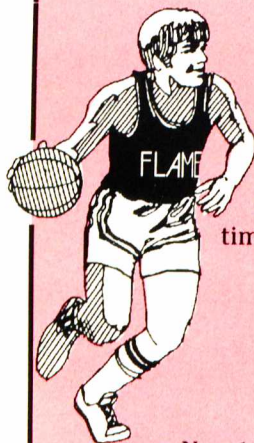
Tennessee, with 67, sent the most students. But Alabama (36), North Carolina (30) and Illinois (29) were among others that were well represented. (See state totals in box.) By classes, there are 131 freshmen, 87 sophomores, 57 juniors, 47 seniors, and 12 special students. Ministerial students number 60 and missions students, 47.

The opening days were days of blessing. In spite of the rigors of registration, students enjoyed evening services in which the Lord clearly spoke to hearts. President Tom Malone preached on Monday and Tuesday evenings, August 23 and 24. Numerous decisions crowned both services. On Wednesday evening, students testified. Some told of God's leadership to FWBBC and His gracious provision for them to come. Others described summer blessings—traveling with the *Rejoice!* ministry team, assisting on a mission field, serving at camp, and working in churches. The college family felt that God was already preparing them for a great year.

The campus revival, September 6-9, with Tom Farrell (see testimony inside) confirmed the hopes.

Please give Free Will Baptist Bible College a prominent place in your prayers. Ask God to bless each teacher. Ask Him to direct students into the ministries of His choosing. Pray that gifts will be adequate to meet the school's needs. Plead for revival, both at FWBBC and across the denomination.

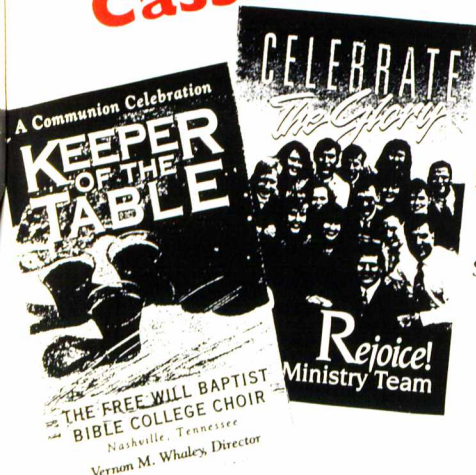
He earned his B.S. in Youth Ministries in 1990 and his MRE in 1992 at Liberty University.

\$250,000-Goal Set For Christmas Drive

To better serve its growing student body, the college has added several new staff workers to the family, according to Tom Sass, Treasurer. He noted the following additions and changes:

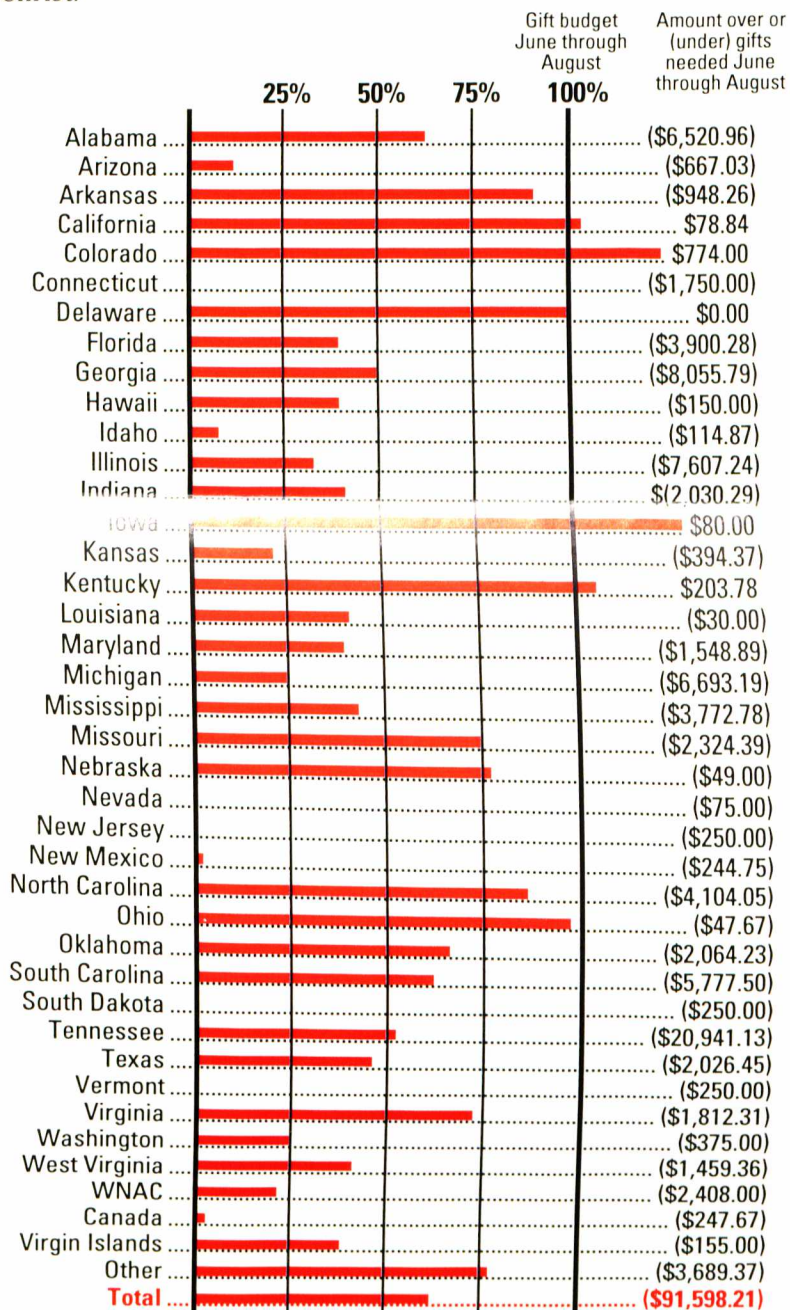
- Michelle Adams* is now full-time in Financial Aid.

Some 17 years ago, the late Paul Kettelman, FWBBC's Public Relations Director, began challenging students to raise operating funds for the college while they were home. His incentive was a steak supper he provided for those who took his challenge. After his death, the drive was renamed in his honor: The Paul Kettelman Memorial Christmas Fund Drive.

In the intervening years, more than \$1 million has been raised for the Bible College by students, teachers, staff workers and other friends during the Christmas season.

This year, Public Relations Director Bob Shockey has set a goal of \$250,000 for the drive. That is a 22% increase over last year's \$205,000. The college family will be attempting to raise \$100,000 of the total.

"Free Will Baptists were very generous last year," says Mr. Shockey. "But our school's needs are greater this year. All of us—not just a few—must support Free Will Baptist Bible College!"

All gifts to the college received in December are counted. So are gifts received in January, if they are designated for the Christmas drive.

Together Way, the denominational stewardship plan that was adopted by the National Association of Free Will Baptists, has designated December as Bible College emphasis month on the annual fund-raising calendar. The *Together Way* calls on every Free Will Baptist church and individual to participate in the Christmas campaign in December. Wide-spread cooperation in December will make it possible for the college to receive a major part of the gifts it needs to operate this year.

Here are ways in which you can help as an individual:

Bob Jones Teacher Is Forlines Lecturer

Dr. Edward M. Panosian, Chairman of the Church History Departments of both the graduate and undergraduate divisions at Bob Jones University, was the guest speaker for the second annual F. Leroy Forlines Lectures at the Bible College.

Dr. Panosian did an outstanding job on campus, Nov. 3-5, speaking in daily chapels and at the midweek service. His messages included insights in God's providence during the Reformation, a "first person" portrayal of William Tyndale, and a pair of messages on periods of revival in the United States.

In addition to his teaching duties at Bob Jones, Dr. Panosian conducts summer tours of Europe in which he reviews Reformation history. He has also appeared in Bob Jones stage and film productions.

The Forlines Lectures were established by the FWBBC Board of Trustees to honor the teacher who has long served the college and the denomination as teacher, writer and theologian.



WNAC Promotes Library Project

The WNAC, meeting last July in Louisville, adopted the college's Welch Library as the focal point for 1993-94 projects.

Recognizing the importance of a good library in the education process, the women voted to "encourage each local woman's auxiliary to give, in addition to regular support, money for one or more books (ranging from \$9.95 to \$99.95 or more) to the Welch Library at Free Will Baptist Bible College during 1993-1994."

Leah Waddell Memorial Scholarship

One of the oldest scholarship funds at Free Will Baptist Bible College is the Leah Waddell Memorial Scholarship Fund. 290 Attend Welcome Days
