Horne served as Student Body President at the college and was included in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. After graduation, he served as youth pastor at Ashland City FWB Church, Ashland City, TN. He later served as associate pastor at Cramerton FWB Church, Cramerton, NC. He is in his sixth year as pastor at Union Chapel.

The conference will also feature Rev. Vernon Barker, founder of Revive Us Again, an evangelistic ministry based in

Joelton, TN. Rev. Barker, a 1974 FWBBC alumnus, was saved under the ministry of Rev. Bob Shockey. His

pastorates have included Louisa FWB Church, Louisa, KY; Mt. Zion FWB Church, Ashland City, TN; Westwood Enterprise Baptist Church, Ashland, KY; and New Hope FWB Church, Joelton, TN. He has held revivals in 13 states.

Rev. Terry Forrest, the college's Dean of Students, will add to the conference's impact. He moved back to Nashville in 1991 to join the FWBBC staff, leaving a 20-year span in the pastoral ministry. The 1971 Bible College graduate pastored Mt. Harmony FWB Church, Saffell, AR; Bethel FWB Church, Ashland City, TN; First FWB Church, Walnut Ridge, AR; and First FWB Church, Monticello, AR.

College officials have asked two student preachers to share in the program. They are Mark Kiepke, from

Enrollment Grows For Third Year

For the third consecutive year, FWBBC has seen its enrollment grow. Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar, announced a 1993-94 enrollment total of 359 students from 27 states and six foreign countries. This is an increase of about 5% over the previous year.

By classes, the college served 141 freshmen, 91 sophomores, 60 juniors, 51 seniors and 16 special students. Ministerial students total 68, and 52 indicate that they are missionary students.

Fourteen states sent more students to FWBBC than last year. States with the largest representation are Tennessee (75), Alabama (37), North Carolina (32) and Illinois (29). State totals are given below.



Just recently I heard something I could hardly believe. A pastor from one of our nearby churches said that this year he found it difficult to persuade his people to keep the college in their giving. The reason? Some of the people thought that, since our 1991 campaign to pay off indebtedness was successful, the college didn't need as much money any more.

How wrong can someone be? The man telling me about this said something I've heard others say from time to time: "We just don't communicate to our people the real extent of our needs."

We certainly try to communicate our needs. Maybe we try so hard to be positive in our presentation that we mislead people.

So let's "tell it like it is." With all my heart I want to ask you to read this $carefully \, and \, prayerfully. \, We think \, it \'s \, absolutely \, essential \, for \, you \, to \, know \, the \, absolutely \, essential \, es$ way things really are at Free Will Baptist Bible College.

Yes, we're essentially debt free. But that doesn't have much to do with everyday reality. It's time you heard the rest of the story. And the sum of it is simple: we aren't receiving enough funds to operate the college the way it needs to be. Sure, we are surviving. But homeless people on the streets are surviving, too, without having their basic human needs met.

That's the way it is here: we're surviving, but our basic needs aren't being met. And it hurts. And we need you to feel and understand that hurt. And I don't know any way to get that across to you without telling you just how it is, with

This is how things really are.

First let me tell you about our buildings. Shortly after Thanksgiving holidays last fall I received an anonymous postcard in the mail, addressed to "Bobby Picirilli"—so I know it was from someone back home or who's known me a long time. The writer let me know she was visiting from out of town.

After some other things, she wrote: "Why do the buildings look so bad?" That hurt. But she's right, they do look bad.

We finally got two of the worst roofs fixed this past summer and fall, because two groups of our people came from out of town to do the work. But we've got several other roofs leaking that we haven't been able to fix. In some cases some inside ceilings have been ruined because of the delay. We just don't have the money or manpower (which also translates into money) to do

We're way behind on painting, outside and inside. As I write this I'm thinking of the Davidson and Thigpen buildings. The outside woodwork hasn't been painted in many years, and "bad" isn't the way to describe how they look. We don't have the money. The central heating system in the Johnson Academic Building needs replacing. We keep patching one leak after another, ruining ceiling tiles each time and enduring a system that often leaves us too cold or hot. The system should have been replaced years ago. We don't have

I wish you'd come look over the interior of the library. A while back I took up some special donations from the faculty and staff to get a new carpet downstairs. That helped a little, but the entire building needs redecorating

From The President

Dear Friend.

I have asked the Lord to help me know what to say and how to say it. It is evident to me that we have not communicated the real needs of the college to you, our friends. As things stand now, we will go in the red again this year.

Every year we cut our budget again and again, leaving off things that need to be done-repairs, purchases, etc.-trying to operate in the black. Maybe doing this has left the impression that we are doing well financially. Some people have even concluded



since our successful Debt Free campaign in 1991 that we don't have any needs.

The sad truth is we are not doing well financially. For example, in the last three years, gifts have fallen over \$200,000 per year short of what our budget called for. We aren't meeting our basic needs. And we can't cut any more. We must do something now to repair our buildings, to increase our library holdings and to provide for our faculty and staff. And we must hire more personnel.

The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) will consider us for candidacy for accreditation this year. Of all years, then, this is one we can't afford to go in the red. Some have thought that the college's needs have come because we are seeking regional accreditation. But the college's needs have not been being met for some time. To be sure, regional accreditation will mean much to our students and will help us to be a better

and reworking. We don't have the money to get this done.

I'll include space in this category. What we did, during our declining enrollment years, was take some of the space we would use for other things and rent it out as apartments to married students—even though the college never intended to provide married housing. The truth is, we're far too cramped, especially in office space. But we can't afford to give up the income from the apartments to take the space we need. We've put so many people in so many nooks and crannies that I'm ashamed.

And those are just some of the most obvious problems. I could add fact after fact to this list. In physical plant alone, we're at least \$100,000 in the hole. It didn't hurt so much for awhile, but it's caught up with us now.

Our people are hurting.

Now I want to tell you about personnel needs. There's the business office for example. Two of our ladies (I'll spare them the embarrassment of using their names) are so overworked that none of us should be able to look them in the eye. Not many evenings, not many Saturdays go by but that they are on the job. Do you suppose the fact that they're not married means we can take

advantage of them that way? The problem is we don't have the money to employ additional people there.

And what about the student services area? Our Dean of Students has to do double duty and serve as Dean of Men too. Those who work in this area have to put in too many weekends in addition to their full duties other-

wise. We need at least a half-time counselor on campus. Again, we just don't have the money to employ the workers needed to give some relief.

The maintenance people will tell you the same thing. We did add one worker this past year, but it's still not enough. We don't have anyone to oversee the maintenance and provision of audiovisual equipment for the faculty. The Business Manager for Physical Operations has to divide his time with the demands of computers, telephone equipment, and other technology. And either area has enough for full time.

Administratively, the load has become almost unbearable. And I'm not too embarrassed about it to make this personal. Since near the end of last September (I'm writing this in March), I would estimate that 75% of the evenings and Saturdays I've been in the office. And the main reason is that we can't afford to employ the administrative assistant we need. The Registrar will tell you the same thing. So will the Treasurer.

The truth is, I'm tired. Many days I feel I just can't go on this way. And the trouble is that I know that many others are overloaded too. We're hurting.

I dread telling you about the library situation, for fear you just won't believe me. Not the building, I've mentioned that part already. Here I'm speaking about the books we have or don't have. As many of you know, we're engaged in formal self-study for the purpose of seeking additional and important accreditation. So recently we were examining some of the standards about library expectations. We ought to have at least 90,000 volumes in our library.

Instead, we have about 60,000. So we're at least 30,000 short. The average cost of adding books is more than \$25 per volume. What that means, my friends, is that we're \$750,000 behind in the library alone! The plain truth is that, during the last several years, our library has been falling behind.

And even if we had the money to buy the books, we can't afford the extra librarian we'd need to get them catalogued and on the shelves any time soon.

Salaries are an embarrassment!

You don't want me to mention salaries, but I must. As Academic Dean, it falls my lot to interview prospective faculty and talk about salaries. And the fact is I'm embarrassed. Most of the pastors of our larger churches would have to take a serious cut in salary to come teach here. Even the full time youth ministers in the churches get paid more than they would here.

Many are the times we haven't been able to employ people we thought we wanted for this reason. I recall just a few years ago when we were searching for someone to lead the new business program. We finally found one—only because he had enjoyed a successful career in management for the government and had a good pension to go with what he would be paid here.

Inevitably, some of the most qualified people we talk with are unavailable. If they are already teaching in college elsewhere the salary we offer them will fall far short of what they're earning. Earlier this week I was interviewing a fine Christian lady who has the needed doctorate and is working for the Tennessee State Department of Education. I told her up front that we wouldn't be able to match what she is being paid. When I gave her the figure and said I knew that was bound to be less than she earns now, her words were, "That's a lot less

How do you think that makes me feel?

Or how do you think it makes me feel when a faculty member comes in and indicates that he's "down" and that one of the things depressing his morale is the money problems he has because of the level of his salary here? I've had any number of these in recent years: one just three weeks ago. He sees what pastors and denominational offices personnel are making and can't help comparing what he makes. And it hurts him.

And he knows that we gave no raises this year. That, in fact, we have missed raises three of the last six years. And that at a time when we ought to be raising salaries dramatically! It hurts me too,

although not financially. I make out fine and have been around a long time so that I'm past the most expensive time of life. But these younger faculty and staff with families are hurting. And all of us ought to be ashamed of that.

But see, if we give a thousand dollar raise, that means with our faculty and staff it costs us \$50,000. And we don't have \$50,000. And the truth is we ought to be giving several times that much.

This could affect our accreditation.

I'm going to leave it at these four. Truth is, I could go on and give at least that many more illustrations. But if that isn't enough for you to get the picture of how things really are, then I don't suppose the rest of our circumstances

As I've mentioned once above, we're seeking regional accreditation to add to our accreditation as a Bible college. We're putting the self study report in the mail this week. The team will visit us April 12-15.

What I've said already has nothing to do with accreditation. Those needs, and the rest of the needs exist whether we seek this accreditation or not. But many of you want us to get this additional accreditation, and the truth is our financial situation may turn out to be a significant hindrance. One thing seems reasonably clear to us: we can't afford to be in the red this year, and it looks like we're going to be. That hurts too.

After the team comes in April, the Commission that makes the decision will

school. But our needs were not being met long before we decided to seek further accreditation. I hope you will take the time to read It's Time You Knew, by Dr. Picirilli, and let it speak to you about our college and its needs.

We presently need an extra \$150,000 from you, our people, before June 1, 1994. By extra, I mean that much more than you were going to give anyway. I have asked our faculty and staff to do all they can by making generous gifts. When I do that, I am asking help from people who haven't received a raise in two years. But they have already started responding.

I am asking our churches to give \$1,000, \$500, or to take a love offering and get it to us before June 1. Please do all you can to make it your best.


Beyond that immediate need, if we are to operate Free Will Baptist Bible College as it should be operated, we must have churches and people who will put us in their budgets or give on a regular basis. We need everyone to increase what they are doing now-to double it, if at all possible. Christian education

is expensive, but a gift to the Bible College is a gift to the entire ministry of the Free Will Baptist denomination.

I am asking every church and individual receiving this letter to send a gift of \$1,000 or \$500 above what you regularly do, so that we can stay out of the red. It is so important. Will you send a special gift-whatever you can-now?

meet in December. We're hoping to get Candidacy Status at that point, which is the first step toward full accreditation that might be gained two or four years after Candidacy Status.

> At this point, my guess (that's all it is) is that the team will recommend Candidacy Status for us. After all, in spite of real deprivation of needs, we've managed our finances frugally and managed to stay in the black most of the time. And we've done a good job, even if on limited finances—mostly because we've got a fine group of dedicated people who are willing to sacrifice in time,

money, and load. But the truth is that things have got to change if we're going to be able to do the job we ought to do and our people want us to do.

This is how much we really need.

How much must things change? We don't really know. Up to this point, we've been getting about \$700,000 per year, in operational gifts, from our people—which is \$200,000 a year less than we've asked for in our budgets. I can tell you for certain that \$1 million won't be enough, but it's enough more than what we're getting now that we can set that as a goal for starters.

In other words, we need a lot more from our churches and individual supporters than we're getting now. At least 50% more. Free Will Baptists simply haven't yet come to understand the cost of education. It's easy for us to start schools, but we don't know how to support them.

I'm not talking extravagance or luxury or wish lists. I'm talking essential needs which are not now being met. We need at least \$1 million a year, this year and every year. And when we've received a million each year for a year or two, we'll explain to you why we need more than that.

That's the way it really is at Free Will Baptist Bible College. It's about time you knew.



Trustees Approve \$1 Million



Free Will Baptist Bible College's trustees have approved a 1994-95 unrestricted gift budget of \$1,000,000, according to President Tom Malone. This is the budget the college will present to the National Association of Free Will Baptists when it meets in Little Rock in July.

The trustees met on campus in mid-May, considered the college's financial needs, and approved this unprecedented gift budget. It represents an increase of at least 25% over anticipated gifts for this year.

The college has only two sources of income: gifts and student fees. Tuition and other fees have been kept deliberately low. Many students are having to pay for their own education, working their way through FWBBC. Others' parents are paying for part or all of their children's education. Many are already strained, financially. In spite of financial aid, families are struggling to keep their children in college. Some students who completed the 1993-94 school year are doubtful they will be able to return until they can save enough on their own to come back. That hurts! For that reason, the trustees have approved only minimal increases in tuition and other student fees. (See box for a comparison of FWBBC with other institutions.)

The only other source of income is gifts. We hope you realize that every gift to FWBBC holds down what the college has to

charge its students.

However, gifts have been insufficient in recent years to meet the college's needs. That is true in spite of the fact that the college's indebtedness was erased two years ago. Operational costs continue. Buildings have to be kept up. Utilities must be paid. The library must be maintained. Salaries must be paid. All of this illustrates one basic fact: Education is expensive. This year, the denomination is being asked to give more to Free Will Baptist Bible College than ever. Not because the college is expanding. Not to fund luxuries. Just to operate it. In the privacy of your own thoughts, you will decide your "vote" for the college. If you decide to begin giving or to increase your giving, you vote to keep the college going. If you decide to do nothing, the college will suffer.

Don't misunderstand. . . Free Will Baptist Bible College is not on the verge of closing. But, as Dr. Haddon Robinson told attendees at a conference for preachers held on campus, "Don't take schools like this for granted. More and more

are closing their doors every year."

If you believe in the college and what it is trying to do, show your support. We need to hear from you. . .now.




TE Department became one of the college's finest. His former students have served well in classrooms and as administrators, in both public and Chris-



Eric Thomsen, a senior music/English major from


Jacksonville, Florida, was chosen president. Assisting him are Jon Forrest, a junior ministerial from student Ashland City, Tennessee, as





COLLEGE BUYS PROPERTY; PROSPECT OF RELOCATING

n September 1, the college took its first step toward relocating the school by purchasing nearly 123 acres of land 16 miles northwest of downtown Nashville.

"We feel that God has given us this property," President Tom Malone said on the day of the purchase.

The cost of \$265,000 is well below market value for the land and will be partially underwritten by recent bequests to the college. However, Stewardship Development Director-Roy Harris is looking for donors who will "buy" the land at \$3,400 per acre. The money will underwrite both the cost of the land and developing it as we prepare to move the college. Should it not prove feasible to move the college, the land can be sold at a profit.

Relocation has become an urgent priority as the college has grown in the past four years. The school has charted a nine percent growth average during this time. But the increase in dorm students has added to the necessity to move. Since 1990, the college has grown by an average of more than 30 dorm students per year. The cost of land in the West End area of Nashville, where the college has been for 52 years, has made expansion impossible. Zoning restrictions have added to the problem. It is no longer possible to buy an old building and convert it to a dormitory in this area.

Given this situation, the college is left with two choices if

enrollment growth continues: move, or cap the enrollment. No one at the college wants to contemplate the prospect of turning away students.

The new property is in the Joelton community. It rolls gently between I-24 and U.S. 41-A (Clarksville Highway). The land is within a mile of the Joelton exit of the Interstate. It has a frontage of about a quarter mile on Clarksville Highway and about double that along the Interstate. Utilities are already on the property, except for sewerage, which is less than half a mile away.

Residents of Joelton have met and approve of the presence of the college in their community . They know what kind of college FWBBC is and recognize it as an asset.

College officials emphasize that no capital campaign will be started or formal decision to move will be made without the National Association's approval.

The President is reviewing offers for the college's present property that have already begun to come in. No one knows what it is worth, but the rising property values that have made it necessary for the college to be moved will work in its favor as its sale is considered.

College officials are inviting alumni and other friends to comment on whether they think moving FWBBC at this time is wise or not. Please correspond with us. As you write, pray that God will lead us clearly, and that we will know His direction and do as He bids.

THE MANY WAYS GOD SPEAKS by Kent Nelson



he Lord speaks to people in different ways."

That was what Brother Malone told the student body during the fall semester last year. I vividly remember him saying, "Sometimes God deals with people through the emptiness of life." His description of "an empty life" perfectly fitted the life I had lived. So, while sitting in one of those hard chapel seats, I began to reflect on my life and the directions in which God had led me.

Growing up in rural Alabama, I had been sheltered from many of the complexities of life that often plague young people. There were, of course, the usual setbacks that disrupted our routine of living, such as financial binds, PTA meetings, and Mr. Reed's dog that made a habit of invading our garbage can.

But our family had a hidden problem that dug deeply into our lives. My father was a struggling alcoholic. I thank God that there was a father-figure in our home, because some families lack even that. But alcohol was like a cancer that ate away at the love and harmony we once shared. My father wasn't always a slave to the bottle. There was a time when I was growing up that our family was united and serving God in our local church. But those times were replaced by sleepless nights and constant worry. As is the case so many times, the devil found a weakness and tore apart in no time what it had taken years to build.

So, it was with tears just over a year ago that we said our final goodbyes to a man who was loved by so many. Before any family or friends arrived, I stood alone with God, holding the hand of my deceased father. Although I had been saved at 15, I gave God my empty life by telling Him, "Anytime, anywhere, anything."

"Anytime" was just a month later. "Anywhere" was Free Will Baptist Bible College. "Anything" was a call to preach.

It has been almost a year since I sat in that hard chapel seat and heard Brother Malone describe my life. As we start a new school year, I can imagine another student in chapel this year, struggling with a broken heart or a shattered dream. As the new student body chaplain, I hope to help them mend the heartbreak. I believe everything happens for a reason. Maybe God was and is preparing me for some unseen challenge that lies ahead. Who knows?

Please pray for us—the students and the faculty—as we set our sights on a successful year preparing for God's service.




December is FWBBC's month under the denomination's *Together* Way plan. Roy Harris, Director of Stewardship Development, hopes to raise one-fourth of the college's




Education Department, has been chosen to serve on the State Board of Examiners for approval of Tennessee's teacher education programs.
