

Fay and Leroy Forlines



n 1991, the former United Soviet Socialist Republic opened its doors and granted religious liberty to its citizens for the first time in the long bistory of that country. Various religions and cults responded by sending missionaries. Some Free Will Baptists went with Rick Amato Ministries for two weeks to distribute Bibles. Some FWBBC students went to Russia in 1994. More FWBBC students and others went with Peter Dyneka Ministries in the summer of 1995.

In April 1995, delegates from the FWB Foreign Missions Department went to Russia to see what Free Will Baptists could do to belp. Russian Baptist leaders told them they needed teachers of theology, ethics, morals, and English. Together, they decided to invite Professor Leroy Forlines and bis wife, Fay, to teach in churches, Bible institutes, Bible colleges, and Bible seminaries for the 1996 Spring semester-from early February through June, Free Will Baptists joined in partnership with the Forlines to pray for and fund this historic endeavor.

In an interview conducted before bis departure, Mr. Forlines outlined what he hopes to accomplish.

Q-What is the primary purpose for your trip?

The purpose for our going is twofold: to teach Arminian Theology and to gather information to share with the Foreign Missions Board about possibilities for Free Will Baptists to advance the cause of Christ there. In addition, I hope to assist those who will be translating my theology book, Systematics, into Russian for use in Russia and Ukraine. The Foreign Mission Board has directed that 10,000 copies be printed in Russian.

Q—How will you overcome the language barrier?

Russians take English in school. Some students will understand English. Also, we have been studying Russian. Regretfully, I will have to rely on an interpreter. Fay will teach English to some, including the President of the seminary at Kiev and his wife.

0—Where will you teach?

We will teach at Russian Baptist schools and churches. Some are definite; others are probabilities. They are located in Kiev, Odessa, Moscow, St.

Petersburg, Ekaterinburg, Chelyabinsk, Novosibirsk, and Khabarovsk. If we finish near the Sea of Japan, we hope to visit our missionaries in Japan before we return to the U.S.

Q-What subjects will you teach?

Primarily Arminian Theology, with an emphasis on perseverance. I expect to put that into the context of the doctrines of man, atonement, and the grace of God as manifested in justification and sanctification.

Q-Why are Russian Baptists looking to Free Will Baptists for this kind of help?

Russian Baptists are primarily Arminian, in theology. Other Baptist groups who have gone over to the region have been Calvinistic. Russian Baptists were delighted to find a Baptist group in America that is also Arminian.

Until seven years ago, they had no opportunity for theological education. The first evangelical theological degrees of higher education granted in the history of the Ukraine or Russia were granted by the Odessa Baptist Seminary on June 24, 1995. Also, having very limited financial resources, Russian Baptists are relying on the generosity of Western Christians to help them get through these formative times.

Q-What needs do you want us to pray over while you are away?

Those who support us in prayer and finances will, in the mind of God, share in the credit for what is accomplished. Many have opened their hearts to be partners with us and God in the "Forlines Russian Beachhead for Free Will Baptists."

We invite and desire others to join in prayer for us: for an effective and fruitful ministry, wisdom in working with God's people in Russia, our physical health and safety, and a willing spirit on our part to learn from those precious Christians who have suffered so much for their faith at the hands of atheistic communists.

Lord willing, Mr. Forlines hopes to be back at FWBBC for the 1996 Fall semester. We pray God's blessings on his ministry there and look forward to his return.

hat an exciting day we had during the Wednesday morning service of Bible Conference. We celebrated the culmination of the Claim the Land Campaign. The campaign began in an effort to repay money the college had borrowed from itself to underwrite the Joelton property it purchased in September 1994. The final commitment came in January 1996. The campaign was scheduled to be completed by May 31, 1996, the end of the present school year. The last commitment on the land was received some four and a half months ahead of schedule and approximately 14 months after the first acre was purchased. Over \$250,000 has already come in with more to be received over the next couple of years. God has been gracious and provided the foundation upon which a future campus for Free Will Baptists can be built.

All 123 acres have been either paid for or a commitment has been made for purchase. During Bible Conference, the deed for the final acre was presented to Dr. Tom Malone in honor of his parents who purchased both the first and last acres. Acres were purchased in several different ways and from several different states. The God of Heaven touched the lives of many people. Gifts and commitments were received from Illinois, Missouri, Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Arkansas, Alabama, West Virginia, Oklahoma, Kentucky, South Carolina, Virginia, Michigan, Florida, Texas, California, Washington, and Hawaii. Gifts came from churches, individuals, a local association, a state association, and the FWBBC Alumni Association. The Student Body of FWBBC is purchasing one acre and several acres are being purchased by Free Will Baptist businessmen and women.

Money will continue coming in for the next few years, but this is a highlight in the history of our denomination. Our folks have caught a glimpse of a future campus for Free Will Baptist Bible College, where we will continue to train our Free Will Baptist young people through the next century, should the Lord tarry His coming.

It was such a pleasure to be in the service at Bible Conference. The joy of celebrating God's blessing and provision left us in amazement and awe at what God had done. There are still many things that must happen if we are to move our campus to the new Joelton property. But we have the assurance that the God "who hath begun a good work" will see it through to completion.



RALLY GIFTS OVER \$200,000

NEEDS REMAIN IN SPITE OF RECORD CHRISTMAS DRIVE

In spite of a record Paul Ketteman Memorial Christmas Drive, the college is facing the possibility of a serious financial shortfall for the school year.

At the end of February, Christmas Drive gifts had gone over the \$250,000-goal and stood at \$270,131, according to Roy Harris, Director of Stewardship Development. This is the best total ever for the campaign. Both December, 1995, and January, 1996, were record gift months.

The college's 1995-96 enrollment did not increase as much as was anticipated. The budget was built on what college officials felt was a realistic projection, but fewer students than expected actually came. A small error in enrollment projections can have a major impact on the budget. Tom Sass, Treasurer, says that the college could finish the year in the red by \$150,000 or more unless people respond to the need by May 31.

While grateful for gifts so far this year, Mr. Harris appeals to friends of the college to do something truly special between now and May 31. It could make the difference in how the college closes the year.

The people of Tennessee can be pleased that the Lord has placed these teachers in such strategic positions.



340 STUDENTS REGISTER FOR FALL SEMESTER

hat a joy! To welcome 340 students at the beginning of a new school year!

After a long, mostly quiet summer, the FWBBC faculty and staff were geared up for the arrival of students. A week of faculty in-service training included sessions led by Dr. Ken Gangel, Academic Dean of Dallas Theological Seminary. Dean of Students Terry Forrest and his staff were prepared to direct orientation for those coming to FWBBC for the first time.

But nothing equals the actual arrival of students. Dr. Tom Malone reminded the faculty that they—our students—are the reason we are here.

After registration, Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar, reported that 110 new FWBBC students are joining 230 returning students. Some 247 will live on campus and make life interesting for their Residence Directors.

By classes, the fall semester student body numbers 101 freshmen, 92 sophomores, 74 juniors, 59 seniors, and 14 special students.

Students came from 26 states, eight foreign countries, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The foreign countries represented are Canada, Spain, France, Korea, Russia, Romania, Panama, and Brazil. The state counts are:

The only way to measure success is to see if you are doing what you set out to do. The denomination determined that the purpose of Free Will Baptist Bible College is to train people for Christian service.

It is good to measure that training with tests, research papers, and required reading. But do those things really measure whether the college is a success? What if a person did all of those things, but never used the training he received at FWBBC? What if the faculty taught excellent lessons, people supported the college faithfully, the library held rich resources, and students made excellent grades, vet the Kingdom of God never benefited? Could we say that the college had met the challenge the denomination gave it so many years ago? The answer is a resounding, "No!"

FWBBC exists for service: preparing men and women to be Christian leaders, instilling a commitment to service within every student, challenging our students to be active Christian servants after they finish their preparation here. Is that what FWBBC is doing? The answer is an emphatic, "Yes!"

One of my responsibilities is to follow the ministries of our Teacher Education students after they graduate. I looked back through our files of 1995 and 1996 graduates a few days ago. This is what I found:

—90% of our 1995 graduates have begun teaching in Christian schools.

-Of 14 1996 TE graduates, six have accepted positions at Christian schools and two are teaching in public schools. Another is working as a dental hygienist to help her husband through graduate school. When he finishes, they plan to serve the Lord in China. Another is working with education and youth in her church. Others are still interviewing for jobs.

One of the 1996 graduates who accepted a job at a public school worked with Free Will Baptist missionaries in Ivory Coast this summer. She and her husband, also a FWBBC graduate, plan to eventually go as missionaries to one of the republics of the former Soviet Union. Another TE major and her husband are also planning to serve as foreign missionaries

Do all of our graduates go to Christian schools or mission fields? While not all minister in Christian schools, we intend that all will be missionaries where God places them. Missions must not be limited to certain places or positions. Wherever people need Christ, that is a mission field. Some of our students, like Linda Snow, will go to Japan. Some, like Greg Ketteman, will be missionary principals in public schools. Some, like Julie Martin, will minister to gifted students in magnet schools. Some will be pastors' wives and will home school their children. Others will help delinquent young people. All of them, trained and motivated during their years at Free Will Baptist Bible College, are called to be missionaries wherever God places them.

FWBBC's Teacher Education Department was founded to support our Christian schools. However, the college's Mission statement says we are preparing students to minister wherever they have the opportunity. Are FWBBC students, especially those trained in Teacher Education, doing this? Is the college fulfilling the purpose for which it was founded?

You had better believe it!

r. Robert Picirilli, Academic Dean, was called upon by President Tom Malone to report on the college's financial needs to attendees of the National Association of Free Will Baptists meeting in Fort Worth, Texas, in July.

He told attendees that the college finished last year \$186,000 in the red (\$140,418, according to new auditing method). "Free Will Baptists simply have not faced up to the cost of quality Christian education in the denomination," he said. He urged delegates to "go back home and seriously consider what you will do financially for the college this year."

In spite of this, President Malone could also report that the college is making good progress in its pursuit of regional accreditation. He also noted that the "Claim the Land" drive, to underwrite the purchase of 123 acres of property to which the colleges plans to move, has been successfully completed.

5,000-GOAL SET FOR 96 Christmas Drive



The 1996 Christmas Drive goal is a record \$275,000! That makes it one of the most massive, ambitious, and challenging drives in the history of the denomination!

As some 340 FWBBC students head home for Christmas, they take with them a challenge to do something for the college's Christmas Project. Get a checkbook signed. Preach or teach a class and ask for an offering. Sing a special and appeal for support. Stewardship Development Director Roy Harris says, "If everyone does something, we'll reach our goal." His goal for the college family is \$100,000! In January, he will tally the checkbooks, checks, and cash gifts our students bring back and apply that toward the goal.

But in those places where no student makes an appeal for the project, the word has gone out for Free Will Baptists to rally behind the drive and to send a gift, sponsor a Sunday school project, or in some other way help to raise a love offering for the young people at the Bible College.

Mr. Harris says that a gift of \$3,000 will, in addition to what students pay, operate FWBBC for a day. If that is too much, he adds that gifts of \$125 will operate the college for an hour; \$500, for four hours; or \$1,000, for eight hours.

The college has an excellent record of meeting its Christmas Project goals, according to Mr. Harris. Last year's goal of \$250,000 was exceeded by more than \$20,000. He is confident that this year's goal can be met as well.

The Christmas Drive, conducted in honor of Rev. Paul Ketteman, who served the college for 25 years as Public Relations Director, is endorsed by the Free Will Baptist National Association. It is part of the Together Way Plan of stewardship designed to fund all of the national departments of the denomination. December is set aside for the college's needs.



The interest from this endowed scholarship is awarded to a student each year. Generally, the scholarship is awarded to a ministerial student who is an upperclassman.

PASTOR COMMENDS STUDENTS TO FWBBC

This fall, 13 students came to FWBBC from Decatur (1L) Free Will Baptist Church. Rev. Larry Monday, himself an alumnus of the Bible College, wrote the following article after bringing his students to Nashville in August.

I bave been a part of many separations in my life. But the one that took place at Free Will Baptist Bible College this week was different from all the rest.

Was it different because our church bad entrusted to the college 13 of our best youth for their training, molding, and maturing into effective Christian workers? Or was it because my wife and 1 bad left our daughter there, not just the church kids? Was that the reason for the tear in the corner of my eye as I looked back at those church kids for the last time? For the next time I saw them, they would be fellow workers.

Was it different because of the big bole they would leave at our church as they began to minister at other places, involved in larger ministries, offered greater opportunities to serve elsewhere throughout our denomination?

I knew we were leaving them

at the best place we could bave left them. I knew these teachers and administrators. Our students would be cared for, loved, and allowed to develop into the men and women of God that He desired them to be.

All of these thoughts passed through my mind. But the tears on Monday evening were for a different reason. I was thinking about years down the road, when these students would think about their home church and all of those members who will have gone on to be with the Lord, and, with a tear in their eye, would say, "Ob, how they loved us at my home church!"

Someone standing near may ask, "How did you know they loved you so much? Was it the money they provided, the way they let you lead in the worship services, or was it the trips they took you on?"

These students would then respond, "Ob, no. It was the way they let us go. They opened up their bands, with tears in their eyes, a prayer on their breath, and said to us...fly...Fly...FLY!"
