BIBLE COLLEGE GRANTED REGIONAL ACCREDITATION

uesday, December 10, was a historic day for Free Will Baptist Bible College and the Free Will Baptist denomination as the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) announced that FWBBC has joined the ranks of regionally accredited institutions.

The road to regional accreditation has been long and difficult. It was begun in 1991, when the college's trustees asked the administration to investigate whether the college might join SACS without sacrificing its integrity. Once it was determined that accreditation would not require changing the college's nature and mission, the college applied and began the self-study that is so important to the accreditation process.

In 1994, SACS evaluated the college and granted it Candidate status. That meant another two to four years of work. As the 1996 meeting neared, most in the administration felt FWBBC would most likely have its Candidate status extended for another two years. Some optimists thought SACS might accredit the college, with stipulations. But, at its December meeting in Nashville, the SACS Commission on Colleges granted accreditation without stipulations—a decision beyond the fondest dreams of FWBBC officials. As one member of the Commission was heard to say, "These folks are ready."

On December 12, local Free Will Baptist pastors and personnel from other departments of the National Association of Free Will Baptists joined FWBBC students and employees for a special chapel. The service focused on thanking God for His help in the process of accreditation and recommitting the college to the ideals and

purposes that have guided it for more than 50 years. As President Tom Malone said, "FWBBC has been and will remain a Bible college, committed to preparing men and women to serve Christ and His Church."

ccreditation is not new for FWBBC. The Bible College has been accredited by the Accrediting Association of Bible College (AABC) since 1958. AABC enjoys a good level of recognition in accreditation circles and the work done by FWBBC students has been widely accepted.

The college's work received further approval in 1976 when its Teacher Education program was licensed by the Tennessee State Department of Education.

Free Will Baptist Bible College has always been committed to quality education in an environment that nurtures Christian growth and maturity. Each new level of recognition has further confirmed that students who enroll at FWBBC are getting full value for every educational dollar—without sacrificing a fervent dedication to Christ and His work on earth.

Where from here? Accreditation is the end of one process and

the beginning of another. The college will soon begin a new self-study aimed at maintaining its accreditation. SACS will initially re-examine the college in five years; after that, examinations will come at 10-year intervals.

Every student will receive full value for his educational dollar. . . at a college fervently dedicated to Christ and His work.

e thank God for His grace and guidance in this process. While the college has been the focal point for much congratulations, it is FWBBC students who are the real beneficiaries of regional accreditation. More doors, on both the undegraduate and graduate levels, will be open to them as they extend their education beyond FWBBC. Bible College students have done well at other institutions and their performance has paved the way for others to follow. However, a few institutions kept their doors closed to students who attended non-regionally accredited colleges. With SACS accreditation, that will change for FWBBC students. In fact, the benefits of SACS accreditation are retroactive to January 1, 1996, helping many students who have studied at or graduated from the college this year.

Join us in thanksgiving for God's help in this enterprise. His hand has been evident. Also, join us in recommitment to stay true to God and to His Word as we approach the 21st century. There has never been a day in which the power of a life, touched by the Master's hand, has been more needed . . . or more evident.

hen we got the news about SACS accreditation I felt a jumble of emotions. I felt again the strain of the last five years and knew that all the hard work enhanced the sense of reward and satisfaction. I wished that all the college faculty and staff could be there to share the moment together, because I knew it had been a tough time for all.

I thought back to 1990 when Dr. Thigpen and the Board first began to consider going for regional accreditation and we tried to look at all the pros and cons. There are arguments both ways, of course. Some Christian educators frown on accreditation of any kind. You don't need man's approval to do God's work, they say—and they're right in some ways.

Objections to accreditation usually take one of two forms. Objections on principle say that seeking membership in an accrediting agency not sponsored by Christians is to be "unequally yoked together with unbelievers" in violation of 2 Cor. 6:14. But that depends on the nature and purpose of an organization. We decided that for an educational institution to be part of an educational organization wouldn't violate the principle unless the organization has religious purposes and compromises doctrine. After all, it isn't necessarily wrong for a Christian politician to be part of a political party, or for a Christian doctor to be part of a medical association.

Other objections are practical ones, insisting that agencies like SACS will require a Christian school to compromise its Christian commitment or integrity. The trouble is that most who object on these grounds simply say that this must be so but fail to cite instances where schools were required to disobey God. After we carefully examined the SACS standards and didn't find anything that would require compromise, we decided to start the process and see if any such things turned up. They never did. All the teams and staff members who've dealt with us have made clear that we have the right to be distinctively Christian. They may expect a certain number of Ph.D.'s on the faculty, but they don't object to Ph.D.'s

that are dedicated to Christ and the college's mission.

If they ever ask anything of us that would require disobedience to God, I believe we'll have the grace and courage to get out. I don't really expect that to happen.

I think many folks misunderstand what accreditation is and how it works. In most countries of the world, accreditation is a function of the government. In the U.S., however, voluntary selfaccreditation has been preserved. Schools that want to accredit themselves and work for improvement band together for that purpose. A team of persons from those very colleges visits a school applying for membership and makes recommendations for improvement based on the standards that have already been drawn up and voted on by the membership. The staff of the agency doesn't make the standards or the decisions; elected representatives of the schools do that. And one good thing about being in the south is that SACS includes many private schools in its membership (more than the state universities, in fact) that uphold the rights of Christian schools to be truly Christian. We baven't encountered one single standard or suggestion that would ask us to hedge on our commitment to Christ, the Bible, or Free Will Baptist distinctives.

Why seek regional accreditation? After all, we were already accredited—since 1958 by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges (AABC)—and that accreditation has served us well. But there are still some schools here and there who will recognize credits only from a regionally accredited institution. As a result, some of our students have suffered needlessly. Even here in Tennessee, some of the state sponsored student funding goes only to regionally accredited schools. And our continued approval to grant teaching licensure in the state was dependent on obtaining regional accreditation. We sought SACS accreditation, then, for the same reasons that any college seeks any form of accreditation: to increase the

level of recognition and approval received from other colleges and organizations and so to make it easier on our students to transfer credits or receive financial aid.

knew it was an important accomplishment, for us and for the denomination. But I knew also that it wasn't any more important than many other key moments we've experienced here. I remember well when Dr. Johnson turned the first shovel of dirt on the first building ever built here, in 1950.

- ...When AABC granted us accreditation in 1958.
- ...When Jack Paramore raised his first \$1000 for the five new buildings scheduled to go up in the 70's.
- ...When we got approval for teacher licensure.
- ...When our denomination responded to Dr. Thigpen and Ronald Creech and we paid off a \$450,000 line-of-credit indebtedness in just three months.

And even those aren't the important things. *It really is God's approval that counts, not man's*. And the important times come every year when a line of cap-and-gown-clad graduates walk across the platform and receive their degrees and then go out to serve Christ and His Church as pastors and missionaries or as lay leaders who will serve also in schools or businesses.

Some of our students have suffered needlessly.

What I prayed, within a few minutes of the news, was that God would make this a blessing and not a curse, that it would not make us proud but of even greater service to the Lord and our people. In our special thanksgiving chapel on Friday, President Malone concluded the celebration with a fine statement of rededication and recommitment to our mission, sealed by a prayer that Dr. Charles Hampton led. That's when I felt most gratified.

COLLEGE, HOME MISSIONS Unite To Plant Churches

he Bible College has sent out many men who have planted Free Will Baptist churches. But, for the first time, the college is now specifically training young preachers in how to do it.

Ralph Hampton, Chairman of the Biblical Ministries Department, says 10 students are enrolled in a new course, Introduction to Church Planting, being offered this semester for the first time. The course is being offered in cooperation with the National Home Missions Department and is the result of a proposal made to the college by General Director Trymon Messer. He and his staff have assisted in planning this important new course.

The course will be taught by a member of the college's Biblical Ministries Department, but will make wide use of Mr. Messer and others who have practical experience in church planting. For instance, this semester the students will also hear from:

- Rev. Gerald Fender, church planter, Knoxville, TN
- Rev. Tommy Jones, church planter, Pittsburg, PA
- Rev. James Munsey, cross-cultural church planter, Weslaco, TX

Home Missions plans to provide videos by home missionaries who will share the practical side of church planting. Internships, where students will work under the direction of home missionaries, are also being planned.

Mr. Hampton is enthusiastic in his support for the new course:

Free Will Baptist Bible College has a vital interest in church planting. We recognize that church planting is essential to fulfilling the Great Commission. It is also the only way our denomination can survive and thrive. New churches are more efficient in evangelism; their focus on outreach is sharper. We must plant churches to reach our cities. . . The best hope for a larger, worldwide ministry for Free Will Baptists lies in a great increase in church planting.

he sun was bright that morning as I began to get ready for church. As was routine for Sundays, the house was filled with the sounds of Southern Gospel. My family and I made the two-mile trek to the

I knew that, more than anything I had ever known before, God wanted me to go to Free Will Baptist Bible College. It seemed the sermon would never end. 

Her response was not what I expected. "Amber," she began. "I know you think you need to go to the Bible College, but we just can't make it. I tried, but the money just isn't there. I just can't do it. Maybe next semester."

Suddenly, a joy overflowed from deep within me and spilled out into a smile. She looked confused. "Amber, you don't understand. You can't go this time." I only smiled back. "Yes, Mom, I understand. It will be okay." I hugged her, kissed her cheek, and did my best to reassure her. As she left, I slid from beneath my covers to kneel at my bedside. "Dear God," I prayed. "No, Ma'am, I didn't," I answered. "How much is it?" My heart leapt. All I had left to pay was \$100! I ran outside to tell Mom how wonderfully God had provided.

She consented for me to go, with the understanding that I could go for a semester and then would have to come home. That was four years ago. In May, I will receive my Bachelor's degree in Secondary Education. The road has not always been smooth, but His grace has been sufficient. I would not trade anything for my time here. It has been truly wonderful and God has been so good. With four years past and many lessons learned, the Son shines brighter than He ever has before.


Tennessee, Illinois, Lead In Enrollment








he first Dr. L. C. Johnson Scholarship was awarded in chapel May 13 to Brian Lewis, a junior Pastoral

The ground is broken!



n June 20, members of the college family met on the 123-acre site of FWBBC's new campus. The occasion was the breaking of ground to build a road from U.S. 41-A to the crest of the property, which will be the center of the campus. A formal ground breaking is planned for the future.

President Tom Malone spoke briefly, then asked everyone to form a circle while FWBBC teacher Ralph Hampton led a prayer of thanksgiving and consecration. Following his prayer, a bulldozer dropped its blade and made the first cut for the road. The 24-foot gravel road opens on the highway and runs about 3,000 feet to a 21-foot, ten-sided prayer chapel on the campus center. (See related article on volunteers.) From the prayer chapel, visitors will be able to see the position of each new building. Pictures hung in the chapel will enable them to accurately visualize the finished campus. The chapel will eventually be moved to a permanent location.

Roy Harris, Stewardship Development Director for the college, says it is no accident that the first building to be constructed on the new campus is a prayer chapel. "Prayer and chapel have always been at the very heart of what FWBBC is all about," he said.

When the road is finished, the main entrance will be built and landscaping begun, with trees and shrubbery flanking the entrance.

Mr. Harris says this stage will cost approximately \$250,000. He has begun raising the money among

friends of the college who are interested in its progress. He has named the project "Stage 2: Developing The Land."

This is the next step toward moving the Bible College from its confining West Nashville campus to the open countryside of northwestern Davidson County.

The cost of the new property has already been underwritten. Free Will Baptists have given and pledged \$3,400 per acre to buy and develop the property. The National Association of Free Will Baptists has given its overwhelming approval to relocation. College officials have been developing plans to market the present campus and to raise funds to build the new campus. The college is presently looking for someone to direct the fund-raising campaign.

to carry out projects to improve the campus.

CHRISTMAS DRIVE AIMS FOR \$300,000

he Paul Ketteman Memorial Christmas Drive has become a keystone in the Bible College's annual drive to meet its general fund obligations.

tremendously. The church designates 15 percent of its undesignated income to outside causes. The Bible College receives 50 percent of that amount. Including designated gifts, some 35% of the church's income goes to outside ministries, according to Rev. Dollar.

But that is not the whole story. The church is also involved in two scholarship programs that benefit FWBBC students every year. And every student from Immanuel who enrolls at FWBBC gets a \$4,500 grant from the church.

It is significant that all of this is from a church with an attendance of about 180.

"Thank the Lord for Immanuel Free Will Baptist Church and others like it who give sacrificially to help meet the needs of the college," says Mr. Harris.

FWBBC STUDENTS REPAY THEIR LOANS

recent Associated Press release shows that FWBBC has the lowest student loan default rate of any 4year private college in Tennessee and lower than that of any public college or university in the state.

In 1995 only 1.6 percent of FWBBC students who borrowed federal funds defaulted in the first or second year of repayment. The average for Tennessee colleges and universities was 12.8 percent; the national average was 10.4 percent.

"Anything under 10 percent is considered excellent by most colleges," according to Dr. Jim Cox, FWBBC's Director of Institutional Effectiveness. "It says a lot about our students, that they have the integrity to pay back what they borrow," he added.

If you or someone you know needs help going to FWBBC, help is available. But we do expect every student to repay all he or she borrows
