Roy Harris To Direct Relocation Campaign

ree Will Baptist Bible College's trustees have asked Roy Harris, the college's Stewardship Development Director, to direct a capital campaign to finance the college's relocation to a new campus, according to President Tom Malone.

The trustees met on campus in early December and asked Mr. Harris to assume the responsibility of raising \$5-\$6 million in cash and commitments in a three-year drive to move the Bible College to a 123acre site outside of Nashville. As Director of Advancement, Mr. Harris will supervise all fund raising for the college, but will have the specific responsibility of raising money to build the new campus.


Trustees also asked Tim Campbell, the college's Director of Alumni Affairs, to replace Mr. Harris in the Stewardship Development Office. He will work under the direction of Mr. Harris and is charged with raising the college's \$1.1 million annual operating fund.

The relocation campaign will be formally launched in March during the college's spring Bible Conference. The college already owns the property to which it plans to move. The property has been underwritten by gifts and commitments to the "Claim The Land" campaign, which Mr. Harris directed.

Due to Mr. Campbell's move, the college is presently searching for a new Director of Alumni Affairs.

What is bappening with the new property? When will we begin actual construction on our first building? Do we have any offers to purchase our present campus? When will we move to our new campus?




hese are a few of the questions some of us hear on an almost daily basis. What people really want to know is what progress is being made toward relocating Free Will Baptist Bible College.

I wish I could say construction will begin this spring and we will be on our new campus within six months. But we are not to that point. There are many factors that must be considered as we prepare to move FWBBC. Like moving from an old house to a new one, our new campus will be larger and more expensive than our present campus.

During the relocation process, Free Will Baptist Bible College must continue to function as a college. We also will have to continue housing students, conducting classes, granting degrees, providing office space for faculty and staff, and maintaining an accurate accounting of our \$3.5 million budget. We also must maintain a healthy general fund during this time.

We also finds that our new campus will cost at least \$6 million more than we We know that our new campus will cost at least \$6 million more than we can reasonably expect to receive from the sale of our present campus. It would be great if someone would offer us enough for our present campus to completely underwrite the cost of the new one. But that is not likely to happen. So the next logical step is to do what we outlined in our presentation to the National Association when we met in Charlotte, North Carolina. That is to launch a campaign to raise the difference between what we expect to receive from the sale of our present campus and the projected cost of the new campus.



ADVANCING TOWARD RELOCATION (CONTINUED)

The Office of Advancement was created to direct this campaign. The primary responsibility of the office is to raise the approximately \$6 million that will be needed to move forward with relocation. Its secondary role will be to oversee the Departments of Stewardship Development and Alumni Affairs, and give general oversight to all fundraising activities for the college.

As Director of Advancement, I will be responsible for formulating and implementing the Relocation Campaign Plan. I will be challenging our Free Will Baptist pastors, churches, and individuals to give sacrificially to help this historic effort. I will also work with corporations and foundations that appreciate schools like Free Will Baptist Bible College. Nashville area businesses that have benefited from the employment of our students through the years will also be challenged to help.

The Relocation Campaign will be formally launched at this years' Bible Conference. It will last approximately three years, with commitments of up to five years. Our Free Will Baptist people will be challenged to help underwrite the new campus by purchasing it in increments. We will be providing opportunities to purchase the campus by square feet, by rooms, and by buildings. Two hundred and forty churches are needed to commit, with the Lord's help, to give \$5,000 a year for five years towards the relocation. That would equal the approximately \$6 million that is be needed. (This must be above what is already being given for the general operation of the college.) We are also challenging 1,200 individuals to commit, with the Lord's help, to give \$5,000 during this five-year period. This would equal \$83.34 per month. A combination of gifts from churches and individuals will be needed to provide the funds. Some churches and individuals can do more than I have suggested and some cannot do as much, but if each will do the very best they can, we will see this miracle of the Lord take place. Our Free Will Baptist denomination has approximately 2,400 churches and over 200,000 people. If one church in ten or one family in 50 will participate, we will see a new Free Will Baptist Bible College campus built for present and future generations of Free Will Baptist young people. If we pray and ask the Lord to direct us in our efforts we will see the project move forward.

The Relocation Campaign will be formally launched at Bible Conference in March and will continue through May 2001, with commitments being received through May 2003.

We are thankful for what God has already done in providing 123 acres of good land and the funds to pay for it. We are now ready to take another big step in the relocation process. Please pray that God will give us wisdom and will keep His guiding hand upon us in every step we take. Pray also that God will impress our good Free Will Baptist people with the role they should play in helping with the financial needs for the move. These are exciting days as we advance toward relocation.

104 SAVED ON **CHRISTIAN SERVICE**

ohn Murray, who serves as Christian Service Director at Free Will Baptist Bible College, reports that students led 104 people to Jesus Christ during the fall semester. As the semester closed before

Christmas, Mr. Murray reported that students preached 471 times, taught 766 classes, and dealt with 1,195 people about their spiritual needs. In addition to those who were saved, students witnessed 158 other decisions and distributed 2.930 tracts

EDUCATORS PRAISE PROGRAM FOR TEACHERS

he Bible College recently reorganized its Teacher Education Program in about half the time the State Department of Education estimated it would take. The project involved thousands of hours, every academic department, and nearly every teacher and administrator on campus. The reorganization was

required by the Department of Education of all colleges and universities in Tennessee that train teachers.

An evaluation team from the Department of Education visited the college in January and expressed its approval

, ev. Roy Harris, Director of Advancement for Free Will Baptist Bible College, officially launched the FWBBC Campus Relocation Campaign at a service on campus March 10, during the annual Bible Conference.

The Campaign will run from August 1998 through May 2001. The goal is to raise \$6-million in five years, according to Mr. Harris. This, with income from the sale of the present campus, is expected to be sufficient to move the college and to complete the first stage of construction. (Construction costs and real estate prices are constantly changing, making it impossible to determine exactly how much will be needed to complete the first stage.) The location of the new campus is a 123-acre site fronting Interstate 24 northwest of Nashville.

Mr. Harris reported that an independent survey of Free Will Baptists, done by the Timothy Group, showed a 93% approval for the project. Three out of four surveyed said they would support the move financially, above their current giving.

The service included a multimedia presentation and was concluded by giving attendees an opportunity to express their support for the Campaign.

A report on the Campaign will be given at the National Association of Free Will Baptists when it meets this July in Tulsa.



An alumnus from the Class of 1993, wanting to congratulate the college on its SACS accreditation, wrote the following to Dr. James, Cox, Director of Institutional Effectiveness:

Dear Dr. Cox,

I completed my bachelor's in December 1993. In 1994, Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, would not accept me into graduate school due to FWBBC's accreditation. Therefore, I took 30 hours of graduate music from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary hoping to "prove" myself to TCU—a class A school, hosting the Van Cliburn International Piano Competitions.

The dean of graduate studies at TCU declined my application though I had passed the piano audition with the piano faculty. The dean of graduate studies agreed to accept me into graduate school if I could maintain above a 3.3 during 24 hours of undergraduate TCU courses. (I graduated cum laude from FWBBC and earned a 3.7 CGPA in 30 hours at Southwestern.)

Needless to say, May 15, 1996, I completed the 24 hours of undergraduate courses at TCU with a 3.904 CGPA. To the dean's astonishment, he told me he was "impressed" over the phone. However, I was appalled that TCU required me to complete "extra" undergraduate hours.

Dr. Cox, I believe FWBBC is one of the finest Christian schools and it deserves respect. Many of my mentors include my professors at FWBBC. The students are also of high quality and discipline. I want to do all I can to help the Bible College gain the respect it deserves. Please let me know any way I can participate.


Also in Tennessee, the churches of the Upper Cumberland Fellowship recently held their third annual rally for the college. On February 6, they raised more than \$8,000.





Dr. Brad Thomas Psychology

It was Thursday night of the annual spring revival at his home church in Birmingham, Brad remembers. The evangelist had preached on the plan of salvation and the

He joined the FWBBC faculty in 1996. His classes include Psychology and Pastoral Counseling. He and his wife, Sharon, are members of Cross Timbers Free Will Baptist Church. They have three sons: Eric, Ryan, and Kyle.

An ardent fan of the Crimson Tide, Brad collects football cards featuring former Alabama players. He also enjoys running and reading.



DR. CARSON TO BE FORLINES LECTURER





It seems like only a few days ago that the administration of Free Will Baptist Bible College took a short ride to northwest Nashville (Joelton) to look at some land that had been brought to our attention by one of our fine Free Will Baptist layman. As we rode in the college van to look at land we had not seen, none of us could have imagined what God had in store for Free Will Baptist Bible College. Much has happened since that first short step. Through the prayers and generosity of our Free Will Baptist people, we were able to purchase and pay for the beautiful 123-acre tract.

- We had the land surveyed as to potential college use.
- We developed a Master Plan for the new campus.

- We completed a survey and found 93 percent of our constituency are heavily supportive of the move.
- We launched our national Relocation Campaign during the 1998 spring Bible Conference.

- We have received about \$1 million in cash and commitments since the project began with the land purchase.
