Let us go and let us make us a place

The sons of the prophets said unto Elisha, Behold now, the place where we dwell with thee is too strait for us.

Let us go, we pray thee, unto Jordan, and take thence every man a beam, and let us make us a place there. . .

...And when they came to Jordan, they cut down wood.

—II Kings 6:1-4

Elisha operated a college, a seminary, for young prophets where the devout, mature, knowledgeable man of God could impart that spiritual wisdom to younger men so they could more effectively take God's message to the people. They were doing what Paul encouraged Timothy to do: "The things that thou hast learned of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others, also" (II Timothy 2:2).

Word of the school spread, which increased the enrollment until the dorms were filled and the classrooms and dining hall were overflowing. They needed to build and there wasn't room in their present location for the expansion.

The success of the project grew out of two observations. The young men saw the need—"Behold now," they said. And all of them participated in the work—"let us go and let us make a place."

Those involved with the operation of Free Will Baptist Bible College have seen the need. The school needs to expand and that is impossible at their present location, so they must relocate and build a new campus. The denomination, which owns, finances, and operates the institution, has picked up on their vision and voted—without a dissenting vote—to do just that.

The second element for success is not as easy as the first—"they cut down wood." Hard work in a spirit of cooperation turned their vision to reality. Elisha didn't build the new school. Every man in his place, doing his job—"felling a beam"—produced a new college on a new campus.

Two bundred thousand Free Will Baptist members of the National Association could give \$50 each and that would be \$10 million. Two thousand five hundred Free Will Baptist churches, members of the National Association, could give \$4,000 per church, which would be \$10 million. Since all the work of the denomination rests on the shoulders of about 500 churches and one-fifth of the membership, then each of those churches must give \$20,000 or 50,000 members must give \$200 each. As the number of those cooperating and participating decreases, the work load increases.

If the vision of a new Free Will Baptist Bible College becomes a wonderful reality, there must be among us an anxious, exciting, cooperating spirit.

Presidential Scholarships

Up to four 1999 high school graduates will be eligible to receive \$8,000-scholarships (\$1,000 per semester for four years) to Free Will Baptist Bible College under the Presidential Honors Scholarship program.

RELOCATION CAMPAIGN AHEAD OF SCHEDULE!

he campaign to raise the funds needed to relocate Free Will Baptist Bible College to her new campus is proceeding at a healthy pace. The campaign was formally launched during the 1998 Bible Conference one year ago. An update on the campaign was given during the Wednesday evening service of this year's Bible Conference. Much has happened in the last 12 months.

• A Campaign Theme, "A New Campus for a New Generation," was selected.

- An Honorary Chairman, Evangelist Bobby Jackson, was chosen to be a special advisor to the campaign.
- Campaign Materials were designed and produced.
- State Campaign Chairmen were selected from several states.
- Steering Committees have been formed in many states. (This is an ongoing process.)
- Approximately \$1,150,000 in cash and solid commitments have been secured. (This does not include more than \$400,000 given towards the original land purchase.)

The next two years will be spent challenging individuals, churches, local associations, alumni, corporations, businesses and foundations to help FWBBC make the move to the new campus. There will also be a flurry of activity as we finalize plans for building designs and uses.

Three things are necessary if the new campus is to be built in the near future:

- 1. We must pray for God's wisdom and help in the project. (This involves both the sale of the present campus and the construction of our new one.)
- $2. \ Our \ Free \ Will \ Baptist \ people \ must \ take \ ownership \ and \ become \ involved \ with both \ their \ finances \ and \ their \ time.$
- 3. Our people must take the initiative in talking with their friends and relatives, and presenting the challenge to become involved in constructing the new campus.

This first year of the campaign has been a busy and exciting one. Great things have been accomplished, but there is still much to be done. The future of Free Will Baptist Bible College is bright and God wants to perform wanders before our eyes. Let's trust Him and do our part, and we will soon see "A New Campus for a New Generation" of young people.

ould \$1,000 or \$1,500 per year help you send a son or daughter to Free Will Baptist Bible College?

That much could be available in the form of tax credits to many Free Will Baptists with college-age children. Two new programs to help with educational expenses have been initiated through the Federal Tax Relief Act of 1997.

While this will be only a brief summary (You know how complex federal programs can be!), we are trying to give you enough information so that you can sit down with your tax preparer and take advantage of what these new programs are offering you.

The Hope Scholarship

The first, is the Hope Scholarship. Briefly it is a tax credit with the following stipulations.

- It is for students in their first two years of college.
- Students must be enrolled at an accredited institution at least half time in a program that leads to a degree or certificate.
- The credit is 100% of the first \$1,000; 50% of the next \$1,000, for a total of \$1,500 per student.
- Qualifying expenses include tuition and required fees (not room, board, or books) paid after January 1, 1998.

The Lifetime Learning Tax Credit

Also available is the Lifetime Learning Tax

• It is for any undergraduate, graduate, or professional student enrolled at an eligible institution.

- The credit is for 20% of the first \$5,000 of out-of-pocket expenses, such as tuition and required fees (but not room, board, or books), for a maximum of \$1,000 per family.
- It covers expenses paid after July 1, 1998.

ree Will Baptist Bible College is a qualifying institution, so students enrolled at FWBBC may be eligible for one of these tax credits. You may claim a tax reduction under either of the programs above, but not both.

Please note that these are tax credits.

- For 1999, you may wish to reduce the amount of federal taxes withheld from your pay by the amount for which you qualify in order to pay college costs.
- If you have already filed your 1998 return, you may wish to file an amended return reflecting the credit due you.

Finally, note these limitations to the programs above:

- Single filers must report an adjusted gross income of not more than \$50,000.
- Married joint filers must report an adjusted gross income of not more than \$100,000.

If you had a child in college last year or you have one in college this year, you need to look into these programs. While the information above is not comprehensive, it is accurate to the best of our knowledge. Please get the advice of a professional tax preparer to be sure you claim all to which you are entitled.







Last year, they preached nearly 800 messages, taught over 1,400 classes, dealt with 1,875 people, and led 112 to Christ, with 478 people making other decisions.

hen I came to Free Will Baptist Bible College last year, my only goal was to make the basketball team. Nothing else really mattered.

That changed on September 25, 1998. We were singing our favorite hymns in chapel. The Holy Spirit had been dealing with me for some time about being saved. As we sang "How Great Thou Art," I let Him come into my life and change every goal I ever had.

During Christmas break, I was asked to preach at my home church in Forestdale, Alabama. I had preached before, but this time it was different. I really wanted to preach! That is when I knew that God was calling me to preach. One night, I knelt and surrendered my all to the Lord. I told Him that I would do anything He wants me to do. It has remained that way since then.

he largest group of new students in 12 years enrolled in late August, defying predictions last spring that the class would be smaller than last year's.

Dr. James Cox, Director of Enrollment Management says the number of new FWBBC students is up about 40% over last year's.

The total enrollment is well above spring projections due to a higher than usual number of summer applications. "A lot of our people worked hard, especially in summer camps, to reach young people who might not have considered coming to FWBBC," says Bert Tippett, Public Relations Director. "It appears that a reorganization of the Enrollment Management process and the addition of several summer recruiters paid off."

He also cited summer traveling groups, such as the Evangel Players, the Rejoice Ministry Team, and New Mercy for playing important roles in the increase.

Dr. Reid Opens Old Testament To Russian Pastors

r. Garnett as guest te Moscow Th

r. Garnett Reid spent two weeks in Russia in November as guest teacher at the first extension school of the Moscow Theological Institute. The school was attended

by 27 Russian pastors and was held in Chelyabinsk.

Dr. Reid taught Old Testament Survey and Old Testament Introduction. His teaching schedule was about 10 hours per day for 10 days, through an interpreter. Below is part of his final report as the school drew to a close.

Yes, indeed, the Hallelujahs are sounding throughout the Chelyabinsk oblast and all over the Southern Urals region. It was a really good conclusion to the session. All of the students and the powers that be were extremely pleased with this first ever session of the Chelyabinsk Affiliate of the Moscow Theological Institute.

It's really a big deal bere, and even more so now that this first one was a success. I lost it when they gave me a letter of thanks (also one for Dr. Malone), an art piece, and especially when the students gave me a watch. Considering what little they have, it was so generous of them. A few of them kissed me (they take that greeting literally bere), but the sweetest thing of all was when they wrote a song on the board they had written for me. Yurii said that since I had taught them many Hebrew words, they had composed a song with three of the names of God. So Sergei played the arrangement, and they started singing, in the old Russian style, "Qadosh, Adonai, Sabaoth." They sang four verses, getting faster each time, then a final, really slow verse. I was speechless and overcome. I'll never forget it.

Tve never experienced anything like this in my ministry.

is strong and healthy. The team was impressed by several things, including:


- The support of the faculty for students and of students for faculty.
