### WHY "PALMER COLLEGE"?

The name "Palmer" may be new to many present-day Free Will Baptists. But, in fact, the name is as old as Free Will Baptists in America. Paul Palmer was an English subject, who was regularly referred to as a "Free-Willer." He provides the link between current Free Will Baptists and our British forebearers, the English Arminian or General Baptists. Palmer established the earliest Free Will Baptist Church on American soil in the year 1727. He was a pastor, evangelist, church planter, and theologian.

His life and ministry exemplified in both mission and ministry what Free Will Baptist Bible College has been and continues to be today. Approximately 85% of the churches that make up the current Free Will Baptist denomination are rooted in his ministry. It seems appropriate that his labor in bringing Free Will Baptist theology and practice to America should be honored in this way.

# TRUSTEES PROPOSE FWBBC BECOME 'PALMER COLLEGE'

he Church that Jesus Christ came to build was always to be characterized by "newness"—to be ruled by "a new commandment," to be comprised of "new creatures" for whom all things are to "become new" and who would one day inhabit "a new heaven and a new earth."

The Free Will Baptist Bible College Board of Trustees and administration have been considering expanding the college's name for many years. It was being discussed by the board when the current President, Dr. Tom Malone, was chairman. Dr. Malone has reported these considerations for the past three years in his report to the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

Now, after much prayer and several years of deliberation, the Free Will Baptist Bible College Board, with President Malone, has agreed unanimously to recommend that the college's name be expanded. The recommendation is:

PALMER COLLEGE: The Free Will Baptist Bible College

### WHY MODIFY THE COLLEGE'S NAME?

So, why should we consider modifying the college's name? The short answer is to further God's purpose.

FWBBC's mission statement says that its goal is "to equip men and women through Bible-based education, to serve Christ and His Church." That mission and that goal is as strong today as it was in 1942 when our college was founded.

We have learned that modifying our name will enable our graduates to gain admission to some of the world's least evangelized people and to areas where the gospel has scarcely been preached. We feel it is worth the time and effort to change our name so that our students can reach these unreached multitudes.

Also, the move to a new campus, planned for 2002, indicated that the timing was right to modify the college's name.

### WHAT IS THE PROCESS?

Since the recommendation requires the college's name to be obtained the charter, the Board will seek the geometric Line Notice the NAFWB in regular session and volumes a year take.

### What else about the college is changing?

The college remains 100% Free Will Baptist and 100% a Bible college.

- We are Free Will Baptists. . . one of whose founding fathers in America is a man named Paul Palmer.
- We are a Bible college. . .committed to equipping men and women through Bible-based education, to serve Christ and His Church.
- We are the Free Will Baptist Bible College. . .owned and operated by the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

The President and the Board are determined that the college stay true to its mission of serving Christ and His Church. Its mandate is to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature..." (Matthew 28:19-20). In carrying out that mandate, the college will continue to be the channel for the denomination's pastors, missionaries, and other Christian workers.

### **CHURCH PLANTING PROGRAM** PLANNED FOR PREACHERS

he National Home Missions Department and Free Will Baptist Bible College are joining forces to establish a new Free Will Baptist church in Nashville that will serve as a training site for student preachers to go out and plant more new churches, and to provide academic and practical preparation for the church planters.

Rev. Clifford Donoho, a veteran Free Will Baptist home missionary who has established two churches, will pastor the new work. Rev. Terry Forrest, who established a new church and served for some 15 years as chairman of the Arkansas State Home Missions Board, will coordinate the Bible College's side of the program. Rev. Forrest is the college's Director of Lifetime

The college will add courses to its present curriculum for pastors that will further prepare them to plant churches. It will also direct pastoral trainees in an internship program with Rev. Donoho to help them gain valuable hands-on experience.

'Our goal is to reach new people for Christ and to train students as church planters," says Trymon Messer, General Director of the National Home Missions Department.

# FIRST BLUEPRINTS BEING DRAWN FOR NEW CAMPUS



he vision of a new campus for Free Will Baptist Bible College is rapidly taking shape and nearing reality. Architect Bob

Schill and members of the Missionary TECH Team, who are designing the overall campus, as well as individual buildings, have thrown themselves into the job with zeal and around-the-clock dedication.

The campus will be "academe in a grove," as Mr. Schill likes to describe it. Buildings will be set under a canopy of trees around the perimeter of a 5-7 acre lake. Walkways will meander across the 123-acre site and gathering places will be scattered along the paths for students and teachers to meet and interact. An amphitheater will face the lake, providing an excellent venue for an outdoor class or a club meeting.

The primary building on the campus will be the chapel. It will be the tallest, most dominant structure on the campus. It is being designed to seat 1,000 and will include a full stage, suitable for elaborate dramatic productions or orchestral performances.

Randy Hood, a 1990 alumnus and member of Donelson Free Will Baptist Church, is serving tolk time as design coordinator and working with the architect and Missionary TECH Team.

- Two residence halls
- An academic building
- A gymnasium
- A cafeteria/student services center





# BIBLE COLLEGE AND MISSIONS DEPARTMENT TO HELP ASIAN SEMINARY

ree Will Baptist Bible College's President Tom Malone, Academic Dean Milton Fields, and Director of Institutional Effectiveness James Cox traveled with Foreign Missions Director James Forlines to sign an agreement of accord and to participate in the opening of the Asia Free Will Baptist Theological Seminary in Seoul, South Korea, on March 1. The opening of the school is the result of several years of joint planning by the college and the foreign missions department.


The Seminary operates under the auspices of the Free Will Baptist Church for All Nations, located in Seoul and pastored by Dr. John Chang.

The graduate division is under the leadership of Dr. Hack Bong Chung, as dean. The dean of the undergraduate division is Rev. Kyu Suk Park. The goal of the Seminary is to prepare students to serve as cross cultural missionaries to countries around the Pacific rim.

For the present, the Seminary meets in the Free Will Baptist Church for All Nations, but land is being purchased outside of Seoul to which the school can eventually move.

The Bible College will work in cooperation with the Seminary, including short-term student and faculty exchanges. The exchanges will be overseen at FWBBC by Tom McCullough, Missions Training Coordinator, and Terry Forrest, Director of Lifetime Learning.

Dr. Malone, Dr. Fields, and Dr. Cox were also given the opportunity to preach to Korean Christians.

## Relocation Campaign Right On Target

lot can happen in 12 months and a lot has happened since April of last year. The Missionary Tech Team formally accepted our project. They took on the design process of our new campus.

We approved the Collegiate Georgian design style accented with brick, stone and columns. We revamped the master plan to locate the core campus around a picturesque lake. We met with our new neighbors and received a standing ovation of support for the project. Floor plans were finalized and detailed blueprint development was begun.

There have been some exciting recent developments. Our campus has been placed on the market at a price of \$14.3 million. The college has received two serious offers for the purchase of the present campus. We have been excited about the interest shown by multiple parties for the present campus.

- Many churches and individuals have made commitments toward the project. Heads Free Will Baptist Church, in Cedar Hill, Tennessee, is one such church. Reverend Wayne Wagner and his good people were challenged to consider making a \$25,000 commitment to be paid over five years. They accepted the challenge last spring. They began working on the commitment and completed the \$25,000 commitment in one year—four years ahead of schedule.
- A businessman, a good friend of the college, made a \$25,000 commitment last fall and completed his commitment by the end of December. He felt impressed by the Lord to increase the commitment to \$100,000.
- The Free Will Baptist Bible College Alumni Association adopted a new project at their annual meeting during Bible Conference in March. They voted to set a goal of \$100,000 to be raised toward the Relocation Campaign to underwrite the construction cost of the entrance area of the new campus.
- The South Georgia Association set a goal of \$150,000 to be raised for the relocation effort.

• The Kentucky Relocation Campaign Steering Committee set a goal of \$250,000.

Our Relocation Campaign goal of \$12 million over five years is on schedule. We have approximately \$4.8 million in cash and commitments with three years remaining.

The next 12 months will also be both busy and exciting. With construction slated to begin late this summer, we will accumulate approximately \$5 million in construction costs by this time next year. The next 180 days are crucial! We must receive more large gifts in order to avoid construction delays. Pray that the Owner of the cattle on a thousand hills and the wealth in every mine will continue His faithful provision to meet the needs. Consider doing what you can to help make this dream a reality.



s you are probably aware, the campus relocation efforts are in full swing. A great amount of time has been spent designing the new campus. Plans for the excavations, utilities, and buildings are being modified on a daily basis. Our goal is the highest possible quality campus.

In addition to raising funds, we are looking for methods of reducing our construction costs. A very favorable (for us) profit margin has been negotiated with a local contractor. Furthermore, we will be purchasing our building materials directly from manufacturers and suppliers to get the best possible pricing.
