

DRS. THIGPEN AND MILEY To CHARGE SENIORS


Dr. Thigpen

The Window of Company of Company

une 1944 was a historic month. Allied forces were herded together on ships by the hundreds of thousands in preparation for the greatest invasion in the history of the world. Paratroopers, pilots, seamen, and infantrymen were anxiously awaiting word from allied headquarters to begin the Normandy invasion. General Dwight D. Eisenhower listened to each member of his staff comment on whether to move forward with the planned invasion or to wait until a later date. His meteorologist read the weather forecast and the prediction was far from perfect. When asked his opinion, the meteorologist said: "We have a window of opportunity. If we fail to go now, it will be several weeks before the tide and weather will permit another attempt." Ike made the decision to launch the D-Day invasion and the rest is history.

We are facing our D-Day at Free Will Baptist Bible College. We have received our "weather report" and we have a "window of opportunity" before us. Failure to take advantage of this opportunity could delay us, not for just weeks, but for many months—perhaps even years—in our efforts to build and relocate to our new campus. Our window of opportunity began with the securing of a new buyer for the campus. We have signed a letter of intent from another college here in town to purchase our present campus. The closing on the sale is scheduled for September 1, 2001. Our plans are to release the plans for the new campus to contractors and sub-contractors for bids by July 4, 2001. We cannot know for sure what the new campus will cost until we see the actual bids. We must also know for certain that we have the cash and commitments needed, above and beyond the funds

received from the sale, to pay for the new campus. We are making personal appeals to individuals, businesses and foundations who can commit to and give large gifts to the campaign.

We are marshaling all our forces in preparation for the launching of our D-Day. We have agreed that to wait will stall the momentum and could delay the move for months, maybe even years. We have a "golden window of opportunity," but we must enlist the help of all those who love Free Will Baptist Bible College. Now is the time for churches, Sunday School classes, individuals, associations, businesses and foundations to step up and help us take advantage of our "window of opportunity." Many have planned all along to do something significant to help. Now is the time to decide. We must know by July 4 that we have the additional funds necessary to close on the sale of the property. Please ask yourself what you can do over the next three years to help us begin construction in October, as scheduled. Call or write us and let us know what you plan to do. We will keep a running tally and make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees in July.

et's not let this "window" close. D-Day in WWII was an uncertain day when it began, but it was a glorious victory when it was completed. We have some uncertain days between now and July 4, but, with God's help and your prayers and support, we also shall see a great and glorious victory. Young men and women will learn to be effective and faithful servants and will go forth from the new campus to serve Jesus Christ and His Church.

This is the 4th book Randall House has published by Mr. Forlines. His other releases include *Biblical Ethics* (1973) and a commentary on *Romans* (1987).



PRESIDENT MALONE To Serve As FWBBC CHANCELLOR

fter 11 years of dedicated service, President Tom Malone says he will soon assume the office of chancellor so that he can better promote the massive campus relocation campaign. "The day-to-day pressure of directing the College's affairs have made it difficult for me to do what is necessary to raise the money we need to accomplish the move to

the new campus," he said.

The announcement was made to college employees on June 25.

The board of trustees has formed a presidential search committee comprised of board Chairman Gary Fry, Assistant Chairman Richard Bowers, and Secretary Larry Montgomery. The committee is considering nominees and hopes to announce their choice by January 2002. In the meantime, Dr. Malone will continue as serve as chief executive of the College.

As chancellor, Dr. Malone will be free to play a major role in the massive effort to raise \$6 million to build the new campus for the College. With the present campus on the market, College officials are hoping to complete the sale by September and begin construction in early 2002. The goal, if all goes well, is to occupy the new campus by the fall of 2003.

As president, Dr. Malone was instrumental in advancing the College on several levels. First, it was his vision to buy 123 acres and to launch the campaign to build the new campus. That property is paid for and the College is debt free.

He also made achieving regional accreditation a priority. FWBBC has been accredited by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges (AABC) since 1958. But, with more and more graduates and undergraduates needing broader acceptance at other colleges and universities, regional accreditation became an imperative. The effort was begun in 1990 and, in 1996, FWBBC became the first Free Will Baptist college in history to become regionally

President Malone often said, "I have three great loves in my life: the Lord Jesus Christ, my family, and Free Will Baptist Bible College." He recently

added, "It is my heart's desire to continue serving the College in whatever way I can that we may see more young people entering the whitened fields of Christian service."

Dr. Malone became FWBBC's fourth president in 1990, following in the noble footsteps of Dr. L. C. Johnson, Dr. L. R. Ennis, and Dr. Charles A. Thigpen.

IN HIGH REGARD!!

(AND HIGH DEMAND!)

he teacher Education program at FWBBC is held in high regard by many. According to the findings of the visiting accreditation committee last spring.

- Interviews with students consistently reflected the high regard they have for the teacher education faculty. A frequent comment was the faculty's ability to model effective teaching practices during their classroom presentations.
- Other comments from local school principals and cooperating teachers (who supervise student teachers) gave praise to the teacher education faculty for their frequent visits to the schools in support of the cooperating teachers and student teachers.
- A review of program material, facilities, faculty credentials and ability, and program assessment practices indicates that it has put together the necessary components to be successful.
- Interviews with local school principals, cooperating teachers, graduates, current student teachers and students resulted in comments of a consistently favorable nature. Students and graduates felt they were well prepared and this was confirmed by their success during student teaching and again upon employment.
- But perhaps the best measure of the success of the program was the repeated statements by school principals who said when they have a stack of teacher applications on their desk from institutions in the Nashville area, they will choose the Free Will Baptist Bible College graduate first.
- While small in size, the teacher education program at Free Will Baptist Bible College is most formidable and would be considered one of its most highly respected programs.

he college's teacher education program is highly regarded by the Tennessee State Department of Education. Based on the performance of the school's education students on standardized

qualifying exams, the program has stood out for several years. In the federally mandated report on institutions with teacher education programs to be released in October 2001, the school will be ranked at the top with 100% of our graduates having passed the qualifying exams.

Knowing about the school's graduates, principals have requested placement of far more student teachers in their schools than the number we have available. One outstanding teacher in a school that has had student teachers from all the local institutions, when asked to accept a student teacher from another institution typically asks "Is there one available from Free Will Baptist Bible College?" If the answer is "No," she will accept the other.

The graduates of the teacher education program are in demand. Typically, graduates have several job offers to consider. The Director of

Elementary Personnel in a large local system has told our TE department that she would hire any graduate the chair recommends. Thoughout the summer and during the school year, principals in Christian and public schools call to request candidates' names.

Free Will Baptist Bible College education graduates are held in high regard and are in high demand!

rustee board chairman Rev. Gary Fry announced to the college family on October 1 that Rev. Matt Pinson has been chosen to serve as FWBBC's fifth president. The announcement was made to the administration and staff at an afternoon meeting and to the student body at an evening gathering in the college auditorium.

Rev. Pinson attended the Bible College in 1985-86 and graduated in 1990 from the University of West Florida, pursuing an interest in law. He later received his M.A. at the University of West Florida (1993) and his M.A.R. at Yale University (1994). He is currently completing Ph.D. studies at Florida

State University.

Since 1994, he has pastored Colquitt Free Will Baptist Church, Colquitt, Georgia. But his activities have taken him far from the south Georgia community where he pastors. He has taught at Bainbridge College in Bainbridge, Georgia, and at Florida State University. He has also been a featured speaker on the FWBBC campus and at ministers retreats in Michigan,

Missouri, and Georgia.

As a fifth-generation Free Will Baptist, his interests in theology and history, especially Free Will Baptist history, run deep. Those interests have opened doors for him to both speak and write. He was featured speaker at the Bible College's 1996 Heritage Week series where he spoke on "Free Will Baptists before 1776." He also held a seminar entitled "A Christian Response to Postmodernism" for the Commission for Thelogical Intergrity at the 1998 National Association of Free Will Baptists. His many articles for Contact magazine include "America's First Free Will Baptists," "Our Tradition of Feet Washing," and "Benjamin Laker: Layman for God." His published books are: A Free Will Baptist Handbook: Heritage, Beliefs, and Ministries (Randall House, 1998) and the forthcoming Four Views on Eternal Security (Zondervan, 2002).

When Rev. Pinson was pastoring in Alabama, he felt God calling him to bivocational ministry: to both pastor and teach. "Thus, I began preparing myself educationally for this dual role," he says. He will take his doctoral comprehensives in January or February, 2002, and plans to be at the college by the end of February. Matt will bring with him his wife, Melinda, and an 18-

month-old daughter, Anna.

As he joins the college, he will be working near two former presidents, Dr. Charles Thigpen (the college's third president) and Dr. Tom Malone (its fourth president). Both maintain offices on the campus. Dr. Thigpen serves as promotional director of the Tennessee State Association of Free Will Baptists. Dr. Malone will continue to serve the college as chancellor. FWBBC's first president, Dr. L. C. Johnson, stops by frequently and can be counted on to keep his younger successors well aware of the college's roots.

Board chairman Gary Fry says: We are grateful to the Lord for his provision for Free Will Baptist Bible College through the many years of our existence. It has been His hand that we have marked, especially in times of important decisions such as the selection of a new president. We are confident that His provision has continued our long line of able leadership at FWBBC with the selection of Matthew Pinson as our fifth president.

The year is off to a blazing start with both staff and students feeling good about what lies ahead. Help us pray it will be FWBBC's best year ever!


FACULTY-STAFF CHANGES MADE





atkins College of Art and Design negoti ated with the Bible College extensively to buy the campus, even to the point of signing a letter of intent. But Watkins officials finally decided not to buy the campus. That decision obviously impacts FWBBC's plans to build its new campus.

The plan was to have the new campus built and ready to occupy by the fall of 2003 on the 123 acres owned by FWBBC just outside of the city.

Director of Advancement Roy Harris says:

The decision of Watkins College to withdraw from the sale was certainly disappointing. But we are not disheartened. We knew from the beginning that if God wanted Free Will Baptist Bible College to build and relocate to a new campus, He would make it happen in His own way and in His own time. We are convinced that it is God's will for us to move and we must trust Him to accomplish this great task. We do not consider the loss of this sale as a roadblock, but merely another bump in the road that must be weathered on our way to a new campus. We will continue to bathe our efforts in prayer and move forward with strength and even greater resolve as God gives us direction. One day we will see hundreds of young people walking up and down the sidewalks of our new campus preparing to carry the gospel to a needy world.

The campus is back on the market in Nashville and prospective buyers have continued to show interest.

Please pray that the Lord will provide for the sale and relocation in His time.

been delayed, President-elect Matt Pinson has initiated a campaign to renovate several major buildings on the present campus to enhance them both for present use and for eventual sale.

Mr. Pinson and his family have chosen to live on campus in the Bligh Building, just behind the Goen Hall men's dormitory. Bligh will be the first building to be renovated. Others will follow, all in keeping with the historic nature of the neighborhood. Rev. Pinson says, "People learn and work better in an environment of beauty, excellence and cleanliness, so improving the quality and appearance of our present campus will be one of my top priorities."

The plan is expected to span two years and will be underwritten by specially secured funding. It will not be paid for by regular gifts or by tuition or student fees.

The end result will be that several buildings owned by the college will be modernized and, thus, be far more attractive to live and work in and, eventually, to sell.

even years ago my life was in utter ruin. I was enslaved to addiction. I had destroyed my job and my relationship with my family. I thought that moving to a new town would make things better so I boarded a Greyhound bus and came to Nashville. Of course, my problems followed me the 700 miles from home to Nashville.

Right after getting off the bus, I was robbed. I didn't know what to do. I found the Mission across from the bus station. The staff there talked with me and assured me that things would work out all right.

The next morning, I met with the staff of the Anchor Home for Young Men. Not knowing what else to do, I joined the program. That was one of the most important decisions that I ever made. It was there that God grabbed hold of my heart and changed my life. It was at the Anchor Home that He called me to preach the gospel.

I enrolled at Free Will Baptist Bible College after completing the Anchor Home program in 1995. In May, 2001, I graduated with a Bachelor's degree and was ordained as a minister by my local church. June 1, I assumed ministry responsibilities in Georgia. Who would have thought? Certainly, not I.

I have learned over the past seven years that the Lord is always faithful. Even when things seem at their worst, God is with you.
