# STUDENTS PREPARE FOR MINISTRIES ABROAD

ome 29 Free Will Baptist Bible College students have been approved for foreign missions service for the summer of 2002, according to Tom McCullough, the college's Missions Coordinator. He says, "As far as I'm able to tell, this is the largest participation for summer overseas opportunities that we've ever had from FWBBC." He notes that this does not count students who might be going under other mission boards.

Some students will participate in outreach at the Soccer World Cup in Japan. Others will assist our missionaries and Free Will Baptist high school students who will be visiting mission fields.

"World Cup, '02" will be an evangelistic team going to Sapporo, Japan, for this summer's World Cup Soccer Tournament. Their main objective will be to assist the Japanese church in evangelistic outreach to the tens of thousands of international visitors who will be present for the soccer games.

Mr. McCullough says, "Their ministries will probably take the form of street music and drama performances, literature distribution and one-on-one personal evangelism."

TEAM interns are mature Bible College students who will be assisting the high school short-term ministry. This will be from the middle of June through the first week of July.

The Overseas Apprentices will be traveling at different times according to the desires of the missionaries who will be hosting them. The length of their stays will vary from 6-8 weeks. They will be working in Brazil, Russia, and Spain.


FWBBC's Missionaries-In-Residence (MIR) for the 2002-03 school year, according to Dr. Milton Fields, Dean.

Dr. L. C. Johnson 1914-2002

# DR. L. C. JOHNSON WITH THE LORD



r. L. C. Johnson, founding president of Free Will Baptist Bible College, died in Norfolk, Virginia, on June 26, 2002, at the age of 88.

He was born in Alma, Georgia, on February 3, 1914, and ordained to the ministry in 1934.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists voted in 1942 to launch an educational institution in Nashville, Tennessee, and tapped the 28-year-old pastor, Linton Johnson, to head it. With few resources other than his own vision and strength of character, he shaped the infant Bible school and laid the foundation for what would become Free Will Baptist Bible College. He served as its president for 34 years until his retirement in 1979. (He returned to the pastorate for three years, 1944-47.) He served for two years, 1979-81, as chancellor of the college.

He earned his B.A. at Bob Jones College (now University). The University later bestowed on him an honorary doctorate. His pastorates included Free Will Baptist churches in Georgia, Mississippi, Florida, and Tennessee.

He served on the Executive Committee of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges and on the



program of the World Congress of Fundamentalists.

He was frequently sought as a speaker for Bible conferences and revivals but said he felt like a poor evangelist because, no matter where he went, his heart and mind remained in Nashville, bound up in the affairs of the college.

In recent years, his health declined. He retained his sense of humor and paid frequent visits to the college. In May, he and Mrs. Johnson moved to Norfolk to live with their daughter and son-in-law, Mary Nell and the Reverend Terry Beck.


He is survived by his wife, Ruth Masser Johnson, and by their three children, Paul Johnson, Mary Nell Beck, and Mark Johnson.

Few men have marked as many lives within the ranks of the Free Will Baptist denomination as Dr. Johnson. His influence will live on through those who are richer for having known him.

The college will hold a Memorial Service on campus honoring Dr. Johnson on Wednesday, September 25, 7:00 p.m.

ew men come along with the qualities of greatness written on their early lives. Men tend to discount those like David, who rise from humble origins. Few would have seen greatness in the lad Linton Johnson, but all saw it in the man.

He not only defined an infant college, he did much to define a denomination. Perhaps no one has affected the course of Free Will Baptists in modern times as much as Dr. L. C. Johnson. He introduced us to our Arminian heritage and taught us that we could be Arminians and still have full assurance of our salvation. And he taught and exemplified holy living and strength of character.

Perhaps his pastor, Rev. J. R. Davidson, saw promise in the lad, for he wrote in 1933, "One of the outstanding things that happened was the licensing of Bro. Linton Johnson to the Christian ministry. He

is a young man to be appreciated. . . The boy is only 19 years of age. . . He bids fair to be one of the greatest powers in the ministry in our entire connection."

How prophetic were those words!

am deeply grateful to all of you who have come to celebrate with me on this important and symbolic occasion in the life of our college. To the members of the Board of Trustees I am grateful, for your leadership and support, and for your part in this event.

I owe a special debt of gratitude to my colleagues on the faculty, who have been and continue to be my own teachers. I also wish to thank our students, whose renewed sense of anticipation about the future stirs me, and our staff, whose strong support of our faculty and mission is unwavering.

I also wish to thank our guests, many of whom have traveled many miles to join us on this momentous occasion. I thank my family, my wife Melinda and children, my parents, my sister, and other family members who are present. They have been with me all along, praying for me, shaping me, and prodding me forward in this pilgrimage. I thank my friends, who have served as a source of steadfast encouragement and counsel.

I thank our many alumni who have gathered here today to celebrate with us. I am honored by the presence of delegates from a number of institutions of higher learning. Thank you for sharing in this celebration of our college and of the calling of higher education. I am also grateful for those from the Nashville community and from public service who have come to be a part of this new beginning.

I wish to thank all those representatives from our Free Will Baptist churches: pastors, laypeople, denominational representatives. You are the foundation of this college, without which we would not exist, and we value your presence here today.

Finally, I wish to thank the three-personed God for His lovingkindness and providential leadership in the life of this college and in my own life. He has led us thus far into this frightful and promising terrain, and He will continue to lead us with His own hand as we remain faithful to His

This is indeed a time of celebration, a time to reflect on our past and to contemplate our future. Anything great that we accomplish in the

An Inaugural Address by a college president is a historic document, a public announcement of his vision for the institution. For that reason, the text of Matthew Pinson's address is reproduced here so that Free Will Baptists may clearly see the direction in which he intends to lead FWBBC.

twenty-first century will depend on our stewardship of our tradition. We must face the future armed with the best of our heritage and with an understanding of our times that will enable us to contextualize our tradition to meet the needs of a new and complex era.

However, in our attempt to do this, we must not be caught up in contentment with the *status quo*. We must reach back within our tradition to recover a sense of identity that will enable us to be the Christian community of faith and learning that God has called us to be in this new century. As Goethe said, "What you have as heritage, take now as task, for thus you will make it your own." I think his wisdom is instructive for our college today. Only by *working at* an identity that maintains continuity with the past can we hope to have an identity that will give us meaning and purpose for the future. This means that we cannot be satisfied just to rely on our recent memory—even in our own lifetimes—and rely on the comfortable and the familiar. We must reach further back into our memory as a college and as a people of faith and recover principles and attitudes that motivated our forefathers to greatness for our Lord.

I come as one who is building on a foundation that was laid by men and women who have given their lives in the work of God. They are too numerous to mention. Among the most influential of these have been the four presidents of Free Will Baptist Bible College: L. C. Johnson, L. R. Ennis, Charles A. Thigpen, and C. Thomas Malone. My aim is to be a faithful steward of the legacy these men have left to me.

Last night we remembered President L. C. Johnson, the founder of our college. His life and work has been an inspiration to us all. Dr. Johnson had the uncanny ability to bring together faith, reason, and life in an unusual way that marked the lives of countless people. He founded this college at a time, during World War II and immediately following the Great Depression, when higher education was among the least of things on the minds of Free Will Baptists.

Those were heady times for L. C. Johnson and that small band of teachers and students that surrounded him sixty years ago. A sense of anticipation was in the air. They were not afraid to take risks. With God strengthening them, they could do all things.

I can only imagine, I can only reconstruct in my mind from conversations I have had with Dr. Johnson, what must have been going through the mind of this twenty-eight-year old pastor from South Georgia who had been chosen to lead this new Free Will Baptist college.

Before he died Dr. Johnson told me some things about those early years which will always remain with me, and which I think should help us confirm our course for the future. Early on, he said, he opposed the narrowness of some in our churches who were pushing for a simple Bible institute model. He believed that we needed a broad-based liberal arts curriculum. The best way to equip men and women to serve Christ and His church was to educate them in the Scriptures as well as the ancient tradition of liberal arts that stretches back to the Middle Ages. But just as strenuously, he insisted that all truth was God's truth, and that these arts and sciences must be taught from the vantage point of a Christian worldview.

In those early years, most of the students were studying to be ministers and missionaries, though many went on to distinguish themselves in a host of other fields. Yet Dr. Johnson insisted on educating the whole person, body, mind, and soul, from the vantage point of a biblical worldview. This was, he believed, the best way to produce Christian leaders in the churches who could change their world with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

This is something that we need to emphasize more than ever, espe-

cially given the fact that for nearly forty years our college has been equipping men and women in a variety of fields to serve Christ and His church. This is reflected in our Institutional Purpose statement, which states our commitment to "preparing men and women for church-related ministries or for careers that are not church related but are appropriate for Christians who live to serve Christ. In both cases the College is fulfilling the traditional Protestant vision of the sacredness of Divine vocation."

Since the nineteen sixties, Leroy Forlines, Robert Picirilli, and others have been reiterating this grand dream of L. C. Johnson's—the convergence of biblical and theological studies with a vision of the liberal arts and career preparation that is both biblical and theological in focus. We must continue in this new century to make this dream a reality. One of our greatest challenges is to reach out to the 90% of Free Will Baptist students who do not attend Free Will Baptist colleges. We must strive to give those called to non-church-related careers a keen sense of their divine calling and their unique place in fulfilling Christ's Great Commission to His saints

Another thing Dr. Johnson stressed to me was that he believed, I think rightly, that Free Will Baptist Bible College was commissioned to provide education for ministers, missionaries, and other workers in the Lord's church. Without a force of well-educated young people called to serve God in full-time church vocations, our churches would not survive. Thus Free Will Baptist Bible College had to provide these laborers.

This is still the case, and as our community of faith grows and we launch out into deeper and more difficult waters in this new cultural matrix, we need more vocational Christian ministers than ever before. We must dedicate ourselves anew to educating preachers of the Word who will take a firm stand for God and truth in an age when divine truth is hard to find, shepherds who will lovingly lead their flocks and feed them the good Word of God, evangelists who will speak words of reconciliation to those who are "without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world." We must commit ourselves to producing cross-cultural missionaries who will take the Gospel of God into danger ous and exotic places like Afghanistan and the Ivory Coast, or into more familiar places like the Nashville jails or the inner city of Chicago.

A third thing Dr. Johnson said to me that will always stay with me was that he founded the college with a vision of cultural excellence. Perhaps this was why everything he touched gleamed with beauty and excel-

lence and refinement. This was evident not only in his demand for gracious and considerate behavior for others—what is commonly called etiquette, but also in his appreciation of the arts. Our mission at Free Will Baptist Bible College must continue to be imbued with this sense of beauty and excellence and cultural refinement.

People cannot be most productive in their vocation unless they are surrounded by beauty. Thus, we must commit ourselves to fostering a climate for the creation of beauty—from the cleanliness of our buildings and grounds, to chapel, to a renewed emphasis on the arts—musical, dramatic, and visual—to beauty and elegance in the way we do our jobs, to the professional and personal etiquette we teach and model before our students.

Among Free Will Baptists there has always been a tension between anti-intellectualism and a Christian concern for the life of the mind. This tension existed among us as early as the middle seventeenth century. Two examples among our English General Baptist forebears are instructive: The London preacher Edward Barber reacted to being kept out of the schools of the Church of England by renouncing all humane learning. Yet the Lincolnshire farmer and tailor Thomas Grantham became an accomplished linguist, theologian, preacher, and writer through a sustained study of the Bible in the original languages, classical literature, and the Christian Fathers.

When Benjamin Laker, Paul Palmer's father-in-law, moved to this side of the Atlantic in the late 1600s, he greatly valued his books on theology and other subjects, including *Christianismus Primitivus*, Grantham's theological *magnum opus*. This same concern for education exhibited itself with the small band of worshippers Laker left behind after his death, who appealed to their brothers and sisters in England for either a preacher or for books—and this despite the fact that they and their posterity were kept out of institutions of higher education until late in the eighteenth century.

This is the kind of tradition that has been perpetuated by Free Will Baptist Bible College, and we remain devoted to this vision of Christian education. As Dr. Johnson said in a sermon, "Education is not to tame zeal, but to channel it." We must renew our commitment to opposing that kind of zeal that is "not according to knowledge."


In moving into the future, we must build on our strengths. Our greatest strength is our faculty. Not only are they well-credentialed and good at what they do, but they also value excellence and have a passion for serving God with all that they are. They are also committed to Christian scholarship. I want to give them what they need to move into uncharted waters in fulfilling their calling as Christian scholars and teach-

ers and molders of the minds, hearts, and wills of our students.

Another strength of this institution is our dedicated support staff, who make the process of Christian teaching and learning possible, who free the faculty to do what God has called them to do. I think we sometimes underestimate the value of this supporting role. But as we move into the future, we will affirm and encourage our staff in the living out of their own Christian vocations.

One of the most obvious strengths of Free Will Baptist Bible College is our student body. I thank God for students who are committed to finding out what God has called them to do and living out that calling in their daily lives. So many people in the Nashville community have told me that our greatest strength is our students, who combine character with service and learning to make an impact on their world.

Another strength is that we remain firmly rooted in the great tradition of Christian orthodoxy our forebears have bequeathed to us with an unblemished inheritance of Christian faith and practice. The mediator of this tradition has been our churches that make up the National Association of Free Will Baptists. They have insured that we remain on a steady course of Christian orthodoxy and the faith and practice that our fathers and mothers believed—and we believe—most closely reflect the witness of Holy Scripture. Free Will Baptist Bible College must be a wise steward of that heritage of Christian confession—ensuring by rigorous Christian scholarship and spiritual vigilance that our inheritance remains intact








President Pinson's father, John, delivered his own address at the Inaugural Lunchenn

in a new context of religious relativism.

Because of the debt of gratitude we owe to our churches, we must commit ourselves to serving them. Our college must not only be interested in what the denomination can do for it. We must be concerned about what we can do for our denomination. We must strive to instill in our students loyalty to our denomination and our confession of faith.

We must build on all these strengths if we are to fulfill our mission, if we are to be a truly Christian community of faith and learning. That is my vision for Free Will Baptist Bible College: that it will be a Christian community of faith and learning, to use a phrase that has often been used by the Christian philosopher Arthur F. Holmes.

That is what this college is. It is what it has always aspired to be, and it is what we want it to become, more and more, because we are on a progressive journey—a pilgrimage—to realize the will of God for ourselves individually and corporately.



When I look at these students, I know I am where God desires for me to be. For most of them, their being here is providential. They have a real sense that this is where they are supposed to be—that God has led them thus far, that providence has put them in this place. Yet, there is fear; there is trepidation; there is hesitancy. Some of them do not know exactly what God has called them to do with their lives. There is a lot of uncertainty, but they have a sense that they are doing the right thing, that they are doing what gives God pleasure.

I have a sense that we are all here to play a role in a very unique experiment in Christian higher education, and each of us has a part. And the decisions we make in the coming months and years are going to change the course of our destiny.

Recently, during our new student orientation activities, I spoke with our student body president, Neil Morgan. I told him, "These students' lives are going to be forever changed because of the decision, the choice, they made to come here." My life was forever changed because of my decision to come to this place. And the decisions we make now will change us forever. I believe this is a very important and profound and crucial time for us. We mustn't make any mistakes in thinking that the decisions we make, the choices before us, are unimportant.

Thus, our conception of what constitutes a Christian community of faith and learning is imperative. I want to communicate to you what I conceive that to be, and I think that my vision of it is consistent with the broader vision we have had here for sixty years.

Let us consider the words, "Christian community of faith and learning." The first thing we want people to know about this place, and what has led most of us here is that it is a *Christian* community. Spirituality pervades every aspect of this community. This is a spiritual community, a community that is led by the Spirit, energized by the Spirit, permeated by the Holy Spirit.

But we must understand that in this place, spirituality is not something that is off to the side, something special up in mid-air. The evangelist Francis Schaeffer often spoke of knowledge and life as a two-story house. He spoke of a lower story and and an upper story. In the upper story is faith and emotions and love and religious things—spirituality. In the lower story is the rest of life, reason, the everyday decisions we make, the films we watch, the places we go, the things we involve ourselves in, politics, math.

He said that so often Christians tend radically to separate those two stories of the house—the upper story and the lower story. Their faith, the upper story, the spiritual dimension of their lives, is radically separated from the rest of life. The vision of spirituality to which this institution aspires is that all of life is spiritual. There is no radical separation of the upper story and the lower story, of faith and reason, of grace and nature. We can and must take every thought, even the secular ones, captive to the obedience of Christ. That means that spirituality is not limited to the chapel period, or to the Christian service project, or the dormitory prayer meeting. Spirituality is also an academic issue. It's an issue of the discipleship of the mind. It touches every aspect of this community, not just what we tend to think of as the "spiritual" parts. We must let spirituality pervade our lives here.

When we talk about spirituality, we mean that Jesus Christ came into this world to redeem all things, to save us from sin and death and hell, to save us from our selves which were alienated from Him; and that this Good News of Christ is found in the Bible which is the lively Word of God, without error in all that it affirms; and that in that very written Word of God we find that living Word of God, which alone can save us and set us free. As Jesus said, you shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free. The reason we have our students study the Bible is that it alone is the truth that, through the power of the Spirit, guides us into all truth and teaches us the truth about ourselves and the world. And that truth will set us free.

If we are to fulfill our mission in this century, we must continue to emphasize that spirituality is about applying the truth of God's Word to everyday life—to everything. We must emphasize that truly Christian higher education is not just about taking "spiritual" thoughts or religious thoughts captive to the obedience of Christ, but every thought in all of life.

Another aspect of our being a *Christian* community of faith and learning that we must stress is that we are all called, called according to God's purpose. God loves us all and has a plan for us, and we are all called, not only according to God's salvific purpose, but also according to His purpose for our life's work. One student may be called to be a shepherd of God's flock. Another may be called to Nepal or France or Indonesia or Brazil to carry the message of the Gospel to the people of another culture. Another may be called to go into the workforce as a businessperson or teacher and live out the gospel in the everyday warp and woof of life. No matter what God calls our students to, we believe they will be engaged in Christian ministry, in the service of Christ's church, both in the church and in the world. That is what we mean by *Christian* community.

The next word is *community*. Listen to the primary definitions of this word: a social group sharing common characteristics or interests and perceived or perceiving itself as distinct in some respect from the larger society in which it exists.

Another definition is: a group of men and women leading a common life according to a rule.

Some other definitions are "similar character," "agreement," "identity."

These definitions capture what I believe should be our vision of a Christian community of faith and learning. We are a community. We are a social group that has gathered around common characteristics and common interests: a common faith, a common Lord, a common baptism, a common confession. And we also perceive ourselves as distinct, in some very important respects, from the larger society within which we exist. We are also a group of men and women leading a common life according to a rule. We have a similar character. We have agreement. We have identity. The word "community" means not only that you have things in common, but also that you have unity. So we have things in common, and we come together around that common Lord, faith, baptism, and confession. We have unity. We are a family. And there is much that holds us together.

Within this unity we have diversity in our family. One of the reasons for our community standards is that we have a diverse community. Some of the members of this community are from more conservative backgrounds than others. Others are from less conservative backgrounds. Living in community means sacrificing things, giving things up for the sake of others. God has brought us into this place for some wonderful reasons. He has brought us into community with fellow Christians who are different from us, who have different backgrounds from us, who have different perspectives. We learn from each other in this community, in this family. But we do so only through sacrifice—by giving some things up to live in community.

We must continue to have a disciplined community that enables our students to learn and discipline themselves. We must give them habits that will enrich their lives. Our community standards are not always moral in nature but they help us live together, and love together, and learn together in the way we ought. This college must yet continue its dedication to moral goodness. In a relativistic age, we must continue to teach and model before our students holy living that is rooted in a profound, disciplined relationship with Jesus Christ.

But when we become impatient with each other, let us never forget that we are a flawed community. We are not perfect. We are fallen. Let us encourage each other to realize that these flaws arise from our fallenness and yet urge one another to become what God wants us to be in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

One of the things about being a family is that we are small. I do not aspire to be always as small as we are now, but we must not forget that there are benefits to being small. God often uses small things to show that people who will accomplish His mission are not the great and mighty and powerful but the small people whom the world thinks are the least apt to carry out that mission.

We must teach our students, by instruction and example, the value of living in community, and what it contributes to preparing them to be leaders in the intellectual, spiritual, cultural, and public lives of their own communities.

The last part of the phrase is, of course, "faith and learning." This means that Holy Scripture is integrated with every subject, whether the natural sciences, psychology, literature, business, or history. No matter what the subject is, we aim to view it from a thoroughly Christian perspective. That does not mean that we simply take a secular subject and sprinkle moralisms and Bible verses over it. Rather, we attempt to integrate the Christian worldview with everything we think and do, including our academic subjects. That is the task of our faculty: to integrate Christianity with the disciplines they teach.

We must teach our students that God created the world and said it was good, that he became incarnate in the world in the form of His son Jesus Christ, and that He aims to redeem this fallen world by the power of His Spirit through Christ's work on the Cross. Therefore, Christian students must be diligent students of the world that God has made. This will aid them in their calling to bring about transformation and salvation in this world.

We also need to continue to emphasize that every course has a purpose. Some students come wanting to study only their field, thinking that the arts and sciences are not necessary. We must not succumb to the contemporary notion that career preparation is the primary purpose of higher education. Every course in our curriculum has its purpose. We must remain committed to our core curriculum, which will play a part in producing truly educated and well-rounded students who have a truly Christian mind. We must remain committed to educating our students in biblical studies and theology, which will enable them to forge for themselves a Christian worldview. But this theological orientation will not be limited to the Bible class; it will pervade all aspects of teaching and learning.

We must work together to foster a new sense of unity on the campus of Free Will Baptist Bible College. We are all working toward the same goals—faculty, staff, administration, students, alumni, the churches. I want to lead in a way that sees unity—indeed community—as vitally necessary to accomplishing our academic and spiritual goals. The road ahead will not be easy. We must boldly traverse it together. By embodying the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace, we can accomplish the awesome task the Lord has set before us in this place, thus bringing greater glory to Him, enjoying Him forever, and increasing the bounds of His kingdom. Let us pray for each other in the important and challenging task that lies ahead.

## **ALUMNI, STUDENTS SHARE** IN THEOLOGICAL SYMPOSIUM




he college was the site for the Free Will Baptist Theological Symposium, November 2-3. The Symposium is sponsored by the Commission For Theological Integrity of the National Associa-

# DR. PICIRILLI HOLDS SERIES ON CALVINISM AND ARMINIANISM



r. Robert Picirilli was the 2002 speaker for the Leroy Forlines Lectures on campus. His topic, Calvinism and Arminianism, was presented during chapel services November 19-22.

His series was largely based on his book, *Grace, Faith and Free Will*, published by Randall House, and dealt with the differences between Calvinism and Arminianism.

The Lectures were instituted in 1992 to provide a forum for the highest quality of evangelical scholarship. Professor Leroy Forlines, longtime teacher of Systematic Theology at the college, embodies the spirit in which the lectures were founded and are presented. Other speakers in the Forlines Lectures have included Dr. Norman Geisler, Dr. Robertson McQuilkin, Dr. Gerald Mattingly and Dr. Gary Habermas.




special course for 5 to 12 students featuring backpacking, wilderness
