SPEAKERS:

Evangelist Bobby Jackson graduated summa cum laude from FWBBC in 1954 and earned his M.A. at Bob Jones University. In his 51 years of evangelistic ministry, he has conducted over 1,500 campaigns and preached more than 15,000 sermons in 30 states and Canada. The North Carolinian has written four books and released several recordings.

Dr. Eddie Moody graduated from FWBBC in 1989. He presently serves as pastor of Tippett's Chapel FWB Church, Clayton, North Carolina. He is also associate professor and chair of the Department of Counselor Education at North Carolina Central University. Prior to taking the pastorate, he served as staff psychologist for the NC Department of Juvenile Justice.

Rev. Mike Mounts pastors Westerville FWB Church, Westerville, Ohio, where he has served for the last 10 years. Called to the ministry at 19, he has pastored for 20 years in Ohio and Alabama. He presently serves as assistant moderator of the Ohio State Association, moderator of the Franklin County Conference, and a member of the National Master's Men board.

Dr. Garnett Reid, a 1977 FWBBC graduate, earned his M.A. and Ph.D. at Bob Jones University. He joined the Bible College faculty in 1982 after pastoring Cross Timbers FWB Church in Nashville. He teaches Old Testament and, last fall, taught the first class in Old Testament Hebrew. Dr. Reid is highly regarded as a conference and retreat speaker.

The FWBBC Alumni Association will hold its annual meeting during the EVENTS: conference. Officers will be elected, and the current project, the renovation of Ennis Hall, will be reviewed.

In cooperation with the Foreign Missions Department, the college will dedicate the Boyce Building as the official MIR home at 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, Mar. 11. The property has been extensively renovated and will be the campus home of the Missionary-In-Residence. The MIR lives on campus for a year, teaches missions courses and motivates students with the needs of the

CLASS IN HEBREW BEGUN

or the first time, Free Will Baptist Bible College is offering courses in Biblical Hebrew. In December (2002), seven students successfully completed the first semester of Beginning Biblical Hebrew. A second year, six hour course, Hebrew Exegesis, is scheduled for the fall of 2003.

"Study of the Biblical languages is making a comeback in many colleges and seminaries," observes Dr. Garnett Reid, teacher of the class. "For several years pragmatic, 'how-to' courses bumped Hebrew and Greek from many programs. Now it's not uncommon to see undergraduate curricula like ours offering these languages. On our part at the Bible College, the inclusion of Hebrew simply reaffirms our longstanding commitment to the exegesis of the Biblical text for Bible study, preaching, and teaching. These languages are vital tools to unfolding what God says to us in Scripture," he says.

The college also encourages area pastors and others interested in learning Hebrew and Greek, for the first time or to brush up on their language skills, to consider enrolling in future courses.

What About Relocation?

ave you heard? Enrollment is up at Free Will Baptist Bible College! The college registered a 13% increase in student enrollment this year as compared to 2001-2002. We are grateful that God is sending students to our school, and we are grateful for a corresponding increase in general fund gifts. Both are factors that relate to the eventual relocation of the college.

Some are wondering where we are in the relocation process. Because of declining enrollment over several years and the withdrawal last year of Watkins Institute's offer to buy the campus, the Board of Trustees of the college voted to put relocation plans on hold. President Matt Pinson reported to the National Association of Free Will Baptists (July 2002):

"Money given for relocation has been well invested. The progress and work that has occurred up to this point will enable us, when the time is right, to proceed with relocation. Funds received for relocation will continue to be wisely invested. We are poised for growth, and relocation is still a part of our long-range plan."

o, what is being done at the college in the meantime? If you were to step on campus today, you would see significant changes from a few years ago. Buildings have been and are being renovated. Extensive paving has been done. The grounds are the best they have been in years. But none of this is being done at the expense of relocation. *Relocation* gifts will continue to be held until conditions are right for the move. *Renovation* funds have come from alumni and friends of the college and from money borrowed for this purpose. Is renovation a good investment? A recent appraisal of one newly renovated building shows that its value has increased \$2 for every \$1 invested in renovation!

When will the college move? We will keep tracking enrollment, since that is the most powerful force driving relocation. The need for more space will tell us it is time to move. The marketing of the present campus will also play an important role, since funds from its sale will be needed to pay for construction. In addition, general fund and relocation giving will have to be adequate for the transition to a new campus. Those three factors—enrollment, the campus sale, and financial support—will tell us what it is time to move.

As of the end of 2002, the college has received \$1.2 million in relocation gifts. This was invested in architectural drawings, engineering fees, and an access road, which are currently assets of the college. The expenses of the campaign were also paid from relocation gifts. By the way, thanks to Missionary TECH Team, architectural plans were drawn at about half the cost of most projects of this magnitude.

We are grateful for the support of our Free Will Baptist people. Pray for us as we determine God's timetable for resuming the campus relocation.

59 GRADS IN CLASS OF '03

ay 15 was a great day at FWBBC as 59 students from 15 states and one foreign country completed their studies. The college's Memorial Auditorium was packed and visitors filled the adjacent lounge to graduates receive 54 bachelor's and five associate's degrees.

Nearly half of the class—47%—is entering some field of ministry, according to Dr. Milton Fields, Academic Dean. The class includes 35 women and 24 men. In addition to their degrees, 37 also received ETA diplomas, qualifying them to teach Christian Education courses published by the Evangelical Training Association (ETA).

The challenge by Dr. Mark Paschall, former medical missionary to Ivory Coast, urged graduates to remember that graduation is not the end. "You know the solution to the problems of people: Jesus Christ. You know the 'cure," he said





iLEARN CENTER **SET FOR FALL**

ree Will Baptist Bible College's Teacher Education Department is fulfilling a dream by launching the *i*Learn Academy childcare center. Department Chairman Dr. Thurman Pate and TE teacher Dr. Suzann Harris also plan to introduce a new program in Early Childhood that will go hand-in-hand with the Academy. The new program will offer a 2-year associate's degree to those who want to work with young children and a 4year bachelor's degree for those who plan to direct childcare programs professionally

Property facing West End Avenue, adjacent to the Student Services Building, has been purchased to house the Academy. Dr. Harris, who wrote her doctoral dissertation on the development of an on-campus early learning center, will direct the Academy. The center will be fully staffed, and will be licensed by the State Department of Human Services.

Dr. Pate says it will serve four purposes:

- To serve as a demonstration school for teacher candidates in the Early Childhood program.
- 2. To provide a quality childcare facility for children ages 3-5.
- 2. To provide an assessment service for children, especially those from homeschool families.
- 4. To provide an afternoon tutoring service for children.

The center is scheduled to open early August and will accommodate about 45 children.




Two EARN MASTER'S DEGREES

About \$35,000 has been raised in the \$100,000-project, as the remodeling is nearly completed. He says, "When finished, Ennis Hall will provide five one-bedroom apartments and one two-bedroom guest apartment for visiting prospective student families and guest speakers." Some of the apartments are already rented and occupied.

Frank adds, "I am impressed with the wonderful work that Bob Bass and others did on the interior and exterior of the house. I am equally impressed with the quality of couples that this housing option is attracting to our campus, couples with a heart for God and a commitment to prepare themselves for ministry."

Ennis Hall was the second piece of property acquired by the college, in 1945, as it began to grow. The building has been used as a dormitory, for classrooms, a chapel, and faculty offices and apartments. Gifts to the college may be designated to the Ennis Hall project by either alumni or other friends.


