Kindergarten Mission Field

hen Susan Pattengill came to FWBBC from Park Hills, Missouri, her goal was to be a teacher on some mission field. She never imagined that her mission field would be right in "Music City."

After graduating in 2003 with a B.A. in Elementary Education, she set out to find a job teaching in the Metropolitan Nashville Public School system. She was in high demand, with 10 interviews.

She later learned that her numerous interviews were because she was one of the top 10 prospective teachers for K-8 in the Metro system.

Susan never dreamed her mission field would be right in Nashville.

Her real hope was to find a kindergarten class of foreign students. When one opened up, it was at an inner-city, poverty level school, where 98% of the children ware of the children were on a subsidized lunch program. But the opportunity to impact these child impact these children was so compelling that Susan turned down an offer to team teach at another team teach at another school with the Tennessee Teacher of The Year.

The new position would not be easy. Susan says, "It was an ELL class" English Language Learners." Her students came from seven countries. All 22 scored "0" on a reading assessment test of the l reading assessment test at the beginning of the year. "I had a couple of kids who knew some of the letters of the alphabet and two who had letters of the alphabet and two who knew almost all of them. None of my kids knew the alphabet sounds "

45 GRADUATES RECEIVE DEGREES

arents, students, friends, and visitors filled FWBBC's Memorial Auditorium the morning of May 13 to share in the graduation of 45 students. The service included testimonies by seniors, special recognitions of faculty and staff, and the awarding of degrees. Dr. Eddie Moody, a FWBBC alumnus and pastor of Tippett's Chapel Free Will Baptist Church, Clayton, North Carolina, brought the final challenge to the class of 2004.

The class represents 16 states and two foreign countries. The college awarded three Associate of Science in Business, two Associate of Arts, three Associate of Christian Ministries, 22 Bachelor of Science, 14 Bachelor of Arts, and one Bachelor of Music Education degrees. Nineteen seniors—over 40 percent of the class—graduated with honors.

President Matthew Pinson recognized three staff members, two of whom are retiring. Bruce Bilbrey (maintenance) was honored for 25 years of service to the college. Dianne Tippett (cashier) is retiring and was recognized for her 35 years on the staff. Peggy Jo McElhinney (bursar) has announced that after 45 years at FWBBC, she is retiring at the end of June.

President Pinson also announced that the board of trustees voted to award the title *professor emeritus* to Rev. Ralph Hampton. Mr. Hampton has taught at the college for 46 years, mostly in the fields of Bible and pastoral training. He will continue to teach at the college. The president also recognized Cynthia Doney's service as interim chairman of the Music Department.

Two teachers were honored for their service as student advisors. James Evans (youth ministry, Christian education) was voted 2004 Advisor of the Year. Dr. Darrell Holley (English) was recognized for excellence in academic advising.

A number of special awards were made to students and to groups on campus (see page 3).

COLLEGE PRESENCE KNOWN AT KANSAS CITY NAFWB


DADAD APAPPADAD

ree Will Baptist Bible College enrolled 358 students in August, the highest number of enrollees at the college since 1985, according to the Office of Registration and Records. The enrollment includes 248 dormitory students and 110 off-campus students. The full-time equivalency (FTE) of 333 indicates that a high percentage of the students are in full-time programs.

My Time Was Up A testimony by Jim Williams

My parents were divorced when I was young. I went to live with my mom and my grandparents. My grandfather is a Free Will Baptist pastor in Michigan. Although I grew up around the church, I was never really in church. I claimed to be saved when I was at youth camp, but the truth is, I just wanted my family to be proud of me; so I did it for them. For a long time, I lived a two-faced life.

I started listening to rap music when I was just nine years old. By the time I was a teen, I was living the rap star lifestyle—drugs, alcohol, the love of money, etc. When I was 16, I was with a group that got a record contract with a small local label. By this time I was deeply into this music's culture and what it offered. Although I was drowning in sin, I can remember the conviction that God put on my life. I was convicted, not because I was His child, but because I had grown up with His Word planted in my heart by my Christian family.

At age 18 I had my own apartment in Flint, Michigan. I had parties every other night. Everyone I knew—and some I didn't—showed up. I knew that they didn't come to see me. I knew they came because of what I could do for them. I had an apartment, popular friends, access to alcohol and drugs; our music group lived like celebrities. That is what they came for.

of Run DMC (one of the groups we were opening for) was shot and killed in a New York recording studio. Our producer said that we were supposed to be in the studio that day with Run DMC. That was a rude awakening.

In November I was at a party in my hometown. I just didn't feel right; so I decided to go home. I walked the train tracks that night—a very lonely place at 3:00 a.m. I had never truly felt God speak to me before, but that night, I know I did. My time was up, and I had to make a decision. Either I would give my life over totally to Christ, or I would lose myself in the world. I knew if I signed the recording contract, it would be over. I would be so saturated with sin and lost in worldly pleasure that I would never be one of His. I didn't want to die in my sins and spend eternity separated from the God who created me. So I fell to my knees, using the rail of the train track as an altar, and surrendered my life to the Lord Jesus Christ.

My life has not been easy; I don't expect it to be. But I praise God every day for the assurance I have of His great love, grace, and forgiveness.

Lecturer To Focus On Book of Ruth

The 2005 Leroy Forlines Lectures at Free Will Baptist Bible College, February 22-23, will feature Dr. Daniel Block, the John R. Sampey Professor of Old Testament Interpretation at The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky.

Dr. Block has taught at the Moscow Theological Seminary and at Bethel Theological Seminary. He has written extensively on the Old Testament, including a two-volume commentary on Ezekiel, and a commentary on Judges and Ruth. He is currently completing a commentary on Deuteronomy scheduled for publication in 2005.

His series will center around a study of the book of Ruth and is entitled, "What in the World is God Doing?"

The lecture series was established in honor of FWBBC's Professor Emeritus Leroy Forlines. Rev. Forlines has taught at the college since 1953, has written a number of books on theology and ethics, and has preached and lectured widely.

The lectures will begin at 10:00 a.m. both mornings. Visitors are welcomed.
