

THURSDAY 7:30 P. M. SEPTEMBER 30, 1937

FRIDAY 1:00 P. M.

The house was called to order by the clerk.

The moderator appointed as Auditing Committee Bros. Ira Meeks, J. J. Rich and Henry Pickett.

Bro. A. M. Roberts resigned as member of the Executive Committee and Bro. John Pickett was appointed to fill out his unexpired term.

Bro. Henry Black was appointed on the Executive Committee in Bro. J. D. Killburn's place whose time has expired.

Bro. G. W. Hollis was appointed as delegate to represent this Association in the Alabama-Mississippi State Association at Bethel church, Marvel, Ala., Route 1 convening on Monday after the fourth Sunday in October 1937.

A free will offering of \$8.02 was taken to defray the expenses of our delegate to the State Association and to pay our \$5.00 fee for minutes.

An inspirational talk was made by Bro. J. M. Shirley regarding the regligent attitude of our people toward financing the cause of Christ.

Following this Bro. J. F. Williams made an interesting talk in which he outlined the duties of the deacons in regard to raising finance for the kingdom work.

Elder V. L. Yancey made an interesting report of the work of our State Association last year.

The Business Committee made a partial report which by motion was accepted.

The house was called to order by the clerk. Prayer by Elder J. E. Hodgens.

The following committees made their reports which were accepted: Education, Home Mission, Devotional, Deceased Members, Sabbath Schools, Family Religion and Business.

The Ordaining Council called Bro. Sam Goodwin into examination as to his call to the ministry and reported the examination satisfactory, which report was accepted.

The Committees on Temperance, Literature, and Standing of the Ministry rendered their reports which were by motion accepted.

Motion carried that the moderator appoint a committee to investigate

the rumors against the ministers who were not recommended as being in good standing.

By motion the petition for membership into this body from the Second Free Will Baptist church of Alabama City be referred to the Executive Committee of this Association.

SATURDAY 11:00 A. M.

The message was brought by Elder J. J. Staab. Scripture reading Psalms 12:1-2. Text Matt. 11:28, "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

Following this service, Elder Lyman Ogle was ordained to the full function of the ministry.

SATURDAY 1:00 P. M.

The body was called together by singing. Devotional services were conducted by Bro. J. C. Hollingsworth. After an interesting and soul-stirring testimonal service, the clerk called the house to order for business.

The Committee on Resolutions rendered its report which was, by motion accepted.

A motion was carried for each church to keep funds collected for a tent, in the local church treasury, until a sufficient amount is collected in the various Churches to purchase a tent for evangelistic purposes, after which it may be paid out for this purpose by order of the Executive Committee.

By motion the next session of this Association will convene with Bethel Church, Marvel, Ala., Route one.

Motion carried to give certificates of standing to the ordained ministers of Alabama City Church if the Executive Board is successful in adjusting the grievances of the two factions.

By motion the clerk is authorized to draw on the Home mission for funds to finish out the expense of having five hundred minutes printed.

By motion the clerk is to be paid ten dollars out of Associational treasury for her clerical duties.

By motion Bros. C. F. Kendrick, J. M. Shirley, J. E. Harkins, R. H. Howard, D. N. Davis, E. W. Wilkerson and J. E. Hodgens be retained as Investigating Committee until the misunderstanding at Alabama City Church be cleared up.

Motion to adjourn. Benediction by Elder L. L. Davis.

After singing and prayer a glorious prayer and praise service was conducted by Bro. Goodwin. Following this service Elder Lyman Ogle brought a Spirit-filled message on "The Blood of Christ." Scripture reading Matt. 26:26-29, Text Matt. 26:27, "Drink ye all of it."

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INVESTIGATIONS

Alabama City, Ala. October 16, 1937

To The Cahaba River Free Will Baptist Association, Greetings: We, your Committee appointed to investigate the differences arising in Alabama City Church beg to report our investigation as follows:

We find the First Free Will Baptist church out of order, the church having acknowledged to same and having asked forgiveness for their illegal act. We forgave them on condition that they rescind their illegal act which would place them back in full fellowship with the Cahaba River Free Will Baptist Association. Having done this they will automatically come in good standing after having notified the moderator of the Association. Elder V. L. Yancy and Elder W. T. Crabtree after taking these same steps shall become eligible for certificates of standing from the Association.

We further find Elders A. G. Robershaw, J. I. Taylor and W. A. Wisner out of fellowship, also their followers who withdrew from the First Free Will Baptist Church.

We annul their action and demand the credentials of the three ministers above named until they make satisfaction through this committee.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. THE BIBLE—The scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.

2. GOD.—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the scriptures as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, yet one God infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are to supremely love, adore and obey.

3. CHRIST.—Christ is God manifest in flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man; once crucified, He is risen and glorified and is an ever present Savior and Lord.

4. THE HOLY SPIRIT.—The scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of men.

5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD.—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of man may require.

6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN.—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to the years of accountability sin and become guilty before God.

7. THE WORK OF CHRIST.—The Son of God by His incarnation, life, suffering, death and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground for salvation by faith.

8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION.—The conditions of salvation are: First, repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. Second, faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith, the soul, renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin, becomes a child of God. Third, continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. ELECTION.—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence, by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. FREEDOM OF THE WILL.—The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. SALVATION FREE.—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

12. PERSEVERENCE.—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. GOSPEL ORDINANCES .- Baptism, or the immersion of believers in

water, feet washing and the Lord's Supper are ordinances to be perpetuated under the gospel of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

14. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH.—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employment and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

15. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION.—The scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life and they that have done ill unto the resurrection of judgment; then the wicked will go into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.—John 5:29, revised version; Matt. 25:46.

16. WAR.—War destroys the lives of the innocent, and is contrary to the teachings of the New Testament, therefore, we are opposed to war.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopting the word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves one to another by the will of God, in this solemn Covenant.

We promise, by His grace, to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearances of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world; from all sanction of use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions and social worship; and by self-denial, faith and good works endeavor to grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

We will not forget the assembling of ourselves together for church conference, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the purpose of the church, of its poor and its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reprove with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the spirit" in the bond of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring and, as far as we are able, promote the success of the church of the gospel. We will everywhere hold Christian principles sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme, counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society, constantly praying and toiling that the kingdom may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of education and denominational enterpises, the evangelistic efforts for the salvation of souls and the conversion of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly and preserve us blameless until the coming of our Lord Jesus.
