 We send at telegram to Mr. Newton N. Minow, Chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, congratulating him on his attempt to "clean-up" T. V. programming and assure him of our support and prayers.

2. We approve the film "Operation Abolition" and urge that it be shown in our meetings when possible and that

as many as possible can see this film.

3. Lost.

4. We give a greater measure of support to the National Association of Evangelicals of which our National Convention is a member.

5. That the State Executive Board be responsible for the care and upkeep of the signs placed at the entrance of

our state.

6. That we give the host church a standing vote of thanks

for their wonderful hospitality.

7. That we adopt the following recommendation which was sent by Southern Association. "We heartily recommend that a new church membership club be organized statewide through California, similar to the one being pres-

ently in efficient operation in the State of Oklahoma. The purpose of this organization is for the financial assistance of newly organized churches throughout the state. This recommendation came through Southern Association and was heartily discussed and is now being eagerly presented to the State in hope that immediate action will be taken."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION TO BE PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL SESSION, JUNE 29, 1961

PREAMBLE

From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist Denomination, being regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith in Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship amog us as an association of churches, and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordiation with us, do therefore, ordain this constitution for our better denominational government.

ARTICLE I - Name

The name of this organization shall be the California State Association of Free Will Baptist.

ARTICLE II - Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to coordinate and unify the efforts of its constituency in denominational efforts and polity for the primary cause of the evangelization of the State of California and to aid in spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ unto the "uttermost parts of the earrh."

ARTICLE III — Delegation

Delegates to this Association shall consist of two (2) types of delegates. One shall be those defined as standing delegates and the other shall be those elected delegates representing the subordinate Associations and defined as the elected delegates.

- Standing Delegates. Standing delegates shall be all of the ordained members of any Association being a constituent part of this Association, and in good standing with the Association of which they are members, their wives, all officers and members of standing boards of this Association and the unmarried widows of deceased ordained members.
- 2. Elected Delegates. Elected delegates shall be those delegates duly appointed or elected by the subordinate Assocition which they represent.

The delegation composing this body as described above shall in all cases be members in good standing in the subordin-

ate Association from which they come.

Representation in this Association shall be by subordinate Associations. Each subordinate Association shall be entitled to one (1) delegate per each fifty (50) members. Each subordinate Association shall represent by a letter giving all of the statistical information called for by this Association and listing all delegates representing them by name. This Association shall have have no power to fill vacancies in the delegation of any subordinate Aassociation. Accompanying the letter of information shall be the representation fees as set by this Association These letters and fees shall be received by a vote of the standing delegation and when received, the elected delegates shall then become voting delegates.

3. Standing delegates shall lose their status and not be recognized as voting delegates if they have moved from the territorial bounds of this Association. No ordained or their wife shall be recognized as voting members upon moving from the territorial bounds of this Association, or are not recognized as members in good standing in their local Association. No ordained or their wife shall be recognized as voting members upon into the territorial bounds of this Association, unless they have obtained a recommendation from the Association from which they came, and that Association by a member of the State or

National Association.

ARTICLE IV - Meetings

This Association shall hold it's meetings annually. The date and place shall be decided upon at the previous meeting of this Association or shall be provided by this Association. In the event of an emergency, and no other provisions having been made by this Association, the officers and the Executive Board of this Association shall set the date and place of the annual setting.

ARTICLE V - Officers and Boards

The officers of this Association shall be:

1. A Moderator

2. An Assistant Moderator

3. A Clerk/Treasurer

4. An Assistant Clerk/Treasurer

4. An Executive Secretary

Each of these, in accordance with the following defined proceedures, shall be elected at the closing session of this Association.

Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed or elected as this Association shall provide, and shall hold office until their work is completed or their successors are appointed.

Each Board, committee and officers meeting shall keep accurate minutes of their meetings and shall make these minutes available for reading at the request of the Association.

The standing Boards of this Association shall be:

1. An Executive Board

2. A Mission Board

3. A Board of Christian Education

4. A Sunday School Board

5. A Leagut Board

6. A Book Store Board of Trustees

Each of the above named Boards, and any other standing Boards as may be elected by this Association hereafter, shall be governed by the following stipulations.

Each Board shall be composed of five (5) members serving terms of one (1) to five (5) ylears so arranged that one member will be elected each year to a term of five (5) years. These members to be elected atth e closing of each session.

Vacancies occuring on any Board shall come by reason of:

1. Resignation. Any member of any Board shall be allowed to resign at their pleasure.

2. Death. Any member of any Board passing from the stage of mortal life shall create a vacancy on the Board of which he is a member.

3. Dismissal. Any member of any Board may be dismissed by this Association for any unchristian conduct, for conduct detrimental to the general welfare of this Association. Any member who is declared out of fellowship or against whom charges of heresy or nonchristian conduct are being pressed in the subordinate Association of which he is a member, shall be suspended from active service on the Board of which he is a member, until the consumation of the charges made in the subordinate Association by which he is disciplined. If found guilty of charges as des cribed above, he shall be dismissed from this Board and his position shall be declared vacant.

4. Removal from territorial bounds. Any member of any Board who moves to reside outside the territorial bounds of this Association shall be considered automatically dismissed from membership on the Board which he serves.

5. Failure to serve. Any member of any Board who shall fail to serve in the capacity alloted them shall upon approval by this Association, be dismissed from the Board on which he serves.

No member of this Association shall be allowed to serve on more than one standing Board at one time, nor shall any member serve as an officer and on any Board or standing comi mittee at the same time.

Description of Duties:

A. The Moderator. The moderator shall be chosen by the majority vote of the delegates present and voting at the closing of the session of this Association. To serve a term of one (1) year.

The duties of the Moderator are:

- He shall be the presiding officer at all business sessions of this Association and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees and auxiliaries of this Association.
- 2. He shall maintain order in all business sessions and allow full and free debate on all issues, but recognize no one or allow debate by any demonstrating an unchristian spirit.

Parliamentary procedures guiding the Moderator shall be those defined in "Robert's Rules of Order."

B. The Assistant Moderator. The Assistant Moderator shall be chosen by the majority vote of the delegates present and voting at the closing of the session of this Association. To serve a term of one (1) year.

The duties of the Assistant Moderator are:

- 1. He shall assist the Moderator in all business sessions of this Association.
- 2. In the absence of the Moderator, the Assistant shall become the Moderator and be governed by the duties alloted the Moderator.
- 3. He shall serve as parliamentarian at all sessions of this Association.
- C. The Clerk. The Clerk shall be elected by the majority vote vote of the delegates present, and voting at the closing of the session of this Association. To serve one (1) year. The duties of the Clerk are:

The Clerk of this Association shall keep a true and accurate record of the proceeding of the Association, and write them in a book set apart for that purpose; keep an accurate record of all officers and committees. The Clerk shall keep all papers and documents of this Association unless otherwise ordered and shall conduct all correspondence for the Association.

D. The Assistant Clerk. The Assistant Clerk shall be elected by the majority vote of the delegates present, and voting

et ine closing of the session of this Association. To serve one (1) year.

The duies of the Assistant Clerk are:

The Assistant Clerk of this Association shall assist the Clerk in recording the minutes of the proceedings of the Association and shall make themselves available to assist an any of the labors of the Clerk. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall become the Clerk and the duties of the Clerk shall then be applied to them.

E. The Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be elected by the majority vote of the delegates present, and voting at the closing of the session of this Association. To serve one (1) year.

The duties of the Treasurer are:

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of this Association to receive and receipt for all money turned to him, or her, from whatever source contributions may be made to the Association, deposit the same in a bank or banks, as shall be designated by this Association. All bills and accounts owed by this Association shall be paid by check drawn against the Association account and signed by the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall give a report of all funds received and expended, and the report shall be accompanied by an accurate balance sheet of approved standards of accounting.

F. The Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall be elected at the closing of the session. To serve one one (1) year. Be it understood that upon acceptance of this position, the Executive Secretary shall serve a minimum of six months, the sole exception being for reasons of health. In the event of his resignation, he shall give a minimum of sixty days notice. In the event of his dismissal he shall be given a sixty-day notice. In the event of resignation or disciplinary action, it shall become the duties of the officers of this Association, the State Executive Board and the Book Store Trustees to meet jointly to effect the dismissal and/or replace the Executive Secretary.

The Executive Secretary shall be responsible for the general promotion of all branches and departments of this Association. It shall be his duties to promote the general welfare of the Association with regular reports of the work of the Association made to the general membership of this body. It shall be his duty to work closely

with the Moderator in coordinating denominational efforts and making known by publication these efforts and their success.

The Executive Secretary shall serve as treasurer of the cooperative plan of support and shall disperse the receipts as directed by this Association. He shall make every effort to enlist all churches within the general framework of this Association to support the cooperative plan of support with a tithe, and shall promote each department or agency of the Association where designated offerings are needy or sought. All designated offerings received shall be forwarded to the agency to which they are directed.

He shall serve as manager of the Bible Book and Church Supply Stores until such time as this Association shall otherwise provide. From this vantage point, he shall promote sales of church supplies and shall endeavor to supply the full needs of the churches.

He shall serve as managing editor of "The Voice."

He shall make periodic visits to each subordinate Association, and there inform them of the progress of the overall work of this Association. Even though some other agencies may have executive secretaries, it shall be his duty t promote these agencies in the coordinated denominational effort.

G. The Executive Board. The duties of the Executive Board shall be all of those duties normally assigned to an executive committee. These are interpreted to be that this Board shall, in the interim between sessions of this Association, act in behalf of the Association if necessity shall so demand. However, all actions of this Board shall be reported in writing at each session of this Association and shall be reviewed by that body. This Board shall stand liable to this body for discipline or dismissal from this Board for actions contrary to the general polity and intent of the Association and this constitution. No decision shall be rendered by this Board that will effect the Association that can be normally detained and decided by this body in session.

In cases of disputes arising from, or within, a subordinate Association, this Board shall serve as an arbitration committee. This Board shall have no dictatorial powers whtsoever, but shall by arbitration attempt to setle such disputes as may be referred to it. If a satisfactory settle-

ment cannot be executed by arbitration, this Board shall be limited to recommendation to this Association. It shall not issue a verdict or edict, that could, or would,

supercede this Association in its decision.

This Board shall hear all disputes or questions of discipline, doctrine or practice that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing this organization, or any appeal that may be made by any Association, church, or individual person which is a component part of this body. Said appeal shall have been made in writing and properly signed by the constituent body or bodies, making such appeal from the lower to the next higher body. This Board shall be limited to making recommendations to these affected parties and if not accepted by all concerned, shall refer the signed allegations to his Association in session for final action.

This Board shall keep accurate minutes of each meeting. These minutes shall be turned to the Clerk of this Association and be kept with the minutes of this Association.

tion.

H. The Mission Board. The duties of the Mission Board shall be to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in comunities within the bounds of this Association with whatever moral and financial assistance as may be theirs. Also, in cases of small churches failing to function, every assistance possible shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state, and national level of both home and foreign nature shall be the obligation of this Board. This Board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support to the

entire missionary program of the denomination.

This Board shall orient itself and elect it's own officers. This Board, being an agency of this Association, shall be empowered to have it's own constitution and by-laws, which shall not be repugnant to this constitution or the general polity of this Association.

The Treasurer of his Board shall receive and receipt for all money coming to it from all sources. It shall be deposited in a bank, or banks, and all debts and accounts of this Board shall be paid by check drawn against this treasury and signed by the treasurer.

Accurate minutes shall be kept of all meetings of this

Board, and shall be available for reading at the request of this Association. A complete report of all activities of this Board shall be made in writing to this Association while in session, wih an accurate accounting of all receipts and disbursements made. An accurate balance sheet shall accompany these reports and shall be signed by the officers of this Board.

I. The Board of Christian Education. The Board of Christian Education shall establish and promote a high standard of christian education within the framework of this Association. In the consummation of it's duties, this Board shall promote a high level academic institution wherein fundamental, orthodox, evangelical training may be obtained by those availing themselves to higher education. The highest academic standard possible shall be attained and maintained. The doctrines of Free Will Baptist Church as defined in the "Treatise of Faith and Practice" shall be the guiding theological position of the institution.

This Board shall orient itself and elect it's own officers. It shall meet upon the call of it's chairman at any time. This Board, being an agency of this Association, shall be empowered to have it's own constitution and by-laws which shall not be repugnant to this constitution and the general polity of this Association.

The Treasurer of this Board shall receive and receipt all money coming from any source, and shall deposit it in a bank, or banks, where all accounts and debts of this Board shall be paid by check, drawn against the Board's account and signed by the Treasurer.

An accurate record shall be kept of all meetings of this Board, and shall be available for reading at the request of this Association. A complete report of the activities of this Board shall be made in writing to the annual session of his Association with an acurate account of all receipts and disbursements made. An accurate balance sheet shall accompany the reports and shall be signed by the Board.

This Board shall seek to work harmoniously with other denominational academic institutions.

J. The Sunday School Board. The Sunday School Board shall endeavor to establish and maintain a high standard Sunday School in each church within the structure of this Association. In accomplishing this, this Board shall offer incentive material for teacher training, attendance build-

ing, and general assistance to all Sunday Schools of this Assocition.

This Board shall devise and offer such materials as are acceptble to this Association to the Sunday Schools. This Board shall be so equipped as to be able to establish a high level, departmentalized Sunday School attendance and Bible study at every opportunity, and devise and execute such measures as are deemed appropriate and in harmony with the gerenal polity and practice of this Association.

K. The League Board. The League Board is the only tie between the League Convention and this Association, thus the League Board shall officially represent this Association in the work of the leagues and their convention.

The League Board shall work closely with the leaders of the league convention and shall offer their directive guidance when necessary. They are not an authoritative Board to dictate policy to the league convention, but shall represent this Association to that convention.

This Board shall endeavor to establish leagues in all churches constituting this Association. They shall offer general assistance and devise such material for training our youth as shall be appropriate and in harmony with the general polity of this Association.

This Board shall gather an accumulated report of the league convention of this state, and shall make their report in writing at each annual session of this Association. Accompanying this report shall be a report of all activities of this Board. This Board shall keep accurate minutes of all meetings, and shall deposit these minutes with the Clerk of this Association, and shall be available for reading at the request of this Association.

L. The Book Store Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees of the Bible Book and Church Supply Store shall be responsible for the general oversight of the operations of store. This Board shall establish operating procedures that will govern the merchandising policies of the store.

A complete accounting of the operations of the store shall be made at each annual session of this Association, accounting for all purchases, sales, operating expenses and activities in writing. Included in this report shall be an acount of all the activities of this Board and a

Balance sheet from a competent accountant.

All operating procedures of the store shall be those accepted as normal retail proceedures, but not repugnant to the general polity of this Association and the tenets of this constitution.

ARTICLE VI - Church Government

Government of this Association shall be congregational in form and democratic in its practice. Congregational church government to be defined as: "The local church is an independent body, as far as it relates to its own government, the transaction of its business. The choice of its officers and the disciplining of its members. The local church holds the deed to its own property and is responsible for its own fanancial obligations and there is no authority by any ecclesiastical power that can revert or change the decision of the local church. When a majority of a congregation, in regular conference votes for cr against, their decision cannot be reversed by any other authority. However, an appeal may be made by common consent. to the next highest authority which is the quarterly meeting. If the minority is still dissatisfied, the next appeal is to the district association. The next appeal is to the state association and if dissatisfied by the state's decision, then their next and final appeal is to the National Association of Free Will Baptists. None of these can change the decision of the church but may recommend.

If the higher authorities are dissatisfied with the ruling of the majority, they may withdraw the hand of fellowship from the local church but it still leaves the local congregation in full charge of the church property and cannot interfere with its decisions any further."

ARTICLE VII - Discipline

This Association shall have the right and authority to discipline it's members and shall be recognized as the highest ecclesiastical tribunal within the State of California for Free Will Baptist.

ARTICLE VIII - Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the delegates present and voting at any session of this association, provided that all proposed amendments are presented in writing to the Association one (1) day in advance of action upon the proposed amendments.

Casteel for work previous to State Meeting. He was given the responsibility of completing plans for an Institute in Quarterly Meeting No. 4. Agreed that we would certify properly conducted courses taught since the State Associaion, 1960. Were informed that a profit of 35% can be made by the board on ETTA books. Affirmed that we would pay \$50.00 to a group of churches' holding an institute according to our rules.

After looking over the one hundred acres, 24 cabins, cafe, grocery store, and other large buildings which would be suitable for a tabernacle and a five room house. The total price was \$47,000. The board decided it was too much money to invest at this time and decided to drop the matter.

On April 8, 1961, we me at Arvin. We voted to recommend to the State Association and State League Rally that a member of each district League Rally represent at the State Associa-

tion with a report of their activities.

We're happy to report on the following Youth Encampments: July, 1960, Golden Gate had 225 enrolled and 75 professions of faith and four announced their calling to be foreign missionaries. Bro. Dean Moore was the evangelist.

Center Association June, 1961, had 107 enrolled with 16 professions of faith. Bro. James A. Franklin was evengelist.

The Southern Association June, 1961, had 117 enrolled in their first separate encampment and 25 professions of faith. DeArthur Yandell was the evangelist.

The West Coast Association being combined with the Southern Association last July, reported 225 enrolled with 55 profes-

sions of faith. Bro. Edward Johns was the evangelist.

We're grateful for the fellowship among our people and for the salvation of the many souls reached during this past year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TO THE CALIFORNIA STATE ASSOCIATION

When Convened At Tulare, California, June 28-30, 1961

In the early part of this church year, it was felt by the Board of Christian Education that definite steps must be taken to establish a full time religious school of training. The first consideration of the Board was to contact Rev. Charles Sapp, to become the Director of the California Bible Institute. After a meeting with Bro. Sapp, the action pending did not cuminate and other avenues were sought.

The Board later met at Kerman, and after much consideration and prayer, and encouragement by pastors and church leaders, these proposals were drawn up and are herewith presented to the 1961 Session of the State Association, as follows:

1. We propose to begin a full time day school next September, with evening classes added as needed. The units received here will be transferable to the Free Will Baptist Bible College in El Cerrito, California.

2. We propose to add two new departments to the school. A Music Department and an English Department. This will bring the present curriculum to include Bible and church related subjects, History, English, and Music.

3. We propose to launch a publicity drive to gain students and added financial support for the Bible Institute, which will include:

A. A catalogue with complete information about the school, it's courses of study, accreditation, costs, and other pertinent information.

B. An itinerate will be made to further acquaint the people of California with the California Bible Institute.

4. We propose a budget of \$25,000.00 to purchase property and building to house the California Bible Institute. Classes of the Institute will be conducted temporarily in the Sherwood Forrest Free Will Baptist Church, 5570 Castro Road, El Sobrante, California.

The Board of Christian Education, acting upon the recommendation of the State Executive Board, made a loan of \$400.00 to the Bookstore Board of Trustees, June 6, 1961.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR THE BIBLE, BOOK AND CHURCH SUPPLY STORES

To State Association of Free Will Baptist

This Board met three times during the year as a board. We met once with the Executive Board and State Officers and once with the Executive Board. Also once by telephone, making a total of 6 minutes. The following was accomplished.

1. Store was incorporated in accordance with the Corporations Code of the State of Calif., as a non-profit organization. This was accomplished on March 22, 1961.

Minutes of meeting held at Concord, Calif., on May 9, 1961.

The board was confronted with the following problems which we felt were pressing to the extent that appropriate action was necessary immediaely. We were conscious that we were accountable to the State Association for whatever action we did take. More important we knew that all men shall give

an account to God for every word and deed.

Problem No. 1. Brother Doss' Illness. Brother Doss no longer continued to keep the Book Store in operation. Sister Doss' time would also be taken in caring for him and she was the one who did most of the work in the Book Store.

Problem No. 2. Short period of time between now and the

State Association.

Problem No. 3. The availability of a good location. A committee appointed at the meeting of the Joint Boards (24 April at N. Fresno) was given the responsibility of securing a possible location in the event a move was accepted by the Staate Association. This committee located a desireable location at a reasonable rent. However, this transaction had to be closed immediately as another party desired the building and the owner was unwilling to wait until the State Association for confirmation. (As a matter of information, the owner was willing o let us have two months free rent if we were willing to do some repair work on the building.

Problem No. 4. We could not afford to hire someone to keep the store open until the State Association. Bro. Dudley, a member of this board, volunteered to fill all orders from the Churches until the State Association.

This board also took into consideration the following:

1. The diserability of the location of the Book Store had already been a question in the minds of some.

2. The recommendation of the Joint Boards (Executive Board, Book Store Trustees and State Officers) held at N. Fresno on April 24, from which came a recommendation to move the book store to Modesto.

3. This move was discussed and approved by all present at a meeting of Pastors held at State League Rally on April 28 and again a meeting of Pastors at Kerman, Calif., on May 8.

In view of these things the Board took the following action:

1. To close operation of the Book Store, to street traffic only, at Concord, Calif., on May 9, 1961.

2. To go ahead and rent the building in Modesto and proceed with needed repairs, and to move existing stock from Concord to Modesto.

3. To accept the gracious offer of Brother Dudley to fill all orders from the Churches until the State Association.

As a matter of information, the stock is now located at 1045 11st St., Modesto, Calif., in a building that a deposit of \$100 has been placed on, holding it until July 1,1961, available for a 2-year lease and 2-year option.

BY-LAWS

- 1. The Moderator or assistant Moderator or in their absence the oldest minister (in the work) present shall call the association into conference.
 - 2. Each session shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 3. Fourteen members from two or more associations shall constitute a quorum. A less number may adjour until such quorum is present.
- 4. Visiting brethren are invited to seat as advisory members.
- 5. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and vote taken.
 - 7. Motion made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. The Moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit.

10. The ruling of the Moderator may be overruled by a

two-thirds majority of members voting.

11. No question from any association shall come under the association unless it has first been discussed in its own association.

12. At each Association arrangement shall be made to insure two or more sermons or their equivalent devotional ex-

ercises each day.

13. The State Association shall have no power to fill vacancies in the delegation from any composite body.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God by faith in Christ and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant. We promise by His Grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages,

and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the scripture, secret prayer, family devotion, and social worship, and self denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow" in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ." We will forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship and the observance of the ordinances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work. We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of Peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and to seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring and as far as we are able, to promote the success of the church, and the Gospel. We will everywhere hold Christian principles sacred and Christians obligations and enterprises supreme, counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society, constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come and His will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday School, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of Peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our

Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. The Bible. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by inspiration of God and are an infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. God. There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Rigtheous Governor of the universe; and in the Scripture as Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. Christ. is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature, truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified and is our ever present Savior and Lord.
- 4. The Holy Spirit. The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit, all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Santifier of men.
- 5. The Government of God. God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. Sinfulness of Man. Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His Posterity, therefore, inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. The Work of Christ. The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection affected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. The Terms of Salvation. The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance of sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord, with purpose to love and obey him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy spirit, freed from the domination of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

- 9. Election. God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. Freedom of Will. The human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live or resist them and perish.
- 12. Perseverance. All believers in Christ, who through grace, persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promis of eternal salvation.
- 13. Gospel Ordinances. Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 14. Tithing. God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:33) and the apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." (I Cor. 16:2)...
- 15. The Christian Sabbath. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works, and activities and for personal communion with God.
- 16. Resurrection, Judgement, and Final Retribution. The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They will have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation; then the wicked shall "go away into eternal punishmen, but the righteous into eternal life."
