

IN MEMORY OF ELD. D. C. JOHNSON

Eld. D. C. Johnson better known as "Uncle Dock" was born October 18, 1854.

He was an orphan boy and grew up under adverse circumstances.

He underwent many hardships in early life, yet he was taught in his youth to live right and serve God. After he grew to manhood he worked hard and by careful management accumulated a reasonable amount of material wealth which he often used to help those he found in need.

He joined the Free Will Baptist church August 19, 1874. He was very much devoted to his church, always giving his presence at its meetings.

He was twice married, his second wife still living at his death. He also leaves one son and two daughters who have grown to manhood and womanhood.

He was licened to preach the gospel by his church about the year 1908 and in 1910 he went before the Ordaining Council and was ordained and set apart to the full work of the Gospel ministry.

He served several churches as pastor and preached faithfully the doctrine and practice of the Free Will Baptist church as he believed the Bible taught until the day of his death.

The death Angel came on the 10th of January 1932. Funeral services were conducted by Eld. S. H. Styron assisted by several other ministers of the Gospel.

1st—We your Committee on Obituaries realizing that the Cape Fear Conference and the Free Will Baptist Church has lost one of its ablest and most beloved preachers and Christian workers in the loss of "Uncle Dock" and that in his passing the church and conference will always miss his smiling face and will forever cherish his memory as one of our most beloved men.

2nd—That whilst we in our weakness are unable to comprehend the mighty workings of God, we now bow our heads in humble submission to him that doeth all things well, and careth for those who serve Him and love his commands.

3rd—That the fifty eight years of continued service for his master be an example for the younger preachers of the Free Will Baptist church to continue, in the faith until death shall call them from this life.

In John 1:6 we find these words "There was a man sent from God whose name was John."

We believe this scripture could readily be applied and even in this age, ould we not say there was a man sent from God whose name was "Uncle Dock" Johnson.

"Uncle Dock" was simple, plain, patient, faithful and courageous, never willing to give up the fight until the victory was won.

He was a man of limited educational qualification, but was a man of muck thought and unsurpassed in his day for the way and excellent manner and his ability to expound the simple gospel to those who were his hearers.

When God wants to perform a certain work he does not call the Legislature or Congress to convene, but he calls a man yes, He calls a man to the work and entrusts that man with doing it.

When men want to perform a task they call great councils together of devise ways and means by which they hope to accomplish their purpose. This is man's way. On the other hand God called a man and sent him forth to do the work.

God wanted a nation of people whom he might call his own, and use is his chosen people through all ages, the mightiest single stream of injunce ever flowing down through the chanels of time. And yet to found such a people and give them a beginning He called Abraham, a man of faith, a man that you could trace his journey's and pilgrimages by the alters he built to Jehova, God.

He then wanted to weld that people into a nation and call them from inder bondage. He then did not call congress but he called Moses and then vaited forty years for his training before He sent him to this task. So it has been all down through the ages when God wants a great work to be one He calls and sends a man.

All those who have heard "Uncle Dock" preach the Gospel keenly feels and realizes that he was giving to us the philosophy and faith the foundation and structure of his own life.

We have often heard him say that God had called him to preach the Gospel. This call came to him in the prime of life and never until his dyeing day did it depart from him as the deepest conviction of his life.

There are no doubt, preachers, who go out for favor or applause, will ay, that the preacher must forget sometimes that he is a preacher. He was not that kind. He never forgot that he was a preacher and at all times and under all circumstances acted the part of a preacher.

No one who ever came into his presence or talked with him in the briefest way could fail to be reminded of the fact that he was a man of God.

He was never ashamed to own his relationship with God. He was anxous for all those he came in contact with to know that he was a preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I think he could have truly said as did Paul n Romans 1:16 "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ."

I have never heard any one say that "Uncle Dock" ever sought honor fame, or glory, save in the cross as spoken of in Gallations 6:14 "God forbid that I should glory save in the cross."

He felt and no doubt knew that he was sent from God into the world to be a preacher of the word and perform a mission for the Lord.

He filled his mission well. He preached to all classes of people. The rich, the poor, the halt, the lame, the blind, the bond and the free. To all he administered alike, in fact he knew no difference between the rich or the poor, the black or white.

His life cannot be understood only in the fact of his everlasting conviction that he was a man sent from God to do His bidding among men This was his great purpose in life.

He was, however, a man subject to the mistakes of life but all these he attributed to his own weakness as a human being.

When he seem to succeed well in his work he gave God all the glory. You never heard him boast of his own goodness or even intimate that he was infalible. He never claimed to be more pious, holier or even better that other folks, or that he even walked daily in the glaring light of God's glory. He realized the frailties and weaknesses of human nature, and of his own life because he was human. On the other hand he fully realized the power of God unto salvation of men, and lived daily in a conscious state of mind that God had humbled him yet exalted him, by allowing him to be among the number sent of God.

He realizing that God had sent him out to do his work gave him faith that never wavered, gave him courage not to be conquered and hope that was never dimmed.

He trusted fully in God, believed in His wisdom to plan His work, and that His way was the only way.

It often seemed to him no doubt that sin and evil might abound for a season and be victorious, yet "Uncle Dock" being indeed conscious of the fact, that God had sent him realized that God would and must win out, and that we need not be in too much of a hurry about it. God is patient therefore the man of God must work with patience and leave the results with God.

He was a man that went about seeking to do good. He had faith in the good and believed in the ultimate triumph of the good.

The vast number of people who knew him can freely join us in saying, "There was a man sent from God whose name was D. C. Johnson.
