The Ninety-eighth annual session of the Cape Fear (Original) Free Will Baptist Conference convened with the church at West Clinton, Sampson County, N. C., October 30, 1952, at 10 a.m. and shaded at W. convenient County at the control of the contr

Conference was called to order by the moderator, Rev. L. R. Ennis.

The morning worship was conducted by Rev. C. M. Coates who led the audience in the songs, "I Am Thine O Lord," and "There Is Power In the Blood." After the singing of these hymns, Rev. W. H. ### Reports of Various Boards and Committees

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

In accordance with the requirements and stipulations of the Constitution and the By-Laws of the conference, your Executive Board has endeavored to discharge the functions and duties required of the Board. We have been required to attend to many routine matters, as well as some very weighty matters. It is the purpose of this report, not to burden you with the routine matters, but to report on the more weighty and important matters.

In the meeting held on February 22, 1952, in our Smithfield Church, we were presented with a petition from the Raleigh Church, requesting the Executive Board to come to their rescue. After adopting suitable resolutions regarding a new set-up for the Raleigh Church, we authorized our Executive Secretary, Thomas E. Beaman, to arrange for a joint meeting with the Raleigh Church on February 29.

On February 29, we held a joint session with the church in Raleigh. At this time we presented the mutual regulations and agreements which we had drawn up and adopted in the meeting on February 22. The church adopted unanimously, the agreements. In these agreements we stipulated that joint ownership was to be acquired. A new financial set-up followed.

The necessary regulations and agreements having been established, we handed the entire assignment over to our Executive Secretary with instructions to proceed to execute them and to make his report when he had finished the assignment. We are attaching hereto, and making a part of this report, a specific report on the Raleigh Church, which gives the gist of his report.

In other meetings during the year, we handled routine matters with some consideration given to further arrangements and interests of the Raleigh Church.

On October 27, we held a meeting in Smithfield at which meeting we authorized the Moderator and Secretary of the conference to make application to our National Home Mission Board for a gift of \$500.00 for the Raleigh Church. We also, authorized the renewal of the applications to the State Mission Board and to our own Conference Mission Board for the renewal of our applications.

At this meeting we received into conference membership, Rev. Herman Hersey and Rev. Earl Glenn.

#### RALEIGH CHURCH

The First Free Will Baptist Church, located at 802 North Bloodsworth Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, did on the 16th day of February, 1952, petition the Executive Board of the conference for council, and assistance in the re-organization and administration of their church, throughout the period of their struggle to become securely established.

On February 22, the Executive Board did by suitable resolution accept the petition, and set up necessary rules and regulations for a working mutual agree-

ment with the church at Raleigh, one of which joint title was to be acquired to the property.

A joint meeting of the Executive Board and the Raleigh Church was held on February 29, in the church building at Raleigh, resulting in the adoption of the plans and agreement which had been submitted in writing. The vote was unanimously in favor of the proposed arrangements.

Joint title has been acquired to the property. A new financial system set up. All indebtedness was ascertained and set up in order on the books. The pulpit was supplied by a joint pulpit committee until a regular pastor was secured. Rev. Herman Hersey was installed as resident pastor on July 1, on a full time basis.

#### REPORT OF TEMPERANCE AND CIVIC-RIGHTEOUSNESS COMMITTEE

As your Temperance and Civic-Righteousness Committee and as ordained ministers of the gospel in the State of North Carolina, we believe that the Holy Bible is the divinely inspired Word of God and should be reverenced as such. Therefore, we recommend to your heading and admonition Romans, chapter 6 (verses 11-13 especially).

Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof.

Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead,

and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God.

Secondly, we recommend that we adhere strictly to our Church Covenant and urge that this covenant be read to all new members when being received into the church, and to the entire membership at such time as the pastor of the church may deem proper.

#### COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We believe that it is hard to be a pleasing servant if one is a reluctant disciple. We believe that he will be limited in influence and success if he does not lay aside the weights of the world and the questionable deeds which will mar his fruit-bearing. Unless parents practice temperance and civic righteousness, they cannot expect their children to do so. Likewise, ministers and laymen, as well as other Christian leaders, should lead strictly temperate lives. Society demands this of them, for their influence constantly speaks for or against moral reform and the improvement of society.

In every walk and relationship of life, whether in the home, the office, the factory, the field, the pulpit, or the legislative assembly, men should stand for civic righteousness and temperance. If they fail, they are traitors. They are traitors to temperance. #### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

October 30, 1952

We have endeavored to make progress in all of the fourteen point program of your board. The accomplishments are far from what we would have them to be. However, we are happy to report that progress has been made. Some of the accomplishments will be made specifically stated on the specific report on the Go-

1. TITHING CAMPAIGN: Your Board sponsored a Tithing Campaign. During the month of February, every minister of the conference and those pastoring in our conference was asked to preach a sermon on Tithing. Every Sunday School superintendent and teacher requested to cooperate through the Sunday School and all were requested to make a report in order that we might give to our people a report.

The following ministers made their report as requested: Leonard B. Woodall, Jr., Robert M. Fader, Gideon Stevens, W. A. Martin, J. Walter Stanley, C. M. Coates, C. H. Coates, Lloyd Vernon, L. R. Ennis, Thos. E. Beaman, Earl Glenn, W. O. Lassiter, Albert T. Coates, J. C. Hathaway.

AnneReports' reveal the following: and the man only family recall places and

- 1. Eighteen sermons on tithing were preached and heard by more than 3,000 people who were in attendance.
  - 2. Ninety-seven new tithers were acquired. (Note: If their yearly income averaged \$1,000 per year—it would mean an increase in church offering of \$9,70 per year.)
- 3. Approximately 7,000 tracts and pieces of literature were distributed.

  The distribution of literature still goes on. Some pastors and teachers have written in as many as three times for additional tracts and pamphlets.
- 4. One hundred eighty-four of the 224 pastors, teachers and superinten-size dents of Sunday School participated in the campaign which was the largest total number on record ever to co-operate in a single plane simultaneously on a Conference-wide scale.
  - 5. We will reap in the future abundantly as a result of the investment we made in this endeavor.

II. \$100-A-MONTH CLUB: This club was organized under the directions of the Board of Missions, as a part of its planned program, to meet a long felt need for a fund especially ear-marked to aid the beginning of new churches. We have set a goal of \$100 a month. Hence, the name \$100-A-Month Club. Of course, we did not expect to reach the goal the first year, but gradually, we believe that we will have a membership sufficient to receive \$100 a month to this specially ear-marked fund. This fund now amounts to \$323. The expenses for promoting this club has been paid by our regular Mission Funds. Hence, all money received is now in the hands of the treasurer of the Conference. Let us clearly understand now, that this money is not for use in helping churches already organized, but to be used in helping churches get organized and set up. The regular Mission Funds will be used for helping the now existing churches.

III. THE LORD'S ACRE PROJECTS: We sponsored three special regular conferences for study and understanding of the plans and methods. One was held at Oak Grove, one at Lee's Chapel and one at Smithfield. The pastors of the churches in each area, the Lord's Acre Committees and other interested individuals attended these conferences. Besides the holding of these special regional conferences, a special contact was made with approximately fifty individuals who did not attend these conferences. The result of these conferences has been that our people have been better informed as to the plans and purposes of the projects.

Several of our churches sponsored the Lord's Acre plan and in some instances they had a Harvest Day Sale. Reports have not been turned in from all of the churches, therefore, we cannot make a full report now.

Tee's Chapel deserves special recognition. A large number of members planted an acre. Others had chickens and hogs. Each project was marked with a sign "The Lord's Acre." The pastor and his church held a dedication service of each plot of ground so earmarked. Field scenes were also taken in motion picture. These crops have not all been harvested and therefore, no financial report can be given.

Our Shady Grove Church also went all out for the Lord's Acre Project, marking each plot of land that was set aside for the "Lord's Acre." After the crops were gathered and converted into cash, the combined offering was made at the church worship services on Sunday, October 26. The total Lord's Acre and Harvest Offering was \$2,323.16.

Lee's Chapel Church had a very good Harvest Day Sale. The receipts from the sale which included the proceeds from the Lord's Acre Projects amount to \$1,182.

Daly's Chapel Lord's Acre and Harvest Sales netted them \$275.00.

- IV. THE RALEIGH CHURCH: It has been necessary for us to aid our Raleigh Church in supplementing the pastor's salary and we have allocated for this purpose \$50.00 per month from June through October. It will also be necessary for us to continue this allocation for some time to come.
- V. OTHER APPLICATIONS: We have other applications for assistance and we probably will be getting others during the coming year. If we help those who are appealing to us for assistance, we must have an additional income from our churches.
- VI. Donations to Missions: According to the best available information, the Conference Churches contributed to missions, including Foreign Missions, State and National Missions, and Cape Fear Missions, the sum of \$1,098.88 during the year.

#### I. Free Will Baptist League

#### II. Sunday School Training Course !!

Beginning the latter part of January, we will give another course in the ETTA cycle. The subject will be "World Wide Missions." The training centers will be the same as for the Leagues.

#### III. Students in the Bible College and Student Loan Fund

This year we have five students in our Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee. We must give some aid and assistance to these students. It will be necessary for us to increase our Student Loan Fund in order to help them continue their studies in our Bible College.

Churches, Sunday Schools, Leagues, Woman's Auxiliaries and individuals are requested to contribute this year to this fund. The earlier you can get in your contribution, the better, as it will be needed in the very near future.

### IV. The Family Life (1783) (2000) AND CONTROL OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY

During the year we have given considerable emphasis to family life. One Union Meeting Session was devoted to the general discussion and emphasis and this phase of our Go-Forward Program.

We have authorized the procurement of available texts, pamphlets and booklets on the Family Life and authorized the writing of some for our own particular use. These we expect to distribute during the coming Conference Year.

This particular item of the Go-Forward Program was assigned to your Board of Education and we will continue to do our best to carry out the requirements of the assignment.

Institutes were held at Kinston, Goldsboro, Smithfield and Lee's Chapel, in which Institutes a course of instructions in "Sunday School Evangelism" was given. The enrollment was very gratifying, and the work accomplished by the students was commendable. We held a big rally in Smithfield following the completion of the course. The rally was well attended.

During the year, our churches contributed the following amounts to education: Goldsboro \$364.46; Robert's Grove \$64.00; Oak Grove \$7.35; Hopewell \$35.00; St. Mary's Grove \$35.00; Bethel \$82.00; Riverside \$5.00; Smithfield \$50.71; Johnson's Union \$56.83; Casey's Chapel \$41.20; Powhatan \$37.00 Total \$778.55.

We are confident much more money was given to education than is reflected in the above figures, but they gave it in such a way that we could not get the actual figures. Thus, the Cape Fear Conference looses the credit which rightfully would belong to us.

We issued several bulletins for the information and enlightening of our people.

We also mailed out several thousand bulletins and pamphlets about our college work in Nashville, Tennessee.

The ministers of the Conference have met in four regular sessions during the year and one emergency session for fellowship and consultation in matters pertaining to the general work of our conference.

We have done more work this year as a board than any one year during the history of the Conference and we have had to devote a considerable amount of time and expense during the year to properly discharge the duties and functions of this board. We have the satisfaction that we have accomplished a great deal and feel that much of the labors will bear much fruit. Besides ordaining Brother Robert M. Fader, Brother Leonard Woodall, Jr., and Brother W. A. Martin to the Gospel Ministry, whose names we request be enrolled on the official list of ministers, we have also recommended the admission to membership in the conference Rev. Herman Hersey, pastor of our Raleigh Church, and Rev. Earl Glenn, pastor of our Smithfield Church. These latter two ministers having been admitted to membership by the Executive Board, we request their official registration.

We wish to again respectfully call to the attention of our churches, the requirements as stated in the new National Treatise, page 49, chapter 11, section 1-2.

When a church desires that one of its members should be licensed or ordained to preach the Gospel, it requests the quarterly meeting or association of which it is a member to examine, by council, such member. The examination for license should refer to the piety and doctrines, the convictions and purposes respecting the work of the ministry, and the reputation for character and ability of the candidate, and his present and prospective educational and professional qualifications. The examination for ordination should include all that is required for license, and also satisfactory examination respecting the life and labors of the candidate, and his attainments, at least in the departments of English, education, doctrinal and pastoral theology and homiletics.

According to this regulation, churches cannot license or re-license a minister without the permission and written authority of this Board. We have no choice in the matter.

We are also happy to report that the harmony and fellowship of the ministers of your conference is excellent.

We wish to respectfully call your attention to provisions in the Constitution of the Conference Article 7, which reads as follows: "Each church shall contribute to the Conference program \$10.00 annually for each 100 members, or fraction thereof."

This means that if a church has less than 100 members, they pay the \$10.00

for the fraction thereof. But if the church has 101, and less than 200 members, they will pay \$20.00.

The above is in no sense meant to reflect on anyone, or any church. It is a factual matter as provided in the Constitution. We are sure that many churches did not so understand.

We would respectfuly request those churches which have overlooked, or failed to send in the correct amount, mail in the balance due as soon as possible.

In the first day session we received from Lee's Chapel Church, \$40.00 for Cape Fear Missions. The worship offering was \$32.30. \$80.00 was received as Conference Funds. The above receipts were not included in the Treasurer's report, for the reason they were received after the report had been mimeographed.

The reports reveal the following additional information:

Some Accomplishments and Future Plans Under the Go-Forward Program

One Daly's Chapel: Purchased an additional acre of ground. Sowed grass, planted shrubs, completely remodeled church, new windows, doors, underpinning, painted, new pews, new aisle rug. They plan to improve cemetery, add two Sunday School rooms and a small tool house. Rev. Thos. E. Beaman, pastor.

Oak Grove: Fixed the pulpit, new pews, bought five new chairs and table-Rev. M. E. Godwin, pastor.

Riverside: Hauled gravel, built four Sunday School rooms, new ceiling in main church, sanded and finished floors, new pulpit stand and new furniture, new rugs, three oil heaters, new light fixtures, new steps and porch extension, repainted entire building, bought new chairs for Sunday School rooms and new song books. Immediate plans are to add two more Sunday School Rooms over the present ones. Rev. C. M. Coates, pastor.

Bethel (Johnston): Building Sunday School rooms now. Graded grounds and established lawn and parking area. Rev. Lloyd Vernon, pastor.

Shady Grove: Painted inside and out-1950. Activity building (outside now complete). Plans are to finish activity building and furnish with rest rooms and kitchen. Rev. L. R. Ennis, pastor.

St. Mary's Grove: Pulled up stumps and leveled yards. Future plans are to set out trees. Rev. J. B. Ferrell, pastor. The mark for all the past of the

rooms, reEnlarged pulpit, painted two class rooms, put two rugs in class rooms, remodelled front of church. Rev. Herman Hersey, pastor.

See Corinth: Built a road to church, turned church around, built a cement front

and had church underpinned. Rev. C. H. Coates, pastor. The regular to this

West Clinton: Purchased pews for church, added five Sunday School rooms; closed in two rest rooms. Plans are to paint outside and inside and complete rest rooms; put shrubbery on grounds and dispose of old buildings. Rev. J. Walter Stanley, pastor.

Smithfield: Laid (walks and stepping stones, landscaped yards, church remodelled, constructed a parsonage for approximately \$10,000. Full time pastorate, Rev. Earl Glenn.

Prospect: Has constructed and paid for new modern brick building at a cost of approximately \$25,000. Converted the old church building into an educational building. Rev. C. H. Coates, pastor.

St. John's: Build an annex, enlarged auditorium, installed new lighting and heating systems. Built vestibule, acquired additional land, landscaped and beautified with shrubbery. Cost approximately \$8,000.00. Sunday school increased from membership of 113 to 185. Church attendance from 22 to 225. Rev. Thos. E. Beaman, pastor.

Bethel (Lenoir): Constructed a chapel at a cost of \$5,500.00. Plans are to construct educational building and later remodelling sanctuary. Rev. Thos. E. Beaman, pastor.

Yelverton's Grove: Constructed a new church building. Rev. J. Walter Stanley, pastor.

Lee's Chapel: Built additional Sunday School rooms. Acquired additional land. Installed new heating system. Installed new pews. Rev. C. H. Coates, pastor.

St. Paul: They plan to remodel the building and build Sunday School rooms. Rev. Warren Mallard, pastor.

Goldsboro: Added one Sunday School room, new heating system, under the pastorate of Rev. Rashie Kennedy. They plan to build first unit of Educational Building, under the pastorate of Rev. Walter W. Reynolds.

Casey's Chapel: Plans are for the redecoration of the present building inside and for installation of heating system; underpinning building. Rev. Dan Beaman, pastor. Mark Mark Control Contro

Other Churches: Made improvements, including Powhatan, Johnson's Union, and Steven's Chapel. Detailed information not available.

S. S. 1951 enrollment was 3,299—1952 enrollment 3,632, a gain of 333. Records show gains each year under the Go-Forward Program, a justification for the program.

The majority of our teachers and officers of the Sunday Schools have been taking training to better prepare themselves for more effective usefulness. Our ministers, largely speaking, are taking the courses of instructions given by the Board of Education. The training program will be re-activated in January, and will include special training in League Leadership.

I have spent approximately three and one-half months this year in the interest of the Cape Fear Conference and the Program. I have furnished the Conference office space, the use of Water, Lights, telephone service, office equipment, etc.,

without charge. The expenses in the proper conduct of the business have been held to a minimum. The items of expenses will be shown in the Treasurer's expenses.

The accomplishments truly justify the investments in time, talents, labor and money.

Indeed, we are going forward with the work of the Kingdom as represented by the Cape Fear Conference.


