## PROCEEDINGS

The one hundred fifteenth session of the Cape Fear Conference of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina convened with Casey's Chapel Church near Goldsboro, North Carolina, on October 30 and 31, 1969.

### THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

(October 30, 1969)

The Cape Fear Conference opened its 115th annual session Thursday morning, October 30, at 10 a. m., with the singing of the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

Prayer was offered by the Rev. C. M. Coats.

The morning devotional was by the Rev. J. Walter Stanley, pastor of Faith and Daly's Chapel Churches.

The Rev. Walter Bass, host pastor, graciously welcomed everyone to Casey's Chapel. The Rev. Eddie Edwards gave the response to the welcome.

The secretary of the Conference, Ray G. Smith, declared the meeting opened for business.

The Rev. Adrian Grubbs Jr., chairman of the Credentials Committee, explained the registration procedures adopted by the 114th session of the Conference as offered by the Resolutions Committee which states as follows:

A brief recess was declared by the moderator.

The worship hour was opened with congregational singing "Love Lifted Me." Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. Walter Stanley. The morning message was brought by the Rev. C. Felton Godwin. Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. Stewart Humphrey.

The Conference adjourned for lunch.

## REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE COLLEGE

### SERVICES

Mount Olive College believes that its primary purpose is to provide a comprehensive program of Christian education for Free Will Baptists. These services include:

1. Educational opportunities, including financial assistance, for every student who has the desire and potential to attain a college education. No other college can do for Free Will Baptists young people what Mount Olive College can and we ask that you encourage students from your church to attend our own College.

2. Ministerial students and others preparing for church-related vocations are offered two years of basic education plus practical experience.

3. Extension courses in Bible are offered upon request when possible.

4. A Ministers' Institute for pastors, their wives, and interested laymen is offered each summer.

5. A Youth Conference for high school students is also available to all Free Will Baptist students each summer.

6. Pulpit supply and speakers for special occasions are provided by members of the faculty and students upon requests.

7. Auxiliary programs and study courses are given by College personnel on a one-night basis when several auxiliaries in an area wish to come together for this purpose.

8. Library services are also available. The Moye Library contains approximately 19,000 volumes and the Free Will Baptist Historical Collection. Although materials in the Historical Collection may not be checked out, other books are available on loan.

### APPRECIATION

The College is grateful to the Cape Fear Conference for its support last year and following is a report of gifts by each church as well as the suggested challenges for 1969-70.

### DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

A \$500,000 dormitory project to accommodate 126 men is now under construction and is scheduled to be put into use in the fall of 1970. This building is necessary for the College to continue its growth.

The Church Finance Association, Inc. has been serving Free Will Baptists of North Carolina since 1940. It is owned by and operated for Free Will Baptists..

We would like to express our appreciation to all who have supported our Association with their time, prayers, and funds. Our thanks go especially to those who have had vision and faith to make the Church Finance Association, Inc. what it is today.

Our Association has over \$20,000 in memberships as of September 8, 1969; and over \$165,000 in deposits. Our loans to churches and institutions now exceed \$200,000. In 1968 our loans to church amounted to \$65,150. All of our accounts are in good standing.

Our needs are great. If we are to meet the needs of our church we must secure additional funds. We need to increase our deposits to the point where a large withdrawal will not retard our operation. As of now we could use an additional \$120,000 in making loans to churches. The Association pays five percent interest on deposits of \$500 or more; and four percent is paid on deposits of less than \$500.

### NOVEMBER IS CHILDREN'S HOME MONTH

Thanksgiving is a most wonderful season of the year. It is a time when we can reflect back over the past year, taking inventory of our blessings and projecting our lives into the future. All of us here at the Home have much for which to be thankful. In fact, Free Will Baptists as a whole have much for which to be thankful. A generous offering to our Home is an excellent way for you to express your thankfulness. "To care means to share."

Free Will Baptists have remembered November as Children's Home Month for many years. The November gifts constitute a major part of our annual support. These gifts will help determine our program of child care tremendously. The gifts at the State Convention were \$8,048.80. We spent over \$5,000 of this amount getting our children in school. This included clothes, books, lunches, etc., for the first month of school. Our tobacco brought \$9,550.69. We spent \$6,635 of this amount in paying off an old farm debt. The level of giving had increased up until the last three weeks. We must continue to receive an increased level of giving to meet our ever-growing needs.

Please try to see that your church, Sunday school, auxiliary, etc. give a little more this November than last November. It is our hope that every church in North Carolina will make a gift of some size during the month of November. We welcome you to bring your gifts to the traditional Thanksgiving service on Thanksgiving Day. The traditional outdoor picnic will follow the worship service which starts at 10:30 a. m. The children will be ready to leave for Thanksgiving vacation at 1:30 p. m.

### SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1970

Because of the many letters and inquiries of people from all across the state, asking for the privilege of doing something for our children; and because of seeing a need for a more balanced and uniform program, we will start this new sponsorship program as of January 1, 1970. This program has been approved by the Executive Committee of the State Woman's Auxiliary Convention, and many, many individual auxiliaries. Those auxiliaries and individuals who now are sponsoring a child can simply select from the list below what they want to do, and the items not taken by the present sponsors will be given to the people who are asking for a specific project. All present sponsors are encouraged to follow this plan:

**Food:** \$300 per year (\$25 per month).

**CLOTHES:** \$100-\$150 per year, depending upon the size of the child, one half in August for school clothing, and one half in March for Easter.

**CAMP:** \$45 per year. Last year only five or six of our children had the privilege to go to camp. We would like for those ten years old and above to have the privilege.

**ALLOWANCE:** \$60 per year or \$5 per month. Some of our children are now getting too much money, while some are getting too little. Then there are some who do not get any money at all. All twenty-eight children's homes in North Carolina have an allowance system with the exception of our Home and one more. We ask that the \$5 be sent to the office the first of each month, making your checks payable to the Home, beginning January 1, 1970. We will simply put all the allowance into one "pot" or fund and draw out in equal amounts for each age level. This means the higher the age level, the more allowance a child will get. If you send in your \$5 for "your" child, he may get less or he may get more than \$5; but every child will get some. We are aware that for many reasons everyone will not send in this amount, because some forget and do not send anything. What we are saying is that "our" children have to buy stamps, envelopes, and many small personal items; and to have a share-alike program, we can better teach our children the value of money: thus teaching them to save.

**CHRISTMAS:** \$25-\$35 per year. This amount has been arrived at by the many auxiliaries we have visited. We will continue to send you a list of the child's needs and let you take care of Christmas in your own way, spending what you like. However, the above amount is recommended by most auxiliaries we have visited.

**BIRTHDAYS:** \$1-\$5 per year. This is mailed directly to the child. Most times a child's birthday is an important occasion on our campus. Each child gets his personal cake on his birthday. He is free to share this cake with whomsoever he chooses. Your gift and the cake seem to single him out, thus making this day a special day.

**SUMMARY:** All the above funds should come to our office payable to the Home with the exception of his birthday and Christmas, unless agreed upon. We believe the above plan will improve our present system. We encourage your cooperation in helping to make our Home a better home.

The officers shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a secretary, an assistant secretary, and a treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years, expiring upon the close of the session at the close of the session in which they are elected. Temporary officers, representatives or messengers may be elected at the option of the conference for whatever purposes deemed essential.

## ARTICLE IV. STANDING BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

It shall be the policy of this conference to elect as many boards and committees as may be necessary in carrying out its program. These shall keep records of their proceedings and make a report at each annual session of the conference. A board of trustees, a board of Christian education, a board of missions and church extension, and a board of ordination consisting of five members

# CONSTITUTION

## PREAMBLE

We, the Cape Fear Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist denomination of North Carolina, desiring to be in fellowship in a bond of union, do ordain this constitution.

## NAME

This shall be the constitution of the Cape Fear Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist Churches of North Carolina.

## PURPOSE

The object of the Cape Fear Conference shall be to promote Christ's kingdom among men by means in strict conformity to the Holy Scriptures.

## ARTICLE I. COMPOSITION

This conference shall be composed of affiliated ordained ministers and churches within its bounds, who are in good standing, and of all general officers, and members of standing boards or committees of the conference. It shall operate under the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina. No church corporation whose articles or incorporation or constitution and bylaws conflict with the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina shall be permitted membership in the Cape Fear Conference.

## ARTICLE II. REPRESENTATION

Each church shall represent with one delegate for each one hundred members or fraction thereof. The delegation from each church shall carry to the conference a letter certifying their appointment and giving the statistics and financial condition of the church; together with a statement of all funds received and disbursed for denomination and benevolent purposes during the year.

## ARTICLE III. OFFICERS

The officers shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a secretary, an assistant secretary, and a treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years, entering upon the duties of said office at the close of the session in which they are elected. Temporary officers, representatives or messengers, may be elected at the option of the conference for whatever purposes deemed essential.

## ARTICLE IV. STANDING BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

It shall be the policy of this conference to elect as many boards and committees as may be necessary in carrying out its program. These shall keep records of their proceedings and make a report at each annual session of the conference.

A board of trustees, a board of Christian education, a board of missions and church extension, and a board of ordination consisting of five members



each shall be elected. The term of office for members of these board shall be five years, but shall be so adjusted as to terminate the tenure of office of one member annually.

Section 1—Standing boards shall write their own bylaws and administer their respective programs of work, but each shall remain subject to their conference.

Section 2—The executive committee shall be composed of the moderator, assistant moderator, secretary, treasurer, and one member elected by the conference at the time of the official election of officers.

Section 3—Temporary committees shall be appointed at option of the conference for whatever purpose deemed necessary.

## ARTICLE V. FINANCE

Each church shall contribute to the conference annually according to its membership.

## ARTICLE VI. ADMISSION OF CHURCHES

Any properly organized church that gives evidence of adherence to the doctrines of Christianity as taught by Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina and desires to help promote the program and work of the Cape Fear Conference and the North Carolina State Convention, may present its petition to the regular session of the conference. If the petition for membership is approved, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the delegates.

## ARTICLE VII. DISMISSION OF CHURCHES

A church may be dismissed from membership in the conference by vote of the conference.

## ARTICLE VIII. VISITORS

The Cape Fear Conference may extend to visiting brethren all the privileges of the body save that of voting and holding office.

## ARTICLE IX. MEETINGS

The Cape Fear Conference shall meet in annual session on Thursday and Friday before the first Sunday in November. The host church shall be selected by vote of the conference in annual session or by the executive committee. The place of a future meeting thus selected may be changed by an act of the executive committee should such a change become necessary.

## BYLAWS

SECTION 1—The duties of the moderator shall be to preside, according to accepted parliamentary procedure, over the session of the Cape Fear Conference; to appoint temporary committees, delegates, and representatives; to serve as ex officio member of all standing boards and committees; and in general, to perform the duties of the office of moderator.

SECTION 2—The duties of the assistant moderator shall be the duties of the moderator when that officer is not present and he shall assist the

moderator when called upon. In the event of the resignation or death of the moderator, the assistant moderator shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the conference.

SECTION 3—The secretary shall record the proceedings of all sessions of the Cape Fear Conference and preserve an accurate record of said proceeding in a book provided for this purpose. The secretary shall prepare and cause to be published the minutes of the annual sessions of the conference; hold in trust all documents, not otherwise preserved, and surrender same at the direction of the conference; conduct the official correspondence and sign such documents and instruments as require the secretary's signature; and serve as a member of executive board.

SECTION 4—The duties of the assistant secretary shall be the duties of the secretary when that officer is not present, and he shall assist the secretary when called upon. In the event of the resignation or death of the secretary, the assistant secretary shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the conference.

SECTION 5—The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the conference and pay out same by order of the conference, the executive committee, or any standing board invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and paid out and make an annual report to the conference.

SECTION 6—It shall be the duty of the executive committee to transact the business of the conference when the conference is not in session, and make report at annual conference. The executive committee shall plan the program for the annual session of the conference.

SECTION 7—The board of trustees shall hold in trust all conference and real property, gifts and bequests of the conference, and convey or expend said property or assets as the Cape Fear Conference may direct.

SECTION 8—It shall be the duty of the board of ordination to examine, ordain, and discipline ministers in keeping with the provisions of the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, along with whatever additional requirements may be made by the conference. The board of ordination shall examine ordained ministers seeking membership in this conference and make recommendations in keeping with their findings.

SECTION 9—It shall be the duty of the board of missions and church extension to cooperate with the churches of the conference to promote the establishment of churches within the bounds of the conference. The board of missions and church extension shall cooperate with the state board of missions to raise money, arrange itineraries, and keep the work of missions before our churches.

SECTION 10—It shall be the duty of the board of Christian education to keep our people informed as to our educational needs, and endeavor to promote the cause of and stimulate interest among our people in the cause of Christian education. The board of Christian education shall cooperate

with the educational institutions of our denomination and use all funds for best interest of Christian education.

SECTION 11—The following temporary committees shall be appointed annually by the moderator and shall render reports during the sitting of the conference: credentials, nominating, resolutions, temperance, obituary, and letter digest.

SECTION 12—A board or committee will be recognized as having a quorum when there is a majority of the members present for a meeting, providing all the members of said board or committee have been duly notified concerning the said meeting.

SECTION 13—All reports, resolutions, and recommendations shall be considered properly presented to the conference in written form only.

SECTION 14—Each minister and delegate in good standing shall duly attend each day while the conference is in session or be subject to censure by the conference and reported to his local church.

SECTION 15—If any member, in the judgment of the conference, shall show anger in his discussion on any subject, he shall forfeit his seat in that session.

SECTION 16—No member shall be excused from any session of the conference without leave of the moderator.

SECTION 17—The conference shall adjourn by a majority vote.

SECTION 18—Each officer and member of standing committees and boards in good standing shall be entitled to a seat and vote in the conference.

SECTION 19—The conference shall open and close with suitable devotional services.

SECTION 20—This constitution and its bylaws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds favorable vote of the members present, provided that said amendment shall be presented on the first day of the annual session for action on the following day.

# UNION MEETING

## CAPE FEAR CONFERENCE OF ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I

**NAME**—This organization shall be known as the Union Meeting of the Cape Fear Conference of Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina.

#### ARTICLE II

**PURPOSE**—The purpose of this union meeting is the creation of an effective agency through which the Cape Fear Conference may successfully promote its work. It shall thus be and remain subject to the authority and use of the conference—except in the election of its general officers—as a consistent medium devoted to the advancement of the conference program of evangelism, education, benevolence and church extension.

#### ARTICLE III

**COMPOSITION**—This union meeting shall be composed of churches affiliated with the Cape Fear Conference, the ordained and licensed ministers who are members of churches that belong to the conference, and all general officers and members of standing committees of both the conference and the union meeting.

#### ARTICLE IV

**REPRESENTATION**—The churches of the Cape Fear Conference shall represent in the quarterly sessions of the union meeting with one delegate for each one hundred members or fraction thereof. Sunday schools, leagues, and auxiliaries shall each represent with one delegate.

#### ARTICLE V

**FINANCE**—Each church shall send with its delegation to the quarterly sessions of this union meeting one percent of its annual budget exclusive of funds for building and equipment, or a total of four percent of the church budget for the full year of four union meeting sessions. Sunday schools, leagues, and auxiliaries shall represent with whatever amounts they may choose. All funds shall be allocated by the executive board of the conference, but said allocations shall be approved by the union meeting in regular session or by the conference.

#### ARTICLE VI

**OFFICERS**—The general officers of this union meeting shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a secretary, an assistant secretary, and a treasurer, each of whom shall be elected for a term of one year, at the last session of the union meeting before the annual session of the Cape Fear Conference.

## ARTICLE VII

**BOARDS AND COMMITTEES**—All standing committees and boards created by the conference shall avail themselves of the advantage of promoting their work through the union meeting.

The general officers of the union meeting shall be added to the executive board of the conference and this composite committee shall constitute the executive committee of the union meeting. This committee shall have power to act for and on the behalf of the union meeting between its regular sessions. It shall also be the duty of the executive committee to prepare and supervise the programs of the union meeting and to allocate all undesignated funds.

## ARTICLE VIII

**MEETINGS**—The union meeting shall hold its regular sessions Saturday before each fifth Sunday in the churches of the Cape Fear Conference. The host church shall be selected from time to time, according to the alphabetic succession of the initial letter of the name of each church. This method of selecting the place of meeting may be changed when deemed expedient or necessary, by an act of the union meeting in session or the executive committee.

## ARTICLE IX

**AMENDMENT**—This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Cape Fear Conference by a majority vote of the members present, provided that the proposed amendment be presented in writing by the union meeting.

## BYLAWS GOVERNING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

1. The board shall be composed of five members. Their terms of office shall be as provided for in the constitution of the conference.

2. The officers shall be chairman, assistant chairman, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, and executive secretary, who shall have charge of the promotional work of the board. Provided, however, that any two officers may be combined at the option of the board, and provided further, that the executive secretary may, or may not be, a member of this board.

3. The treasurer of the conference shall, unless otherwise provided for, hold all funds of the board and disburse same on order of the board, or when duly signed by the chairman and secretary of the board. Annual reports of all receipts and disbursements shall be made to the conference in session and interim reports to the executive board when requested.

4. The board shall meet as often as necessary for the proper dispatch of the work assigned to it by conference direction, but must meet at least twice a year.

5. The board shall make, or cause to be made, adequate records of



meetings of this board, detail records, reports, etc., of all activities of the board and its officers, and preserve same as permanent records.

6. This board shall be charged with the responsibility of cooperating with our state and national educational institutions in the promotion of general Christian education.

7. The organization, direction, and the training program of Free Will Baptist league shall be under the direction and supervision of this board.

8. The general supervision of the Sunday school promotional activities, organization of new Sunday schools, training program for workers, and any and all other Sunday school promotional programming shall be the responsibility of this board.

9. This board shall be charged with the responsibility of making, or cause to be made emphasis on the Christian family life.

10. This board shall be responsible for conducting area institutes, and conferences, on a conference scale, annually to instruct and help our people when necessary to have a better understanding of our conference, state, or national programs.

11. It shall be the responsibility of this board to direct and supervise all training programs of the conference.

12. The board shall be empowered to make such rules and regulations as it may deem expedient for the proper prosecution of the responsibilities assigned to it, provided, however, that the same shall not be inconsistent with bylaws, nor the constitution of the conference.

13. The board shall be responsibility for the promotion and administration of a Student's Loan Fund with which to aid worthy students in security and education.

14. The board shall lend money only upon the following terms and conditions:

A. Students must be adjudged worthy as to character and ability, and must attend an institution of learning approved by this board.

B. A promissory note must be made by the student, with one or more good endorsements, or other good security satisfactory to the board. The rate of interest shall be 1% while the student is in training. After completion of training, a new note shall be made bearing 6% interest with monthly, or quarterly payments to be made until obligations are fully discharged.

15. These bylaws may be amended or revised at any annual session of the conference, provided that such amendments, or revisions, as may be deemed necessary, shall lie on the table at least three hours before a vote is taken, during which time they shall be read twice, and provided further that such amendments or revisions shall require a two-thirds vote.

#### BYLAWS GOVERNING THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. The board shall be composed of five members. The first named shall be for a term of one year, the second for two years, the third for three

years, the fourth for four years, the fifth for five years and thereafter for a term each of five years.

2. The officers shall be chairman, assistant chairman, recording secretary, and an executive secretary, who shall have general charge of the promotional work of the board. Provided, however, that any two officers may be combined at the option of the board, and provided, further, that the executive secretary may, or may not, be a member of the board.

3. The board shall meet as often as may be deemed necessary and attend to all matters pertaining to missions within the territory of the Cape Fear Conference, but must meet at least twice a year.

4. The treasurer of the conference shall hold all funds designated for Cape Fear missions and pay out same on order of the board, or when said order is duly signed by the chairman and the secretary of the board. Annual reports shall be rendered to the conference of all funds received and disbursed.

5. All persons doing work that merit compensation must first apply to the board on approved forms, and receive authorization to do work under regulations of the board before they can be compensated for same with mission funds.

6. Mission points, or stations, may be opened and maintained by the board for such a length of time as may be deemed best, employ evangelists, missionaries, and such field workers as may be deemed necessary for the proper promotion of the mission work.

7. The board shall not make any investment in property, nor promote any investment in property, without first giving due consideration to the safety of the investment, property titles, and other matters relative to the security of any investment.

8. No person shall be at liberty to enter upon any approved mission point without first consulting the board and receiving its approval as to place, plans, and purposes.

9. The board shall render annual reports to the conferences and interim reports to the executive board when requested.

10. The board shall be empowered to make such rules and regulations as it may deem expedient for the proper prosecution of the mission program, provided that same shall not be inconsistent with these bylaws.
