

PROCEEDINGS

—OF THE—

CENTRAL CONFERENCE.

According to appointment, the ministers and delegates composing the Central Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, convened with the church at Reedy Branch, Pitt county, N. C., November 9th, 10th, 11th, 1910.

Eld. R. I. Corbett, who was appointed to preach the introductory and C. J. Harris, his alternate were absent. J. T. Butler preach from Mark 16: 7. "Go your way and tell my disciples and Peter that I will appear."

After one hour recess the conference was organized by electing J. T. Butler, Moderator, C. J. Harris, asst. Mod. J. M. Barfield recording clerk and D. A. Windham, reading clerk.

The moderator appointed the following committees: Devotional—W. J. Braxton, Dolphas Davenport and Paul Harrington.

Finance-Geo. V. Boyd, J. H. Whitley and J. A. Hudson.

Education—R. R. Jones, L. L. Smith and W. H. Laughinghouse.

Mission-T. F. Heart, T. H. Barnhill and R. F. Pittman.

Temperance—T. E. Peden, R. E. Emmerson and D. M. Ratcliff.

Sunday School-A. D. McKeel, Z. B. Loftin and Jos. Turwell.

Bro. Enoch Braxton was appointed to attend the stand and record the Texts preached from during this session.

On motion, we invite the following visiting brethren to seats in this conference:

On motion, J. M. Barfield was appointed to write a biographical sketch of Eld. F. McLawhorn.

On motion, Joseph Tugwell was appointed Treasurer of the Honorary minister fund to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Eld. F. McLawhon.

On motion, the names of L. L. Smith and J. P. Woodard were enrolled on the list of ministers.

On motion, Iron Springs, Rrice's Mill and East Lake were dropped from the list of churches.

On motion, Eld. J. T. Butler was appointed to sell Bolton's Grove church building and turn the proceeds over to the Treasurer of the building committee of Washington church.

On motion, conference adjourned till Friday morning

at 9:30 o'clock.

LETTER FROM OHIO RIVER YEARLY MEETING.

Zaleski, Ohio, Oct., 5, 1910.

The Ohio River Yearly Mecting sends Christian greetings to the North Carolina Central Conference, praying the Great Head of the Church to direct all your deliberations, so that all you do will be for his declarative glory and the good of our common humanity. Our last session held at this place in August, was very largly attended, the preaching of much more than ordinary excellence and the prayer and testimony meetings, we believe unexcelled in interest and spirituality. One young man of much promise, Charles G. Moore, was ordained, at the request of the Jackson Quarterly Meeting and two others were advised to attend school and better ualify themselves for the work. A majority of the

churches have been blessed with revivals the past year. The Christian Meeting house in the center of the city of Wellston has been purchased by the General Conference, which we believe insures the perpetuity of that church and of the Jackson Quarterly Meeting. One of our ministers, Eld. George W. Moore, has been appointed by our National and State Boards, missionary to the State of Washington and is now at work with head quarters at Godendale, with good prospects of success. We are much interested in the large field which providence has opened for us in the Congo country, in Africa and believe it would be highly criminal for us to neglect and let some other denomination take possession of it and hope you and all the other constituent bodies of our General Conference, will cheerfully respond to the very modest request of our Mission Board, for twenty-five cents per resident member, for the support of this exceedingly important mission. We congratulate you on the achievement of State wide Prohibition and as three fourths of our counties are already under Prohibition and the law reasonably well enforced, we expect in a very short time to obtain the victory in the other fourth and banish the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor from the entire State. We were greatly disappointed by not receiving a messenger from you at our last session, but as we see in your minutes that one was appointed and take it for granted that he was providentially hindered and that you desire to continue the correspondence that has been at least very satisfactory and beneficial to us, and appoint our clerk corresponding messenger to your conference and solicit as many of your ministers and members at our next session, with First Kyger church, as you can see your way clear to appoint. RESOLUTION.

TEMPERANCE—1. We are very thankful for the rapid advance of Prohibition and total abstinence principles throughout the civilized world within the past few years and especially rejoice that we were the first denomination to make total abstinence a test of membership.

2. The Central Conference consisting of 35 preachers. 58 churches and 5,334 communicants unanimously and earnestly petition the Congress of the United States to speedily pass a law forbidding the shipment of intoxicating liquors into Prohibition territory, with sufficient penalties to make it effective.

3. The Conference also petitions our State Legistature to instruct our Senators and advise our Representatives in Congress to favor and use their entire influence in fa-

vor of the passage of this law.

4. It is Christian duty to see that the laws, especially on moral subjects are enforced and hence it is the duty of each citizen to report every violation of the liquor laws that comes to his knowledges to the proper authorities.

5. Near-beer saloons ought to be prohibited because they are stepping stones to strong drinks and usually a blind under which acknowledged intoxicants are sold.

- 6. We continue our testimony against the use of tobacco and advise all our members to entirely refrain from it all, our members addicted to the habit, who are less than sixty years of age to give it up at once and be guilty of it no more forever, and further we are utterly opposed to employing teachers in our denominational schools and very especially in our Theological School, who are addicted to this habit in any form.
- 7. We warn our people against the opium and kindred habits as unchristian, detrimental to the health of mind and body, weakens religious influence and prevents sinners from seeking Christ.

8. We advise the organization of W. C. T. U. and L. T. L. or some other temperance organizations in each church and that they be vigorously kept up and that the pastor and members manifest a deep interest in them.

OBITUARY OF ELD. F. McLAWHORN.

It becomes my sad duty to chronicle the death of one of our fellow laborers, in the vinyard of the Master. On Dec. 6th he finished his work on earth. He had been in bad health tor several years, but, was able the most of his time to preach. He had just returned from Spring Branch, Green Co., one of the churches that he had the care of, was sitting in his chair on Monday evening, and was strickened with appoplexy, dying in a short time.

Eld. McLawhon was born July 11th, 1847. He was a dutiful son to his parents. On Nov. 25th, 1866, he was happily married to Miss Elizabeth Ellis, daughter of Mr. Oliver Ellis.

In Sept. 1867 he joined the F. W. B. church at Reedy Branch, under the preaching of Eld. Henry Dixon, one of the old land marks.

He lived a consistent member of the church, and soon he felt divinely ealled to preach the Gospel, and de all he could for the Master. The church saw that he was apt to teach, and he was licensed in May 1875. On July 31st the same year the church ordered his ordination. He then went forth preaching the gospel, and holding the care of churches. Eld. Fred, as he was called, made an able pastor for the churches that he had the care of, and they all prospered. A short time before his death, he was elected President of the board of tiustees for the Theological Seminary at Ayden, N. C.

The writer has known him ever since he began preaching. He always went when called on to do religious service. Thirteen children, were born into them, five of which proceeded him to the spirit land. A dear companion, and eight children, are left to mourn the loss of a kind husband and an affectionate father.

He was buried in the family grave yard, with masonic honors.

Those among whom he has gone preaching the gospel will hear his voice no more.
