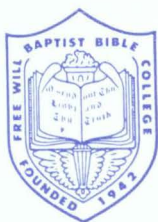

PROCEEDINGS.

The Sixteenth Annual Session of the Central Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, convened with the church at Arthur, Pitt county, N. C., Nov. 8th, 9th and 10th, 1911. Eld. George C. Vause, who was appointed to preach the introductory sermon attended and preached. Text: Matt. 28:19-20.

After one hour intermission conference was organized by electing Geo. C. Vause, Moderator; T. H. Barnhill, Ass't Moderator; Geo. W. Prescott, Recording Clerk, and D. A. Windham, Reading Clerk.

On motion, the following visiting brethren were invited to seats in this conference: Western—E. T. Phillips and B. B. Deans. Eastern—A. E. Rouse and Luke H. Wetherington. South Carolina—R. I. Corbett. South Georgia Association—E. B. Joyner. Ohio River Yearly Meeting—T. E. Peden.

The following committees were appointed:

Devotional—W. F. Walters, C. D. Smith, T. A. Nichols

Finance—Geo. V. Boyd, W. J. Braxton, J. I. Corbett.

Education—M. A. Woodard, J. T. Bundy, Charlie C. Fagan.

Missions—J. T. Butler, R. R. Jones, A. D. McKeel.

Sunday Schools—D. A. Windham, C. B. Jones, H. J. Alexander.

Temperance—E. B. Joyner, R. I. Corbett, E. T. Phillips.

Bro. Leslie Smith was appointed to attend the preaching service and record the texts preached from during this session.

On motion, the list of ministers was called.

Geo. C. Vause was appointed to write a biographical sketch of Elder T. N. Manning.

On motion, this conference grant Eld. M. A. Woodard a letter of recommendation to the Midway Association of Georgia.

On motion, the names of Elders E. D. Hathaway and J. Rollins be placed upon the list of retired ministers.

On motion, Conference adjourn till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock. Benediction by J. T. Butler.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Conference assembled pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder M. A. Woodard.

On motion, a committee consisting of Geo. W. Prescott, T. H. Barnhill and J. T. Butler was appointed to write an historical outline of the original organization of the Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, and that it appear annully in the minutes of the Central Conference.

On motion, the list of churches was called. (See statistical table.)

On motion, the directors of the Ayden Seminary were authorized to collect the pledges made during the last session of Conference for the support of the school and report the same through the paper.

On motion, the treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of the delegates sent to the other conferences.

On motion, J. T. Butler was instructed to sell the land on which Bolton's Grove church was built and turn the proceeds into the Central Conference.

One hour is given for dinner.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference re-assembled at 1:30.

On motion, the committee appointed at last conference to ascertain if Elder E. L. Sowers had departed from the faith, be released and J. T. Butler, E. Alexander and W. E. Spencer be appointed to act in its stead.

The committee appointed at last conference to settle the trouble between Eld. C. B. Jones and the church at Piney Grove, Beautort Co., made a report.

On motion, the report be received and the committee discharged.

On motion, George C. Vause, W. F. Hart, Exum Dail, W. J. Braxton and George W. Prescott, be elected Directors of the Ayden Seminary from the Central Conference.

The following delegates were appointed to the various conferences: Western—D. A. Windham. Eastern—George C. Vause. South Carolina—T. H. Barnhill. Ohio River Yearly Meeting—By Letter.

A letter from the Ohio River Yearly Meeting was read, and on motion, it appear in the minutes of this conference.

On motion, the Central Conference withdraw from the Triennial Conference.

A letter from Washington church, asking this body to assist in the erection of a church building was read.

On motion, George C. Vause, T. H. Barnhill and W. J. Braxton be a committee to visit Washington. N. C., to ascertain if the present location for the church building is favorable and if so, to report through the FREE WILL BAPTIST paper.

At 4 p. m. conference closed till to-morrow 9:30 a. m. Prayer by E. T. Phillips.

FRIDAY MORNING.

Conference re-assembled according to adjournment. Prayer by R. I. Corbett.

On motion, C. J. Harris be appointed a member of the Examining Board to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Eld. T. N. Manning.

On motion, we receive Oak Ridge church, Pitt county. W. J. Braxton was appointed treasurer pro-tem.

On motion, the finance committee retire, settle with the treasurer and he make his report.

Conference re-assembled at 1:30. The petitions for the next conference were heard. By a vote the next session will be held with the church at Hull Road, Greene county, N. C., beginning Wednesday before the 2nd Sunday in November, 1912. J. T. Butler was appointed to preach the introductory and L. L. Smith his alternate.

On motion the mission fund be applied to incidental expenses.

On motion, there be 1500 minutes printed and distributed as heretofore.

On motion, the clerk be paid \$12.00 for preparing the minutes.

On motion, a vote of thanks be extended to the church at Arthur and vicinity for their kindness and hospitality in entertaining the conference, and thanks to the Christian brethren for the use of their church for preaching service while we were engaged in the business of the conference in our church.

On motion, we extend a vote of thanks to the moderator for his efficient ruling during this session.

On motion, conference adjourn to meet with Hull Road church, on Wednesday before the 2nd Sunday in

November, 1912, at 11 a. m. Closing remarks and prayer by B. B. Deans.

On Temperance.—We, your committee on temperance beg leave to submit the following:

1st, We insist that total abstinence be required of all our members in the use of all alcoholic drinks as a beverage, that all who are known to tipple be under the censure of their church.

2. That we as a people forever stand by prohibition and that we help to enforce the law by aiding in the arrest and conviction of those guilty of violating prohibitory laws when milder measures cease to avail.

3. That we highly approve the measures being taken to stop the importation of liquors from wet into dry territory, and that we use all our influence upon the Congress of the United States in bringing about national prohibition, and in protecting sections already under prohibitory law.

4. That we look upon people who claim that prohibition is a failure as enemies to the righteous cause of temperance, either through ignorance or for an evil intent.

5. That we ask Christian people everywhere, both in town and in country sections to form law and order leagues for the suppression of vice in every form.

ON EDUCATION.—We your committee beg to submit the following:

1st. We recommend that every young man called to the ministry, be required to take advantage of a literary education as far as opportunity permits him.

2nd, We recommend that the pledge system for raising money for the Seminary be continued as we are in debt for the improvement of the School building and the erection of a dormitory.

3rd, We ask the Board of Directors to keep the matter of financial aid to our School at Ayden before our churches, by writing letters to each of them at least once a month, asking them to make collections from churches and individuals to secure sufficient funds to pay the tuition of the ministerial students and other expenses of the school.

Brief History of The Original Free Will Baptist Conference of North Carolina.

It was ordered by the Central Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, that a brief history of the organization be printed in the minutes to perserve the records for coming posterity.

About the year 1690 the churches which had been organized by Free Will Baptist ministers from London, England, met in Yearly Meetings or Associations and in 1752 the organization by a vote changed its name to the Original Free Will Baptist Conference of North Carolina.

In 1830 at Grimsley church, Greene county, the Conference was separated into two divisions for convenience and to discinguish the two, the Eastern was called the Shiloh Conference and the Western was called the Bethel Conference.

In 1847 the two Conferences united, (the Bethel Conference having grown weak) and assumed the former name: "Original Free Will Baptist Conference of North Carolina.

In 1886 at Black Jack, Pitt County it was decided to divide the Conference into two, on account of increased area and number of churches and the Western division was called the Western Conference and the Eastern division the Eastern Conference.

In 1885 at Gum Swamp church, Pitt County, the Eastern Conference was divided into two, the Eastern and Central Conferences because of the increased growth in area and number of churches.

The Central Conference is a continuation of the original organization in 1690 and should date back to the first organization.

Letter From the Ohio River Yearly Meeting.

First Kyger, Ohio, Aug. 15th, 1911.

The Ohio River Yearly Meeting, to the North Carolina Central Conference, Greeting:

Dear Brethren, the past year has been one of steady work and advancement. Most of our churches have been blest with a few additions, by conversion and baptism. One New church has been organized. Several meeting houses, notably, the one in the city of Grafton, West Virginia, have been repaired and made more attractive. Our session held here, which has just closed, was of very great interest. Six of our seven quarterly meetings were represented. Two corresponding messengers, one from the Christian connection, one from the Holiness church and Eld. Roy Ray and wife who are preparing for missionaries to Africa, were in attendance and took an active part in the services. The preaching, prayer and testimony meetings and Sabbath School recitations, were all of a high order and we believe did much good. We, to save expenses, appointed Thomas E. Peden, D. D., to bear this annual greeting to you. Please receive him in the Lord, as becometh saints and send one or more messengers to our next session, which, the Lord willing, will be held with the Third Alexander church, in Athens Co., Ohio, beginning Friday before the second Sunday in Aug., 1912, at 2 p. m. Eld. Samuel H. Norman, National Evangelist was with us and rendered valuable assistance. Our missionary to Golden Dale, in the state of Washington, failed to report but the last news from him indicated that the prospect was fair for soon organizing a church and commencing preaching in several other localities. It appears to us, and we trust to you that we ought, at once increase our Home and Foreign Mission contributions, so that our Board can plant a mission in each of the seven states in which we have no churches and in each of our island possessions and establish two or three more Foreign Missions either in Asia or or South America.

BIOGRAPHY OF ELD. T. N. MANNING.

By ELD. G. C. VAUSE.

Eld. T. N. Manning, son of Lenerton and Andrilla was born Feb. 16th, 1838, and died March 21, 1911.

He was converted and joined the church Sept., 1853 under the preaching of Billy Baker. as he was called. About the middle of the civil war he made a trip home to bring his dead brother. While at home he was given license by Eld. Henry Dixon, returned to service in the war with his license and Bible to begin a career which I will bearly speak of, as it is so well written by himself in the lives of the people of Eastern N. C. His first experience as a preacher was with the soldiers.

To say that Elder Manning was a man of ability and power is not too much. He knew that the crown is to them that believe the power of God and the wisdom of God.

Eld. Manning was in ill health nearly a year, but only confined to his room a few weeks. His wife, daughter of Robt. and Sarah Worthington, to whom he was married Oct. 28, 1869, preceded him to the glory land Sept. 5, 1907. His funeral was conducted by G. C. Vause in Winterville Free will Baptist church on the 5th Sunday in April. The service was a response to his own arrangement, having himself selected time, place, two songs, a text and the man to preach. His songs were, "Some day dear mother I shall moulder, but the hour I do not dread," and "On the happy golden shore where the faithful part no more. meet me there." His text was Acts 20:25, "And, now, behold, I know that ye all among whom I have gone preaching the kingdom of God shall see my face no more."

One has but to think of this text to see in it a true index to Eld. Manning's life. It meant much for a F. W. B. preacher to go in his day. It means much to preach the kingdom of God in any day. He has done both and now as his text says, we'll see his face no more in this world of conflict. He wanted to die. He shouted in the very jaws of death.

May God keep and direct the six children with the many friends of Eld. Manning until we meet on the happy golden shore.
