Mrs. H. L. Spivey gave a report of the orphanage committee and by a motion the report was adopted.

An offering was taken for the Orphanage amounting to two-hundred-seventy-five-dollars and fifty-seven-cents.

The local church gave a musical program which was enjoyed by all.

Rev. Rashie Kennedy delivered the convention sermon. His text was taken from Acts 1:8 "The Risen Christ Evangelizing the World Through His Church."

REPORT OF RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

I-Protest to President Truman's effort in sending a representative to the Vatican in Rome.

Since history bears testimony to the fact that the policies and practices of the Roman Catholic Church have furnished threats in the past to the political, economic, and religious safety and security of the nations, and is in nowise more amiable today, and since it is apparent that any move or gesture toward recognition of the authority of the Vatican on the part of our government encurages and aids the menacing position of that power against the liberties of our people, and the people of the nations of the world;

Therefore, be it resolved:

1—That the Central Conference of Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, now in session at Rose Hill Church, Pitt County, go on record as registering its protest against the appointment of General Mark Clark, or any other person, by the President of the United States as Ambassador to the Vatican, or in anywise as representative of this nation to the Roman Pope.

2-That a clear and fitting message of protest on behalf of this body be wired to Harry S. Truman, President of the United States, and one each to-

Congressman Bonner of this congressional district and Senator Smith of this senatorial district..

II-Temperance:

In as much as drunkenness is in a large degree responsible for immoral practices, and in as much as intemperance is not Christian practices, but against the teachings of the Bible when it says to be temperate in all things;

Therefore, be it resolved by this Conference now in session at Rose Hill, Pitt County, 1951:

- 1—That this Conference urge its members not to have any part in or be in any way aiding or abetting in the use or sale of alcoholic beverages, but rather use our support against such traffic.
- 2—That we urge said people to be temperate in all things both Spiritual and moral.
- 3—That this Conference request its ministers to deliver, occasionally, messages urging the people to live Godly in Christ Jesus and abstain from all conformity to said practices.
- 4—That this Conference urge all of its members to observe the Lord's day. That all members who open their places of business on the Lord's day be urged to keep it closed that day.

III-Resolution on Finance:

Whereas the former practices of the Free Will Baptists in regards to raising funds has been in conflict with the Bible plan of tithes and offerings,

Whereas these practices have in many cases been in conflict with the right policy that should be used in the local church as regards Bible Stewardship,

Whereas these practices have involved the local, state and national interprises and in many cases has made it embarrassing to the committees and boards who have charge of those interprises:

For example the orphanage has to send out little children.

The college has to send a quartet.

The Mission Board has to send out Itinerate workers.

Be it resolved that this Conference, in this session decide by the passing of this resolution to begin teaching and practicing the Bible plan of Stewardship.

Stewardship as it relates to time, talent, and possessions.

IV-Resolution of appreciation:

Resolve that this Conference give this church and community a rising vote of thanks for the generous and friendly way in which they have entertained this Conference.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL BOARD

We, your Educational Board, beg to report as follows:

During the year we have endeavored as much as circumstances would permit to keep before the people of the conference the cause of Christian Education, and encourage the churches to respond liberally to the appeals made from our College and other educational agencies of the denomination. The records at the College show that Central Conference churches have raised a reasonable amount for this worthy cause during the year, not as much as we would have liked to have seen raised, and not as much as we feel might have been raised, but an amount to do credit to the conference.

We are pleased to note that our pastors over the conference and other church leaders are awakening to the opportunity offered through conducting Bible institutes and Worker's Training Schools in the church to better educate the rank and file of our membership. A number of such institutes and schools have been conducted during this year, all, so far as we are able to learn, with success.

We commend this and urge that more of it be done. We also endorse the splendid work being done by our Sunday Schools and Woman's Auxiliaries through Daily Vacation Bible Schools to forward the Christian education of the children of the churches.

We desire to make the following recommendation to the conference, after careful consideration and prayer. We have in our Bible School at Nashville, Tennessee, at the present from this conference a fine young person who is preparing for foreign mission work with our denomination. This person is Miss Elsie Dunn. This fine girl has entered school by faith, believing that God has called her to be a missionary. We understand that she has no funds with which to pursue her education, and will be forced to leave school unless funds are provided. Her own church, believing firmly in her call, is contributing liberally to her support. We recommend that we do all that we can during the coming year to help this girl through school, by taking an offering during this sitting of the conference to apply on her school expenses, and by urging the churches to take offerings for her during the year, as they find it possible. In this way we will be "practicing what we preach" in missionary endeavor.

During the year we arranged a radio program presenting our College Male Quartet, which was such a success that the announcer in charge at the time said that it was as good a male quartet as he had ever put on the air. As a result of this program, the cause of our Bible College and Christian Education was given some most favorable publicity. We further recommend that our ministers throughout the conference use the radio as often as possible to further the education of our people, and to present to the public our denominational work. If you cannot get a thirty minute program, as we were able to do, use such time as you may secure to the best possible advantage.
