

The clerk officially opened the conference and presented the moderator.

REPORT OF MOUNT OLIVE COLLEGE November 4, 1964

Greetings:

We are happy to share with our friends in the Central Conference a

report on the progress and future plans of Mount Olive College. We are grateful to you for helping to make 1963-64 the most successful year in the history of the college. The Central led all other conferences in financial support. A report of the gifts received is listed by churches and is attached hereto.

Enrollment for the fall semester totaled 290 students from eight states and two foreign countries, for an increase of 61 over the fall of 1963.

A \$1 million development program on our new 90-acre campus is now underway. Contracts totaling \$815,00 have been awarded for an academic building designed to accommodate 350 students and a three-unit dormitory complex with rooming facilities for 132 students. The college has available in gifts and loans \$700,000 to apply on these contracts. The North Carolina State Convention has called upon Free Will Baptists to raise by June 30, 1965, the additional \$115,000 needed to complete these buildings.

This development program is the most aspiring undertaking in the history of our denomination. It is a challenge to greatness to which Free Will Baptists of North Carolina are responding with faith and dedication.

The general operating budget for the 1964-65 fiscal year totals \$298,830, and of this amount the Free Will Baptists of North Carolina are asked to contribute \$60,250. Individual church quotas for the general fund have been prepared and mailed. The successful operation of the college depends upon each church giving its fair share.

High school seniors should make their application now for admission to the fall semester in 1965. Mount Olive College is dedicated to providing opportunities in Christian higher education for the largest number of Free Will Baptist young people.

We ask our friends in the Central Conference to join hands with us to assure that no worthy student is denied the opportunity to achieve his highest intellectual and spiritual destiny.

CENTRAL CONFERENCE MISSIONS BOARD REPORT

Please accept our thanks for the splendid cooperation by the churches in our conference this year. It has been the greatest in our conference mission work.

Two years ago, only eleven churches contributed to our mission program with offerings of \$631.12. Last year there was \$3,136.49 given by 32 churches.

Since last conference, forty churches have given a sizeable increase in the amount of 7,071.96. This is 80% of all churches contributing.

Not only should we thank our churches for their fine cooperation, but we need to thank our state mission board for its assistance in a time of need. The auxiliaries, Sunday schools, layman's leagues, and individual members have consistently made offerings, for which we are grateful.

The members of the Weldon church and the Roanoke Rapids mission have labored untiringly to build and witness. Together with their pastors, the Rev. Vance Link and Missionary Noah Brown, we are spreading the cause of the Free Will Baptist missions in an area where very few knew anything about it. Our people move from this section of our state to these cities, and we feel that we should endeavor to establish churches in every town.

Last year you approved our report and recommendations, which can be found in the minutes beginning on Page 21. We have sincerely tried to carry out your recommendations. The results can be seen in two fine building programs which we believe you will be proud of when you see them. Also, a growing church at Weldon and growing prospects of a church soon at Roanoke Rapids.

We would like to recommend the following:

- 1. That each church continue to give as much or more support next year as they have this year.
- 2. That each church raise a special offering of \$50 or more to pay bills that are now due. This money is needed right away. Our treasurer will give the amount needed in his report.
- 3. That each church send a delegation for open house to be held soon, as soon as the metal building is erected.

Many of our individual members and organizations use the Church Finance Association, Inc., as a savings depository.

The solvency of this enterprise can be seen from the following financial condition of the Church Finance Association, Inc., as reflected by its annual report as of January 1, 1964:

REPORT OF THE FREE WILL BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

We thank you for the valuable support you gave this Children's Home last year. Our records show that during the year ending August 31, 1964, we received a total of \$24,842.78 from individuals, churches, and other organizations of your district. (This includes gifts from all sources and for all purposes and is the amount actually received in our office, but does not include funds that were en route at the close of year.) Forty-six of your churches were represented by these gifts.

In addition to the cash given by you during the year, many of you also remembered this Home with coupons, food, linens, clothing, visits, prayers, and in many other ways. All of these have been very helpful and are deeply appreciated.

We now have seventy-six children in our care. One other child has been approved for admission. Applications are pending for several children more than we will be able to care for.

The total number of children who have been admitted to this Home since it was opened on May 23, 1920, is now 526. Applications have been made for many others who were worthy, but for whom we had no room. We need to enlarge our facilities if we are to serve all those who look to us and are worthy.

Most of our plans for improvement and expansion for the next five years are incorporated in our Golden Anniversary Development Program which was adopted by our Board of Trustees on September 3, and endorsed by our State Convention in its recent session. We urge you to become familiar with this program and help to carry it out. The outline of this development program was published in The Free Will Baptist recently. Mimeographed copies are also available at this meeting. Anyone desiring further information is invited to visit, call, or write the superintendent.

We have distributed at this meeting a report of the gifts from this district during last year and a listing of the suggested quotas for the year 1964-1965.

We realize that, in some cases, the new quotas represent an increase over last year. However, these new quotas are based upon our needs for general operating funds, and to help reach the goals established in our *Golden Anniversary Development Program*. We hope to be able to carry out our development and expansion program without a special building fund campaign, the use of special building fund quotas, or the necessity of "going in debt."

Please try to reach your quota—so we can reach our goals.

REPORT OF THE ORDAINING COUNCIL

The first action of the council this year was the ordination and installation of Bill Futch at the conference in session at Friendship church.

On March 10, 1964, the council voted to permit Spring Branch church to license J. S. Humphrey; and on June 19, 1964, voted to permit Daniel's Chapel to license Danny Hooks.

On July 13, 1964, the council met to consider the situation existing in the Greenville Free Will Baptist Church, having been informed of this situation and requested by members of the church to take some action. The council instructed the clerk to write the Rev. Robert Crawford requesting a time of meeting which would be convenient to him. The clerk wrote to Mr. Crawford on August 13, 1964, but has not to this date received a reply to the letter. Since the letter was sent by registered mail, we are in receipt of the fact that Mr. Crawford received our communication on August 15, 1964. At a later meeting in September, the council decided by unanimous vote to publish in *The Free Will Baptist* the following letter:

"Be it known to all concerned that since the Rev. Robert Crawford is no longer a member of any church in good standing with the State Convention of Free Will Baptists, and because he has refused to meet with the ordaining council concerning the difficulties involving his pastorate in Greenville, he is held out of order and out of fellowship with the Central Conference until further action is taken either by the conference itself or Mr. Crawford himself." The ordaining council met on October 29 and examined for the gospel ministry the applicant from Hull Road church, Joe Barrow. After due examination, both written and oral, the council voted to recommend him to the conference for ordination in this session.

The ordaining council met for its last meeting of the year the first day of this session of the Central Conference when meeting with the Tarboro church. The Revs. Floyd B. Cherry, Willis Wilson, and Charles Sapp were the regular members present. The Rev. E. C. Morris was asked to sit with us during our deliberations. The council voted to recommend Dr. Burkette Raper, the Rev. E. C. Mooris, and the Rev. Fred Powers to the Cape Fear Conference for membership. The council voted to recommend to Watery Branch church that Edgar Benton be licensed to preach for one year. The council also voted to accept the recommendation of the State Convention regarding the ordination of ministers.

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CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

We, the Central Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist denomination of North Carolina, desiring to be in fellowship in a bond of union, do ordain this constitution.

NAME

This shall be the constitution of the Central Conference of the Original Free Will Baptist Churches of North Carolina.

PURPOSE

The object of the Central Conference shall be to promote Christ's Kingdom among men by means in strict conformity to the Holy Scriptures.

ARTICLE I. COMPOSITION

This Conference shall be composed of affiliated ordained ministers and churches within its bounds, who are in good standing, and of all general officers, and members of standing boards or committees of the Conference. It shall operate under the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original -Free Will Baptists of North Carolina. No church corporation whose articles of incorporation or constitution and bylaws conflict with the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina shall be permitted membership in the Central Conference.

ARTICLE II. REPRESENTATION

Each church shall represent with one delegate for each one hundred members or fraction thereof. The delegation from each church shall carry to the conference a letter certifying their appointment, and giving the statistics and financial condition of the church, together with a statement of all funds received and disbursed for denominational and benevolent purposes during the year.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS

The officers shall be a moderator, an assistant moderator, a clerk, an assistant clerk, and a treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years, entering upon the duties of said office at the close of the session in which they are elected.

ARTICLE IV. STANDING BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

It shall be the policy of this Conference to elect as many boards and committees as may be necessary in carrying out its program. These shall keep records of their proceedings and make a report at each annual session of the Conference.

A board of trustees, a board of ordination, a board of finance, and a board of missions, consisting of five members each, shall be elected. The term of office for members of these boards shall be five years but shall be adjusted to terminate the office of one member annually. A committee to represent the Conference's stock in the Free Will Baptist Press, a credentials committee, and an obituary committee, consisting of three members each, shall be elected. The term of office for members shall be three years but shall be so adjusted as to terminate the office of one member annually.

A committee of one shall be elected to serve as Conference Historian; the term of office shall be two years.

A committee of one shall be elected to serve as publicity committee; the term of office shall be two years.

The executive committee shall be composed of the moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, treasurer and one member elected by the Conference at the time of the official election of officers.

Temporary committees shall be appointed at the option of the Conference for whatever purpose may be deemed necessary.

ARTICLE V. FINANCE

Each church shall contribute to the Conference according to its membership.

ARTICLE VI. ADMISSION OF CHURCHES

Any properly organized church that gives evidence of adherence to the doctrines of Christianity as taught by Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina and desires to help promote the program and work of the Central Conference and the North Carolina State Convention, may present its petition to the regular session of the Conference. If the petition for membership is approved, the moderator shall extend the hand of fellowship to the delegates.

ARTICLE VII. DISMISSION OF CHURCHES

A church may be dismissed from membership in the Conference by vote of the Conference.

ARTICLE VIII. VISITORS

The Central Conference may extend to visiting brethren all the privileges of the body save that of voting.

ARTICLE IX. MEETINGS

The Central Conference shall meet in annual session on Wednesday and Thursday before the second Sunday in November of each year. The host church shall be selected by vote of the Conference in annual session or by the executive committee. The place of a future meeting thus selected may be changed by an act of the executive committee should such a change become necessary.

ARTICLE X. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Section 1. The duties of the moderator shall be to preside, according to accepted parliamentary procedure, over the sessions of the Central Conference; to appoint temporary committees, delegates and representatives; to serve as ex officio member of all standing boards and committees; and in general to perform the duties of the office of moderator.

Section 2. The duties of the assistant moderator shall be the duties of the moderator when that officer is not present and he shall assist the moderator when called upon. In the event of the resignation or death of the moderator, the assistant moderator shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the Conference.

Section 3. The clerk shall record and preserve a permanent record of the proceedings of all sessions of the Central Conference. He shall prepare and cause to be published the minutes of the annual sessions of the Conference, hold in trust all documents not otherwise preserved, and surrender same at the direction of the Conference. He shall conduct the official correspondence and sign such documents and instruments as require his signature.

Section 4. The duties of the assistant clerk shall be the duties of the clerk when that officer is not present, and he shall assist the clerk when called upon. In the event of the resignation or death of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the Conference.

Section 5. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Conference, except that held by other boards and committees of the Conference. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and paid out and make an annual report accordingly to the Conference.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to transact the business of the Conference when the Conference is not in session. The executive committee shall plan the program for the annual session of the Conference.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the board of trustees to hold in trust title to all tangible property belonging to the Conference. It shall have power to convey such property when authorized by the Conference.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the board of ordination to examine, ordain, and discipline ministers in keeping with the provisions of the Statement of Faith and Discipline for Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina along with whatever additional requirements may be made by the Conference. The board of ordination shall examine ordained ministers seeking membership in this Conference and make recommendations in keeping with their findings.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the board of finance to check and verify all money to be received by the treasurer; they shall make recommended allocations and report same to the Conference.

Section 10. It shall be the duty of the board of missions to cooperate with the churches and the Conference in furthering the establishment of churches within the bounds of the Conference. The mission board shall endeavor through cooperating with the State Board of Missions to raise money, arrange itineraries, and keep the work of missions before our churches. Section 11. It shall be the duty of the committee to represent the Conference's stock in the Free Will Baptist Press to do so at any stockholders' meeting.

Section 12. It shall be the duty of the credentials committee to check each church report for verification as to their delegates and make recommendations to the Conference as regarding their seat during the annual session. The credentials committee shall check registration cards, of the enrolling minister and make recommendations of same to the Conference.

Section 13. It shall be the duty of the obituary committee to prepare suitable memorial services for all ministers who die during the year preceding the Conference and to present to the Conference a suitable obituary for publication in the Conference minutes and in *The Free Will Baptist*. Copies of the obituary are to be presented to the family of the deceased and to his local church.

Section 14. It shall be the duty of the Conference historian to collect and preserve any historical data concerning the Conference.

Section 15. It shall be the duty of the publicity committee to see that proper publicity is given to the activities and work of the Conference.

BYLAWS

Section 1. A board or committee will be recognized as having a quorum when there is a majority of the members present for a meeting, providing all the members of said board or committee have been duly notified concerning the said meeting.

Section 2. All reports, resolutions, and recommendations shall be considered properly presented to the Conference in written form only.

Section 3. Each minister and delegate in good standing shall duly attend each day while the Conference is in session or be subject to censure by the Conference and reported to his local church.

Section 4. If any member, in the judgment of the Conference, shall show anger in his discussion on any subject, he shall forfeit his seat in that session.

Section 5. No member shall be excused from any session of the Conference without leave of the moderator.

Section 6. The Conference shall adjourn by a majority vote.

Section 7. Each officer and member of standing committees and boards in good standing shall be entitled to a seat and vote in the Conference.

Section 8. The Conference shall open and close with suitable devotional services.

Section 9. The minutes of the Conference shall be signed by the moderator and clerk.

Section 10. This constitution and its bylaws may be altered or amended by a two-thirds favorable vote of the members present, provided that said amendment shall be presented on the first day of the annual session for action on the following day.

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
