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Minutes of the Central Illinois Yearly Meeting of Free Baptist.

The Central Illinois Yearly Meeting of Free Baptist met with Johnston City. Illinois, Church, at 8:00 o'clock A. M., October 1st, 1915. Called to order by the standing clerk, Rev. G. A. Gordon. Prayer by Rev. George Elkins, after which Rev. J. L. Franklin was chosen moderator, Rev. J. H. Blythe assistant moderator and Rev. Edwin Settle assistant clerk.

Letters called for and read from Looney Springs and Makanda Quarterly Meetings, also a letter from Palestine Church of the Franklin County Quarterly Meeting, that Quarterly Meeting having

AFTERNOON SESSION-1:30 O'ULOCK P. M.

Met and opened by singing and prayer by Rev. J. W. J. Wells. Roll called, and forty present. Minutes of morning session read.

TEMPERANCE—Whereas, the use of intoxicating liquors is filling our almshouses, penitentiaries, jails and insane asylums, robbing women and children of bread, breeding an army of idlers, and that nine-tenths of the crime of the country is attributed to the drink habit, whether gotten from licensed saloons or blind pigs. Therefore, be it resolved. That the Central Illinois Yearly Meeting go on record as being opposed to the manufacture and sale and use of intoxicants in any form whatever, and wish to pledge our moral and financial support to the W. C. T. U., the Anti-Saloon League and all kindred organizations which have for their purpose the overthrow of the liquor traffic. Adopted.

The committee of seven who were appointed at our last Yearly Meeting on union, and who met in joint session at Benton, Illinois, last October with a like number from the Baptist, reported as follows:

We, your committee, would report that we attended the meeting of the Southern Illinois Baptist Association at Benton, Illinois, as requested. Said association appointed a similar committee of seven, and said joint committee submitted a joint report to said association then assembled, which was adopted. See minutes of Southern Illinois Baptist Association of October, 1914, beginning on page two and continuing to middle of page three. In which it was agreed that all churches whether formerly Free Baptist or Missionary Baptist should become members of the Southern Illinois Baptist Association upon equal footing, and to be known henceforth as Baptist. Said report was signed by all the committee except J. H. Bagwill, who had moved north, and upon a vote was approved and adopted.

Mrs. West of Tamaroa presented her book, "Christ Crucified on Wednesday and not on Friday," and explained why she wrote it, and

sold a number.

Resolved, that when this session of the Central Illinois Yearly Meeting adjourns, it will adjourn subject to the call of the Board of Trustees. Adopted. FRED COMBER.

Resolved, that the present Home Mission Board be retained at

least for one year. Adopted.

Voted that J. H. Blythe be re-elected on the Examining Board

for the remainder of this session.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS—Whereas, the Sunday School is largely an important factor in the success of the church and in the salvation of souls, be it therefore, Resolved, that we insist on a more general interest, and a more vigorous effort on the part of old as well as young in behalf of this noble work. And to this end we suggest a general canvas of the respective communities in behalf of securing the attendance of all children as well as older persons in this work. Adopted.

FOREIGN MISSIONS—Whereas, the union of Baptist and Free Baptist contributions that add largely to the chances for success of Our Foreign Mission Field, and whereas there seems to be a great falling off in our contributions; Therefore, Resolved, that instead of slackening our hands in this work, we urge our churches to a more general interest, and that this Yearly Meeting session if possible bring to bear means to a more general effort than ever before in all our churches; Resolved. That we consider the preachers or pastors of the respective churches largely responsible for any failure that may occur. Adopted.

DENOMINATION—Whereas, Free Baptist have in the past been forward in progressive moves for forwarding the Kingdom of God on earth, such as anti-slavery and temperance, we rejoice in our day our body has been given the opportunity of taking a forward step in the matter of Christian union. Our merging with the larger Baptist body, as represented by the Northern Baptist Convention, implies the advance of liberal Baptist sentiment. The recent published report of Dr. Anthony, corresponding secretary of our General Conference, while it has no flaming statistics, shows a very gratifying progress of heart-touching and Christ-honoring service between the larger Baptist body and our own. Your committee recommends that since the action of the committee appointed last year to confer

with a like committee of the Southern Illinois Baptist Association has been ratified, steps be taken to discontinue holding our Yearly Meeting as a separate meeting from the Southern Illinois Baptist Association, but that we preserve our legal organization through our Board of Trustees. Chase, and was much enjoyed and appreciated by all. When he had finished we sang, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," and extended the hand to Bro. Chase, who responded in a few well chosen remarks. As a further expression of appreciation we voted Bro. Chase \$5.00 which the clerk was ordered to pay him.

Bro. A. A. Lipe was introduced to the meeting.

The clerk was ordered to print 1000 copies of the minutes of this meeting and distribute same to the churches.

R. E. Williamson was elected treasurer to succeed himself.

Rev. Arthur E. Cox presented his pamphiet, "Open Communion," to the meeting, and gave each minister present a copy.

On motion Miss Crawford, a returned missionary to the American Indians, was asked to speak to the meeting at 2:00 P. M. Saturday.

Bro. Wells asked to be excused from further attendance at this session.

Adjourned to 1:30 P. M.

CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION.

Resolved, That Article Six of the Constitution of the Central Illinois Yearly Meeting of Freewill Baptist be changed so as to read: The sessions of this body shall be held at the same time and place of Southern Illinois Baptist Association, and further that its membership shall consist of a Board of Trustees, seven in number as provided in its charter, who shall be members of churches within the membership of the Southern Illinois Baptist Association." Adopted.

Rev. G. A. Gordon was re-elected state agent.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY—Whereas, there is a class of ignorant, dissipated, undesirable immigrants landed on our shores every year, whose morals are as reprehensible as their religion and who continue the practice of both upon their arrival here. Now we are unalterably opposed to such acquisitions to our citizenship. We also disapprove of monopolies, strikes, boycotts, saloons, Sabbath desecration, easy divorce laws and other evils that threaten our national peace and prosperity. We deplore the class of statesmanship that has precipitated nearly all of Europe and Old Mexico into a needless, unrelenting, cruel war. We congratulate our own country that it is in peace with all the nations of the earth, and with gratitude to Almighty God, lift our voices in commendation of the diplomatic genius of the men who are at the head of our government, and who have so successfully steered the ship of state over the threatened breakers of the past three stormy years. Adopted.
