PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday Evening July 29, 1975

The worship service opened with the congregation singing "Oh, There's Sunshine," led by Glenna Stackhouse, with Iris Jones at the piano.

Following preliminary remarks, concerning the next day's business, an offering, amounting to \$31.35, was taken to help defray

Brother Fidell Bridges, speaker of the evening, was called to the stand to conduct the service. Preceding the preaching, he presented several from his church, who entertained with singing and musical numbers.

Wednesday Morning Worship, 11:00 A. M.

Worship began with congregational singing of "Amazing Grace,"

and "At Calvary," led by Roger Phillips, with Pat Pitts at the piano. Juanita Smith led in prayer, after which "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder," and "The Kingdom Is Coming" were sung.

Sister Pat Pitts sang a beautiful number "I Won't Have to Worry Any More." and Brother Thayne Fast led in prayer.

The message was brought by Brother Hollis Walker, jr., who took his text from Acts 2 and 1 Thess. 4. The subject of his message was the abundant entrance the Christian can expect, because Jesus is living and providing the needed sustenance for our growth, that we may have overcoming grace. The Christian has access to an unlimited supply of effectual, energizing power to promote to high spiritual plateaus.

An offering, amounting to \$25.65 was taken for association expenses. John Grider pronounced the benediction, and asked a blessing on the noon meal at the dismissal for the noon hour.

Ministers Conference, Wednesday, 1:30 P. M., July 30, 1975

The Assistant Moderator, Brother Bob Dickey, took charge, as the Ministers Conference program began. Becky York led the congregation in singing "Showers of Blessings," with Ramona York at the piano.

"The Trial of Jesus" was the subject dealt with in the conference, with different ministers discussing the different aspects of the trial and conviction.

Brother Thayne Fast dealt with the false accusation, with its injustices, as His enemies contrived to have Him crucified, as it relates to us, as the recipients of His victorious death in our stead.

Brother Corky Walker discussed the necessity of Christ's substitutionary death that man might have redemption from the inherited Adamic nature, which all humanity is possessed with.

At this time Sisters Ramona and Becky York brought some very beautiful, and inspiring songs, "Give Us Barabus," "Find No Fault in Him," and "Should Have Been Crucified."

Brother Steve Burton read from Scripture, and brought some facts that Christ's death was the fulfillment, in every phase, of what had been prophesied so many years before.

Brother Steve Lytle spoke on the accomplishments of Christ's

Sunday School and C. T. S. Wednesday Afternoon, 3:00 P. M.

Brother Steve Burton took charge for the sessions on Sunday School and C. T. S. work. Becky York led the congregation in singing "Blessed Assurance," with Ramona York at the piano. Brother Charlie Hoover led in prayer and afer some remarks concerning the work the special speakers, Steve and Judy Lytle, Missionary interns preparing to go to Panama, were introduced.

Sister Judy brought real interesting and inspiring thoughts, and advice on the importance of maintaining a live spiritual training program, in both the Sunday School and C. T. S. She brought out the fact that it is imperative that we maintain a high level of teaching and training in the local church, if we are to be able to provide the qualified leadership necessary to go out and evangelize the unchurched here at home, and reach out to "the uttermost parts."

She brought out the fact that there are just as evident symptoms present to herald the condition of "sick" Sunday School or C. T. S. as here are to diagnose a terminal disease. Some of the symptoms being unprepared teachers, disinterested students, part-time attendance, people attending either the Sunday School or the worship, but not both.

As a remedy they suggested some necessary prerequisites to a good training program. Some of these being: Teachers maintaining enthusiasm, through extensive preparation, being concerned about the lost, involving all persons in activity of a spiritual nature, and use of teaching aids-visual and otherwise-which would create an interest among students.

Wednesday Evening Worship Service, 8:00 P. M., July 30, 1975

The Moderator called the meeting together for worship, and Becky York led the congregation in singing "Standing on the Promises of God," and "Beulah Land," with Ramona York playing the piano.

Some beautiful numbers in song were brought at this time, as Sisters Ramona and Becky York sang "Skipping on the Clouds," and "Touring the City;" and Sister Pat Pitts sang "Death Cannot Hold Our King.

Moderator turned the service to the visiting Missionary Interns, Rev. and Mrs. Steve Lytle, who are expecting to serve God, as our representatives in Panama, Central America.

These young people are very dedicated to the Lord's work, and spoke enthusiastically, under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, of their urge to get to the mission field, and down to the business of winning souls.

Judy used Acts 4:12, as a basis for her message concerning the compelling force of the love of God, in motivating His people, and thrusting them out to the "regions beyond." She spoke briefly of her experience, as a summer missionary in Panama, and looked with

great anticipation to returning there as a permanent missionary.

From Matt. 28:16, Brother Lytle brought a soul-inspiring message on the compelling love of God, and spoke with much fervor of his desire to fulfill what he feels is God's will for him life—to be an

ambassador of his King, out in a lost world.

His words were full of power, and the unction of the Spirit, and a great challenge to the hearts of all of us, as he impressed everyone that it is imperitive that we live consecrated lives if we are to be the

witnesses He intended us to be, in reconciling the world to God. By way of comparison, he likened the child of God to the Ambassador of a country—both are citizens of a country, and go out to represent the policies of his country, in a foreign land. Just as an ambassador represents the policies of his country to foreign governments, the Christian is a citizen of God's Kingdom, carrying the policies of God into the Kingdom of this world.

The compelling force to thrust the child of God out is the direct call of God, and his feeling of obligation, being a sinner saved by

grace, should provide the impetus necessary.

To satisfy God all Christians are called on to make some necessary committments. These are—pray, give, send and go. The "going" he qualified by saying that as God does not call everyone to leave and go to foreign lands, He calls them to go by sending some others in their place.

As "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" was sung, an invitation was given for total committment. An offering of \$167.50 was taken for

the Lytles, as a conclusion of the service.

Article 1—Name and Composition.—This organization shall be known as the Central Western Missouri Association of Free Will Bap-

tists, and shall be composed of such consistent, well-regulated Free Will Baptist churches as shall from time to time unite with the organization and agree to this constitution.

Article 2—Purpose.—The purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various churches of which it is composed, together with all ordained deacons, ordained or licensed ministers and their companions who are members in good standing with the Free Will Baptist church and the church clerks of the churches in this Association, and one delegate from each church represented in a Quarterly Meeting from the Central Western Missouri Association.

Section 2.—A resident member shall be one in good standing who, if able, discharges his or her obligations to the church. All other members shall be considered non-resident.

Article 4—Discipline.—Should a grievance arise which cannot be properly and satisfactorily settled in the local church, a request may be made to the Association that a council be appointed to advise or arbitrate; the decision of that council to be accepted as final.

Article 5—Officers.—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, an Assistant Moderator, a Clerk, an Assistant Clerk, a Treasurer, and a Statistician; all said officers shall be elected annually at the regular session of the Association; and shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

Article 6—Boards.—This Association shall elect a Board of five members of which two shall be ministers, to be elected as follows: The first named for a period of one year, the second for a term of two years, and the fifth for a term of five years. After the first election one member shall be elected each year for a term of five years or until his successor is elected. This Board shall be called the Home Mission and Executive Board of the Central Western Missouri Association, shall act as Trustee of any property of the Association, and shall be the examining council of the Association.

Article 7—Meetings.—This Association shall meet annually on Tuesday night following the 4th Sunday in July, and it shall be the duty of the churches composing it to represent themselves by letter and delegate.

Article 8—Program.—It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to plan and carry out the program of the Association.

Article 9—Amendments.—This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided notice of proposed alteration or amendments has been given to the church clerks of the member churches by the Executive Board 30 days prior to Association meeting.

BY-LAWS

Article 1.—Each annual session of this Association shall be called to order by the Clerk or the Assistant Clerk, or in his or her absence the standing member having seniority in years of service. After the clerk or the one calling the assembly to order shall declare a quorum he or she shall call the Moderator to the chair, or in his or her absence the standing member having seniority in years of service.

Article 2.—Each session of this Association shall be open and closed with prayer.

Article 3.-Delegates equal in number to the number of active

churches and representing at least a simple majority of active churches shall constitute a quorum to transact business for the Association, but any less number shall adjourn.

Article 4.—Regular Parliamentary procedure as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall be followed. The method of voting shall be determined by the Moderator unless one-third of the voters present dissent. No one shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes nor more than twice on the same subject without the consent of the Conference.

Article 5—Section 1.—The first item of business of the Association shall be to receive the church letters and seat the delegates. However, business shall not be suspended to wait for late or delayed letters. Such letters shall be received upon their arrival and their delegates seated.

Section 2—Item 1.—The election of the officers of this Association shall be held at the closing business session of the regular session of the Association. They shall hold office until their successors are elected.

Section 2—Item 2.—The Clerk-Treasurer shall supervise the printing of the minutes for the year of which they were Clerk-Treasurer.

Section 3.—The second item of business of the Association shall be the report of the Executive Board.

Article 6.—All committees or a Committee on Committees shall be appointed by the Moderator.

Article 7.—It shall be the right of each church of the Association to determine its own pastoral year. We urge that each church have its business year end on June 30th.

Article 8.—A committee of five lay members, qualified delegates to the Association, shall be chosen to look into the standing of the ministry of the Association and shall report to the Association for approval before adjournment.

Article 9—Section 1.—It shall be the duty of the churches of the Association to accompany their church letter with five dollars (\$5.00) per church plus fifty cents (50c) per resident member for the Central Western Missouri Association fund to be allocated thus: 15 per cent for honorarium for Associational Clerk, and 85 per cent for the Central Western Missouri Associational expense.

Section 2.—The Associational Clerk is to reimburse our general board member from this Association to the State Association for gas, lodging and food per receipts.

Article 10—Section 1.—No one shall be ordained to the ministry in the Association until they have carried a license two years, or should they be called to pastor a church they may be ordained in one year.

Section 2.—Examination for ordination to the ministry may be carried out at the regular session of the Association, or as otherwise directed by the Association. Examination for license or for ordination (both ministers and deacons) to be done at a time and place agreeable to both candidates and examining council. Ordination may be carried out in the local church (if desired) subsequent to examination and favorable action of the examining council.

Article 11.-No one shall be licensed or ordained in this Associa-

tion who is a user of tobacco, alcohol, or who cannot qualify according to I Timothy 3:1-12 and Titus 1:6-9.

Article 12—Section 1.—It shall be required of the ministry of this Association to adhere to sound doctrine in both preaching and practice as embraced in our Treatise of Faith and Practice. It shall further be the duty of the active ministries to report each year by letter and at least once in three years in person. Ministers in the Armed Forces shall not be required to report in person during their term of service. All ministers meeting these requirements shall be granted a Certificate of Ministerial Standing when and if approved by the appointed Committee on Ministerial Standing.

Section 2.—All aged or afflicted ministers, who so desire, may be enrolled on the superannuated list, not being required to report to

the Association in order to have a Certificate.

Article 13.—These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, providing that a notice of proposed change has been given to the church clerks of the member churches by the Executive Board 30 days prior to the Association meeting.

CHURCH CONVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Jesus Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to provide things honest in the sight of all men.

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to study of the Scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able, promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief busmess in life to extend the influences of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will

be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of education and denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
