This ought not to be the case any longer.

There are not many churches but what could make the necessary financial arrangements to assure the pastor that he would not have to sacrifice in order to attend the

(2) If this has not been done, a sum could be voted out of the church treasury.

(3) Some individual in the church could take it upon himself to raise enough among the members to pay the pastor's expenses.

Above all, do not wait until the pastor himself has to mention it. Make his heart glad by taking care of it yourself. The church will receive the ultimate benefit after all, for the pastor will come back from the convention a better minister.

DON'T DEFEAT THE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Plan of Support continues to gain favor throughout the denomination as the simplest channel of support for all of the denomination's agencies. The suggestion that the churches give at least ten per cent of their budget to outside causes is seen as being reasonable and equitable.

The states like the plan of channeling the money from the local churches through the state offices because this provides them a record of giving and also helps supply funds for the state budget. Probably the state organizations benefit more definitely from this plan than anyone else.

There is a danger, however, that the districts and states might take advantage of the very plan which is meant to help them. Some districts have set up programs of their own and ask the churches to send their Cooperative money through the district office. Here a percentage is retained (sometimes much larger than is equitable) before the money is sent to the state office. We feel that in most every case the budget of a district would not be so large but what it could be met outside the cooperative budget without having to take from the funds. Should this not be true in an instance or two, the district should be very careful to keep only a small percentage that would be in the proper ratio with the much larger state and world-wide needs.

The same thing holds true for the state organization. If the states are not careful in their allocations to see that the world ministry of the denomination gets an amount large enough to meet its needs through the cooperative budget, they will be defeating the very program which is designed to give financial help to the states. As the very name implies, this must be a *cooperating* effort.

Where Is Revival?

Someone has said that the word "revival" is one of the most misused words in the vocabulary of the Christian. We hear about it and read about it from churches on every hand. One church may have one revival meeting a year, another two or more. There are cooperative revivals, citywide revivals, revival crusades and others by other names and for every genuine effort put forth on behalf of Christ, I am deeply grateful. Daily I pray for these meetings and for revival, but where is the revival?

A revival to some means one thing and to others another thing. Perhaps we could answer the question if we could agree on our definition of revival.

Surely a revival is a time of testing; a testing of the Word of God, of God's Holy Spirit, of the Lord Jesus Christ. Does the Bible mean what it says? Is it the infallible Word of God? Does it work in this modern twentieth century? Is the Holy Spirit still in the world? Does He still convict and convert sinners and make real to them the power of God through the Lord Jesus Christ? Is it possible to tap the resources of heaven for our daily needs through prayer which desperately needs an answer?

Time of Testing

A revival is a time of the testing of the people of God, of believers, of the bloodwashed ones, of the church. Charles G. Finney tells in his autobiography of having not come to the Lord for salvation until he was almost thirty years of age. He regularly attended church, took part in the church activities, sang in the choir and yet did not come to know Christ until he was almost through his twenties.

On one occasion at prayer service he tells of having refused to allow the church to pray for him because he told them, "Your prayers do not accomplish anything. I have seen you again and again pray for revival. It has not come. I have heard you pray often for an infilling of the Holy Spirit. Nothing happens, so why should I allow you to pray for me?"

This is an awful indictment but it is just as true today. Preceding revivals we have cottage prayer meetings, we meet before service time each evening to pray for revival, we have prayer conferences, we spend hours on study courses on prayer, yet there is actually so little fire from heaven. Something is terribly wrong when a great man of God can make the statement that in his opinion ". . . at least eighty-five per cent of America's church members are lost."

Another states that according to the way men live "... no more than one third of our nation's church members have experienced regeneration."

Members Are Great Potential

I think from statements such as these and from observing conditions as they exist, you would have to agree with me that the greatest revival and evangelistic potential is the membership of our churches.

We, as individual Christians, must undergo testing as we examine ourselves to see if we are denying ourselves, taking up our crosses daily, allowing the Spirit of God to lead, guide and direct our every move. Do we take time daily to meditate and think on things eternal? Do we have a passion for the lost? Are we willing to spend and be spent for Christ and eternity? Are we living so as to hear Christ say to us, "Well done."

The pastor and the evangelist will certainly undergo a time of testing during a revival. If the shepherds of the flock, the Sermon of the Month

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
"Wilt thou not revive us again: that thy people may rejoice in thee?" (Psalm 85:6)

spiritual leaders, are in a right relationship with God, there will be souls who arc blessed and a touch of revival, at least, will come. But if we see no moving of the Holy Spirit among the members of the church, we are too prone to pass the buck and blame each other. The pastor says the evangelist just wasn't the right man; the evangelist says the pastor did not make the right preparation.

What about Sinner?

But what about the sinner; what part does he play in having a revival? None, whatsoever. The sinner is lost, under the condemnation of eternal separation from God and has nothing to do with revival until he has been made alive through faith in Jesus Christ. But when the church is right, the pastor, the evangelist and the Christians are yielded to God and filled with the Holy Spirit, then the sinner will be convicted and converted and brought into fellowship with God and man.

Why Distribute the Scriptures?

In a meeting of this nature, where we face the situation and the program of an important agency of the churches, it is always well to be clearly conscious of the basic motives that underlie all that is done. Why do we, why should we distribute the Scriptures?

The teacher of English literature would say: "There are thousands of allusions in English literature which cannot be understood without knowledge of the Bible. Indeed the Bible itself is a literary work of large importance. No cultured person should miss the Bible." The historian would say: "For such ground as it covers, it is an important historical record and gives the common man some sense of historical perspective." The moralist would say: "It holds up valuable standards of conduct and ideals that the social order greatly needs." The bigot would say: "Distribute the Bible because it proves everybody is wrong but me."

Ministry to Lives

But the question is not asked of these distinguished citizens, it is asked of us. I think our answer must be—like so many points in sermons!—three-fold.

First—we distribute the Bible because of its ministry to the lives of individual men and women. A debauched young man in Milan reads it and becomes St. Augustine.

A medieval monk finds in it the teaching that can overcome the corruption of his Church, and with it creates a new epoch in history.

A precise little scholar, struggling with his unsatisfied soul, hears a passage sung, a commentary upon it read, feels his heart strangely warmed, and pours his life into the labors that reform a nation and alter the character of millions.

A Chinese general, injured in a coup d'etat and deeply discouraged, asks for a Bible, and his wife reads him the Psalms to bring him peace.

A Belgian parachutist, caught and flung into prison, finds himself alone, disheartened, and facing death. The secret tapping on the pipes brings him a message; a Bible is secretly passed to him; he reads and learns; and before the cell door opens to the guards who take him to the firing squad, he signals to his unseen friend, "I am going to life!"

Constant as the Sun

An American business man, held a political prisoner in silent, solitary con-

finement in Communist Hungary, finds in the Bible inexpressible solace and strength.

Another, a jailed missionary, on the other side of the world in China, devotes his long hours to study of the Bible.

These instances of the ministry of the Bible to individual men and women are dramatic flashes out of the growing influence of the Bible upon millions and millions of people. Not always so dramatic, but as constant as the sun, their daily contact with the Bible warms, illuminates, purifies, and guides vast numbers of people. It is our faith that it can do this for every man.

That is why we distribute the Bible.

Essential to Evangelism

The second reason why we must distribute the Bible is because it is indispensable to the Christian Church. The first duty of the Christian Church is evangelism by which men and women are brought into the Christian community. Though some modern methods of evangelism overlook the great value of the Bible as an instrument of evangelism, Dr. Chirgwin's book, *The Bible in World Evangelism*, gives us indisputable evidence of the essential relationship of the Bible to the Church's first duty.

The successful evangelist, the successful missionary, must have the Book near his hand or in it. In Formosa in 1941 there were but two baptized persons and some Bibles among the aborigines. In 1946 when the missionaries returned after the war, there were four thousand persons in the Christian community, and churches were being built.

The Bible not only brings men into the Christian community; it is the central element in their instruction in the Christian faith and the Christian life. It holds this place in the education of children and youth; it holds it in the training of new members; it is central in the training of new ministers for the churches.

Strengthens the Church

The Bible not only brings men and women into the church and is the central element in the instruction of the church; it constantly strengthens and upbuilds the church. Can one imagine the worship of the church, and indeed the worship of the family, and the devotions of the individual without the contribution of the Bible?

The Bible is also both the inspiration

and the stabilizer of Christian thought. Great intellectual movements in the Church's life owe their origin to a deeper insight into truth caught from the pages of the Bible. How far, indeed how wildly, might the pendulum of Christian thought have swung under the pressures of ultraradical and ultra-conservative were it not that the Bible is always pulling them back to the central truths that it sets forth! Thus, the Bible constantly makes for the inspiration and the reform of the Church, as is apparent to readers of current theological literature.

Finally, the Bible not only brings men into the church and nurtures and inspires them there; it binds them together there. This company is a witness to that! It is the constant experience of the Bible Societies that Christian groups which can be drawn together by no other cause can be drawn together about the Bible Societies and their work.

Brings Christians Together

Nay more, in the words of a Christian theologian, "By universal consent of all Protestant bodies, the Scriptures are the one ultimate standard of faith and practice. Here we are on bedrock. The Bible is the very core of the Christian life for all Protestant Christians."

For this reason also, then, we must distribute the Scriptures. Every church must have adequate supplies of the Bible and make effective use of them. No economic barrier must stand in the way—younger churches in the African bush or the Indian village, older churches in city and town and tenement and countryside must have the Bible.

The third reason why we must distribute the Bible lies in the desperate need of the world. Men are shaken today by the extent of the world's upheaval. A score of new nations are "crowding to be born." "Up from the shadowed land the murmur swells Of broken hearts, of discontent, of strife, Of faith perverted, quickened hope—it tells The multitudes have felt the surge of life."

And as if this were not enough, there hangs over us the bitter division between the free world and the totalitarian world and the appearance at man's hand of destructive forces able to ruin a nation in a night!

Must Be Everyman's Book

No program anyone can conceive can prevent profound disaster to the human race except as each man possesses in himself the powers of self-discipline, the spirit of compassion, and ideals of human service which the Bible makes it possible for him to have. The Bible must be everyman's Book that all men may be free.

These, then, are the reasons why we must

distribute the Scriptures—because they minister to men's needs; because they enlarge, strengthen, instruct, enrich, reform, and unite the Church; because in them lies mankind's hope of righteousness, peace, and freedom. But all this was said in just 26 words nineteen hundred years ago-

"These are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing ye might have life through His name." This is why we must distribute the Bible. AN APOLOGY

Report of the American Bible Society for 1955

The American Bible Society has been set apart but must never be set aside. It belongs to your church, and at the same time it belongs to more than 54 other denominations.

Translations in 55 languages were examined in 1955; 18 new translations were printed; 14 are in the printers' hands; 20 translations or revisions of Testaments or whole Bibles are in process. The new Spanish Revised (Valera) Bible is now in the hands of the printers. (All or part of the Bible has now been translated into 1,084 different languages and dialects.)

Headquarters Publication will reach an estimated 14,500,000 copies in 1956, including 692,000 Bibles, over one million Testaments, and over 12¹/₂ million Bible portions. A notable production in 1955 was "The Good News," the illustrated New Testament with over 500 photographs. This new book is receiving wide acclaim.

Distribution in the United States continues at a very high level. The Society has for many years worked closely with home mission boards, supplying them with inexpensive Scriptures for Indian work, migrant work, and other special groups. Scriptures are distributed in the United States in some 85 languages. The Navaho New Testament will be available in 1956.

Scriptures for Service Personnel represents the largest single item in the national distribution budget. Chaplains requested and received more than $1\frac{1}{3}$ million Scripture volumes for free distribution in 1955. The cost was over \$220,000. Only \$125,000 for this need could be included in the 1956 budget; \$100,000 more is necessary.

Distribution Abroad

Europe: The Bible Societies have been at work for 150 years distributing Scriptures on the continent of Europe. There are 11 national Bible Societies with whom we cooperate in Europe.

Last year 150 tons of paper were sent to *East Germany* where Bibles, Testaments, and illustrated Gospels were manufactured and distributed. Fifty tons of paper were sent to *Hungary*. Twenty thousand refugees per month are still pouring inteo West Germany. Each refugee, who wants one, is given a Bible or Testament in his own language. Additional work is being done in *Denmark*, *Belgium*, and *France*. Mats and reproduction copies were furnished to church leaders in *Russia* for Bible publication.

The Middle East: From the Aegean Sea to the headwaters of the Nile the American Bible Society distributes Scriptures in 34 languages. This is accomplished through sales (at below cost) across the counter of its offices in every capital in the Middle East, and through its faithful colporteurs who move up and down the Bible Lands. Circulation in *Iraq* increased almost 100% in 1955. Poverty of the masses required large subsidies to keep selling prices within reach of the average countryman.

Latin America: The distribution of over 3¹/₂ million volumes in Latin America accounts for over half the Society's total distribution abroad. Scores of churches in Argentina are each distributing 5,000 volumes annually. Two and a half million volumes in Brazil do not fill the annual demand. In Mexico and the West Indies the total annual circulation has almost reached the one million mark.

Asia: A great new factor in Asia is literacy. It is estimated that ten million people a year are learning to read. The Bible Society is meeting these new literates with the Word of Life. In Korea, for the first time since the war, the Bible Society again functions rather normally. The new colloquial Kogotai Bible was released in Japan in April 1955. More than 75,000 copies had been sold by the end of the year. The Scriptures are distributed in some 20 languages in the Philippines. Nearly 20 million Chinese are living outside the China mainland. China is closed but millions of Chinese are open to the Gospel. The American Bible Society is producing the Sermon on the Mount and illustrated Gospels to meet the need of new literates in India, Pakistan, and Ceylon.

Africa: In Africa people are on the move, and the Bible Society is following through with the Scriptures wherever they go. The American Bible Society is responsible for 35 languages in Africa. Its new office in *Liberia*, for instance, provided over 19,000 volumes in 1955.

They go straggling into the Sunday school assembly a LITTLE tardy.


Some of the members chew gum a LITTLE, joke a LITTLE, and doodle a LITTLE.

Where Is Revival?

Though we see little of it in these days, we must confess that revival is a time of weeping. I have been in meetings in nearly every state in the southland and in the state of Michigan. Some have been highly organized and widely advertised, others have had no advertising or prior planning. But I have never been in a really successful revival where no one did any weeping and agonizing in prayer before God.

In churches everywhere, there is so much about which to weep. There is the fruitlessness of our own lives, the indifference and coldness of our own hearts, the powerlessness of our own testimony. To see the pitiful few in the Sunday evening service and the little handful of faithful ones at the midweek prayer service—this is indeed cause for weeping.

Cause for Weeping

Statistics tell us that there are more church members now than at any like period in our history. In the year 1953 there were 58 million Protestants and 34 million Catholics in the United States. Does it not seem reasonable that if one out of three of these were really and genuinely converted, that we should take America for Christ within a year. But the number of these multiplied millions of church members who are lost is enough to break the heart of an angel.

There is plenty cause for weeping and a revival is a time of weeping over the unsaved. The multitudes of the unregenerate are unaware of their condition and certainly will not weep for themselves. How many of them today are trying to dull their senses in pleasure, seeking an easy religion in joining the cults and the other groups which deny the blood and the fundamentals of the Christian faith.

Members Swept In

Many of the churches of today put on church membership drives. Great numbers are swept in rather than wept in and the results certainly reveal it. Many are joining the church on a "confusion of faith" rather than on a confession of their faith. So we have a machine-manufactured membership, a robot religion, so many with the idea that it is fashionable to be a member of the church. If the pastors and church leaders were to absolutely insist on a separated life, holy living, our church rolls would be reduced by the millions.

But we, who are the pastors and evangelists, like to point with pride to the number of additions we have had in our churches or in revivals held in other churches. We seem to be obsessed with the mania for success, we want recognition, we almost border on what we might call Goddishonoring competition to build our churches and get new members. Oh, how we need to weep and ask God to break our hearts as He did some of the great preachers in bygone years.

But you know and I know that tears are

out of style. Jeremiahs are not popular in this modern age. It's all right for the crooners to sobbingly pour out their appeals through some hit tune over radio or television but it's all wrong to weep in church. Liberace, with his wavy hair and the wink of his eye, can drive old women into hysterics with his piano antics but it's all wrong to show any emotion in church.

Return to First Love

Of course the results of every revival should be not only the return of church members to their first love, to be set on fire for God's glory, but there should be a great reaping of lost souls. What would happen today if just one out of three of our church members were to get on fire for God?

If these were to pray and weep and yield themselves unreservedly to the Lord Jesus, what a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit we would witness. We would see the greatest spiritual awakening that America has ever experienced. I'm sure that you will agree that the greatest revival opportunity we have lies within those on the rolls of our church memberships.

But, someone begins to argue, weeping and emotion are low brow reactions of ignorant people. This same person begins to criticize, analyze and minimize with his scholarly philosophy but we have only to open the pages of the Bible and read where Abraham showed emotion when he pleaded with God for Sodom and Gomorrah.

No Suppressed Hallelujahs

Moses was filled with emotion when he cried out, "Oh, this people have sinned a great sin, and have made themselves gods of gold. Yet now, if thou wilt forgive their sin; and if not blot me, I pray thee, out of the book which thou hast written." There were no suppressed hallelujahs when the lame man at the beatiful gate of the temple was healed. He went walking and leaping and praising God and the people were filled with wonder and amazement.

But, may I hurry on to say, I do not believe in and do not want a whooping, hip-hip, hooray kind of emotionalism generated by the maneuvering of the flesh. We want only that which is genuinely of the Lord and comes through a visitation and the overwhelming outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Then there will be a time of rejoicing and a revival should very definitely be just that. When we see souls saved and get into a right relationship with God, oh, how our hearts rejoice. When we see lukewarm, backslidden Christians weep over halfhearted service and regain the victory in their lives, what a time for rejoicing. When we see old animosities and grudges swept away, sins confessed, barriers broken down, prayers answered, words cannot describe the joy.

Revival Price Is High

How we need to weep and cry unto God for revival. Today there are more tears shed in the average movie theater than

Foreign Mission Department Publishes New Booklet



We have for years been praying for an agricultural missionary to show our Christians that they must change their crops to productive ones. Please pray with us about it."

Apostles of Discord—

The Religion of Reason

Unitarians parade as Christians, yet they deny much of that which is precious to all orthodox Christians:

They deny the doctrine of the Trinity.

They deny that the Bible is the revealed Word of God.

They deny the Bible doctrines of heaven and hell.

They deny that Jesus is the Son of God. They deny the Virgin Birth of Jesus.

They deny that salvation is made possible by the blood atonement of Christ.

They deny the Bible doctrine of original sin and salvation by Grace through faith.

Accent On Reason

Unitarians place accent on reason. To them the final authority in religion is human reason. They refuse to form a common creedal statement of their own, but delight in applying the "test of reason" to the doctrines of others. It is easy to see that such a belief humanizes God and defies man. It is humanistic rather than theistic.

In fact, Unitarians deny so many of the fundamental tenets of Christianity that one wonders why they claim to be Christian at all.

The roots of the Unitarian movement go back to the first century. There arose a group of heretics called the Ebionites. The Ebionites were Jewish Christians who insisted that the Jewish laws and customs should be observed by the Christian Church. They repudiated the writings of Paul because he recognized Gentiles as Christians.

Began with Ebionites

These Ebionites tried to hold on to Judaism and yet be Christian. To them, Jesus was merely a man. They insisted that the Holy Spirit was a female; thus completely repudiating the doctrine of the Trinity. According to them, complete salvation can be secured only through Judaism. In fact, most of the things that present -day Unitarians believe or fail to believe were present in the heresy of the Ebionites.

The Ebionites gradually dwindled away. However, there was enough of the doctrine left to raise its head in the Arian controversy of the fourth century.

Arius set forth the doctrine that Christ, though higher than human nature, was

inferior to God, and was not eternal in existence, but had a beginning. Against these views, Athanasius argued. He asserted that the Father and the Son were one, and that the Son was eternal. The doctrines taught by Arius and Athanasius were diametrically opposed to each other, and their ideas admitted of no compromise. The Church was obliged to decide between them.

Nicene Creed Adopted

Constantine called a council of the bishops at Nicea in Bithynia 325 A. D. The majority of the council voted to condemn the teachings of Arius. They agreed upon a creed which definitely and distinctly set forth the doctrine of the Trinity. This creed is known as the Nicene Creed.

Although there were those who denied the doctrine of the Trinity, they were few and of little influence until about 1600, when a seet called the Socinians arose. They, like their predecessors the Ebionites, denied the deity of Jesus. They maintained that "Jesus was a mere man."

The name "Unitarian" was first used in the sixteenth century. A distinguished Unitarian, Belsham, tells in the following statement why the group adopted the name instead of being called Socinians:

We do not answer to that name (Socinians), nor do we approve of being distinguished by it. In the first place, because the doctrine we hold is not borrowed from the Socinians, but is known and universally allowed, to have been coeval with the apostles. And further, we differ very materially from the opinions of that great and good man and his immediate followers, who strangely imagined that Christ, though a human being, was advanced by God to the Government of the whole created Universe, and was the proper object of religious worship. We call ourselves Unitarians to distinguish ourselves from other classes of Christians. . . .

Began to Increase

The Unitarians as a group never attracted much attention in England until the end of the seventeenth century when they began to increase and to acquire some distinction through the writing of Dr. Priestley and his associates. Dr. Priestley met with much opposition in England, and in 1794 he retired to America. Dr. Priestley may have been respected by many individuals in this country, but it does not appear that he met with much success in the propogation of Unitarianism. On his arrival in America, he was denied access to almost every pulpit. His congregation in Northumberland, Pennsylvania, where he lived, is said at no time to have exceeded thirty or forty persons. And even they refused to be called Unitarians.

Perhaps the most significant event in the rise of Unitarianism in America was the action taken by James Freeman and his congregation at Kings' Chapel, Boston, in 1785 whereby that first Episcopal Church in New England became the first church openly acknowledging Unitarianism.

Harvard Became Hotbed

Harvard University soon became a hotbed of Unitarianism. In 1805 Henry Ware, an outspoken liberal was elected to the Hollis Chair of Divinity. The liberal theology was cultivated through the Anthology Club, through *The Monthly Anthology*, *The Christian Monitor* and the aggressive *General Repository and Review*. New England Congregationalism began to split into a conservative and liberal wing.

Whatever headway the Unitarian movement had made in America at the beginning of the nineteenth century, it remained for three men—William Ellery Channing, Ralph Waldo Emerson and Theodore Parker to crystallize Unitarian principles.

Sermon Sparked Interest

It was just another quiet Sunday morning in May 1819 when Channing, the famous Boston minister, preached his famous Baltimore Sermon. He was invited to preach and share in the ordination of Jared Sparks as minister of the First Independent Church of Baltimore, Maryland. In this sermon Channing set forth the first concise doctrinal statement of the Unitarians. He said that reason is the ultimate authority, that Jesus was a human being only and that man is inherently good. This theology allows no place for the doctrine of the vicarious atonement of Christ. According to Channing, Christ's mission is "the recovery of man to virtue." He revived all the old Socinian arguments against the Trinity, yet his attitude toward such Socinians as Priestley and Belsham was only lukewarm.

Reports of this sermon were published far and wide. Probably no sermon preached

in America up to this time had so many readers. It has been called the "Unitarian Declaration of Independence."

Emerson Was Leader

Next to Channing, Ralph Waldo Emerson stands out as a leader of Unitarianism in America. After three years as pastor of the Second Congregational Church in Boston, he resigned because the church would not follow his liberal teachings. However, he continued to preach and lecture to large audiences until his death in 1882.

Emerson's theology was Unitarian and pantheistic. The word "miracle," as pronounced by the churches, is a monster. To him, the ultimate authority in religion lies in reason. The Unitarians of his day were not anxious to accept Emerson because of certain fundamental differences in his theology and theirs. Thus Emerson became the foremost exponent of what is called American Transcendentalism.

The Unitarian Transcendental principles set forth by Emerson were given more concrete application by Theodore Parker. His sermon on *The Transient and Permanent in Christianity* is a landmark in Unitarian history. This sermon was preached in South Boston in 1841. In this sermon, Parker says that Christianity is nothing but pure morality, that it is purely a product of the season, and that miracles are myths.

Known for Liberal Views

Through the years the beliefs of Unitarianism developed. Each new leader would add something until today the group is known for its liberal views. They are known much more for the things they do not believe than for their positive beliefs. Unitarianism is proud to be called the religion of reason because to it reason is the final authority in matters of religion.

By an unintentional coincidence, National Unitarian Organizations were formed on both sides of the Atlantic in 1825. These organizations are democratic and represent the member churches. The American Unitarian Association has its headquarters in Boston. There are in Great Britain and America at the present time some eight hundred churches about equally divided between the two countries.

Influence Is Great

The Unitarian group has never been large in the United States. It has been estimated that only about one per cent of the total church membership is Unitarian. Yet its influence is great because of the famous people who have been Unitarians. Among noted Americans have been the following Unitarians: Henry W. Longfellow, Nathaniel Hawthorne, James Russell Lowell, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Henry Thoreau, Julia Ward Howe, Louisa May Alcott, and William Cullen Bryant. Unitarians quote Thomas Jefferson as having said that he hoped that some day everybody would be Unitarian.

Unitarians do not have a missionary program as such. Their growth has been

due to their intellectualism. Many Americans have a deep respect for anything that parades as education. This is especially true of college students. So when the professors in the classroom begin to cast doubts at Christianity and demand logical proof for every item in the Christian creed, the student is apt to first be confused and later come to accept the cynical, skeptical attitude.

Defenses Suggested

There is no intellectual defense against Unitarianism. Christianity is reasonable yet it transcends reason. What person can explain love? Yet Christianity is a religion of love. What person can explain from logic alone the doctrine of the Trinity? Yet this doctrine is basic in orthodox Christianity. What person can explain the nature of immortality? Yet how blessed is "The house not made with hands" to the Christian. Christianity is a religion of experience and emotion as well as logic.

What defense can we offer our young people against Unitarianism? If logic fails, where can we turn?

Revelation vs. Reason

We must teach our youth that the Bible is God's Word and is therefore, the final authority in matters of religion. It is revelation versus reason—the revealed Word of God against the reason of man. Youth who have a deep respect for the Bible as God's Word are not apt to be led astray.

Another defense against Unitarianism is experience. A man's beliefs cannot be removed from his experiences. You cannot convince one that fire is not hot when his experience with fire proves otherwise. If we can lead our youth to have definite experience with God and things spiritual, no Unitarian professor will be able to move them.

Our kitchen work table has a plastic top with an intricate design of wild roses against a background of white. As I sat there this morning admiring the handiwork of some unknown designer, I was suddenly conscious of our missionaries. I really don't know why.

I began to look around me at some of the things I take for granted but which would be considered luxuries by our missionaries. I looked at our breakfast table still set before me. Here is good creamery butter and homogenized milk. There is no fear that these products are not wholesome and clean, for they have to measure up to standards set by the United States government.

I looked at the floor. It is covered with inlaid linoleum, and although somewhat worn in spots, it still responds very well to Johnson's Glo-Coat. These supplies for easy cleaning are not at our missionary's fingertips, though.

I went to the kitchen sink to wash the dishes and by simply turning a faucet, I had all the hot water I needed flowing right into the dish pan. Our missionaries can't turn a tap and have safe drinking water, much less running hot water. They must carry their water and boil every drop used for drinking and cooking.

The family wash was finished in a little less than three hours. I used a soap that is advertised as being "kind to the hands" as well as guaranteed to get the clothes clean.

For lunch, I am planning to have hamburgers, cokes and ice cream. A simple meal, but I can't help remembering just now seeing two returned missionaries eating six hamburgers each and saying, "You have no idea how good hamburgers really are."

Our radio has been tuned to the local station to get the correct time and late news. A minister friend of ours has just concluded the daily radio devotional program. The morning mail brought letters from three friends. Somehow my heart has been strangely humbled as I have revalued some of the things I have been taking for granted.

But do you know what our missionaries do have? They have the certain knowledge that God directed them to their field, that they are obeying God's command for them, and the assurance that His best blessings are theirs.

The Greatest Victory

An aged caretaker of Winchester Cathedral in southern England loved to tell the story of how Wellington's victory over Napoleon reached England. In those days there were no modern means of communication. News of the history-making battle came by a sailing vessel to the south coast of England and then, by semaphore, was signaled overland to London.

Eagerly the Empire waited for news from the battlefront. Atop the cathedral the seamaphore began slowly to spell out the message, letter by letter, "WELLINGTON DEFEATED"—and then a dense fog settled over the city. The signals could no longer be seen, and thus the sad, heart-sickening news of the incomplete message went to London, spreading gloom and utter despair —"Wellington defeated."

In due time the fog lifted, and again the cathedral semaphore became visible, spelling out the complete message: "WELLING-




TON DEFEATED THE ENEMY." The news spread like prairie fire over the land, lifting the people from gloom to gladness and praise.

Nineteen centuries ago, on a rough, barren hill outside the gates of Jerusalem, a battle of more far-reaching importance was fought and won. Jesus Christ entered into combat with sin and death.

To his disciples, at the time, it may have seemed a colossal defeat as his limp body was placed in the tomb of Joseph. To them Calvary meant but one thing: JESUS DE-FEATED. Soul-Winning Is Biggest Business in the World

Soul-winning is big business—the biggest business in the world. The saving of sinners is the thing which is nearest to the heart of God, for "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."

Nothing can keep the Christian warm, fresh and alert like personal evangelism in the church and its auxiliaries of which he is a member. Soul-winning is the safeguard against dead and fruitless orthodoxy. The growth of every believer and the expansion of any church, whether large or small, depends upon a live and consistent soulwinning program. Without it no church can long survive and no Christian can grow strong.

Throughout the book of Acts we discover that the early church considered its one supreme task to be the winning of others—the saving of souls, with every believer a soul-winner.

As we study the lives of early Christians we will find them reaching out for others, as when Andrew brings Peter, his brother, and Philip finds the eunuch. They were anxious to win others to Christ. We believe that every real child of God has a desire to see others won to Christ. This desire is implanted in his heart at the time of conversion.

It is true, however, that most Christians seem to feel that they cannot do the work of a soul-winner. They will faithfully and regularly attend church; they will even live separated lives and avoid all forms of worldliness. They will give generously to support the work of the Lord and be faithful in praying and reading the Bible.

Many are willing to sing in the choir, teach a Sunday school class, or fill other offices in the different auxiliaries of the church, but feel they cannot win souls. Satan wants to keep them thinking this way, of course, and thus he is able to keep them from fulfilling this definite responsibility and privilege.

There are Christians who feel that they are not properly equipped for this work of soul-winning since they have not had the privilege of attending Bible training schools or seminaries. But all true believers can win souls for Christ.

The Bible has much to say about this business of soul-winning. Perhaps one of the most important verses is to be found in Psalm 126:6: "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

Here is a formula, or pattern, which if followed cannot help but yield blessed re-

sults, according to the promise which it contains. You will notice that the first thing required by this verse is action on the part of the real soul-winner. God here shows us that the first requirement in soulwinning is going after souls. The word "go" is a common word of action.

In Isaiah 6 the voice of the Lord calls, "Who will go for us?" And in the Great Commission which our Lord gave to the church, he said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." The chief reason why Christians do not win souls is that they simply do not personally respond to this command of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The Christian who is responsive and who keeps going at the business of soul-winning, who constantly is seeking others for Christ, who makes soul-winning his chief business in life is the one who will reap the soulwinner's reward and blessing. Too many of us are waiting for the "ideal" opportunity. Satan sees to it that there is no such thing.

If we are ever to be soul-winners it will mean more than offering prayers for the salvation of souls. It will mean more than just having concern for the lost. It will call for "putting feet to our prayers." We will never win others to Christ through our church until we are ready to go after them.

That wonderful verse in the Psalm indicates that the real soul-winner will be a person of deep compassion for the lost. Great soul-winners have always been those with broken hearts. The Lord Jesus was a man of compassion. The Apostle Paul wept over the Ephesian church. Great evangelists down through the ages have wept as their hearts were broken for the lost. Let us never be ashamed of tears as we seek to win the lost to Christ.


The next thing in this marvelous formula which God has given us is found in the words "precious seed," or the word of God. Others are not saved by our tears, nor indeed by their own. If we win them, it will be by using the precious seed, the Word of God. The soul-winner must learn early that it is not by argument or human influence that souls are won to Christ. The use of God's Word is absolutely essential. We must rely upon the Word, which the Holy Spirit uses as a sword.

This wonderful verse also tells us that if we will be faithful in going and sowing the seed with hearts of compassion, we will most definitely have certain and blessed results. The promise is that He "shall doubtless come again . . . bringing his sheaves with him."

It also indicates that great joy will accompany the faithful word of those who strive to be soul-winners. There is no joy on earth like this. This is the early reward of the soul-winner which God permits him to enjoy now, quite apart from the joy in heaven which is to come.

May we make this biggest business in the world our business.

The Day Gopalan Died

I had known Gopalan about two years before he died and Wilson-raj took his place. The first time I met him was in December 1951. When I arrived in India in July of that year, he was studying carpentry in Madras and I did not have the privilege of making his acquaintance at first.

I remember a slender, serious lad coming forth to meet me with a gracious bow and the usual Indian greeting, "Salaam" (Peace.) Almost five years have passed since then and I have watched this youth grow into young manhood with an everdeepening grasp of spiritual truths.

In January 1953 he was baptized and chose for his Christian name, Wilson-raj. Just before his baptism he read Psalm 32 as his testimony. Then he turned to the congregation and said: "I have already made restitution to those whom I have wronged as far as I know. But if there is anyone in this congregation that I have wronged, I want you to tell me now and forgive me."

A few days after his baptism a lad was heard to call him by his heathen name, Gopalan. He instantly said in disgust, "Gopalan, hm! He is dead; died last Sunday." As Wilson-raj, he was instrumental in leading his father, mother, and two sisters to the Lord.

In July 1954 he enrolled in the South India Bible Institute and completed the Christian Workers' course. Upon completion of his work there, he came to us and has been doing both evangelistic and school work as well as conducting two Sunday schools each week and assisting a third.

On January 28 of this year he was privileged to attend Billy Graham's meetings here in India and he was very specially met by the Lord and blessed. He went to those meetings with a hungry and expectant heart and the Lord did not disappoint him.

He is a young man all our Free Will Baptist people can be proud of. At the moment he is looking for a bride. Please hold him up in prayer, asking God to give him the bride of His choice. God's hand is upon him and we believe that Wilsonraj is going to be used in a very unusual manner in his beloved land to lead many to the Lord Jesus.

The following is the personal testimony he typed out and gave me just the other day:

"I do like to give my testimony of how the Lord blessed and saved me. I was born in a Hindu family, and in boyhood spent most of my school days in mission schools. I heard many messages about Jesus Christ, but I did not like to receive Him as my personal Saviour.

"When I was 22 years old God touched my heart and spoke to me through His Word in Ecclesiastes 11:9. He revealed my sin and I had godly sorrow for that sin. After that I confessed my sin and I asked Him to wash my heart whiter than snow in the precious blood of the Lamb of God. He washed me whiter than snow. After that, joy and peace filled my heart and I realized the assurance of

salvation. Then I could sing the song, 'He brought me out of the miry clay.' Soon after that I dedicated my life to do His ministry and I prayed God to use my life for His glory. God heard my prayer and He called me to do His task and He is using me.

"This is my desire and prayer—I want to be an effectual soul-winner throughout my life. And also I am learning great lessons from the testimony of others. If I want to be an effectual soul-winner I must die every hour and minute to my opinions and to my preference and to my tastes and to my own will, and to approval or blame even of my people and live for Christ and do His blessed will. 'Which things I gain, those things I count as loss for Christ.' Praise the Lord for His wonderful blessings to me. He is leading me and guiding me in His path. Praise His holy name!"

My heart filled with joy and praise as I read this lovely testimony. He certainly has grasped the truths that are essential to a victorious Christian life, hasn't he? And all of it in the short time since the day Gopalan died and Wilson-raj took his place.

Miss Wilson is working with Miss Laura Belle Barnard as a missionary in South India. She will return to the United States this summer on furlough.

New State Paper For Alabama Churches



Q. Assuming that only Christians will get to Heaven, what will become of those of other religions?

- A. God certainly does not recognize any religion which does not bear the name of His Son, Jesus Christ. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Those of all other religions together with the non-religionists fall into the category listed in Revelation 21:8, "But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death."
- Q. When God said, "Let us make man," to whom does the "us" refer?
- A. To the Triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It does not seem to bother men as to the fact that God the Father and God the Holy Spirit were in the beginning, but multitudes question the presence of Jesus, the Son, at the creation. However any doubt whatsoever concerning this is settled forever in John 1:1-3. Also note Hebrews 1:2.
- Q. What is your opinion of a person who says he believes in God, and yet does not attend church or take part in Christian service?
- A. I think his actions belie his profession. I John 2:4 says: "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him." We are clearly told in Hebrews 10:25 that we are not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together. One who deliberately refuses to attend church is disobeying this very plain teaching or commandment of the New Testament.
- Q. At what age should children be baptized?
- A. I don't think any person should be baptized until he has first repented of his sins. When a child reaches the age where he can understand the plan of nalvation and realize that Jesus died for him, that is the time he should contes Christ and be baptized. I think this applies to individuals whether they are what eighteen, or eighty. Acts 2:38, 39 will help you on this point.
