REPORT OF VARIOUS COMMITTEES**EDUCATION AND LITERATURE**

The National Board of Education, assisted by the Executive Committee of the General Board of the National Association on September 26, 1941, purchased property known as the W. O. Terrell home, 3609 Richland Ave., Nashville, Tenn., and have made tentative plans to open and begin operation of a denominational school next September in this building.

We, the committee, realizing the responsibility resting upon the National Board and upon our denomination as a whole, do hereby offer the following recommendations:

First, We recommend that this Association contribute \$50.00 from the Associational Fund for Education, and this be sent through proper channels immediately.

Second, We recommend that the churches of the Cumberland Association accept the following suggested budget for Education for the year 1941 and 1942 and do their utmost to fulfill their obligations.

Amount to be paid per month: Oak Grove, \$1; Pleasant Hill, \$1; Good Springs, \$1; Heads, \$2; Craigfield, \$1; Shady Grove, \$1; Columbia, \$3; Ashland City, \$5; Bethlehem, \$1; Union Hill, \$1; New Hope, \$5; Pruetts Chapel, \$1; Cofers Chapel, \$5; Oakland, \$1; Oaklawn, \$1; Bethel, \$3; Olivet, \$2; Mt. Zion, \$1; Rock Springs, \$1; Friendship, \$1; West Nashville, \$2; Starkeys Chapel, \$1; East Nashville, \$5; Mt. Pleasant, \$1; Oakwood, \$1; Brandons Chapel, \$1; Millers Chapel, \$1; Scotts Chapel, \$1; Stoney Point, \$1.

We further suggest that the above named churches send in their suggested amounts regularly each month.

We further recommend that the Association instruct Mr. G. W. Fambrough, our treasurer, to forward immediately upon receipt all educational funds through the proper channel to the Treasurer of the National Board of Education and that the churches make report of their work at each Quarterly Meeting.

Third, That the delegated body composed of delegates, deacons, and ministers, pledge their support and the support of their churches to the National Board of Education in its program of opening and operating a National F. W. B. School in Nashville, Tenn.

We further suggest that a standing vote of the body be given and that the names of those voting favorably be recorded by clerk and become a part of the minutes.

We also suggest that the names of those not voting, or those casting a negative vote, shall also be recorded and appear in minutes.

Fourth, We also recommend that those indebted to the Educational Fund of the Association make monthly payments of not less than \$10 per month.

Fifth, We also urge that the ministers, deacons, and laity subscribe to one or more of our denominational papers.

Sixth, We also urge all Free Will Baptist Churches to use Free Will Baptist literature.

Seventh, We recommend that the General Secretary of the Association visit all churches at least once during the year in the interest of the Education Program.

We recommend that this committee be retained and recognized

as the Board of Education of the Cumberland Association throughout the year, and that Rev. R. B. Crawford and Mrs. Agnes B. Frazier be added to this Board.

We extend a cordial invitation to all of our people and their friends to visit our school property when in Nashville.

We will not forget the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, for its poor and all its benevolent works. We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace; to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able, promote the success of the church and of the gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principles sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises "supreme," counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the kingdom of God may come and that his will may be done on earth as it is in heaven; to this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sabbath schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of souls, and the conversion of the world; and may the God of peace sanctify us wholly; and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old Testament are word of Divine Inspiration, given to Abraham's children, and that the New Testament contains the only proper rules of faith of the Christian churches.

Article 3. We believe in the depravity of man, and in man's inability to recover himself from his fallen condition without a Divine Mediator.

Article 4. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ, according to the Scriptures, suffered and died upon the cross, and thereby made full atonement for every human being, and by His obedient life, satisfactory death, triumphant resurrection and glorious ascension, ever advocating at His Father's throne hath brought an everlasting salvation for every sinner that will repent, believe and obey His word.

Article 5. We believe that the faithful Christians will not fall from grace; notwithstanding we believe in the free moral agency of man after jurisdiction, and that there is possible danger of falling into sin and being finally lost.

Article 6. We believe according to the Scriptures: Paul's letter to the Hebrews, 6th chapter, 1st to 7th verses that after a man has been partaker of the Holy Ghost, if he shall fall from grace, it is impossible to renew him again unto repentance, or restore him again into the favor of God.

Article 7. We believe Baptism and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper and the washing of the Saints' feet are all ordinance ordained and instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only proper subjects, and the proper mode of baptism is immersion, and that it is the duty of believers to attend these ordinances.

Article 8. We believe in the general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

Article 9. We believe according to the Scriptures, 1st Cor. 10:6, that each individual, having been inducted into the Kingdom of Christ by an operative influence of the Holy Ghost, and having faith to exercise the free dictation of his conscience, is in communion with saints.

Article 10. We believe in the justification of infants by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ, in a passive state and thereby adopting them heirs of His Kingdom.

GOVERNMENT AND CONSTITUTION

Article 1. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to one vote; and each church having more than fifty members shall have one vote for the first fifty, and one vote for every additional fifty members or fraction thereof. These votes shall be cast by one delegate from each of the various churches and this delegate shall be duly elected by the church to cast these votes. A roll call shall be made on all important questions when desired.

2. In the letter form each church shall be expressed the number received by experience, letter, recommendation, restoration, number dismissed by letter, excluded, died, since last Association, and the

total number enrolled. Also give name of present pastor and one called for the ensuing year, names of deacons and their addresses, name of Sunday School Superintendent and Secretary and addresses, enrollment of Sunday School, and also amount collected since last Association, and amount paid out to pastor, to missionary, to minutes, and to any other expenses may have had, and amount left in treasury.

3. All subordinate churches shall be subject to the rule of this Association.

4. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper code of rules which they are authorized to establish for themselves.

5. They may elect a Moderator, Secretary and Treasurer from among themselves, and they may hold their office until their successors are elected.

6. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except when withdrawn by consent.

7. New churches may be received into the union, who shall petition by letter or delegates, if they have been regularly organized upon a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and are walking according to the gospel order.

8. This Association shall furnish each church with minutes of their proceedings, in proportion to the amount sent by each church; and in order to enable the Association to print their minutes it is expected that each church will send up such sums of money as they think proper, and when received shall be placed in the hands of a trustee appointed for that purpose, and may be disbursed by order of the Association.

9. For the purpose of ordaining ministers of the gospel, and deacons who shall come with recommendations from their churches, and for trying all ordained members for un-Christian conduct, there shall be an annual Presbytery, which shall convene at the close of the Association at the same time and place, and at any time during the Associational year, if called by Moderator or his assistants or any five members of said Presbytery, who deem it necessary to make such a call. Said Presbytery shall consist of ordained members present and they shall elect a Moderator and Clerk from among themselves for the time being, who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected. It shall be the duty of said Presbytery to examine all applications or ordinations sent up with recommendations, from their churches composing this Association, and if found competent, to ordain and set them apart for the work by laying on of hands. Said Presbytery shall have full power to try all ordained members for un-Christian conduct and on testimony their decision shall be final.

10. It shall be the duty of each minister who shall organize a church to ordain deacons for the same. Also, his duty to ordain deacons where a vacancy occurs in his charge. It shall be the duty of each pastor to support a Sunday School in the church or churches in his charge.

11. No person shall be ordained to the ministry until he is able to fill the requirements of Paul's first letter to Timothy 3 and this be tested by the Presbytery. Said Presbytery shall have full power to propound Spiritual questions as they see proper and all candidates shall be required to answer them satisfactorily.

12. This Association may exclude from its body any minister who

teaches heresy, or any other church that countenances him in said teaching or that may be disloyal to the tenets of Faith as held by this Association and expressed in our Articles of Faith.

13. All questions coming before this Association shall be determined by a majority, except excluding churches, which shall be determined by a majority, except excluding churches, which shall receive a concurrence of two-thirds.

14. Representatives from five churches shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and no business shall be transacted without a quorum.

15. The minutes of this Association shall be read before them, corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

16. This Association may adjourn at any time and place it may think proper, so as to confine it among the churches composing the same.

17. Amendments may be made to this form of government at any time by a majority of the members present composing the Association, voting in behalf of the amendment.

18. When the Association shall have convened, it is the privilege of all ordained members belonging to the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptist to sit in council with us and propose resolutions coming before this body as though they were delegates by the church.

RULES AND DECORUM

This Association shall be opened by singing and prayer. Only one person may speak at a time. All addresses made by the members shall be made to the Moderator, and the person thus speaking shall strictly confine himself to the subject in debate, nor cast any personal reflections toward any member of this body who has spoken previously.

No person shall be allowed to speak more than three times on any one subject without leave of a majority of this Association.

The brother shall not be interrupted during his speech by any one except the Moderator, except he violates order.

No person shall laugh or whisper in time of public speaking.

No member shall absent himself without leave from the Association. Members shall use the word "brother" or "brethren" in all debates.

The names of the members of this body shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called over as often as necessary, provided a call be made by a member of the Association.

No member shall speak longer than fifteen minutes at any time without leave of the Moderator.

Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly violate any of these rules, shall be reported by the Moderator and be subject to the censure of the Association.

Adopted in Council this Saturday before the first Lord's Day in October, 1867, as a standing decorum though subject to revision by a majority of members voting for deviation.
