PROCEEDINGS

Wednesday Morning, October 15, 1958

The 115th annual session of the Cumberland Association met at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, October 15, at Carlisle Free Will Baptist Church, Carlisle, Tennessee.

Rev. John Vick led in the singing of "Standing on the Promises" after which Rev. Robert Carroll led in the opening devotions, reading from I Cor. 15:8, 9, and leading the congregation in prayer.

The Rev. Guy Owens, pastor of the host church, welcomed the delegates, ministers and visitors. Rev. Earnest Craft responded with words of appreciation for the association to meet with the Carlisle Church.

Rev. Luther Reed, moderator, called the meeting to order and appointed the following Finance Committee: J. B. Reding, Theodore Dowlen, and Wallace Howell.

The Committee on Committees was appointed as follows: Rev. Earnest Craft, Rev. Robert Carroll, and Rev. John Vick.

The moderator called for the ministers, deacons, and delegates to stand, and he recognized them as the voting body of the association.

Visiting ministers were welcomed, including Rev. George Dunbar, Benny Turner, Rev. Roy Duckett, Rev. William Mishler, and Rev. Homer Willis.

The moderator called for a report on the Children's Home from H. C. Burgess, superintendent. Mr. Burgess stated the conditions in the home and emphasized that a special drive was under way to pay off the indebtedness on a new building at the Home. Churches were urged to help in the drive. Mr. Burgess also reported \$3210.60 was given by the Cumberland Association to the Home during the past year. Children cared for number 76. Rev. George Dunbar assisted Brother Burgess in showing some slides of the Home. Motion passed to receive an offering for the Home for Children. The people responded with an offering of \$65.96.

The moderator adjourned the business session to go into the morning worship service. Brother Vick led the congregation in the singing of "Are You Washed in the Blood." Rev. George Dunbar prayed for God's blessings upon the service and gave thanks to God for His blessings upon the Free Will Baptist churches, missionaries, and Christian workers everywhere.

Rev. Louis Moulton, promotional worker for the National Foreign Mission Board, was called upon to bring the morning message. He read from Romans 1:16-20 and delivered a strong message on foreign missions.

Following the morning service, Brother Owens welcomed the congregation to share in the noon-day meal provided by the host church. The morning service was adjourned with the singing of "Blessed Assurance" and prayer by Rev. Raymond Riggs.

Wednesday Afternoon

The afternoon session opened with the singing of "Bringing in the Sheaves." Rev. Eunis Crowe led in devotions, reading Eph. 2:1-6 and

closing with prayer. Brother Marion Pettus led the congregation in singing "Rescue the Perishing."

The moderator read from I Sam. 15:1-23, bringing a challenging message on not disobeying the Lord.

Rev. Robert Hill, assistant moderator, read the Rules and Decorum of the Association.

Rev. Homer Willis brought news from the National Home Mission Board and its activities.

Rev. William Mishler made a report on the work of the National Sunday School Board.

The registration committee report was read by J. B. Reding with 35 churches reporting the first day.

Motion passed to adjourn and Rev. Homer Willis dismissed the service with prayer.

Wednesday Night

The host church conducted a worship service on Wednesday evening for those who could attend. Rev. A. B. Troutman was speaker for the service.

Thursday Morning, October 16, 1958

The Thursday morning service began with the congregation singing "Amazing Grace," led by Brother Vick. Rev. Robert Carroll led in prayer. The congregation then sang "Glory to His Name."

The moderator called for Rev. Sidney Henry to lead in the morning devotions. Brother Henry read from Prov. 29:18 and spoke about the need of vision among Christians.

The minutes for the previous day's session were read by the clerk and approved.

The business session was adjourned to enter the Presbytery ordination service. The congregation sang "I Love to Tell the Story," and following the ordination service the morning worship service was begun with the Bible

College quartet singing "We'll Understand It Better Bye and Bye," and the spiritual "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot."

Dr. L. C. Johnson was introduced as the morning speaker. Brother Johnson spoke first on the need of Christian education and gave a report of gifts to the Bible College from Cumberland Association churches. He urged a cooperative support in the Victory Celebration December 17 and 18. The quartet sang another special number before Brother Johnson spoke from Col. 2:10 using the theme that the Christian is complete in Christ.

Following the morning service the host pastor again welcomed the people to the noon meal provided by the church women. Rev. Ellis Cravens prayed the closing prayer.

Thursday Afternoon

The afternoon service began with the singing of "Tell Me the Story of Jesus," followed by prayer led by Rev. Willie Justice.

The obituary committee report was given by Mrs. Rebecca Clifton, and a duet "Beyond the Sunset" was sung in memory of those in the association who had died during the year. Rev. Luther Reed led in a prayer in memory of those who had departed. Motion passed to adopt this report.

Ray Turnage gave a report on the Youth Camp property as sponsored by the Master's Men of the Cumberland Association. Motion passed to adopt this report.

J. B. Reding gave a report of the Finance Committee, which was approved.

Report of the Petitions and Requests Committee was given by Rev. Charles Jennette. Motion passed to receive this report.

Motion passed for the Cumberland Association to meet with the Donelson Church next year and for the State Association to meet at the Bible College.

Resolution passed to give a rising vote of thanks to the host church for the hospitality shown the delegated body. The congregation stood in token of their appreciation.

Motion passed for the churches to take an offering for Superannuation on Father's Day.

Motion passed that each of the 46 churches adopt the National Association revision of constitution that each local church can represent with one delegate to the National Association.

Resolution passed that each church make an offering of \$1. per member for the Bible College Victory Celebration day December 17 and 18.

Motion passed that the churches not having leagues make efforts to organize a league this year.

Rev. Eunis Crowe gave the report of the Temperance Committee. This report was approved.

Rev. Ellis Cravens gave a verbal report of the Western Quarterly Meeting.

The Nominating Committee Report was given by Rev. Robert Hill.

Motion passed to accept the report and fill vacancies where there are conflicts.

Motion passed to approve Rev. L. Donald Hill and Rev. Ellis Cravens to Education and Literature Board; J. B. Stack to the Home for Children Board; Rev. Harrold Harrison, Rev. Roy Thomas, and Rev. J. O. Brown, Jr., to the Foreign Missions Board; J. W. Love to succeed himself on the Home Mission Board and Rev. J. L. Welch to replace Rev. Robert Shockey; Rev. Joe Hurst to be added to the Superannuation Board; Buford Key to be on the Youth Camp Board (1959) and Ray Turnage (1961).

Delegates to the State Association were approved as per the Nominating Committee report.

Following a motion to elect the general officers from the floor, the officers were elected as follows: Rev. Luther Reed, moderator; Rev. Robert Hill, assistant moderator; Rev. E. B. McDonald, clerk; and J. B. Reding, treasurer.

The moderator was empowered to appoint a registration committee for next year. This committee was made up of Elmer Felts, J. B. Reding, and Rev. Charles Jennette.

Motion passed that the general officers of the Association be in charge of the program.

The presbytery report was given by E. B. McDonald and approved.

The associational treasurer's report was given by J. B. Reding. Motion passed to adopt this report.

Motion passed that the treasurer send a check to the State Association for membership fees.

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1. Be it resolved that the 46 churches of this Association be requested to observe Father's Day by receiving a special offering to be used in behalf

of aged, retired ministers, and to comply with the requests of the National Superannuation Board that 25% of all such offerings be sent immediately to the treasurer of that board.

2. Be it resolved that each of the 46 churches of this Association be requested to comply with the constitutional change of the National Association of Free Will Baptists made last July (1958) by electing one delegate from the laity and send them to the annual meeting which convenes at Asheville, N. C., in July, 1959.

3. Be it resolved that sometime prior to December 17, 1958, each church of this Association be requested, in whatever manner the local church may decide upon, to gather together an offering of at least \$1 per member on the church's roll and by some chosen representative to send this offering to the Bible College where it will be applied on the College Victory Celebration fund with which College debts will be paid.

4. Since about 25% of the churches in the Cumberland Association do not have Free Will Baptist Leagues, be it resolved that the churches without a League put fourth more effort to organize a League.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION BOARD

We are very happy to present this year's progress of the Home Mission Board of the Cumberland Association.

The progress at Clarksville has been very good. They are in a building program and hope to be in their new basement in a few weeks. This board has not contributed any money to the building program this year, but we have paid half the salary of our missionary. Our agreement with the National Board on this project expired September 30, 1958.

In July of this year the board investigated and approved a mission at 299 Hermitage Avenue in a rented store building. Regular services have been held there since then—also a revival meeting. The board has given partial support to this work. We hope to be able to organize a church within the next year.

Brother J. W. Love, a board member, has opened a work in another section of South Nashville, Faith Mission, 417 Chestnut Street. The work here is progressing steadily and they have just closed a successful revival,

REPORT OF STATE ASSOCIATION

The 20th session of the Tennessee State Association of Free Will Baptists was held with the Sylvan Park Church, Nashville, Tennessee, October 23-24, 1957.

There were 28 ministers, 2 deacons, and 25 delegates representing three districts registered.

The theme of the session was "Unification Through Revival." The keynote message was delivered by Dr. L. C. Johnson, president of Free Will Baptist Bible College. This was one of the most challenging messages ever delivered at any of the State associations. Other speakers were Rev. Horace Teague, Rev. Johnny Floyd, Jr., and Rev. W. S. Mooneyham.

The State Foreign Mission Board reported that two new fields of activity are being opened to our Foreign Mission Board. One in the Bondonkou Circle, Africa, and the other in Brazil. Each pastor was urged to keep missions fresh in the minds of his people by supporting the denominational program which in turn supports the missionary program.

The State Youth Camp Board reported two successful camps held this year with very good attendance.

The Christian Education Board gave a very inspiring and challenging report on the needs and values of Christian education for pastors, Sunday school teachers, and League leaders. The Bible College asked the Free Will Baptist people to raise \$66,000 by January to pay for the Student Center and Dining Hall. The College needs monthly gifts up to \$5,000 to operate. Tennessee's share of the proposed budget for 1957-1958 is \$12,750.

We were happy to welcome a new district to the Tennessee State Association. The Bluff City district association, Memphis, Tennessee, came in with four churches and 131 members.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

1. Membership

We now have 22 auxiliaries reporting to our convention with a total enrollment of 447. This represents an increase of 97 members during the past year.

2. Youth Organizations sponsored by the convention are:

A Young Adult Auxiliary with 18 members, 28 Young People's Auxiliaries and Go-Tell Auxiliaries. The young people from local churches meet quarterly in a fellowship meeting called the Christian Youth Ambassadors, and have given more than \$100 toward a special missionary project.

3. Sixty-four study courses were conducted during the year in Missions, Stewardship, Evangelism and Prayer to better equip and enlighten the women for service.

4. Forty-one weeks of prayer were conducted, which resulted in \$376.60 self-denial offerings for missions.

5. Two hundred sixty-five members reported soul-winning efforts with a report of 32 souls won. Value of contributions and commodities sent to the Children's Home was \$1,060.10. The women have carried out various benevolent projects.

6. There are over 200 subscribers to our Free Will Baptist papers.

7. The auxiliaries of the convention gave more than \$400 to help establish the first mission station in the Bondukou Circle, Africa. They gave \$250 to the Memorial Student Loan Fund, which enables students to stay in school who need financial assistance.

8. Cash gifts to missions, \$908.66; Bible College, \$410.04; Children's Home, \$621.88; Superannuation, \$47; and \$447.57 to other phases of Kingdom work.

9. We are endeavoring, this year, to reach our quota in helping to build homes for our missionaries in Japan.
