GOVERNMENT AND CONSTITUTION

CUMBERLAND ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

ARTICLE 1. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to one delegate for the first 50 members or fraction thereof, and an additional delegate for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof. Each delegate shall be entitled to cast one vote on all business transactions.

ARTICLE 2. Each member church of the Association shall send a letter to each annual meeting, giving members received during year, enrollment, members dismissed, name and address of pastor and other officers, and financial statement of receipts and disbursements, according to the form provided by the clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE 3. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper code of rules which they are authorized to establish for themselves.

ARTICLE 4. They may elect a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer from among themselves, and they may hold their offices until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE 5. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except when withdrawn by consent.

ARTICLE 6. New churches shall petition the quarterly meeting for membership. The quarterly meetings shall have power to receive new churches as members, and in turn shall recommend them to the annual Association.

ARTICLE 7. This Association shall furnish each church with minutes of their proceedings, in proportion to the amount of money sent by each church; in order to enable the Association to print their minutes it is expected that each church will send such sums of money as they think proper, and when the money is received, it shall be placed in the hands of a trustee appointed for that purpose, and may be disbursed by order of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. For the purpose of ordaining ministers of the gospel and for trying all ordained members for un-Christian conduct, there shall be a Presbytery, which shall convene at the opening of the Association, and at any time during the associational year, if called by the Moderator or his assistants or any five members of said Presbytery who deem it necessary to make such a call. The Presbytery shall consist of ordained members present, and they shall elect a Moderator and Clerk from among themselves for the time being, who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected. It shall be the duty of said Presbytery to examine all applications for ordination sent with recommendations from their churches composing this Association, and if found competent, to ordain and set them apart for the work by laying on of hands. The Presbytery shall have full power to try all ordained members for un-Christian conduct, and on testimony their decision shall be final.

ARTICLE 9. It shall be the duty of each minister who shall organize a church to ordain deacons for the same. It is his duty, also, to ordain deacons where a vacancy occurs within his charge. It shall be the duty of each pastor to encourage the organization and support of a Sunday school in the church or churches where he is pastor, as well as other organizations that may prove helpful to the work of the church.

ARTICLE 10. No person shall be ordained to the ministry nor shall the credentials of any minister be ratified until he is qualified to meet the conditions stated in the third chapter of I Timothy. The term "the husband of one wife"

means he shall not have more than one living wife (that is, he shall not be married to one wife at the present time and there be a wife still living from a previous marriage). This shall be tested by the Presbytery. The Presbytery shall have full power to propound such Spiritual questions as they consider necessary to determine his qualifications. All candidates for ordination shall be required to answer these questions satisfactorily.

ARTICLE 11. This Association may exclude from its body any minister who teaches heresy, or any church that countenances him in said teaching or that maybe disloyal to the tenets of Faith as held by this Association and expressed in our Articles of Faith.

ARTICLE 12. All questions coming before this Association shall be determined by a majority vote, except exclusion of churches which shall require two-thirds majority.

ARTICLE 13. Representatives from five churches shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and no business shall be transacted without a quorum.

ARTICLE 14. The minutes of this Association shall be read before the body, corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE 15. This Association may adjourn to meet with any church that is a regular member of it at any time it deems proper.

ARTICLE 16. Amendments may be made to this form of government at any time by a majority of the members present composing the Association, voting in behalf of the amendment.

ARTICLE 17. When this Association shall have convened, it is the privilege of all ordained members belonging to the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists to sit in council with us, and to propose resolutions coming before the body as though they were delegates from the church.

ARTICLE 18. This Association, having jurisdiction over all the churches within its bounds, shall discipline any church which calls a minister for a pastor who has been excluded by the Presbytery.

BOARDS

ARTICLE 1. All standing boards shall be composed of three members, except the Executive Board, Home Mission Board, and Superannuation Board which shall be composed of five members and the Board of Directors of Hillmont Assembly, Inc., acting also as Trustees, which shall be composed of seven members. Standing boards include the Executive Board, Home Mission Board, Board of Education, Home for Children Board, Board of Directors of Hillmont Assembly, Inc., Superannuation Board, and such other boards as growth and expansion may justify.

The personnel of each of the foregoing boards, exclusive of the Executive, Home Mission, Superannuation, and Board of Directors of Hillmont Assembly, Inc., shall be elected as follows: the first named for a period of one year, the second named for a period of two years, and the third named for a period of three years. Succession to office thereafter shall be determined as order requires. The Home Mission Board, and Superannuation Board, shall be elected on a rotation basis with one member being elected each year for a five-year term. The Board of Directors of Hillmont Assembly, Inc., shall be elected on a rotation basis with one member being elected each year for a seven-year term.

ARTICLE 2. The personnel of the Executive Board shall be composed of the Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and the moderators of each quarterly meeting.

ARTICLE 3. The Executive Board shall have the power to act in behalf of and for the Cumberland Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary for its own government, and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the Association. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to make written reports of all its work to each annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE 4. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operations in their respective fields. They shall organize themselves and regulate their work as may become necessary and as may be found in harmony with the principles and tenets of the Association.

RULES AND DECORUM

This Association shall be opened by singing and prayer. Only one person may speak at a time. All addresses made by the members shall be made to the Moderator, and the person thus speaking shall strictly confine himself to the subject in debate. No speaker shall cast any personal reflection toward any member of this body who has spoken previously.

No person shall be allowed to speak more than three times on any one subject without the permission of a majority of the Association.

The speaker shall not be interrupted during his speech by anyone except the Moderator unless he violates the rules of order.

No member shall absent himself without permission from the Association. Members shall use the word "Brother" or "Brethren" in all debates.

No member shall speak longer than fifteen minutes at any time without permission from the Moderator.

Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reported by the Moderator and shall be subject to the censure of the Association.

Adopted in Council this Saturday before the first Lord's Day in October, 1867, as a standing decorum, though subject to revision by a majority of members voting for revision.

Constitution and Government revised October 17, 1957,
October 15, 1964, and October 14, 1965.

PROCEEDINGS

The 124th annual session of the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists of Tennessee met at Oak Grove Free Will Baptist Church, Charlotte, Tennessee, on Wednesday morning, October 11, 1967 at 9:30 o'clock.

Rev. Eugene Waddell led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power" and "To God Be the Glory."

Rev. Robert Woodard gave the opening devotions, reading from the first chapter of First Peter, and closed his remarks with prayer. Rev. Wallace Hayes, pastor of the host church, gave a very cordial welcome to the association. Bro. J. B. Smith responded with appreciation for the privilege of the association meeting with the Oak Grove Church.

Rev. Ronald Niebruegge called the association to order, greeted the ministers, deacons, and associational delegates. This group was qualified as the voting body. Visitors were also recognized and welcomed. The following were appointed to serve as the Committee on Committees: Rev. Henry Melvin, Rev. H. C. Beasley, and Rev. Glen Hood.

Mrs. Ray Turnage brought greetings from the 70 children at the Free Will Baptist Home for Children in Greeneville, Tennessee, and gave a very inspiring report from the Home. She expressed thanks to God for His blessings and to this association for our continued support, pointing out the fact that we should earnestly pray daily for each of the children. Mrs. Turnage reported that during the past year the churches from our association have given a total of \$6,618.50 to the Home, and that the debt at the Home is at present only \$3,000.00. Motion carried that this report be accepted.

After reading from the fourth chapter of Second Timothy, Rev. Charles Thigpen gave the report of Free Will Baptist Bible College. He reported that the churches of our association gave a total of \$22,047.39 during the past year--this total including gifts to the Building Fund as well as the General Fund. Bro. Thigpen read a progress report of the expansion program of the Bible College stating that a total of \$391,413.59 has been given or committed for this cause to date from our entire denomination. The state of Tennessee has given or committed for a total of \$56,464.45. Bro. Thigpen expressed his appreciation to the Cumberland Association for its faithfulness in giving to the Bible College during the years and encouraged us to continue to pray for and support the school. Motion carried that we accept this report.

Following a twenty minute recess, Bro. Waddell led the congregation in singing "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" and "We're Marching to Zion." Bro. J. B. Hall led the group in prayer.

After an offering amounting \$86.52 was received, Mrs. Peggy Brown and Mrs. Dorothy Denney rendered a special number in song entitled "Unworthy."

Rev. George Ludwig brought the morning message, his Scripture text being Matthew 7:24-29, after which he led in prayer.

Rev. Charles Thigpen dismissed the morning service with prayer and gave thanks for the food.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Following lunch served by the host church, the afternoon service was opened with the congregation singing "Revive Us Again," after which Bro. Niebruegge delivered the moderator's message, reading from the fifth chapter of Ephesians. He then led in prayer.

The report of the Western Quarterly Meeting was given by Rev. Wallace Hayes and by motion the report was received. Motion carried that the recommendation from this quarterly meeting to the Cumberland Association be referred to the Resolutions Committee to be presented with their report.

Rev. Eugene Waddell gave the report of the Southern Quarterly Meeting and motion passed that the report be received. The recommendation from this quarterly meeting was also referred to the Resolutions Committee.

The report of the Northern Quarterly Meeting was given by Rev. Kenneth Stephens and by motion was adopted.

Rev. Don Sexton gave the report of the Tennessee State Association and announced that this years meeting will be held in Memphis, Tennessee, at the Randall Memorial Church on November 15, 16, 1967. Motion carried that this report be received.

Partial report of the Registration Committee was given by Bro. J. B. Reding and by motion was received as information.

The report of Hillmont Assembly Board of Directors was given by Dr. Robert Picirilli. Motion carried that the report be accepted with its two recommendations to be voted on item by item. By motion both recommendations were adopted.

Bro. J. B. Reding gave the report of the Superannuation Board. Motion carried that this report be adopted.

Bro. Sam Johnson gave a report of the CTS Department. By motion this report was received as information.

The moderator declared the meeting adjourned for the day and the group was dismissed.

THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 12, 1967

The Thursday morning service was opened with the singing of "Jesus Saves" led by Rev. Earl Sutton. Rev. Wallace Hayes brought the morning devotions, reading from the eleventh chapter of Acts, after which Rev. Glen Hood led in prayer.

The moderator recognized and welcomed ministers, deacons, and delegates declaring them the voting body.

Rev. E. B. McDonald gave the report of the Presbytery and by motion this report was received as information. The full report of the Presbytery will be printed in the minutes of the Cumberland Association.

The report of the Foreign Missions Board was given by Rev. Doug Roberson and the report was adopted.

Bro. A. G. Caldwell gave the report of the Home Missions Board and by motion it was adopted as read.

Rev. Rufus Coffey gave the report of the National Association. Included in his report was highlights of the 1967 National Association meeting held in Jacksonville, Florida. He pointed out also some of the needs of our denomination today. Motion carried that this report be received as information.

The minutes of the previous day's session was read by the clerk and the minutes were approved as read.

Motion carried that Wednesday's offering be given to the Bible College expansion program and Thursday's offering be given to the Jackson, Tennessee Home Mission work.

The report of the Cumberland District Woman's Auxiliary was given by Miss Mary Wisheart and by motion was adopted.

Following recess, Bro. Sutton led the congregation in singing "Send the Light" and "Rescue the Perishing." Rev. John Lindsley led in prayer.

An offering in the amount of \$78.16 was received, after which Jean, Jane, and June Picirilli sang two special numbers, "Marvelous Grace" and "He the Pearly Gates Will Open."

Rev. Norlin Jones brought the morning message using as his Scripture text Acts 9:31. He also gave an up-to-the minute report of the work in Jackson, Tennessee. Rev. Stanley Outlaw led in prayer.

Rev. Richard Cordell dismissed the morning session with prayer and gave thanks for the food.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was opened with the congregation singing "He Keeps Me Singing." Rev. Paul Weaver led in prayer.

Rev. William Mishler introduced the ministers who have been ordained in our association during the past year and also those who have recently transferred their credentials into our association. Bro. Waddell, assistant moderator of the Presbytery, welcomed these ministers into our association.

The report of the Education and Literature Board was given by Rev. Roger Reeds. He announced a TNT Workshop to be held at the Donelson Free Will Baptist Church on November 1, 2, 1967. Motion passed to adopt this report.

Rev. Carlos Craft gave the report of the Obituary Committee. The body stood in silent tribute to the memory of those who had died during the past year, after which Bro. Niebruegge led in prayer.

The Petitions & Requests Committee report was given by Rev. Gene Helton. Motion carried to adopt both recommendations of this committee. The 1968 session of the Cumberland Association will meet with Woodbine Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee.

Rev. Paul Weaver gave the report of the Temperance Committee and by motion was adopted.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was given by Rev. William Mishler and motion carried that the report be received and recommendations be adopted item by item. All recommendations were adopted as read with the exception of number three which was adopted as amended. (See reports.)

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by Rev. D. L. Sharp. By motion all officers and board members were elected as nominated by the committee. Following the resignation of Rev. Ralph Hampton, motion carried that Rev. Wallace Hayes be elected to the Board of Directors of Hillwood Assembly.

Bro. J. B. Reding read the report of the Registration---Finance Committee and by motion was received as amended---that Thursday's offering be given to Rev. Norlin Jones as a love gift.

The report of the Associational Treasurer was given by Bro. Reding. Motion carried to adopt this report.

Motion passed that a committee be appointed to study, design and make available an adequate form for the local churches to use to report to the Cumberland Association. Rev. William Mishler, Rev. Gus Thompson and Mrs. Robert Picirilli were appointed to this committee.

The following delegates were elected to the State Association: Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Frazier, and Mr. J. B. Hall.

Motion passed to adjourn and the association was dismissed in prayer by Bro. J. B. Smith to meet in 1968 on October 16, 17 at Woodbine Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee.

TEMPERANCE

We, the Temperance Committee submit the following report:

1 Corinthians 9:25a, "And every man that striveth for mastery is temperate in all things."

We recommend that we commit ourselves to temperance:

1. In Mental Activities

A. Obscene Literature--deploring the fact that many publications continue to depict crime and other sordid aspects of life, we urge cooperation with groups attempting to create public sentiment, as well as official censorship of indecent and harmful literature. We would urge upon Pastors, Sunday School Teachers and Church Training Service workers, and parents to assume more responsibility in the promotion of wholesome reading matter in the church and home.

B. By guarding our thoughts, refraining from lust for position and material possessions and carefully selecting radio and television programs.

2. In Bodily Appetites

By being modest in dress, by normal consumption of food, by total abstinence from the use of all alcoholic beverages and the practicing of proper health habits.

3. In Social Activities

By refraining from participation in questionable amusements, by indulging only in wholesome and constructive conversation, and the refusing, as much as possible, to patronize places which sell alcoholic beverages.

Furthermore, since the youth trained in our churches of today have too little admonition as to the dangers of drinking alcoholic beverages and the total abstinence from the same, also the lack of self-respect, respect for the House of the Lord, and laws of both the State and Nation, we urge the Ministers, Church officials, and parents of our churches to establish a mental, bodily, and social pattern for the youth of our churches and communities, and that these persons be responsible "under God" to be "living examples" and that they emphasize educational and training programs that will adequately inform the youth of our churches.

We further recommend that pastors and laymen write to their Senators urging them to support Senate Bill Number S2202 banning the advertising of alcoholic beverages on radio and television between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. (Senator Albert Gore, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C.; Senator Howard Baker, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C.).

EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

Steps are continually taken to improve our literature. It champions our own doctrine as well as church government. What's wrong with denominational loyalty anyway?

In conclusion let me suggest that you pray for the administration and faculty of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Pray for the ministries of the Sunday School and Church Training Service Departments.

Annual Report of the Board of Directors
Hillmont Assembly
To the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists
October 11, 1967

Part I: FINANCIAL OPERATION

When the present Board assumed operation of Hillmont in the fall of 1965, there was a note at the Ashland City Bank of \$2,431.03 plus interest, and the sinking fund was approximately \$1,095.51 in arrears. We are happy to report that the note against the property has been paid in full, and we are now only about \$343.63 in arrears in the sinking fund. We are therefore almost completely out of the red.

Our financial operation during the 1966-67 year was as follows:

Part II: CAMP OPERATION, 1967

In the early part of this year, problems arose that made it advisable to consider renting facilities for the 1967 program. First, the Tennessee Department of Public Health issued new and extensive regulations governing camps which we felt we could not meet. Second, there would be a required expenditure of several hundred dollars to put Hillmont in condition even for this summer--money that was not available to us. Third, even if the money had been in hand, it was questionable whether it would have been wise to expend it on a building that obviously could not continue to meet state approval over the next few years.

We therefore assembled the Executive Committee and other ministers of the Cumberland Association to seek their counsel. While readily accepting the final responsibility for the decision that was reached, we were gratified that the ministers supported our feeling. We therefore proceeded to rent Harrison Bay State Park near Chattanooga and had camp during the week of August 6.

In reporting this week of camp to you, we would first comment on three weaknesses. One, our decision was reached so late in the year that most facilities were already booked; therefore, we had to go much farther away from home than we would ordinarily have had to do if our decision had been reached earlier. We would probably have been able to get Montgomery Bell park had we been ready to make our reservation by January 1. Second, and for the same reason, we had only one week of camp. We would surely have had at least two weeks if we had known of our need to arrange rental in time. Third, we erred in providing a poor grade of bus transportation; the decision was motivated by a desire to save funds, and we really did not realize how inadequate the service we used was.

Now let us emphasize the positive; we are happy to report a fine week of camp. The facilities were excellent--including a good swimming pool--and there was a record enrollment of 120 campers, not counting workers. The spiritual tone of the week was very good, with two Bible classes daily and John Craft as camp evangelist. A number of meaningful decisions were recorded. On the financial side, after all fees were received and all bills paid, a profit of approximately \$300 was realized.

Part III: CAMP OPERATION IN THE FUTURE

During our two years as Board of Directors of Hillmont, one of our most pressing problems has been to analyze the outlook for the future of camping in the Cumberland Association. We have made, we believe, an honest attempt to provide for permanent facilities of our own. We devoted a great deal of attention to providing detailed reports and raising money to clear indebtedness. And we were able--by hiring a director on salary in 1966--to provide a very good program at Hillmont in 1966 (considering the inadequacy of the facilities).

We are convinced that the ideal course of action would include having our own camping facilities if these could be reasonable adequate. It is obvious to everyone that they are woefully inadequate at the present, and so we have given careful study to the matter of what it would take to make them adequate. Minimum facilities would include several groups of cabins (or two dormitories if that approach were preferred); a main building to serve as dining hall and lodge; a tabernacle; a swimming pool and/or lake; athletic fields; and so on. One of the members of our board is a contractor who has prepared rough drawings of the type buildings we would need and has estimated costs. It is our estimate that it would require an expenditure of at least \$50,000 to provide the very minimum of reasonably adequate facilities.

If such facilities were in our possession, we could provide a very expanded camping program for the entire year--a program that would be wonderful indeed. Of course, such a program would involve at least two full-time salaried personnel: a camp director and a caretaker-maintenance supervisor.

But while we feel such a program would be ideal, we are face to face with two hard objections. First, we do not believe the Association will be prepared in the near future to support such an expensive ministry; second, we are not sure that--even if the money were available--we are ready to provide such a year-round program. Therefore, having considered both sides of the question thoroughly, we feel that wisdom requires that we recommend the annual rental of camping facilities in preference to maintaining our own. There are several advantages.

One, we can have adequate facilities. There are state parks, and one or two privately-owned facilities that are available to us. These provide essentials--including swimming facilities--which we cannot provide at Hillmont.

Two, no financial investment is required, neither at the beginning nor for yearly maintenance and repair. Fees charged will cover costs. This was true this year, as reported above, even though we labored with a tremendous transportation cost that would not generally be necessary. It was interesting to us in a recent meeting to hear the report of a \$300 profit this year, while at the same meeting our treasurer reported an expenditure of half that amount for just one year's insurance on the Hillmont property!

Three, there are no year-round "headaches" connected with supervising and keeping up the facilities. A director for each week can be appointed each year, and all he must do is plan the activities for his week. When the week is over, everyone gets on the bus or in his car and goes home until next year. It seems foolish to us to spend the money and time required to maintain facilities the year round for just a few weeks of camping each summer.

As a result of our consideration, therefore, we make the following two specific recommendations:

1. That the Board be given permission to provide for the rental of adequate facilities for the summer camping programs.

2. That the Board be given authority to try to arrange a sale for our Hillmont grounds, expecting at least enough to cover present indebtedness, final details of the contract to be approved by the Executive Committee of the Cumberland Association. (Note: We have had the property appraised, and the estimate is that we can get \$45 or \$50 an acre, thus around \$7,000.)
