GOVERNMENT AND CONSTITUTION

CUMBERLAND ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

ARTICLE 1. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to one delegate for the first 50 members or fraction thereof, and an additional delegate for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof. Each delegate shall be entitled to cast one vote on all business transactions.

ARTICLE 2. Each member church of the Association shall send a letter to each annual meeting, giving members received during year, enrollment, members dismissed, name and address of pastor and other officers, and financial statement of receipts and disbursements, according to the form provided by the clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE 3. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper code of rules which they are authorized to establish for themselves.

ARTICLE 4. They may elect a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer from among themselves, and they may hold their offices until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE 5. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except when withdrawn by consent.

ARTICLE 6. New churches shall petition the quarterly meeting for membership. The quarterly meetings shall have power to receive new churches as members, and in turn shall recommend them to the annual Association.

ARTICLE 7. This Association shall furnish each church with minutes of their proceedings, in proportion to the amount of money sent by each church; in order to enable the Association to print their minutes it is expected that each church will send such sums of money as they think proper, and when the money is received, it shall be placed in the hands of a trustee appointed for that purpose, and may be disbursed by order of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. For the purpose of ordaining ministers of the gospel and for trying all ordained members for un-Christian conduct, there shall be a Presbytery, which shall convene at the opening of the Association, and at any time during the associational year, if called by the Moderator or his assistants or any five members of said Presbytery who deem it necessary to make such a call. The Presbytery shall consist of ordained members present, and they shall elect a Moderator and clerk from among themselves for the time being, who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected. It shall be the duty of said Presbytery to examine all applications for ordination sent with recommendations from their churches composing this Association, and if found competent, to ordain and set them apart for the work by laying on of hands. The Presbytery shall have full power to try all ordained members for un-Christian conduct, and on testimony their decision shall be final.

ARTICLE 9. It shall be the duty of each minister who shall organize a church to ordain deacons for the same. It is his duty, also, to ordain deacons where a vacancy occurs within his charge. It shall be the duty of each pastor to encourage the organization and support of the Sunday school in the church or churches where he is pastor, as well as other organizations that may prove helpful to the work of the church.

ARTICLE 10. No person shall be ordained to the ministry nor shall the credentials of any minister be ratified until he is qualified to meet the conditions stated in the third chapter of I Timothy. The term "the husband of one wife" means he shall not have more than one living wife (that is, he shall not be married to one wife at the present time and there be a wife still living from a previous marriage). This shall be tested by the Presbytery. The Presbytery

shall have full power to propound such Spiritual questions as they consider necessary to determine his qualifications. All candidates for ordination shall be required to answer these questions satisfactorily.

ARTICLE 11. This Association may exclude from its body any minister who teaches heresy, or any church that countenances him in said teaching or that may be disloyal to the tenets of Faith as held by this Association and expressed in our Articles of Faith.

ARTICLE 12. All questions coming before this Association shall be determined by a majority vote, except exclusion of churches which shall require two-thirds majority.

ARTICLE 13. Representatives from five churches shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and no business shall be transacted without a quorum.

ARTICLE 14. The minutes of this Association shall be read before the body, corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE 15. This Association may adjourn to meet with any church that is a regular member of it at any time it deems proper.

ARTICLE 16. Amendments may be made to this form of government at any time by a majority of the members present composing the Association, voting in behalf of the amendment.

ARTICLE 17. When this Association shall have convened, it is the privilege of all ordained members belonging to the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists to sit in council with us, and to propose resolutions coming before the body as though they were delegates from the church.

ARTICLE 18. This Association, having jurisdiction over all the churches within its bounds, shall discipline any church which calls a minister for a pastor who has been excluded by the Presbytery.

BOARDS

ARTICLE 1. All standing boards shall be composed of three members, except the Home Mission Board and Superannuation Board which shall be composed of five members, and the Executive Board and the Youth Camp Board which shall be composed of seven members.

The personnel of each of the foregoing boards, exclusive of the Executive, Home Mission, Superannuation and Youth Camp Board shall be elected as follows: the first named for a period of one year, the second named for a period of two years, and the third named for a period of three years. Succession to office thereafter shall be determined as order requires. The Home Mission Board, and Superannuation Board, shall be elected on a rotation basis with one member being elected each year for a five-year term. The Youth Camp Board shall be elected on a rotation basis with one member being elected each year for a seven-year term.

ARTICLE 2. The personnel of the Executive Board shall be composed of the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and the moderators of each quarterly meeting.

ARTICLE 3. The Executive Board shall have the power to act in behalf of and for the Cumberland Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary for its own government, and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the Association. It shall be the duty of the Executive Board to make written reports of all its work to each annual session of the Association.

ARTICLE 4. The duties of the various standing boards shall be to plan a program and supervise its operations in their respective fields. They shall organize themselves and regulate their work as may become necessary and as may be found in harmony with the principles and tenets of the Association.

RULES AND DECORUM

This Association shall be opened by singing and prayer. Only one person may speak at a time. All addresses made by the members shall be made to the Moderator, and the person thus speaking shall strictly confine himself to the subject in debate. No speaker shall cast any personal reflection toward any member of this body who has spoken previously.

No person shall be allowed to speak more than three times on any one subject without the permission of a majority of the Association.

The speaker shall not be interrupted during his speech by anyone except the Moderator unless he violates the rules of order.

No member shall absent himself without permission from the Association. Members shall use the word "Brother" or "Brethren" in all debates.

No member shall speak longer than fifteen minutes at any time without permission from the Moderator.

Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reported by the Moderator and shall be subject to the censure of the Association.

Adopted in Council this Saturday before the first Lord's Day in October, 1867, as a standing decorum, though subject to revision by a majority of members voting for revision.

PROCEEDING

The 125th annual session of the Cumberland Association of Free Will Baptists of Tennessee convened at Woodbine Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, on Wednesday morning, October 16, 1968, at 9:30 o'clock.

Rev. George Lee led the congregation in singing "Work For the Night is Coming" and "Glory to His Name," after which Rev. Roger Reeds led in prayer.

Rev. Harvey Hill brought the morning devotions from Psalms 121 and called on Rev. E. A. Craft to lead in prayer. Rev. Richard Cordell, pastor of the host church, gave the association a very warm welcome and Bro. J. B. Hall responded with appreciation for the privilege of the association meeting with the Woodbine Church.

Rev. Nedo Eaddy, assistant moderator, called the association to order and qualified the ministers, deacons and associational delegates as the voting body. By motion the printed program was adopted as the order of business for this session. All visitors were cordially welcomed to this meeting. The following were appointed to serve as the Committee on Committees: Jesse Webb, Jerry Pinkerton, and Wallace Hayes.

Rev. Don Ellis gave a report from the Home for Children in Greeneville, Tennessee. He thanked each church in this association for their financial and prayer support during the past year. Mr. Ellis reported that during the past year the churches from our association have given a total of \$6,174.65 to the Home. Motion carried to adopt this report.

Following a fifteen minute recess, the Bible College report was given by Dr. L. C. Johnson. He expressed thanks to God and appreciation to the Cumberland Association churches for their faithfulness to Free Will Baptist Bible College in the past. The churches in the Cumberland Association have given a total of \$26,848.16 to Free Will Baptist Bible College during the past year (\$12,636.46 to the general fund and \$14,211.70 to the expansion program). By motion this report was accepted.

After a congregational song, an offering in the amount of \$94.20 was received, followed by a special number in song, "Precious Hiding Place," by Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Fletcher.

Rev. Bob Shockey brought an inspiring message, reading Revelation 3:20 as his Scripture text, after which he led in prayer.

The moderator read the following report of the Committee on Committees and it was adopted as read:

Rev. Henry Melvin dismissed the morning service with prayer and gave thanks for the food.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Following lunch served by the host church, the afternoon service was opened with the congregation singing "No, Not One." Bro. Forrest Reynolds led in prayer, after which Bro. Eaddy delivered the moderator's message, reading from the third chapter of Luke, verses one and two, and then led in prayer.

The report of the Western Quarterly Meeting was given by Rev. Wallace Hayes. Motion carried that this report be adopted.

The report of the Northern Quarterly Meeting was given by Rev. Glen Hood and by motion was adopted, with the two recommendations being referred to the Petitions and Requests Committee.

Rev. Jerry Pinkerton gave the report of the Southern Quarterly Meeting and motion carried that the report be adopted.

Miss Mary Wisehart gave the report of the Cumberland District Woman's Auxiliary Convention and by motion the report was adopted.

The report of the Tennessee State Association was given by Rev. W. B. Hughes. He announced this year's meeting will be held in Church Hill, Tennessee, at the Church Hill Free Will Baptist Church on November 11-13, 1968. Motion carried that this report be adopted.

Bro. Hughes then gave the report of Hillmont Assembly and motion carried to adopt the report, including the recommendation that the name of the Board be changed to Youth Camp Board.

The report of the National Association was given by Rev. Rufus Coffey. In this report was included highlights of the 1968 National Association meeting

which was held in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He also announced the 1969 meeting to be held in St. Louis, Missouri on July 14-17, at the Sheraton-Jefferson Hotel. Motion carried that this report be received as information.

Bro. J. B. Reding gave a partial report of the Registration Committee. This report was received as information.

Motion carried that ARTICLE 2 (under BOARDS) of the Constitution be amended to include the assistant moderator as a member of the Executive Board.

Motion carried that the first sentence of ARTICLE 1 (under BOARDS) be amended to read as follows: "All standing boards shall be composed of three members, except the Home Mission Board and Superannuation Board which shall be composed of five members, and the Executive Board and the Youth Camp Board which shall be composed of seven members."

The report of the Petitions and Requests Committee was given by Rev. Gerald Richmond and by motion both recommendations of this committee were adopted.

The moderator declared the meeting adjourned for the day and the group was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Wallace Hayes.

THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 17, 1968

The Thursday morning session was opened with the congregation singing "Blessed Be the Name" and "Blessed Assurance" led by Rev. W. B. Hughes. Rev. Wallace Hayes brought the morning devotions from Matthew 23, and then led in prayer.

The moderator declared the ministers, deacons and delegates present as the voting body for this session. He also welcomed all visitors.

The report of the Presbytery was given by Rev. E. B. McDonald and motion carried this report be adopted. The full report of the Presbytery will be printed in the minutes of the Cumberland Association. Rev. William Mishler presented the newly ordained ministers in this association and also those who have transferred from other Free Will Baptist bodies.

Bro. J. B. Reding gave the report of the Superannuation Board and by motion the report was accepted.

The report of the Foreign Missions Board was given by Rev. Reford Wilson and report was received. Bro. Mishler led the group in special prayer for the missionary requests given to us by Bro. Wilson.

Rev. Roger Reeds gave the report of the Education and Literature Board and motion carried to adopt this report.

Bro. A. G. Caldwell gave the report of the Home Missions Board. By motion this report was adopted.

Rev. William Mishler gave the report of the special committee appointed during the 1967 session to study forms used by our local churches in reporting to the Cumberland Association. Motion carried to adopt this report.

Following a twenty minute recess, Bro. Hughes led the congregation in singing "I Love to Tell the Story" and "He Loves Me." Dr. Robert Picirilli led in prayer.

An offering of \$53.11 was received, after which the Rev. Earl Langley family sang a special number "Sweeter Each Day."

Bro. Langley then brought the morning message, his subject being "How Deep the Experience" and taking his Scripture text from Romans, chapters 7 and 8. He then led in prayer.

Rev. George Ludwig dismissed the morning session with prayer and gave thanks for the food.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session was opened with the congregation singing "I Know Whom I Have Believed." Rev. Gerald Richmond led in prayer.

The minutes of the previous day's session and of the Thursday morning session was read by the clerk and approved as read.

Rev. E. A. Craft gave the report of the Obituary Committee and by motion was adopted as read. The body stood in silent tribute in memory of those who had died during the past year, after which Bro. Eaddy led in prayer.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was given by Rev. William Mishler and the report was received to be voted on item by item. Motion carried that item one be tabled and that the recommendation be studied by the various quarterly meetings during the coming year and brought back before this association at the 1969 session. Items two and three were adopted.

Rev. George Ludwig gave the report of the Temperance Committee. This report was adopted as amended (see reports).

The report of the Nominating Committee was given by Rev. Richard Cordell and was received to be voted on item by item. All nominees were elected except the treasurer. Bro. J. B. Reding was nominated from the floor and duly elected to this office.

Bro. J. B. Reding gave the report of the Registration-Finance Committee and by motion was adopted.

The report of the Associational Treasurer was given by Bro. Reding. Motion carried that this report be adopted.

The Registration Committee for the 1969 session was appointed by the moderator as follows: Glenn Vann, Mavis Walker, and Nadine Hood.

A rising vote of thanks and appreciation was given to the officers who have served during the past year.

State Association delegates were elected as follows: Mrs. Earl Langley, Mrs. Glen Hood, Mrs. Nedo Eaddy, Mrs. Harvey Hill, and Mrs. Robert Picirilli.

Rev. Norlin Jones gave a short report on the progress of the new church at Jackson, Tennessee.

Rev. D. L. Sharp gave a short report of the new work recently started in Laverne, Tennessee.

Rev. William Mishler reported the possibility of a new work being started near Franklin, Tennessee, in the near future.

Motion passed that we select the name of a representative to submit to the Nominating Committee of the State Association, suggesting that this person serve as a representative of the state of Tennessee at the meeting of National officers and State delegates to be held in Nashville, Tennessee, on December 2, 1968. Rev. Eugene Waddell was selected.

Motion carried that we request the State Association to meet with the Loyal Chapel Free Will Baptist Church, Columbia, Tennessee, in 1969.

TEMPERANCE

We, the Temperance Committee, submit the following report:

I Corinthians 9:25a, "And every man that striveth in mastery in temperance in all things."

We recommend that we commit ourselves to temperance:

1. In Mental Activities
 - A. Obscene Literature - deploring the fact that many publications continue to depict crime and other sordid aspects of life, we urge cooperation with groups attempting to create public sentiment, as well as official censorship of indecent and harmful literature. We would urge upon Pastors, Sunday School Teachers, and Church Training Service works, and parents to assume more responsibility in the promotion of wholesome reading matter in church and in the home.
 - B. By guarding our thoughts, refraining from lust for position and material possessions and carefully selecting radio and television programs.
2. In Bodily Appetites
 - A. By being modest in dress, by normal consumption of food, by total abstinence from the use of all alcoholic beverages and the practicing of proper health habits.
3. In Social Activities
 - A. By refraining from participation in questionable amusements, by indulging only in wholesome and constructive conversation, and the refusing, as much as possible, to patronize places which sell alcoholic beverages.
 - B. Furthermore, since many of the youth trained in our churches of today have too little admonition as to the dangers of drinking alcoholic beverages and the total abstinence from the same, also the lack of self-respect, respect for the House of the Lord, and the laws of both the State and Nation, we urge the Ministers, Church officials, and parents of our churches to establish a mental, bodily, and social pattern for the youth of our churches and communities, and that these persons be responsible "under God" to be "living examples" and that they emphasize educational and training programs that will adequately

inform the youth of our churches.

C. We urge our ministers and people in this time of political and social unrest to refrain from any participation in or with extremists who defy law and order and thereby create a state of more confusion and uncertainty in our society.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

God is at work in our world. One of the most phenomenal movings of evangelism in this century is taking place in Indonesia. In Latin America, an unusual moving is seen among Roman Catholics. In troubled Africa, the national church under seemingly adverse circumstances is experiencing growth.

Free Will Baptist missionaries are fulfilling their calling in India, Japan, Ivory Coast, France, Panama, Uruguay, Ecuador, and Brazil. On returning to North India, the Cronks found their area flooded. Some of their Christian villages were destroyed by the flood. The Hannas will return for furlough in early December. Brother Willey remains seriously ill and he waits patiently for deliverance from his body of suffering. A letter from Cuba reports the continuing witness of our people in Cuba. On behalf of our 78 missionaries and appointees, I thank you for your prayers and gifts.

We are thus able to report that we have no property and no debts, and need no gifts from the churches. The \$7,500 received left us more than \$500.00 to the good after all bonds and interest were paid off.

Part II: THE 1968 CAMPING PROGRAM

We are especially happy to report on the most successful camping program ever conducted in the Cumberland Association. As you know by now, we used Montgomery Bell State Park and rented two completely separate campsites there during the week of August 18. One campsite was for juniors, the other for teens. In the junior camp, directed by Mr. Harvey Hill, we had 140 (including 23 workers). In the teen camp, directed by Mrs. Ronald Niebruegge, there were 135 (including 18 workers). Thus, each camp had 117 campers, for a total of 234.

From a spiritual standpoint, both directors report significant accomplishments, the campers also agreeing the camps had a real impact on their lives. One camp reported 64 decisions, the other nearly 100.

From a financial standpoint, the camps were quite successful. Even after reducing our charges, the week's operation left us with an income from the campers of nearly \$860.00 more than the expenses!

With reference to plans for next year, which we have already begun to make, the following points might be of interest. We are laying plans for a three-week program rather than this year's two-week program, and hope to fill all three weeks with a three-way age-grouping. We are planning to use the same facilities, although final dates will have to be announced later. With this year's experience behind us, and now knowing better the costs we will have, we expect to provide better services, including better food (especially fresh milk instead of powdered). We do not purposely intend to operate at a profit and will gradually be able to bring expenditures and charges into closer balance.

This leaves a current cash-in-bank balance of \$1,496.37. (Note: there is an additional balance of \$42.87 still in the old sinking fund, giving us a total cash-on-hand of \$1,539.24. We are not sure, but there may be yet a \$100 bond that has not been cashed).

Here is a summary report on the 1968 camping operation: Receipts totaled \$4,428.44 of which \$3,613.00 was in camper's fees and the rest mostly from gross concession and handcraft sales. Expenditures were \$3,567.87, leaving a surplus of \$860.63 (as indicated above). The main expenditures were, in round figures; \$150 travel; \$1150 food; \$750 items for resale; \$578 camp rental; \$220 honorariums; \$150 recreation equipment; \$78 literature; \$140 rental of cots, chairs; \$200 insurance; \$50 first-aid supplies. A detailed accounting is available to any who would like to check with the secretary of the Board.

We recommend that the association officially change our name to the Youth Camp Board. (This requires a constitutional amendment of Article 1 under "Boards").
