PROCEEDINGS

The Thirteenth Annual Woman's District Auxiliary Convention of the F. W. B. of Cumberland Association of Tenn. was called to order by the President in Bethlehem Church, Wednesday morning, August 23rd, 1933.

Opening hymn, "Jesus Calls Us."

Devotional service was conducted by Mrs. W. E. Felts, on the subject, "Launch Out Into the Deep." It was an earnest appeal for a deeper consecration of one's life in service for the Master.

The Address of Welcome was delivered by Mrs. J. W. Maxey, and responded to by Mrs. Lillian Lee.

Roll called and the following Societies responded by letter or delegate: Ashland City, Bethel, Bethlehem, East Nashville, Coffers Chapel, New Hope, Rock Springs, Oaklawn and West Nashville.

Motion made and carried, the chair appoint the following committees:

President's Message by Mrs. Edd Parker, followed by a talk by Rev. J. E. Hudgens. Both messages were enjoyed by the Convention.

Report of delegate to Ladies' Aid Convention of Union Association by

Mrs. Mary Welch. Mrs. Welch gave a very interesting and encouraging report of work done by Union L. A. S. Convention.

Motion we accept and adopt report as read, and this Convention pay expenses of delegate to Union Ladies' Aid Convention which was \$12.85 and we send delegates to next annual setting of this Convention, delegates to be appointed by Executive Committee, expenses paid by the Convention.

A general discussion on Zion Bible School at Blakely, Ga., each Society represented at this Convention is asked to help in this work, with your prayers and offerings.

Motion made and carried that this Convention pay \$25.00 to Zion Bible School.

Each Society represented in this Convention, is asked and urged to send in 10 cents per capita for General Conference funds.

By motion the National Sect. of Women's Work be paid 10 cents per capita by Treas. of Convention for General Conference funds, if Societies fail to send in at Convention 10 cents per capita.

By motion Convention pay Mrs. Fannie Polston \$10.00 for book of programs.

"National Women's Work in Review and Prospect" by Mrs. Fannie Polston, gave some encouraging reports from the field.

Reports from Societies called for. The reports were received from the following Societies: Ashland City, Bethel, Bethlehem, Coffey's Chapel, East Nashville, Rock Springs, New Hope, Oak Lawn, and West Nashville.

Reports from Departmental Chairman called for, and received as follows:

Stewardship Departmental Work of 1933.

Report of Stewardship Departmental Work by Mrs. Agnes Frazier. Report read by Mrs. Alexine Slack and is as follows: During the past year we have faced new and challenging circumstances in our efforts for Kingdom Extension, as financial difficulties grew more perplexing. We felt more keenly the need of real Stewards. Surely, we need reinforcement of our women in our churches, whose duties lead them to study and present "God's Plan," not ours, for Kingdom Extension. For this cause the Stewardship Department was created, as a definite means of promoting Stewardship in each Society, and as an aid in securing more accurate reports of tithers. I recommend the continued use of Stewardship or plan of work in each Society.

Believing the Stewardship Declamation Contest to be an excellent means of developing consciousness in the hearts and minds of young people. I recommend this contest be continued and the awards be the same as last year. In order to stir up the minds of our local society leaders, "by way of remembrance" we recommend:

1st—That state wide recognition be given to churches in which every woman makes some offering to the church during the year 1934.

2nd—That we make a tireless canvass of our members for the tithes and offerings which God has ordained.

3rd—That we continue to distribute literature on Stewardship, urge the study of Stewardship text books, and the use of Stewardship programs.

4th—That we offer our service to the church in seeking to enlighten every member as to their duty as a Steward in extending God's Kingdom.

For this cause we were given a place in "Women's Auxiliary Plans" and to this end we were created as a Department that "over the tumult of life's wild and restless sea," the women connected with the Free Will Baptist Church, might hear the call of Christ and follow Him in extending His Kingdom. Motion to accept and adopt report as read, and Mrs. Mary Welch be appointed as chairman for Stewardship Dept. for the ensuing year.

Report on Mission Work by Mrs. J. H. Oliver, Chairman.

Report is as follows: mailed letters to 12 Societies in order to get report on mission work, thus far, I have only had reports from four of our Societies. On First Sunday in Jan. Bethlehem had a Program on missions, also Pastor W. H. Oliver preached a special sermon on missions. Offering for missions \$6 85. On July 2nd. Ashland City had a special program on missions, collection for missions \$12.00. This society has a Junior Mission Band which is being trained to do more and greater work for the Master. On May 21st, Coffey's Chapel put on a mission program, by Junior boys and girls. An address was given by Miss Bertha Bruce on Mission Work in China and India. Sermon by an eleven year old girl, "Returned Missionaries from China" Collection for missions \$38.55. We have had one missionary class taught by Mrs. Mary Welch, text book, Stewardship and Missions.

East Nashville Society reports 12 monthly meetings in which the study of two books were completed. Two Programs presented by a group of returned Missionaries from China, sponsored two reading contests in which 125 people read the larger Stewardship book, gave one book on missions to one of our young ministers, distributed 5000 tracts of good literature.

By motion this report be accepted and adopted as read and Mrs. J. H. Oliver be appointed chairman for the ensuing year.

Educational Plan of Work.

Report on Education by Supt. Mrs. Mary Welch.

In the Educational Department, the standard of achievement for Ladies Aid Societies was mimeographed and mailed, or sent, to each Society with a letter of explanation. New Hope Society's standard showed very good work. Coffey's Chapel had two public Temperance services. Ashland City had one Temperance program and two Temperance services. East Nashville distributed 1334 tracts of good literature, published and distributed the Courier. Sponsored a reading circle, taught eight classes in Stewardship and missions, prepared programs for week of prayer, distributed literature on Temperance, Stewardship, Missions and other subjects, had two temperance programs. There is a great need for more literature, I am sure from lack of reports in my Dept. We have not done all that we could do, but I trust that we shall determine at this convention that this year we will give our hearty support to next year's program and promoters. Much interest was taken in awards for leadership and missionary readings.

Motion to accept and adopt the report as read, and Mrs. Agnes Frazier be appointed chairman of this Department for the ensuing year.

Report of Personal Service Department.

Report of Personal Service Department by Supt. Mrs. Gladys Jackson.

Report is as follows: Of all the Departments of our Women's Auxiliary, I feel that none can be of more importance than that of Personal Service, for in this work, the humblest, the poorest, and the uneducated may perform services for God, that are really necessary, notwithstanding the total in dollars and cents doesn't make a very big showing. We have no way of knowing how long our deeds of personal service will live in the hearts of the poor souls we aid, or just the amount of good results that may come from such influences we set in motion. We do know that He said, "In as much as ye did it unto the least of these you did it unto me." I love the poem, "The House By The Side Of The Road" but I would like to add the lines, "Let me live in a house by the side of the road and be a friend to man." The words in God's name for that is really the way to render service if we are to expect the best results, and this is the aim of our Personal Service, not for the glory of ourselves, but for God's kingdom. If we truly believe, we would be more serious about how much of our time, talents and means we are devoting to God's works. I am proud of the few reports that have been sent to me. I mailed the blanks for reports to each Society represented at the Convention in August, with a letter urging them to be a 100% in paying Convention dues, and sending in full report.

Statistical reports is as follows: Coffey's Chapel made 1483 visits to see the sick, cripples and shut-ins, 175 baskets and trays to the poor, 17 baskets of fruit to the sick, 297 garments given to the poor, 10 cottage prayer meetings held, 11 soul winning efforts, \$18.10 for groceries, \$34.80 donated for charity, 613 visits in the interest of the Society.

East Nashville—Made 704 visits to see the sick, cripples and shut-ins, 15 trays and baskets distributed, 270 garments to the poor, 15 cottage prayer meetings held, \$2.85 donated for charity.

Ashland City—Made 240 visits to see the sick, 17 trays and baskets to the poor, 14 soul winning efforts, 84 garments to the poor, \$36.00 donated to charity, 4 calls in the interest of the Society.

Oak Lawn Society—Made 286 visits to see the sick, 46 trays given to the sick, 20 garments given to the poor.

New Hope Society—Made 488 visits to see the sick, 12 visits in the interest of the Society, 56 trays to the sick, 5 baskets to the poor, 95 garments distributed to the poor.

Bethel Society—Made 100 visits to see the sick and carried 3 trays to the sick.

Rock Springs—Made 401 visits to see the sick, 91 trays to the sick.

West Nashville—Made 288 visits to see the sick, 3 charity calls, 1 tray to sick.

By motion we accept reports as read and retain Mrs. Jackson as chairman for the ensuing year.

A general discussion on week of prayer was given. The following Societies observed the week of prayer: East Nashville, New Hope, Ashland City, Coffey's Chapel, Bethlehem, Bethel, Oak Lawn.

Motion made to adjourn to meet at 9:30 Thursday morning.

Convention was called to order at 9:30 by the Pres. Mrs. Edd Parker.
Song "Jesus Calls Us."

Devotional Topic, "Our Task," by Miss Alene Reed.

Roll call, quorum being present, the President declared the house open for business.

Minutes of Wednesday were read and approved.

Report of Committee called for.

Committee on Plan of Work for 1934 is as follows:

We, your committee on plan of work for 1934, recommend that the plan of work used in 1933 be used again this year. The plan of work is as follows:

I. Educational Plan of Work.

- (a) Standard of achievement for Women's Work.
- (b) Encourage Orphanage Work by special programs and donations.
- (b) Encouraging movement for Free Will Baptist Training School for Ministers and Christian Workers.
- (c) Preparation of leaflets, stories and plays for Stewardship and Mission Work.
- (d) Preparation of programs for week of prayer.
- (e) Distribution of Temperance literature.
- (f) At least one Temperance program given during a year.
- (g) Distribution of any good literature that will encourage F. W. B. Work and promote God's Kingdom on earth.
- (h) Distribute or see that Presidents of each Ladies' Aid Society has a copy of achievements.

Mrs. Agnes Frazier was appointed Superintendent of the Department work for 1934.

II. Plan of work for Personal Service.

Each Society Chairman keep an accurate record of the following:

- (a) Cottage Prayer meetings.
- (b) Soul-winning efforts made.
- (c) Clean up campaigns.
- (d) Visiting to get new members for church, Sunday School and Ladies' Aid Society.
- (e) Visits to see sick, crippled and shut-ins.
- (f) Garments, trays and baskets to the poor.
- (g) Bibles given.
- (h) Having a personal Service committee.

Each personal service chairman send to the Departmental Superintendent, on or before Aug. 1, 1934, a complete record of work done.

A personal service chart will be presented at the Annual Convention by Superintendent of Personal Department work.

Recognitions.

A banner will be awarded the Society reporting first to the Convention President 100% in "Standard Achievement."

A banner will be awarded to Society gaining highest per cent in the following:

- (1) Largest number enrolled in Stewardship class—20%.
- (2) Largest number of new members for 1934—20%.
- (3) Largest number of tithers for 1934—20%.
- (4) Payment of Mission dues by every member—20%.
- (5) Co-operation in report to Department Superintendent—20%.

Mrs. Fred Jackson was appointed Superintendent for this Department for the ensuing year.

III. Plan of work for Stewardship Department.

- (a) Each stewardship chairman conduct a stewardship contest among young people selecting winners for the Convention, where awards of medals will be made by the Convention President.
- (b) One book on Stewardship studied this year.
- (c) One talk on stewardship each quarter.
- (d) Four months tithing campaign (from March 1st to June 30th).
- (e) One program devoted entirely to Stewardship.
- (f) Each Stewardship Chairman send to department Superintendent on or before Aug. 1st, 1934, a complete report of the work.

Mrs. Mary Welch was appointed Superintendent of this Department for the ensuing year.

Mission Plan of Work

I. That a week of prayer be held the week preceding Easter.

II. Mission Study class having three fourths of active members enrolled, not less than four hours spent in class work, All enrolled must read the text book.

III. Each Mission Chairman to keep a complete record of classes and awards of her Society and report her work on or before Aug. 1st, 1934, to the Department Superintendent.

IV. Each Mission Chairman to collect a mission dollar from each member and report amount collected to Department Superintendent on August 1st, 1934.

V. A special program devoted entirely to Missions, either home or foreign, and a special offering for missions.

Mrs. J. H. Oliver was appointed Superintendent for the ensuing year.

Standard of Achievement for Ladies' Aid Societies. To be an A-1 Society you must observe the following ten points:

- (1) At least 12 meetings of the Society during the year.

- (2) An increase of active membership of 10% of the number enrolled at the beginning of the year.
 - (3) 100% payment of Convention dues.
 - (4) Participation in the observance of week of prayer.
 - (5) One Mission study class.
 - (6) Personal service work reported to Convention.
 - (7) An average attendance at the Society meetings of one half of the active members.
 - (8) One Stewardship study class.
 - (9) Participation in the annual Stewardship Declamation contest.
 - (10) One Free Will Baptist religious paper or magazine subscribed for in one half of the families represented in your Society.
- "Let's be A-1 in 1934 and not be a-shamed."

4—Be it resolved that we donate fifteen minutes to a memorial program in honor of our departed members who have been called from us during the year. The program to be arranged by the program committee.

5—That we thank our officers and all our speakers for their untiring efforts and inspiring messages.

6—That we continue our Declamation Contest, and that the age limit for those contesting be between 8 and 14 years, and the awards be the same as last year.
