PROCEEDINGS

The Eighteenth Session of the Woman's District Auxiliary Convention of Free Will Baptist of the Cumberland Association of Tennessee was called to order by the president, Mrs. H. W. Christian, at Bethel Church, on Wednesday morning, August 24, 1938.

The minutes of the morning session were read and adopted.

In the absences of the corresponding secretary, Miss Mary Lou Gower, Mrs. Agnes Frazier was asked to take charge of the standard of achievements and give the report for Miss Gower.

Mrs. Polston stated that the Good Spring's Society wished to re-enter the convention and a motion was made and carried that we receive Good Spring Society into the convention.

Miss Martha Lou Harris of the Ashland City Society, who was the winner of the 1937 Convention Declamation Contest and was given a trip to the National Convention to compete in the National Contest was asked to stand and was given a hearty applaud for succeeding in winning the National Contest.

A motion was made and carried that our societies start entertaining our Convention alphabetically.

Mrs. Christian expressed thanks to other churches and members of Bethel Church who were not Ladies Aid members for cooperating in entertaining the Convention.

Report of Committee on Resolutions

1. Inasmuch as this Convention has been wonderfully entertained and splendidly conducted, be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Bethel Church and community for its hospitality and to our president and other officers and to our visitors, Rev. J. C. Griffith and Mr. and Mrs. I. L. Standley, who have made valuable contributions to this meeting.

2. Be it resolved that this Convention abide by program of National Stewardship Director in that we send winners of only junior and intermediate ages; the juniors 9-12 and intermediate 13-16.

3. Since our women feel very keenly and need as a denomination of a Christian Educational Institution, we recommend that the Second Vice President in each society make an effort to collect at least 10c per member from each member of her church and same be turned over to the proper authority.

4. Inasmuch as Mrs. Nancy Parker has rendered such valuable service to this Convention in selecting and buying a site for an Or-

phanage in Tennessee, we recommend that her name be added to the Board of Control of this institution.

5. Resolved, that the winners of the Stewardship Declamation Contest be awarded a trip to our National Woman's Auxiliary Convention with all expenses paid by this body.

6. Resolved, that the mission money raised by each society be brought to the Convention and paid to the Third Vice President, the Director of Missions, and she be instructed to mail such funds immediately to our National Secretary of Home and Foreign Missions.

Report of Chairman of Orphanage Committee

MRS. E. D. PARKER

I made a trip last Fall to investigate the old Pardue home at Cheap Hill. I did not think it suitable for our Orphanage as the building was very old and badly out of repair and the ground was not very good.

May 11, 1938, I made a trip to Greeneville, Tenn., to see the piece of property being purchased by the Union Association for an orphanage with a view of buying it jointly if our committee found it suitable.

This piece of property is located at the foot of Greene Mountain, 10 miles from Greeneville, Tenn., about 275 miles from Nashville. It has 150 acres of fairly good ground, 80 acres of tillable land and 70 acres in timber and grass. Has a 7-room farm house in good condition, a dairy barn which will take care of 20 cows, a place for horses, will hold 20 tons of hay and other grains. Has a large tool shed, a fine garden space, a young orchard, 2 chicken houses, running water in yard and barn.

The main building, a large dormitory is a 3-story frame, with running water on each floor, 2 baths on first floor and 1 on the second floor. This building has a concrete basement with plenty storage room for fruits and vegetables, a laundry room with two tubs, a hotel range in good condition, a sink, plenty of closet space all over the building, plenty built-in features in kitchen, two furnaces in fair

condition, a large screened in back porch. All buildings are frame and need repairs. It is estimated that 1500 dollars will put the place in good condition. Children will have access to school through high school. The road from Greeneville is not concrete but good and the county judge assured me the road will be put in first-class condition. There is a beautiful pine grove suitable for young people's camps and other assemblies. The name has been given it of Tennessee Free Will Baptist Orphanage.

We have until September to finish the deal, and the price is \$4500. We have already made a down payment of \$500 and have a copy of the deed. A Board of Trustees has been appointed jointly and the names are: Rev. Geo. D. Dunbar, Clyde Long, B. M. Pierce, George Cannon, Samuel Herrell, J. L. Welch, George Harris, Mrs. Fannie Polston, Mrs. E. D. Parker, G. W. Fambrough. A Board of Control has also been named as follows: J. L. Welch, Mrs. Edna Harris, Mrs. H. W. Christian, Cephas Felts, and three from the Union Association.
