Theme: "Compelling Love"

Scripture: John 13:35

The 45th Annual Session of Cumberland District Woman's Auxiliary Convention opened at the Free Will Baptist Bible College on Wednesday morning, August 11, 1965, at 9:30 A.M. with a musical prelude by Mrs. Billy Melvin at the piano and Miss Verla Pembroke at the organ. Mrs. Rufus Coffey led the congregation in singing "Jesus Calls Us" and "O Zion Haste". Mrs. Paul Kettelman led in prayer.

The president, Mrs. Clara Picirilli, gave a greeting and welcome to all attending the convention.

Mrs. L. C. Johnson brought a very timely and inspiring devotional using the convention theme, "Compelling love" as her subject, and this was appropriately followed by Mr. Don Clark's wonderful rendition of "Overshadowed by His Love" as a solo.

Mrs. Maude Coffey explained the constitutional changes made at the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention which adds a Missions Chairman to the present required officers and that the Personal Service Chairman be hereafter known as Personal Service-Evangelism Chairman. She explained some of the duties of these officers and that literature will be forthcoming from the WNAC Headquarters. She also presented the National recommendations regarding the gifts to the Missionary provision closet and the request from WNAC for \$1.00 per member for operational expenses of WNAC headquarters.

A congregational hymn entitled "We've a Story To Tell To The Nations" was sung.

A report of the Treasurer was given by Mrs. W. B. Harris. Special mention was made of Mrs. J. E. Frazier who had extended courtesy and assistance to Mrs. Harris during the past year.

Honor members were recognized at this time. Those present who had been members of the Woman's Auxiliary for 50 years were: Mrs. M. B. Batson, Mrs. Fannie Smith, and Miss Mary Patton. Mrs. N. V. Williams had been a member for 45 years. There were eight who had been members for 40 years; one for 35 years; one for 30 years; seven for 25 years; six for 20 years; nine for 15 years; fourteen for 10 years and fifteen for 5 years.

Mr. Don Clark rendered a special number "The Breaking of the Bread" which was such an inspiration to all.

Rev. Reford Wilson, Foreign Missions Director, brought the morning message which was so enlightening, inspiring and challenging. He related some of his experiences of his recent trip to the foreign mission fields.

"To The Regions Beyond" was sung by the congregation, during which an offering was taken.

Prayer of dismissal and expression of thanks for the food was offered by Mrs. J. E. Simpson.

The afternoon session opened with congregational singing, after which prayer was offered by Mrs. Florence Parham.

Mrs. Charles Thigpen brought a very challenging devotional on "Stewardship", followed by a solo by Mrs. Nellie Jo Cain.

C O N S T I T U T I O N
of the
CUMBERLAND DISTRICT WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION
of the
FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH

We, the women of the churches connected with the Cumberland District Association of Free Will Baptists, desirous of developing and stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among the women and young people of the local churches within this association, and wishing to aid in promoting more effectively the cause of Christ along all lines of Christian Women's endeavors, do organize and adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I -- Name

This organization shall be known henceforth as the Cumberland Woman's Auxiliary Convention of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II -- Purpose

The two fold purpose of this organization shall be:

Section 1. To distribute missionary information and to stimulate by prayer, study groups, and missionary activities a greater united effort for missions in the local communities.

Section 2. To secure the earnest, sympathetic, and systematic cooperation of women and young people in collecting and raising money for missionaries and their work.

ARTICLE III -- Membership

Section 1. The membership of this convention shall consist of all local auxiliaries that, from time to time, upon approval by the district credentials committee, shall become members of this body.

Section 2. Representation: Each local woman's Auxiliary holding membership in this convention shall be entitled to one delegate. The officers of this convention together with the local presidents and the delegates duly accredited by the district credentials committee, shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE IV -- Officers

Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a president, a vice-president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, youth auxiliary chairman, study course chairman, stewardship-prayer chairman, personal service-evangelism chairman, and missions chairman. These shall constitute the district executive committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 2. All officers and duly accredited delegates shall be members in good standing of a Free Will Baptist Church and active member of a local woman's auxiliary.

ARTICLE V -- Elections

All officers shall serve for a term of two years. They shall be nominated by a nominating committee and then elected by acclamation unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee

for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE VI -- Annual Meeting

This convention shall hold its regular meeting annually at a time and place fixed by the previous session, or by the executive committee. Special meetings may be held providing the president of each local woman's auxiliary has been properly notified at least 15 days before the date set for the meeting. Two-thirds of the local auxiliaries legally represented shall constitute a quorum for any special meetings. Semi-annual workshop meetings may be held at the discretion of the president.

ARTICLE VII -- Finances

Section 1. Thirty cents (.30) per active member shall be paid yearly to the District Woman's Auxiliary Convention for membership and representation fee.

Section 2. The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are (1) Mission offerings following each of the three special weeks of prayer, and (2) the Co-Laborer offerings received and distributed monthly.

All auxiliary offerings for every cause should be sent promptly and regularly through the prescribed auxiliary channels; that is, local treasurer to district treasurer, district to state, and state to W.N.A.C.

ARTICLE VIII -- Reports

Record of all work done shall be kept by each officer of this convention and a report of same sent to the district recording secretary on a statistical blank like those printed in the annual W.N.A.C. year book, at least ten days before the annual convention meets in regular session.

ARTICLE IX -- Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment be presented in writing at the first official session of the convention and acted upon during the closing session.

B Y - L A W S

ARTICLE I -- Duties of Officers

Section 1: The President shall plan for and preside over all executive committee meetings and regular meetings of this convention; appoint committees as needed; by ex-officio member if all standing committees; call for quarterly reports of all standing committee chairmen; stay in close touch with the executive secretary and through her with each local auxiliary, keeping the local auxiliary up to date on state and national promotional plans for all committees. She shall highlight the annual district meeting to the State Woman's Auxiliary while in session.

Section 2. The vice-president acts for the president in her absence; performs the duties of enlistment chairman, helping to organize new auxiliaries in the convention district. During the district convention, the vice-president serves as chairman of the registration committee.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary keeps accurate minutes of all meetings; prepares the annual statistical report of this convention which she sends to the State Auxiliary Recording Secretary at least ten (10) days before the date of the State meeting; preserves all valuable papers and turns them, along with all convention records, over to her successor in office.

Section 4. The Assistant Recording Secretary serves as chairman of her credentials Committee, and in the absence of the recording secretary, she shall serve in her place.

Section 5. The Corresponding Secretary is Publicity-Literature Chairman of the Convention. As Literature Chairman, her duty is to devise ways and means of (1) arousing local interest in all auxiliary publications, and (2) for securing every subscription possible to Free Will Baptist papers and magazines. Also she is to strive for 100% CDWA Manual and WNAC Yearbook subscribers by each local member.

As Publicity Chairman, she has charge of all correspondence pertaining to the convention's work; sends public notices of all convention meetings to local newspapers serving CDWA area; reports items of interest to the WNAC column in "Contact"; prepares attractive posters for convention displays and exhibits on CDWA Plan of Work, FWB Mission fields and their workers; arouses local auxiliary interest and participation in the Standard of Achievement Honor Awards by collecting charts annually from each local for the convention exhibit. She serves as the Chairman of the Honor Awards Committee which grades each chart and convention each year presents the awards which have been won by the locals participating.

Section 6. The Treasurer keeps accurate records of all money handled, disbursing it promptly as authorized by the convention; keeps before each local auxiliary the convention's financial plans and the goals set for the year. Reports progress toward these goals frequently. The treasurer must be bonded and her accounts and all funds must be audited annually.

The convention year shall terminate and all books of the treasurer shall be closed on July 30th.

Section 7. The Youth Auxiliary Chairman shall have general oversight of the youth auxiliary organizations within the district. She shall devise ways and means of enlisting and promoting youth auxiliary work throughout the district. She shall work these plans through the local youth chairman with whom she cooperates in annual youth camp work and daily vacation Bible schools among the unchurched. Whenever possible, she should visit every church in the interest of the missionary education of Free Will Baptist young people, and also to enlist them for Free Will Baptist colleges for Christian training. She shall have charge of the annual declamation and essay contests as set up by the W.N.A.C.

Section 8. The Mission Study Chairman devises plans and sets goals for convention study courses, workshops, etc. She shall study duties as outlined in the WNAC Yearbook; inform local study course chairmen on mission study goals and plans for year; read current mission books and plan attractive ways to keep them before local auxiliaries as an incentive for more reading circles.

Section 9. The Stewardship-Prayer Chairman sets goals for the three seasons of prayer offerings and Co-Laborer Offerings; cooperates with local chairman in planning challenging seasonal weeks of prayer programs and in collecting the mission offerings requested with each; plan with the study chairman for the study of a stewardship book. Tithe and enlist other women and young people in tithing. Plan with local chairman for a five minutes presentation of stewardship of possessions at local meetings quarterly. Promotes family altars.

Section 10. The Personal Service-Evangelism Chairman plans and directs through the local P.S.E. Chairman the assigned benevolent activities; leads the local chairman in helping make survey of community to see needs there for Christ; assists them in directing the local women in mission activities according to their needs and talents, planning definitely for each month's activity; keep the purpose of soul-winning, giving self and not money paramount in the lives of the members; keep constantly in touch with local personal service-evangelism chairmen and work in co-operation with their plans.

Section 11. The Mission Chairman: (The local convention did not assign duties to this office, however the WNAC indicates the following "The missions chairman shall assist the state missions chairmen in the promotion of home and foreign missions in accord with the policies of the national boards. She will keep well informed of the latest developments in our missionary program by correspondence with our missionary leaders and directors and study of our church publications!")

ARTICLE II -- Committees

Section 1. Executive Committee

1. Membership of the executive committee is made up of the general officers, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
2. Duties of the executive committee are as follows:
 - (1) Be responsible for formulating policies and programs of the convention.
 - (2) Be responsible for the conduct of annual meeting and the preparation of the program for same.
 - (3) Bring recommendations and a yearly plan of work to the regular annual session of the convention for consideration and adoption.
 - (4) Make written reports through each of its committee chairmen at the annual session of the convention, what has been done toward carrying out through the local auxiliaries the objects of this organization.
3. Meetings of the executive committee shall be held at least twice during the year. The first meeting held as soon after the annual convention as possible at which plans are made for carrying out the convention's plan of work adopted for the ensuing year. The second meeting held at least ten (10) days preceding the annual convention at which yearly reports, recommendations, etc., are prepared. At such other times during the year as the welfare of the cause may demand extra meetings may be called at the discretion of the president. Any member absenting herself from three meetings in succession may be dropped from the committee and her successor elected. No meeting of the executive committee shall be legal unless at least seven (7) members or their proxies are present. All members must have had 10 days' written notice of the meeting.

4. Proxy cannot be another officer of the convention, but any officer may send a proxy who shall be an active member of a local woman's auxiliary. Proxy must be written authority from the member for whom she acts.

Section 2. Nominating Committee shall be composed of three members from different local auxiliaries. All are to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at each annual meeting. This committee is retained for the entire year to fill any vacancy occurring during the year. Each interim nomination will, of course, be upon approval of the executive committee. It shall be responsible for nominating officers at the time of the regular election and for making nominations of vacancies occurring during the year. It shall meet at least one month before the annual convention, at which meeting each committee member submits a list of nominees for each office. The Committee chooses from this list one person well qualified for each office. Then the consent of each person to serve is obtained before presenting the committee's report at the annual convention. Nominations from the floor are always permissible.

Section 3. Credentials -- The Assistant recording secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee and other members may be appointed by the president. This committee shall study the district reports and make its report to the state body before delegates are seated.

Section 4. Finance -- The treasurer shall be chairman of the finance committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The members appointed by the president audit the financial records of the year and report on same to the Body. All appropriations and expenses of the officers may be decided upon by the finance committee, and passed upon by the convention.

Section 5. Registration -- The vice-President shall be chairman, and other members may be appointed by the President. This committee registers every convention officer, every delegate, auxiliary member, minister, visitor, and any other the convention may desire. The report shall include this and other information as desired.

ARTICLE III -- Department Promotional Work

At the earliest possible date following the adjournment of the annual convention, each district department, or committee chairman shall call all like chairmen of each local auxiliary within the convention to come together at some central location for a meeting at which plans and policies and goals are set up for the year's work in harmony with those adopted at the convention. Together there they devise ways and means of presenting and carrying out their plan of work for the ensuing year.

For instance, it shall be the duty of the district convention's vice-president to share enlistment ideas and plans with the vice-presidents of the local auxiliaries whom she has called together in a committee meeting as soon as possible after the convention adjourns. This same principle applies to all other departments of the convention.

The district chairmen shall originate and direct the plan of work in their respective departments in harmony with the W.N.A.C. chief aims and the district and state convention's adopted plans of work. These plans shall be arranged and presented to the executive secretary

at least ten (10) days prior to the regular annual meeting of the district executive committee. Approved plans will then become recommendations to the convention for consideration and adoption by the body while in session.

Each department chairman shall devise ways and means of promoting her respective department of work throughout all the local auxiliaries within the district securing materials and helps from the state and national chairmen of her department; shall have charge of all work pertaining to, or necessary to the promotion of her special phase of the convention's plan of work; shall be expected to attend all executive committee meetings.

For the annual report, each department chairman will secure and compile informative and inspirational facts from local chairman concerning her department's activities during the year that will make interesting and helpful historical records to be printed in the district minutes. A second district wide committee meeting held at a central location at which achievements, etc., for the year are presented and together compiled by the committee for its annual convention report, could prove to be a most revealing and helpful session. This meeting should be held as soon after July 30th as is possible or at least 15 days before the annual session of the convention.

ARTICLE IV -- Amendment

These by-laws may be amended according to article IX under the constitution.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

- I. That a history of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention be compiled and published by WNAC.

That Miss Mary Ruth Wisehart be contacted concerning the writing of said history.

- II. Whereas all other departments of the National Association have elected to be covered by Social Security, be it resolved that the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention provide such benefits for its personnel.

- III. Whereas costs of materials, including mailing supplies, printing, and literature have greatly increased, and, Whereas WNAC's growth and expansion demand a more adequate plan of support, and, Whereas our present methods of support are ineffective and obsolete, Be it resolved, (1) That WNAC membership fees be increased from ten cents (10¢) to seventy-five cents (75¢) per active member per year, and that Article VI of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

Page 60 - Fees and Reports

Section 1. Fees - Seventy-five cents per active member shall be paid yearly to the WNAC by the state convention (and/or other eligible organizations) for membership.

Page 53 - Article VI - The State Convention Fees and Reports
Seventy-five cents (75¢) per active member shall be paid yearly to the WNAC for membership fee.

- IV. Whereas, for similiar reasons, active district and state auxiliary organizations also need additional funds to maintain their operations, we recommend that local fees per active member be increased from 30¢ to \$1.25 per year. We further recommend the following changes in the manual:

p. 12 - The Outline of the Standard

5. Membership Fees and Reports to Officers - Once a year all active members should pay \$1.25 membership fee to be used for promotional work. This money is sent to the district treasurer. Twenty-five cents is kept there, while the remainder is sent to the state convention. The state treasurer keeps twenty-five cents and sends the remaining 75¢ to the Woman's National Auxiliary treasurer.

p. 16 - Article II - Representation

Each local auxiliary shall represent in the district convention according to the convention plans and its proportionate part of money required for district, state, and national work, which is \$1.25 per active member per year.

p. 43 - District Convention Fees and Reports

One dollar per active member shall be paid yearly to the Woman's State Auxiliary Convention for membership fee.

- V. That beginning first quarter, 1967, Co-Laborer Magazine subscription rates be increased as follows:

In groups of five or more	from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per year.
Single subscriptions	from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per year.
Single copy	from .35 to .40 per copy.

- VI. Whereas the increase in Co-Laborer subscription rates will not become effective until January, 1967, and in membership fees until July, 1967, we recommend a greater thrust be given WNAC Emphasis Month by the allocation of suggested state quotas according to membership.
- VII. That the theme, watchword, and hymn for 1967-68 be as follows:
 Theme: "As my Father hath sent me ... So Send I You" John 20:19-22
 Watchword: So Send I You
 Hymn: "So Send I You"
- VIII. That auxiliaries sending articles to the Missionary Provision Closet send an evaluation of the same to WNAC.
- IX. Whereas the National Association plans to project the project of "Everyone Who Has a Bible Buy a Bible" or Bible for the Bibleless on Bible Sunday, December 4, 1966, and, As we feel it can best be promoted through the Missions Boards, the Master's Men, and the Woman's Auxiliary, we hereby recommend that we cooperate in this project in the following ways:
1. Assist the pastor in planning for Bible Sunday.
 2. If the church is cooperating in this project, send the offering through the church to the National Association earmarked American Bible Society. Otherwise send earmarked offerings through WNAC.
- X. That local, district, and state auxiliaries elect a historian whose responsibility is to record the history of the auxiliary of her local church.

Duties

1. Prepares history of the women of the auxiliary. Assembles the facts and writes the history of the auxiliary in the local church from the beginning, if this has not already been done. Include sketches of Honorary and Memorial members.
 2. Writes a supplementary history of the auxiliary.
 3. Submits a history for calendar year, January 1 - December 31. Sends a copy (preferably typewritten) with pictures, to the district historian who compiles a history of the district convention and sends a copy to the state historian. The state historian compiles a history of the state auxiliary convention and sends (with pictures) to the National office where a permanent record will be kept. If there is a general historian appointed by the church, the historian of the auxiliary will submit a copy of the auxiliary history to that person.
- XI. That page 57 of the Manual, paragraph 2, be changed to read as follows: "In areas where there is no state auxiliary convention affiliated with the national auxiliary convention, a district auxiliary convention may represent directly to the national convention with ten delegates by payment of its membership fee. Similarly, a local auxiliary in an area where there is no state or district auxiliary convention may represent with ten delegates."
- XII. We recommend that this Convention give Mrs. Pursell an honorarium of \$100.00 for the preparing of the new manual.
- XIII. We recommend that each auxiliary put new and greater emphasis on soul-winning efforts in each church community through Good News Clubs, etc.
