Children's Home Report:

We have 7 children who will go to Liberty Christian Academy this year, at a cost of \$700.00 per child. We will have two in Free Will Baptist College, at a cost of about \$4,000. They have been working during the past summer to help and will work at college. The financial condition is the lowest in several years. July 1980 Balance - \$9,407.95; July 1981 - between \$4,000 and \$5,000 in the red. (Need that much to break even). The cost per child at our home is approximatley \$7,000 per child per year, and the average at the Children's Home in Greenville, Tennessee is \$10,000. Report given by Rev. Roger Milling. Move to accept as information. Seconded, carried.

Ordination Council Report:

(1) We recommend that we give Rev. Henry Shellman of Landmark F. W. B. Church a letter of good standing to the Twin Cities Association. Move, second, carried. (2) We recommend that we accept Rev. About 200 names were turned in on a petition to keep the Home open, (from East Alabama) and several petitions were received from other Districts. None were for closing the home. Please keep in mind this was only a straw vote in order to get the opinion of those present at the Board Meeting. It carried no official action.

2. The pastor, if he is an ordained Free Will Baptist minister, shall moderator of all church conferences. When he is absent or does not re, the Chairman of the Board of Deacons shall serve in his place, and his absence some other suitable brother may be selected by majority of the congregation.

3. There shall be one or more deacons in the church whose duty it Il be to assist the pastor in the administration of the Lord's Supper.

4. Some suitable member shall be appointed clerk and it shall be his y to do all the recording and other writing pertaining to the business the church and to preserve a file of minutes of the church.

5. When a new cierk is appointed, all books, etc. belonging to the k shall be immediately delivered to him by his predecessor.

6. It shall be the duty of every member, male and female, to attend h conference meeting if they can, for on that day the pastor is expectto instruct the church in spiritual manner by giving plain and pointed ons on doctrine, discipline and the rule of holy living.

7. Conference shall be opened and conducted as follows: 1. Prayer less divine service has been conducted). 2. Invite visiting brethren to with us. 3. Open door of church for recepton of members. 4. Acknowments. 5. References or deferred business. 6. Matters of dealing which in order to come before the church, 7. Miscellaneous business, 8. Admmnt.

8. Visiting brethren who are called in as helpers from sister churches Il be allowed to speak and make motions or second motions, but will be allowed to vote.

9. Any orderly member of another church who does hold this church membership, may be received into the church wihout a letter, when it nade apparent that his Christian character is unimpeachable, and that has applied for a letter and could not obtain it because he desired to this or some sister church. All other members must join by letter aptism.

10. No member shall be received without the majority of the members sent, but unreasonable objections shall not be valid and unless withdrawn the member who makes them shall be liable to be taken under

13. Members dismissed from the church by letter, who become disordely or continue to hold their letter without a good reason, shall be cited to the conference to answer for their conduct.

15. A vote shall not be taken on any question without being moved and seconded and all important questions must be moved and seconded and the vote taken by members rsining to their feet, and all votes taken by

16. No other motion shall be considered while a previous motion and Second is before the conference.

17. It shall be considered disorderly for a member to be absent from conference when an important question is to be decided; but a member, upon his request, may be excused by the church from voting on either side in particular cases.

18. No member shall leave the house during conference without a sufficient cause nor engage in conversation or whispering without being subject to being called by the moderator.

19. All discussion in conference must be conducted with calmness and good faith; those who speak must rise to their feet and address the moderator, and keep to the point in debate.

20. No one shall speak more than three times on the motion without permission of the moderator, nor shall the remarks of anyone be unreasonaby long.

21. When the moderator speaks he must nominate some other brother in his stead.

22. No one shall be interrupted while speaking unless it is necessary to call the speaker to order.

23. It shall be the rule of the church to attend to the administration of the Lord's Supper and feet washing at least once a year and the expenses are to be paid by the church.

24. Members not in good standing shall not commune, but the administration shall not be deferred on account of any.

25. Public fasting, humiliation and prayer shall be observed on proper occasions.

26. This Decorum may be amended or altered by the vote of two thirds of the members present at any two succesive monthly conferences.

27. Any member who is absent from his church for six months shall be placed on inactive roll until he returns and proves himself to the satisfaction of the church.

2. The clerk and assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of these is present, the senior minister in years shall act as moderator.

3. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the association. These delegates shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to their seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the association. In case of questionable representation, however, the cases under question shall be referred to the credential committee. 4. It shall be the duty of every body belonging to this association to send a letter to every annual session of this association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work and statistics. Any body belonging to this association which fails to report itself for two successive sessions may be dismissed from the association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

5. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer and shall be closed with prayer.

6. By a two thirds vote of all members present a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.

7. This association may correpond by messenger or otherwise with

other religious bodies.

8. This association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go in a committee as a whole.

9. Any person not a member of this association may be allowed to take part in it discussion by obtaining permission from the moderator.

10. It shall be the duty of all members of the association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting.

11. No member shall absent himself from the association during its meeting without first obtaining permission from the moderator.

12. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

13. The moderator shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Chritian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or divsion.

14. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator", but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

15. The "yeas" and "nays" may be counted on any question by request of one fifth of the members present.

16. No member of this Association shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

17. It shall be the duty of the moderator to seat delegates in a designated section of the assembly room at the beginning of the business section.

BY-LAWS

1. The East Alabama Association of Free Will Baptist and its members adopt the treatise of the national association of Free Will Baptists in faith and practice.

18. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the members

19. Minutes of the last Association meeting shall be read and adopted at the beginning of each session.

20. Licened Free Will Baptist preachers may be ordained after having been licensed for one year. The only exception shall be when a properly licensed preacher (FWB) is called to pastor a Free Will Baptist Church then he may be ordained before the year is completed.

21. Any church desiring the service of the Ordaining Council between conferences must bear the expenses of the council.

22. Any minister coming to this association bring letter of recommendation from his association.

23. This association shall not consider for ordination any man who does not pay tithes, or any man who has been divorced and remarried, if first wife is still living.

24. Each pastor shall be accepted by the ordination council before being placed on any board of permanent committee.

25. A minister coming to this association for the first time shall bring a photostatic copy of his ordination papers, or some proof of his having been ordained as a Free Will Baptist. Such papers shall be kept by the clerk.

A minister coming from a local church not a member of an association be examined by the ordination council. 6:17.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. The Holy Bible. The Scriptures of the Old Testament were given by inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice. 2 Peter 1:18-21, 2 Tim. 3:16-17.

2. God. There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the Universe; and in the Scripture as Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore, and obey. Deut. 6-4; 1 Cor. 8:4; Jer. 10:10; Jun. 7:28; 2 Cor. 1:19; 1 Tim. 6:17.

3. Christ. Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified, and is our everpresent savior and Lord. Isa. 45:21; Jn. 4:42; Rev. 22:13; 1 Jn. 5:20; I Tim. 3:16.

4. The Holy Spirit. The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all the attribute of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of men. Jn. 16:13; 1 Cor. 2:11; Acts 13:2; Jn. 16:8.

5. The Government of God. God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace not otherwise provided for as the highest welfare of man requires. Ps. 19:12; Psa. 145:10; Acts 1:28; Psa. 22:28.

6. The Sinfullness of Man. Man created innocent, but in disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity therefore, inherit a fallen nature of tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God. Deut. 30:19; Ezek. 33:11; Jer. 44:4; Psa. 5:15; Jn. 6:44.

7. The Work of Christ. The son of God by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full, free and is the ground of salvation by faith. 2 Col. 2:8-10; Jn. 3:3; Col. 2:8-10; Jn. 16:30; Jn. 3:13; Isa. 9:6.

8. The Terms of Salvation. The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death. Rom. 10:10; Acts. 16:31; Heb. 11:16; Rev. 2:10; Jn. 15:9.

9. Election. God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect. Rom. 11:5-7-28; Rom. 9:11.

10). Freedom of the Will. Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the sprit or to resist them and perish. Rev. 22-17; Jn. 11-12.

11. Salvation Free. God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely. 2 Col. 13:14; Matt. 11:28; Isa. 45:22; Rev. 22:17; 1 Tim. 2:4.

12. Gospel Ordinances. BAPTISM, or the immersion of believers in water, and the LORD'S SUPPER are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, is an ordinance teaching humility of universal obligation, and is to be administered to all true believers. Matt. 28-19; Col. 2:12; Acts 8:36-39; M. 1:5; Rom. 6:4; Matt. 26:26-28; 1 Cor. 10:16-21; John 131-17.

13. Tithing. God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament. Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." (1 Cor. 16:2).

14. The Christian Sabbath. The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employments and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God. Gen. 2:3; Mk. 2:27; Ex. 20:8-11; Neh. 9:14; Lk. 24-1-6.

15. Resurrection, Judgment and final Retribution. The Scripture teaches the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to all the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation; then the wicked will "go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life." Eccl. 12:7; Phil. 1:23; Lk. 23:43; Matt. 17:3; Matt. 10:28; Acts 1:11; Matt. 28:6; Jn. 5:28-29; Acts 24:15; 1 Cor. 15:22; Rev. 20:12; Rom. 2:16; Matt. 25:46; 2 Thess. 1:8-10; Rom. 2:23; 2 Pat. 1:11; Mk. 3:29; Matt .13:41-43; Rom. 2:6-10; Act 17:31.
