#### PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

#### to the

## EAST KANSAS QUARTERLY CONFERENCE

#### February 18, 1995

1994 is over and 1995 is well underway, unbelievable! 365 days have come and gone, never to be lived again. And what an eventful year it was for Christians and the battle to defend our faith.

In a quick look back to 1994, we will see some major victories won because Christians got involved in the fight for Christ. Our prayers, hard work, and trust in the Lord have made a difference.

In October 1993 the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) issued proposed regulations that would have made it illegal to share one's faith in the work place. Once word got out to Christians, over 100,000 concerned citizens responded with alarm. The result was that the EEOC was forced to back down.

In September 1993, Attorney General Janet Reno, in one of the most immoral acts witnessed in government, decided to reinterpret the legal definition of child pornography in this country. Once again Christians rose to the occasion and flooded the Department of Justice, the White House, and Congress with their concern. As a result the Senate voted 100-0 to condemn the Attorney General's actions, followed by a similar vote of 425-3 in the House. President Clinton wrote Ms. Reno stopping short of asking her to reverse the decision, she refused. However, two days after the November 8 elections, she returned to the traditional view of child pornography.

Let us not forget the infamous Surgeon General, Joycelyn Elders, who began the year determined to put a condom in every pocket and purse. In January 1994 it appeared that she might just succeed for buried in the administration's health care plan were provisions allocating millions of dollars for school-based condom distribution centers and millions more for the support of abortions. On December 9, 1994, Joycelyn Elders was dismissed from her position.

Probably the greatest accomplishment that Christians have made is the gradual turn-around in the thinking of the liberal press. Jonathan Alter, writing in Newsweek, December 12, referred to the latest statistics on unwed pregnancy as "bone chilling." He stated, "Every threat to the fabric of this country--from poverty to crime to homelessness--is connected to out-of-wedlock teen pregnancy. This scourge was not caused by economics; Calcutta's

families are wretched but largely intact. It was caused by American cultural changes in the last two decades—aided by an irresponsible entertainment industry—that has lifted the stigma off both black and white communities. When the moral judgement of society is restored—in law and in everyday life—the numbers can be reduced over time." Newsweek which has aided and abetted the sexual revolution and the excesses of the entertainment industry, is now calling for a return to "moral judgment"?

Even more encouraging was the Election of November 8. It wasn't so much the Republican landslide that caused our jubilation, but the change in attitude reported by the voters. There has been a dramatic shift in American values. For example, the Family Research Council asked the Wirthling Group polling organization to conduct exit interviews on issues of relevance to the family. When asked what they thought is the cause of problems in the country, 36% said economy and 56% said "moral and social issues".

The poll also found that 65% to 28% of the voters said they would be more likely to support a political party or candidate whose chief priority is to reverse the moral decline in America instead of making other issues their chief priority. And, by 73% to 21% of the voters across the country said, "it is more important for government and elected leaders to support traditional family values rather than tolerance for alternative lifestyles and family structures."

In another remarkable assessment of public opinion, the ultraliberal organization People for the American Way reported 74% of respondents said they were more likely to vote for a candidate who "put top priority on returning to traditional moral values." Only 7% said they were less likely to vote for such a candidate.

While we rejoice over the good news, the battle still rages on. In 1994...

- ...the State of Oregon narrowly passed the nation's first euthanasia law. Oregon voters also defeated a measure that would have prevented homosexuals from gaining special rights through state legislation or local ordinances.
- ...President Clinton met with religious journalists at the White House and defended his administration's position on abortion and placing homosexuals in the military. He also signed into law his Goals 2000 federal education bill, unleashing outcome-based education and other social engineering on our public schools, including rewriting history.

...and influential people who hate traditional families are still out there working to undermine them. Judith Stacey, professor at the University of California-Davis wrote "The belief that married-couple families are superior is probably the most pervasive prejudice in the Western world."

No, now is not the time to sit back and watch to see if the turnaround will continue. We must press on and fan those sparks of revival into full blazes for the Lord.

We, the Public Morals Committee would like to encourage everyone in the following:

- 1. PRAY...prayer made the difference in 1994 and it will make the difference in 1995. Isaiah 65:24 says "And it shall come to pass, that before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear." Let us continue "steadfastly" in prayer for our country and our leaders. Changes are coming and we need to pray the Lord's will be done. Pray for the new legislators and congressmen.
- 2. Continue writing to your state and national leaders, especially the new members, let them know your thoughts on the crucial issues before them. Attached are copies of issues that will be considered this legislative year as well as the addresses for our Senators and Representatives.
- 3. Keep informed on what is going on around you. Events are unfolding rapidly in Congress and at the State Legislature, try to keep up with them.
- 4. Most of all, get involved in getting the truth out to people. It is surprising how many people are confused on what is right and what is wrong. Let them know what "Thus saith the Word of God." We may be the only Bible that many people see, let the LIGHT shine through us.

"Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity... Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee."



# GOP Contract With America



The House GOP plans to bring these 10 bills to vote during the first 100 days of the 104th Congress.

Balanced budget amendment, line item veto:
Balanced budget by 2002 or seven years after enactment of constitutional amendment; president can veto parts of spending bill without vetoing entire bill.

Taking Back Our Streets Act

Crime bill: Shift spending from crime prevention to prison construction; police hiring; harder death row appeals.

Personal Responsibility Act
Welfare reform: Welfare spending cap; states can
cut benefits after two years.

Family Reinforcement Act
Families and children: Increase penalties for pornography and crimes involving children: \$500 tax credit. for families caring for elderly parent, grandparent: \$5,000 tax credit for adoption.

American Dream Restoration Act

Middle-class tax cut: Additional \$500 per-child tax
credit to familles earning up to \$200,000; tax credit to ease
marriage penalty; no tax on IRA intérest.

National Security Restoration Act
Defense: No more defense cuts to finance social spending; no U.S. troops under U.N. command; new rules for financing U.N. peacekeeping missions.

Senior Citizens Fairness Act
Seniors: Retirees can earn more without losing
Social Security benefits; repeal law raising taxes on wealthier Social Security recipients.

B Job Creation, Wage Enhancement Act Capital gains: Cut capital gains tax by 50 percentiveduce unfunded mandates on state and local governments.

Common Sense Legal Reform Act
Legal reform, product Hability: Losers pay winners'
court costs in federal civil cases; limit punitive damages in
product liability cases.

Term Limits: Constitutional amendment to limit congressional terms; Senate to 12 years, House to 6 or 12 years.

# KFRI lists social issues of interest to Christians likely in '94 Legislature

The Kansas Family Research Institute sees a number of social issues as potentially divisive of the Republican party in the Kansas Legislature this year. Among them are abortion, heritage education, abstinence-based sex education, casinos and parents rights, the organization's associate director and general counsel, Mark Kahrs has reported in a recent issue of the group's newsletter, The Kansas Citizen.

Kahrs wrote that election of conservatives last November gave what may be a working majority in the House but the Kansas Senate is still controlled by moderate Republicans, which creates an ideological imbalance within the GOP with a moderate Governor in Bill Graves.

Kahrs believes legislation to further restrict abortion is certain to be introduced in the House and an American heritage education bill which would encourage teachers to read or post certain historical documents, to be reintroduced this year after dying last year in the Senate.

Kahrs said Graves has expressed support for allowing Kansans to vote on a constitutional amendment which is required to permit privately owned casinos in the state but said Indian-operated casinos will be resolved by the courts.

A proposed constitutional amendment recognizing the fundamental right of parents to exercise primary control over the care and raising of their children will probably be introduced again this year, said Kahrs. It was modified beyond original intent and then withdrawn by its supporters last year.

Kahrs further said he anticipates the Kansas Supreme Court upholding the state's current school finance formula and noted that he believes two other controversial issues, including school vouchers and Quality Performance Accreditation or QPA, will likely reappear this year.

Kahrs' article further discussed the Legislature and the subjects of crime, tax-and-spend and his outlook.
