

## **PROCEEDINGS**

The forty-fifth Annual Session of the Eastern Association of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina convened with the church at Arapahoe, Pamlico County, N. C. on October 23rd, 1940. J. W. Alford who was appointed to preach the introductory sermon attended and preached, using for a text Exodus 14; 15. After the sermon the Moderator called us to order for business, and the following officers were in their chairs:

Eld. W. E. Anderson led us in prayer, after which we called off for dinner.

#### WEDNESDAY P. M.

We re-convened after a bountiful dinner, and after singing, Eld. R. P. Harris led in prayer.

The Moderator made remarks, asking co-operation of all.

Visitors were recognized as follows:

Each of the brethren spoke words of greeting to us.

The Moderator made a report of his visit to the Western Association last week.

The Minutes of the Executive Committee were read as follows: The Executive Committee of the Eastern Association met at Warden's Grove on March 30th, 1940.

Present: J. C. Griffin, Ch'm. J. W. Alford, Secy., H. M. Mallard, F. A. Edwards, proxy for Duffy Toler.

After prayer, the Ch'm. presented to us the matter and condition of the Mount Olive church for our consideration.

Bro. U. C. Evett was the one who lodged the complaint about the condition of the church, and stated that he is a member of the church and an ordained deacon. J. L. Jarvis presented the fact of the piano being removed from the church property. Mrs. Myrtle Jarvis also made the same complaint.

The following were heard regarding the matters above: Mrs. Sallie Dixon, D. C. Johnson, A. W. Jarvis, R. C. Johnson, Mrs. J. W. Hamilton, Mrs. A. W. Jarvis, B. H. West, J. H. Clark, Mrs. R. C. Johnson, Mrs. Sina, Bro. Messick, Mrs. L. F. Jones, Mrs. Laura Lewis, Mrs. Letha Tetterton, O. E. Brothers.

After hearing the above parties, it was agreed by the committee to recommend that:

First—The church as a whole try to get together in unity and harmony, and set up regular services.

Second—The roof and windows be repaired, so as to protect the inside of the church.

Third—The piano be returned to the church.

Fourth—A deed to the property be executed to the Eastern Association, and then we feel sure that the Union Meeting and Association will come to their assistance in every way possible.

It is also further suggested that one responsible person be appointed to take care of the church as Janitor.

On motion we adjourn.

On motion the minutes were adopted.

The list of ministers was called and absentees noted.

On motion the Moderator appoint a committee of one to write a sketch of the life of Eld. C. L. Merrill, same to appear in these minutes. Eld. L. H. Wetherington was appointed.

The list of churches was called, with a good response for the first day.

On motion Eld. H. Pipkin be excused on account of the illness of his wife

Eld. L. H. Wetherington spoke to us about the organization of the Church Finance Association, Inc.

Eld. Wetherington spoke of the necessity of subscribing to the Baptist, as did several others.

The Devotional committee reported for tonight: Eld. Duffy Toler open, Eld. Lloyd Vernon preach.

Mrs. J. C. Griffin spoke about the need of a Ladies Aid in every church.

Bro. Noah Bennett of the Christian church spoke of the progress of the

churches, and offered the use of the Christian Church for any of our work while in session.

On motion we adjourn, until tomorrow A. M. 9 o'clock, the session to be opened by 30 minutes prayer and devotional service to be conducted by Eld. W. E. Anderson.

Dismissed by Eld. C. L. Bennett.

### THURSDAY A. M.

The Association met at the hour appointed, and was opened by Eld. W. E. Anderson according to the arrangements of yesterday.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Visitors from other Associations were welcomed as follows:

The above brethren spoke cheering words of greeting.

On motion the new church at Gray Branch, Lenior County, be enrolled on the list of churches.

A letter from Eld. L. C. Garner was read.

The committee on Sabbath Schools reported as follows:

Whereas many of our Sunday School officials have been setting an improper example before the children, and enticing them to indulge in worldly and indecent things by having them attend picnics at public bathing places, therefore be it resolved:

First—That we ask our people to present to our youth forms of entertainment which are constructive, rather than destructive to Christian character.

Second—That we encourage the election of consecrated Christian officers and teachers so far as possible, to operate our local Sunday Schools.

Third—We ask our pastors to take more interest in the youth, and teach them against the things that are detrimental to our cause.

On motion the report was adopted.

The committee on Temperance made report as follows:

First—Whereas it is easy for mankind to over indulge in the things of the world we urge that our members take time to be holy and to walk humbly with their God; to stay away from places of worldly amusement, and all questionable places, or places where it is known that ungodly things are carried on. We recommend, and plead in Jesus' name that our people will remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy, and that they stay away

from all Sunday amusements of all kinds, and that those who go contrary to these recomendations be dealt with according to our Discipline.

Second—In regards to alcoholic beverages, we urge total abstinence; believing that when church members practice total abstinence the whiskey stores and beer joints will disappear.

Third—We recomend that Christians plan as much as is possible to avoid making purchases of any kind on Sunday. And to so live that the world will take knowledge of us that we have been with God.

By the Committee.

On motion the report was adopted.

The committee on Ministerial Character reported as follows:

We, your committee, on Ministerial Character, finding that the Western Association, has, according to its judgment, dropped Eld. Ernest Poston's name from the list of ordained ministers, and revoked his license and credentials, thus debaring the said Eld. Ernest Poston from the professional rights belonging to the Ministry; recommend to this Association, that all churches belonging to the Eastern Association, be instructed that they cannot lawfully use him as pastor until such time as he and the Western Association of Free Will Baptists shall adjust all matters satisfactory to each other, and he shall be reinstated.

We have no charge against any of our ministers.

On motion the report was adopted.

The committee on Education reported as follows:

Realizing the great need of a National Educational Institution, we heartily endorse the National Educational program, and recommend that our preachers, as never before, enlighten our people as to this program, showing to them the great need of Christian education.

We recommend that this Association continue its appropriations as heretofore.

We urge that all aspiring to the ministry, enlighten themselves as to the educational program, and qualify themselves, as much as possible educationally before presenting themselves. On motion the report was adopted.

The Devotional committee reported as follows: Eld. J. P. Woodard open, Eld. J. A. Evans preach at 11 o'clock.

An appeal was made by Eld. J. R. Bennett in behalf of Eld. N. D. Wiggs, and an offering was taken for him, amounting to \$71.02.

The Examining Board made report as follows: Elds. J. R. Bennett, Lloyd Vernon and J. W. Alford met at Hotel Kinston, Kinston, N. C. on July 8th at 10.30 o'clock, and after prayerful consideration, drew up a list of questions for the examination of applicants at the 1940 session of the Eastern Association. The Board met at the home of Eld. J. R. Bennett, at the call of the chairman, October 15th, 1940, at 7.30 P. M. After con-

sidering the questions for the examination, the Board agreed that Bro. J. R. Bennett give the examination, and the papers be graded the same day by the Board.

We recommend that the committee which met in Kinston July, 8th 1940, and prepared the questions, be re-imbursed their expenses amounting to \$14.45.

The Examining Board met at Arapahoe October 23rd, 1940, and examined Bros. Roy Miller, Kenneth Gaskill and Clinton Lupton, and they having satisfactorily passed, we order their ordination, it being optional with Bro Miller, whether we ordain him, or endorse his credentials. We further agree that their ordination take place Friday night before the 1st Sunday in November 1940 at Bridgeton church, at 7.30 P. M., by Elds. J. R. Bennett, Duffy Toler and Lloyd Vernon, Eld. J. R. Bennett to preach the Ordination sermon, and he having full charge of program arrangement. We further agree that, beginning now, the Board stick strictly to the Discipline, in regard to those who desire to come to us from other denominations, requiring 12 months license, as for a beginner.

On motion the report was adopted.

An offering for the Orphanage was taken after the sermon, amounting to \$38.02.

#### THURSDAY P. M.

We reconvened after a very good dinner, and began the business of the Association. Prayer by Eld. W. L. Hart.

Eld. W. L. Hart spoke of the good fellowship here, and invited us to attend the next session of the Central Conference.

Eld. J. R. Bennett was called, and he gave us information concerning the Educational program of the National Association.

On motion the Finance committee was instructed to settle with the Treasurer, and the Treasurer make his report.

On motion we extend to the people of the Christian and Methodist churches a rising vote of thanks for their co-operation with this church in caring for this Association.

On motion Eld. J. R. Forest be enrolled as a member of this Association, subject to his letter from the Cape Fear Association.

- Bro. C. K. Dunn was called, and he brought us a good report of the work and progress of the Printing company.
- Eld. J. R. Bennett, President of the Printing company, reminded us of the fact that we have an up-to-date printing house in equipment, and endorsed all that Bro. Dunn said; each pleading for co-operation.
- Eld. J. A. Evans Supt. of the Orphanage, was called, and he spoke to us of the work of the Home, and asked us to help out in the erection of the Dinning Hall, to the amount of \$1500, before December 1st.

On motion the arrangement for the raising of the above amount be referred to the Executive committee.

The Moderator called for the Executive committee to meet at Bridgeton on November 1st, at 10 o'clock A. M.



Rev. J. R. Bennett, chairman of the National Board of Education, made a report of the program of this part of the work, in which he emphasized the importance of a school and spoke of the embarrassment our people were facing because of not having one. He stated that as a demonstration, we had gone just about as far as we possibly could go, without a place to train some leaders. He made an appeal that our people join hands and hearts, not only in finance, but in prayer for the success of a school at this time. The whole congregation was called to prayer with Rev. C. B. Thompson leading and Rev. L. H. Wetherington closing.

Mrs. J. H. Oglesby, Director of Missions, gave a report on the work and stated that she was much disappointed in the reports she had received. She insisted on the study of Stewardship and Missions in our local work. She reported fifteen Missionary programs given. She received reports from only six churches. The total amount reported to her was \$60.36.

Mrs. John Stilley gave a most interesting and inspiring talk on Missions. She stated that before we can be Foreign Missionaries, we must be interested in Home Missions. She said so many had not known what Home Missions really is. She explained that there was a vast difference in Home Missionary and Social Service work—that a real Home Missionary worker cared for the soul and Social Service workers for the body.

A letter was read from Mrs. Katie Sawyer Jackson, sending greetings from the Central Auxiliary Convention. She also stated that it was impossible for her to meet with us which she regretted very much.

We adjourned for lunch with Rev. J. R. Bennett dismissing the congregation.



A delightful lunch was enjoyed by all present, and the kind hospitality of Beulaville Church was highly appreciated.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened with congregational singing and Rev. M. E. Tyson led in prayer.

At this time the convention paused to pay tribute to the deceased Aid members. The service was very beautifully conducted by Mrs. W. Overman, chairman of the Memorial committee. Mrs. Georgia Frost Barnes sang "How Beautiful Heaven must Be," and Mrs. N. D. Wiggs sang "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

Mrs. Thompson, president of our State work, made a talk in which she insisted on reports being sent to the State in order that the State work might go on in a bigger way.

Mrs. Georgia Frost Barnes, representing the Western Association, reported that they were doing a good work.

The field worker had no report to make.

The Director of Education reported \$10.00 from St. Mary's Ladies Aid Society for Anna Philips Loan fund, and an additional fund of \$2.00, also from St. Mary's.

The director of Superannuation reported a total of \$42.91. Reports were received from 21 Societies.

She insisted that we visit and give more attention to our disabled ministers and try to show them that we do appreciate the work they have done in the past. Mrs. L. H. Wetherington—Director.

The Director of publication and Literature reported 192 subscribers to the Baptist Paper in the District, 10 Bibles given away, 23,456 pages of religious literature given out. There were 77 new members for the District. Mrs. Ed Smith—Director.

The Director of Stewardship had reports from only 5 Aid Societies. These reports included the study of books, number of tithers, and keeping the church and grounds in order. There was one contestant, Francis Langton, age 10, for the Stewardship Contest. Mrs. Louise Bedsworth—Director.

At this time Rev. M. E. Tyson brought a message from the Orphanage in which he paid homage to the women of our denomination for their support and their interest in the home. He stated that in a few weeks he would leave the institution and made an appeal that our women stand by the new Supt., Rev. Evans, and give him our wholehearted support. A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Tyson for his untiring efforts during his stay at the Orphanage.

The Orphanage Director had reports from only 6 Societies. They reported \$138.02 in cash, and two children adopted.

His message was based on her wonderful works and her life sacrificial service for others. It was filled with inspiration and encouragement for our women, calling us to a greater life of service.
- Rev. L. R. Ennis dismissed the congregation and they adjourned for lunch. A delightful lunch was spread by the women of the community and was very much enjoyed by all present.

She made an appeal that we become more interested in our young people in trying to train them for Christian service. She stated that we could use our means in helping them through school, have a church library, have study courses in our churches giving the youth more to employ their minds.

Rev. L. R. Ennis made a talk on our National Educational program. He spoke of how our denomination has grown to a representation of 15 states and our great demand for a school in which to enlighten and educate our youth and prepare them for Christian service. He stated that if our people would line up with our National plan we could soon have a school and be able to accomplish great things in the Master's Service.

Mrs. J. W. Overman, the Orphanage Director, stated that she had received no reports but insisted that more of our local societies adopt a child. She also suggested that our Eastern Convention adopt one.

Rev. J. A. Evans gave a report of the orphanage work in general.

He commended our women for the splendid part they are playing in helping to carry on the work at the orphanage. He pledged himself, his time and devotion to the home and promised to use all funds sent in to the best of his ability, and to the best advantage of the home.
