PROCEEDINGS

The Forty-Ninth Annual Session of the Eastern Conference of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina convened with the church at Warden's Grove, Pamlico county, N. C., on October 18th, 1944, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The session was called to order by Rev. J. R. Bennett in the absence of the Moderator.

The opening devotions were conducted by Rev. J. R. Bennett. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. E. Anderson.

The following committees were appointed:

Devotions: Bros. Coley Watson, Cecil Howard, W. F. Hill.

Finance: Noah Rice, J. C. Griffin, Mrs. Leone Mercer.

Temperance: Harry Mallard, Mrs. Caddie Willis, Mrs. Ludie Barbour.

Sabbath Schools: Revs. R. C. Kennedy, W. E. Anderson, Bro. Calvin Sawyer.

Ministerial Character: Revs. Duffy Toler, Lloyd Vernon, C. L. Bennett, Bros. W. F. Hill, R. R. Jones.

To Apportion the Funds: J. W. Alford, J. C. Griffin, J., R. Bennett, G. W. Gaskill, Vause Gaskins.

Visiting ministers were enrolled as follows:

Western Association: Rev. W. E. Anderson.

The list of ministers was called and absentees noted.

Rev. D. W. Hansley was appointed to write a sketch of the life of Rev. Solomon Duff, the same to appear in these minutes.

A welcome address was made by Bro. W. H. Lupton.

The response was made by Rev. D. W. Hansley.

The minutes of the Executive Committee were read as follows:

The Executive Committee of the Eastern Conference of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina met at Kinston, N. C., on November 24th, 1943 at 11 o'clock A. M. Present: Rev. Lloyd Vernon, Chairman, J. W. Alford, Secretary, Rev. Duffy Toler and Bro. H. M. Mallard.

Prayer was offered by Bro. Toler.

The Chairman stated that the purpose of the meeting was to draw up an order of Business, and also to apportion the sum of \$1,500.00 to the churches to be raised as a chapel fund for the Orphanage.

On motion each church be requested to raise the sum of 25c per capita for the chapel fund, and forward same to Bro. H. M. Mallard, Treasurer, Trenton, N. C., and he hold the same in Chapel Fund account, and send the total collected to the Orphanage not later than the convening of the next session of the Conference.

On motion the secretary be instructed to mail to the Pastors and Clerks the above request at his earliest convenience, and draw on the Treasurer for his expenses.

On motion we adjourned.

On motion the above minutes were adopted.

At this time we began calling the list of churches.

The introductory sermon was preached by J. W. Alford. Text, Psalm 8: 4, after which we dismissed for dinner.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

After a bountiful dinner we re-assembled, and devotions were conducted by Rev. B. F. Ringold. Prayer by Rev. J. A. Evans.

Visiting ministers were recognized as follows:

Western Association: Rev. J. A. Evans.

Cape Fear Conference: Rev. M. L. Johnson.

Central Conference: Rev. Bruce Barrow.

We confinued calling the list of churches.

Rev. M. L. Johnson was recognized, and he made an interesting report of the State Superannuation work, and solicited continued co-operation and support.

The committee on Devotions reported as follows:

Tonight: Rev. D. W. Hansley open, Rev. Lloyd Vernon preach. Tomorrow at 11:30 o'clock: Rev. W. E. Anderson open, Rev. J. A. Evans preach.

A collection was taken for Eld. Luke Wetherington amounting to \$110.00.

On motion conference close until tomorrow morning, 9:30 o'clock. Conference to be opened by Rev. F. E. Jones. Closing exercise by Rev. S. A. Smith.

THURSDAY MORNING

The session was opened at 9:30 o'clock A. M., by Rev. F. E. Jones, according to previous appointment. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. C. Kennedy.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

We finished calling the list of churches.

On motion we ask the Executive Committee to look into the condition of Ruth's Chapel, Craven county, and make such disposition of the matter as they may think best.

A check for \$15.00 from Mrs. M. C. Prescott, sent as a donation from this body to her as a widow of a deceased minister, was received, and in accordance to her wish, it was turned over to the Orphanage, and her name dropped from the list of widows.

On motion we express to Sister Prescott our sincere appreciation for her spirit in this matter.

The Sabbath School committee reported as follows:

We recommend and endorse the same resolution passed in 1943, asking and urging that it be put into effect.

On motion it was adopted.

Rev. M. L. Johnson spoke to us about the Church Finance Association, Inc., showing its aims and nature of its operation, and asking for our continued co-operation.

On motion the Finance Committee retire, settle with the Treasurer, and he make his report.

The Committee on Ministerial Character made the following report: We beg to say that no charges against any of our ministers were called to our attention.

On motion the report was adopted.

On motion we appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to be added to the collection of \$110.00 taken yesterday for Rev. Luke Wetherington, making a total of \$150.00.

Rev. J. A. Evans, Superintendent of the Orphanage made report of the

donations received for the Home from this Conference during the past year, and solicited our continued support. His report follows:

An offering for the Orphanage was taken after the above report, amounting to \$93.04.

Rev. M. L. Johnson was again recognized, and he spoke to us about the Superannuation program, and urged each minister to supply the necessary information and data required by the Board.

On motion we allow the Treasurer \$20.00 a year for his services.

On motion we pay the Clerk \$35.00 a year for his services.

On motion we add the words "or transferred" to the word "excommunicated" in the church letter. The motion was amended by adding another column to our statistical table, with the heading "Transferred." The amended motion was passed.

At this time we called off for the sermon by Rev. J. A. Evans, after which we were served the dinner.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

A very bountiful dinner was served, after which we re-assembled. Devotions by Rev. D. W. Hansley.

On motion we ask the Executive Committee to investigate any church that fails to represent to the Conference, and make any disposition they may see fit.

Petitions for the next session were from Core Creek, and Wintergreen, Craven County, and by vote the next Conference will be held with Wintergreen Church.

Rev. S. A. Smith was selected to preach the introductory sermon, Rev. D. W. Hansley alternate.

The committee on Temperance reported as follows:

The Temperance Committee accepts and recommends the resolutions adopted by this Conference in the 1943 session, offered by sister Alice Lupton. On motion it was adopted.





PROCEEDINGS

The Eastern Auxiliary Convention met in its annual session with Sandy Plain Free Will Baptist Church, on Thursday, March 25, 1044. The Theme for the day was: "Prayer, the Key to Steadfastness."

The devotions were conducted by Mrs. W. O. Caroon, Kinston, N. C., who read several Scriptural texts, bearing on the Theme, after which she made an impressive talk on Prayer. Mrs. J. C. Griffin, the President, made a few inspiring remarks in connection with the devotionals.

The Convention received a very hearty welcome by Mrs. Thigpen, of the local church, followed with the response, rendered by Mrs. Louise Bedsworth, of Davis, N. C.

The President's message was to the point, and consisted largely in instructions to the delegates, welcome to Ministers present, and a plea for the full co-operation of all present.

The business session opened with the enrollment of delegates and Ministers. Reports from some of the Vice-Presidents followed. (See Reports.)

Ministers in attendance were: L. J. Potter, J. C. Griffin, R. C. Kennedy, S. A. Smith, J. R. Bennett, L. R. Ennis, W. E. Anderson, Jas. A. Evans, and Bruce Barrow. The following Committees were appointed:

Nominating: Mrs. J. H. Oglesby, Chairman, Mrs. S. A. Smith, Alice E. Lupton. Finance: Mrs. Walter Rhodes, Chairman, Mrs. Maggie Overman, Mrs. Ruby Stilley. Petition: Mrs. J. J. Blizzard, Chairman, Mrs. Luther Smith, Mrs. Simon W. Jones. Resolutions: Mrs. Earl Harrison, Mrs. R. C. Kennedy, Mrs. Amos Howard.

The Minutes of the Executive session, held in February, at the home of Mrs. Barnes, at Cash Corner, were read, and on motion, they were received, except for the recommendation relative to the nomination of officers at the annual meetings. The report of the Field Secretary was heard at this time. (See Reports.)

Mrs. J. H. Oglesby made a talk on the Mission work, both Home and Foreign, giving some statistics, and calling attention to the lack of churches in our cities and towns, closing with an earnest plea for more activities in the promotion of the Mission cause.

At this time, business was suspended for the Convention message by Mrs. Bruce Barrow. Congregational singing was led by Rev. L. R. Ennis, followed with prayer by Rev. W. E. Anderson. Mrs. Barrow spoke very inspiringly on the Theme of "Prayer, the Key to Steadfastness," basing her remarks from II Timothy, 2nd chapter, and from a part of the 2nd chapter of James. She brought out the thoughts, "To whom to pray; For whom to pray; When are we to pray?" She stressed the great need of praying for ourselves, for each other, for our Pastors, for the newly converted, our aged Ministers, our Orphanage and all Departments of Christian effort, including our Bible School, Missionaries, our country and our boys and girls in service." She said that God made provision for every man, when He gave to

the world His only begotten Son—His call is to "Whosoever will." The entire message was inspiring and impressive throughout.

Adjourned for lunch.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session opened with devotional services conducted by Mrs. Erma Godley, of New Bern, with prayer by Rev. L. R. Ennis.

Rev. James A. Evans, Superintendent of the Orphanage, was heard at this time, relative to the work at the Orphanage, and their plans for further progress and development. An offering was taken, amounting to \$50.00, for the Orphanage. Bethel Free Will Baptist Church at Kinston, by its instructed delegates, requested a letter of dismissal from the Convention, to take membership with the Cape Fear Auxiliary Convention. motion that the request be granted; Motion carried. At this time reports were heard from other District Vice-Presidents. (See table of reports.) Delegates were appointed to the various Auxiliary Conventions, as follows: Mrs. Powell, Central; Mrs. Bruce Barrow, Western; Mrs. Marie Gaskins, Cape Fear; Mrs. J. C. Griffin, Albemarle; Mrs. J. H. Oglesby, Rock Fish, and Mrs. Louise Bedsworth, to the Pee Dee; Mrs. Alice E. Lupton, delegate to the State Auxiliary Convention. Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Field Secretary for the State Auxiliary, made a splendid talk on the great need of more strenuous efforts in behalf of enlistment among our women, and the promotion of Vacation Bible Schools. She said there were a vast number of Churches in North Carolina that had no auxiliary organizations, and the field was ripe for har-She also stressed the need of greater co-operation in behalf of the Assembly Grounds, we are hoping to obtain.

The Resolution Committee reported that "no Resolutions had been submitted to them during the day. The other committees made their reports, and were received by motions. The Nominating Committee presented recommendations for the officers for the ensuing year, and on motion, were received. (See Reports.)

Invitations for the next Convention were submitted, two churches, Mosley's Creek and Whaley's Chapel, both asking for it. It mas moved and carried that the September session of the convention be held with Mosley's Creek Church. Expressions of appreciation were made to Whaley's Chapel. Mrs. Ballard made a short talk on "Superannuation," which was very enlightening and impressive.

A short, miscellaneous program was rendered at this time, led by Mrs. Ballard. A duet, "The Touch of His Hand on Mine," by Mrs. Ballard and Mrs. Bedsworth, was rendered, a recitation and other interesting items composed the program, after which a rising vote of thanks was tendered the local church, for its gracious manner in entertaining the Convention, and for its co-operation in helping to make the day one of success for the Master.

The Convention adjourned with prayer.

PROCEEDINGS

The Eastern Auxiliary convention met with the Mosley's Creek Church, in its semi-annual session on Thursday, September 21st, 1944. Mrs. J. C. Griffin led the devotional service, using the 58th verse of I Cor., 15th chapter, in keeping with the Theme, "Steadfast in Stewardship."

BUSINESS SESSION

Mrs. Walter Rhodes, the new President, made some very timely remarks, asking for prayer for herself, and urged that we not be "slothful" in the business of the Lord, but that we put forth every possible effort to the promotion of the cause of righteousness. She especially stressed the need of more prayer in our homes and urged that we hold cottage prayer meetings often, and in as many homes as we could.

Robert Crawford, National Secretary of the Association. These were presented to the congregation, and given a warm welcome by the President.

Reports from the First and Fifth Vice-Presidents were heard at this time, after which Rev. Jas. A. Evans, gave a very encouraging report from the Orphanage.
