ASSOCIATIONAL PROCEEDINGS

The thirty-second annual session of the First Mission Association of Free Will Baptists met Tuesday evening August 18, 1959, at the Old Minister's Home and Camp Ground for the introductory service. Since the Moderator and Asst. Moderator were not present, Rev. H. E. Staires, chairman of the Executive Board, was in charge of the service. The service opened by singing "Bring Them In" and "Sunlight" directed by Rev. Waldo Young with Betty Payne at the piano. Rev. John Peterson and Rev. Ernest Harrison led in prayer during the service. A praise service was led by Rev. Jerry Rhoades. Rev. and Mrs. Bill Ketchum sang "Surely I Will Lord" and Ricky Young sang "The One Lost Sheep" for special numbers.

Rev. Waldo Young was introduced to bring the introductory message. Text: Acts 4:31. Subject: Because of Prayer. The service was dismissed in prayer.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Services opened with singing directed by Rev. Homer Young, with Waldo Young at the piano. Rev. Bill Ketchum led the congregation in prayer. Rev. E. J. Wilson gave the devotional reading from Titus 3.

Letters were called for.

Motion carried to read the statistics from the Church letters.

Letters from the following Churches were read: Tulsa First, Turley, Cushing, Garden Heights, Stillwater, Okmulgee, Liberty, Sand Springs, Oilton, Blue Bell, Stroud, Coffeyville, West Tulsa, Allen, Lawnwood, Pretty Water, North Heights, Sapulpa First, Owasso, Trinity Temple, Lewis Avenue, New Home, Bristow, Drumright and Silver City.

Motion carried to receive the letters and seat the delegates. The delegates were asked to stand and were seated by the moderator.

Officers were elected as follows: Moderator, Rev. N. R. Smith; Asst. - Moderator, Rev. Robert Duncan; Clerk, Rev. Homer Young; and Asst. - Clerk, Rev. Waldo Young.

By-Laws were read by Moderator, Rev. Richard Shade, North East Association, and Rev. Bill Ketchum, Grand River Association, were recognized as visiting brethren.

Motion carried to allow Tulsa First, and Sapulpa First to enter recommendations for credential board in their letters. Letter from the Airport Church was read. Motion carried to receive the letter and seat the delegates. Motion carried to grant Airport Church the privilege of entering a request on their letter.

Committees were appointed as follows: Pulpit Committee ---- Mrs. Harold McGuire, Gladys Cook, Lela Crow, Mrs. Carolyn Timmons and Rev. Bob Duncan as Chairman. Resolution Committee ---- Harry Staires, Jerry Rhoades, W. E. Warner, Andy Fipps and Alfred Coursey. Obituary Committee ---- Myrl Wilson, Mrs. Tommy Roberts, Ethel Armstrong, Mary Walker and Naomi Wright. Temperence Committee _--- Charlie Hinesley, Mrs. Harold Endicott, Clifford Inbody, Bertha Rushing and Evelyn Chism.

Motion carried to take Resolution No. 3 of the 2nd Quarterly Meeting from the table. The resolution lost.

Pulpit committee reported that Rev. Eual Gorman and Rev. Bill Ketchum were to bring the morning messages.

Motion carried to adjourn until 1:30 p.m. Dismissed by Rev. Roy Bingham.

Announcements were made and we were dismissed in prayer by Pay Rob Katchum dismissed in prayer by Rev. Bob Ketchum.

1:30 P.M.

The afternoon session began with singing "Bless be the tie that binds." Prayer by Rev. John Peterson. The Young brothers sang "Then I Met the Master." The devotional was given by Rev. Jerry Rhoades. He read Phil. 2:1-11 and led the congregation in prayer.

Report of Youth Camp was read and accepted. See report.

Items 1 through 2 of the Credential Board report were read and accepted. See report.

The report of the Committee that was elected at the 3rd Quarterly Meeting to investigate the possibility of having more than one Quarterly Meeting in this Association was read and received.

The committee reported that the majority of the pastors are in favor of two Quarterly meetings, although there is some opposition.

Items 1 and 2 of the Resolution Committee were read and accepted.

The pulpit committee reported that Rev. Roy Bingham and Rev. Jerry Rhoades were to bring the Wednesday evening mesages and Rev. Don Payne and Rev. Harry Staires were to preach for the 11:00 A. M. service Thursday.

The treasurer's report was read and received.

Items 1 through 5 of the Budget Committee were read and accepted.

Mrs. Myrl Wilson read the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. The report was accepted.

Temperance committee report was read and received.

The Quarterly Meetings were placed as follows: First Quarterly Meeting, Turley; Second Quarterly Meeting, Drumright; and the Third Quarterly Meeting, Lawnwood. Introductory speakers are: Turley, Rev. H. E. Staires with Rev. Roy Bingham as alternate; Drumright, Rev. Don Payne with Rev. Doyle Dipboye as alternate; and Lawnwood, Rev. Homer Young with Rev. Bob Ketchum as alternate. Rev. Bob Duncan was elected as introductory speaker for the annual Association with Rev. Willis Walker as alternate. The memorial message will be delivered by Rev. Ed Wilson with Rev. Hattie Newman as alternate.

Motion carried to place the League Rallies. First, Drumright; Second, Garden Heights; and Third, Lewis Avenue.

Executive Board report was read and accepted.

Vacancies on the standing Boards were filled: Executive Board, Rev. Adrain Condit 5 years and Rev. Roy Bingham 1 year; Christian Education Board, Don Payne, 5 years; Trustee Board, Charles Hinesley, 5 years, and Bob Duncan, 3 year; Credential Board, W. T. Roberts, 5 years; Mission Board, Willis Walker, 5 years and Bob Ketchum, 1 year; Cemetary Committee, Sadie Fincher, 1 year.

Resolution from the Temperance Committee was read and received. Motion carried to adjourn. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Carl Sharp.

Song Service: Rev. Ed Wilson led in singing with Rev. Waldo Young at the piano. Morse Moore led the congregation in prayer. Ricky Young sang "One Lost Sheep" as a special number. A praise service was led by Rev. H. E. Staires. Special song "Heaven will surely be worth it all" was rendered by Patti Dressler. Strauther and Eula Mae Yochum sang "Blessings come from Heaven Every Day" with Rev. Clayton Crafton at the piano.

Rev. Jerry Rhoades brought a mesage on "Faithful Stewards" reading I Cor. 4:1-3. Rev. Roy Bingham continued on the same theme reading 2 Cor. 5:16-21. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Tommy Roberts.

Resolution No. 4 was read and received.

The report of the Obituary Committee was read and received. The Moderator asked the congregation to stand in silent prayer which was concluded by Rev. John H. West.

Motion made and seconded that we recommend the state delegates that are listed in the letters and give the Church the privilege to send their delegates name and money later. This was amended to read "give the delegates present today the authority to appoint their delegate." The motion carried.

Motion carried to appoint a committee of three to read Rules of order and report back to the afternoon session on a ruling concerning motions made and lost.

Resolution No. 5 was read and received. Motion carried to adjourn Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Perry Smith.

11:00 A.M.

The morning worship service was opened by singing "There is a Fountain". Prayer by Rev. Roy Bingham. Special number by quartet composed of Homer Young, Waldo Young, Charles Hinesley and W. T. Roberts.

Rev. Don Payne was introduced for the morning message. He read Zech. 4:6-10 and used "Not by Might, nor by power, but by the Spirit of God" for a subject. Rev. H. E. Staires followed him using Heb. 11:1-6 and brought a message on "The Way to God". Dismissed in prayer and the blessing on the food by Rev. Adrain Condit.

Services opened by singing "All Hail The Power" and "Jesus Saves".

Rev. Adrain Condit read Heb. 2:1 and led in prayer for the devotional.

Rev. N. R. Smith spoke concerning the Sunday School Literature that is being published by the State Sunday School Board.

Final report of the Cemetery Committee was read and received.

Resolution No. 6 submitted by the Cemetery Committee, was read and received.

Appreciation letter from the Stillwater delegates was read and received.

Motion carried to have a History of the Camp Grounds.

State delegates were read.

Motion carried that the Executive Board Audit all books.

Motion carried to have a camp-meeting. Motion carried to begin 10 days before the Association which will be August 12, 1960.

Final report of Temperence Committee was read and received.

The committee appointed concerning motions that lost being recorded, made their report that they were not to be recorded. Report received.

Item No. 12 of the credential Board was read and received.

Rev. John H. West was elected as leader of the Association revival (every church in the association being in revival at the same time) and was allowed to appoint a committee to assist him. He appointed Rev. Harry Staires, Rev. N. R. Smith, Rev. Waldo Young and Rev. Homer Young.

Motion carried to appoint a parliamentarian committee. Rev. Don Payne, Rev. Roy Bingham, and Rev. Doyle Dipboye were appointed.

Motion carried to elect two evangelists to preach the camp-meeting. Rev. Robert Duncan and Rev. Wade Jernigan were elected.

Motion carried for the Moderator and asst. Moderator to provide a P. A. System for all associational meetings.

Motion carried that the Clerk be in charge of all Insurance business.

Motion carried that we have some one in charge of medical needs at the Youth camp. Motion carried to authorize the Christian Educational Board to select this person.

Motion carried to pay camp meeting evangelists \$100.00 each to be received from offerings during the meeting and the Assn. Budget.

Motion carried to place Rev. John H. West in Charge of the Camp Meeting.

The Historian Committee was appointed as follows: Rev. C. C. Wilson, Rev. H. E. Staires and Rev. Melvin Bingham.

The minutes were read and approved.

Ethel Armstrong, Nola Posey, Cherry Fipps, June Young and Lela Crow were elected as State delegates from this Association.

Motion carried to include the active deacons names in the minutes beginning next year.

Motion carried to allow the Master's Men to enter a written report in the minutes.

Motion carried to adjourn. Announcements. Dismissed in prayer by the moderator.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

FIRST QUARTERLY MEETING:

- 1. Motion carried that since Everett Buchannon, licensed minister, has united with another denomination, we declare his license void. Adopted.
- 2. Motion carried that no ordained Minister or Deacon be recognized as active in this Assn. until they have appeared before the Credential Board. Adopted.
- 3. Motion carried that the letters that were read be received and read before the Quarterly Meeting, and that the Churches failing to send in the delegate fee, do so. Adopted.
- 4. Motion carried that since the deacons of the Garden Heights Church have requested that the Credential Board and Executive Board meet with them, that this request be granted. Adopted.

SECOND QUARTERLY MEETING:

- 1. We recommend that permanent resolution number 17 be struck from the minutes. Adopted.
- 2. We recommend that ministers coming to us from other Associations, that have an Oklahoma State Ministers card, in good standing be accepted into this Association without examination. Adopted.
- . 3. We recommend that a proposition concerning a building from New Home Church, be referred to the Executive Board. Adopted.

THIRD QUARTERLY MEETING:

1. We recommend that the Sunday School Board and League Board be dissolved and elect a new Board known as the Christian Education Board. Adopted.

Staires, chairman was in charge of the service. They organized with 13 charter members and left the charter open for 30 days. Rev. Conn Sadler was called to pastor the church. The church voted to unite with the First Mission Association.

- 1. Motion carried to give the Olive Church building to the Silver City church whose building was destroyed by a tornado.
- 2. Motion carried to put Olive Church property for sale by sealed bids, bids to be opened on June 1, 1959.
- 3. Motion carried to place an ad in the Drumwright paper, and a sign on the property, and that bids be sent to Rev. H. E. Staires, 139 East Drumright, Drumright, Oklahoma.
 - 4. Motion carried to buy 12 double deck bunk beds for dormitories.

ASSOCIATION

The Executive Board met June 1, 1959, at the camp ground. Bids on the Olive Church property were opened. Motion carried to accept the bid of Willie Van Meter for \$650.00 and sell him the property: Motion carried to buy one bed from Homer Young for \$5.00.

TRUSTEE BOARD REPORT

We have done all within our power to carry out the wishes of the Association during the past year. All buildings belonging to the Association were painted, the seats of the tabernacle were repaired and painted, and the dining hall and the kitchen were repaired and painted. However, we were unable to install the hot water heaters in baths because we did not have the money to pay for them. You have voted many things for us to do in the coming year. We, the Mission Board met and organized with Rev. C. C. Wilson as chairman, and Rev. Don Payne, as Tres. We are requesting your help in completing the suggested plans of the Mission Board. We feel this can be attained through the New Church club plan, and we prayerfully request new members for the plan.

ASSOCIATION:

During the last year your Mission board has written 26 letters to the Churches of this district requesting love offerings for the new Stillwater Church. The response to this request was \$245.09 received as follows:

PERMANENT RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Be it resolved that all our By-Laws and Resolutions which are now in effect, be printed in our minutes.
- 2. That the traveling expenses of the Credential Board "While on business for the Association," be paid.
- 3. That hereafter the November quarterly meeting begin Thursday night before the third Sunday, because of the Thanksgiving holidays.
- 4. That our Churches not send any minister up for ordination until he has been licensed for one year from date of examination.
- 5. That in the examination of candidates for ordination and license, each question and answer be recorded and filed with the clerk of the Association.
- 6. That we the First Mission Association, let it be known to all churches, new members of our Association, and all churches coming in hereafter, that their property is the property of this Association until dismissed by letter from this Association.
- 7. That since we have grown to such proportion, we seat our delegates from the chair, without the usual lineup and hand shake.
- 8. That no person can be an active deacon or minister in this Association who does not pay and teach tithes.
- That the letters of all churches be in the hands of the Associational Clerk at least one week before Conference convenes.
- 10. That we recommend that when the Association is in the worship services all on the grounds be asked to attend unless providentially hindered.
- 11. That the credential board be urged to act as quickly as possible on candidates for license or ordination. Be it further resolved that if the board cannot reach a decision at the quarterly meeting or association, that they be allowed to wait three months.

12. That churches having candidates for ordination or license send request to quarterly conference in session prior to examination. Examination date to be set at a date between sessions of the quarterly conference by the credential committee.

13. That all of our Churches use the letter forms furnished by our

clerk.

- 14. That since we have grown to such proportions, and the demands of service are heavy, that no member of this association be permitted and or required to serve on more than two boards at a time. This ruling to be effective only as vacancies are filled.
- 15. That we give the credential committee the privilege of examining preachers and deacons on the Woman's Auxiliary day at the quarterly meetings and the Association so that hereafter members can be present in the sessions.
- 16. That the assistant moderator of the association hereafter be chairman of the pulpit committee.
- 17. That no Minister be received into the Association from another denomination unless accompanied by a letter of recommendation.
 - 18. That the Moderator with his assistant appoint all committees.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give our-selves to one another by the will of God in this solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the scriptures, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship, and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able to promote the success of the church and of the Gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligation, and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprise, the support of missions, the success of Sunday School and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the infallible Word of God and the only safe rule of faith and practice. 2 Tim. 3:16, 2 Peter 1:20-21.

2. That there is but one true and living God, and in the God Head or Divine Essence, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Gen. 17:1; I John 5:7.

- 3. That we are fallen and depraved creatures, and cannot extricate ourselves from our fallen situation by any ability we possess by nature. Eph. 5:1-19.
- 4. That Salvation, Regeneration, Sanctification, Justification, and Redemption are the Life, Death, Resurrection Ascension and Intercession, of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Acts 4:12; Titus 3:5.
- 5. That he shall endure to the end, the same shall be saved. Matt. 22:13; Rev. 2:10.
- 6. That the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal. Matt. 25:46.
- 7. The Baptism and the Lord's Supper and the washing of the saint's feet are the ordinances of Jesus Christ, appointed in the Church and none but true believers are proper subjects, and the only proper mode of baptism is immersion. Mark 1:4-9, 10; Luke 23:30; John 13:14.
- 8. We believe in the sanctity of the first day of the week or the Lord's Day, and that it ought to be observed and spent in public or private worship of God, and that on it we should abstain from our worldly concerns except in cases of necessity and mercy. Ex. 31:15, Deut. 5:12; Matt. 12:12.
- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the body, both of the just and unjust, but everyone in his own order, those who have done evil to the resurrection of damnation, and that God has appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness by Jesus Christ. I Cor. 15:12; Matt. 12:12.
- 10. That it is our duty to be tender and affectionate to one another, and to study the happiness of the people of God in general, and to be singly engaged to promote the honor of God. John 13:35; Gal. 6:10.
- 11. We believe that Jesus Christ by the grace of God tasted death for every man; yet none can partake of this divine benefit only by his repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, infants and idiots excepted. Acts 20:21; I Tim. 2:5-6; John 3:14-16; I Cor. 15:20-22; Romans 5:15.
- 12. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ is the door into the Church, that baptism is a duty in answer to a good conscience. John 10:7; I Peter 3:21.
- 13. We believe that the Lord's people are one in Him, and, therefore, should be one at His table. I Cor. 1:1, 11, 27, 28.

CONSTITUTION

From long experience, we are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches to perpetuate our union and to maintain a correspondence among our churches.

Therefore we have adopted the following Constitution and By-Laws for our government.

1. This shall be called the First Mission Association.

- 2. This Association shall be composed of such well regulated Free Will Baptist Churches maintaining Gospel order, agreeing with the denomination in doctrine and practices, favoring the enterprises that have been endorsed by this association.
- 3. The acting members of this association shall be the Ministers, Ministers' Wives, Deacons, and the Church Clerks belonging to any church, composing the body, also three delegates from each church chosen by the members of their respective churches.
- 4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, a Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Board composed of five members. The Board members to be elected so as to require one to be elected each year. The Trustees shall be elected by and be subject to the Association. They shall act as custodians of all

property belonging to the Association, and shall sign legal papers when authorized by the Association to do so. All officers shall hold office until their successors are elected.

5. The property of any church in this Association that should go down until they cannot transact business because they are disorganized. shall become the property of the Association and the Executive Board

has power to execute legal papers for the property.

6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be decided upon by the Association, also meet in regular Quarterly Meetings, and at such quarterly meetings shall have power to transact business of the Association except to change the Constitution.

7. This Association may be called together by the Moderator by

giving the churches ten days notice of such meeting.

8. This Association shall not license or ordain any person to the Ministry or as a Deacon who has more than one living companion.

9. This Constitution may be changed at any Yearly Meeting by a two-thirds majority of members voting.

BY-LAWS

1. The Moderator or Assistant Moderator, or in their absence, the oldest minister present shall call the Association into conference.

2. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.

3. Five members from two or more churches shall constitute a quorum. A less number may adjourn until such quorum is present.

4. Visiting brethren are invited to sit as advisory members. 5. Those who speak shall arise and address the moderator. Per-

sonal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and a vote taken.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. The Moderator shall not allow discussion when not carried on

in a Christian Spirit.

10. The ruling of the Moderator may be overruled by a two-thirds

majority of the members voting.

11. Any Minister opposed to any of the enterprises endorsed by this Association will not be entitled to a seat in conference, and we will not seat any Minister in this Association that teaches the baptism of the Holy Ghost separate from Regeneration of the Birth of the

12. No questions from any church shall come under the consideration of the Association unless it has first been discussed in its own

church.

13. At each Association arrangements shall be made to ensure two or more sermons or their equivalent devotional exercises each day.
