ASSOCIATIONAL PROCEEDINGS

The thirty-third annual session of the First Mission Association of Free Will Baptists met Tuesday evening August 23, 1960 at the Old Ministers Home and Camp Ground for the introductory service. The service opened with Mrs. Fronzie Tuttle at the piano, Rev. Waldo Young leading the congregation in singing "There Shall Be Showers of Blessing." Rev. Sam Gober led in the opening prayer, followed by opening remarks by Rev. N. R. Smith, clerk, who was in charge since the Moderator and Assistant Moderator were not present. The congregational singing continued with "We're Marching to Zion," "He Keeps Me Singing," and "Whosoever Will." A special solo entitled "My Lord Grows More Precious to Me" was rendered by Mr. Wayne Payne of Drumright.

The congregation then sang "At Calvary," followed by a praise

service conducted by Rev. N. R. Smith.

Special singing continued with a quartet composed of Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Roberts, Shirley Roberts, and Rev. Waldo Young singing "One Touch of His Hand," accompanied by Mrs. Tuttle at the piano. A quartet composed of Rev. Jim Christian, Mr. and Mrs. Burl Tuttle, and Rev. Waldo Young sang "I Need No Mansion Here." Mr. and Mrs. Jim Christian and daughter sang "I Cannot Find My Way Alone."

Rev. Smith introduced the speaker, Rev. Willis Walker, pasof Liberty. He delivered the message on "A Solemn Warning," reading Revelation 3:1-5.

Invitation hymn "Just As I Am," was sung. Benediction by Key. Jerry Rhoades.

Wednesday, August 24, 1960

Morning services opened with singing "Praise Him, Praise Him," directed by Rev. Bob Ketchum, Mrs. Melvin Bingham, pianist. Prayer by Rev. E. J. Wilson. The congregation then sang "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story."

In the absence of the moderator, Rev. N. R. Smith called the yearly Association into conference. He read II Timothy for the devotion, and called on Rev. John H. West to lead in prayer.

The letters from the churches were read by the Assistant Clerk. Motion carried to receive the letters and seat the delegates.

Nominations for moderator were called for Rev. Harry E. Staires was elected to this position. Other officers elected were; Assistant Moderator, Rev. Adrain Condit; Clerk, Rev. N. R. Smith; Assistant Clerk, Rev. Waldo Young.

Motion carried that one parliamentarian be elected. Rev. Don

Payne was elected.

Petitionary letters were called for. A letter from the Central Free Will Baptist Church, Tulsa, was read. Motion made to accept the letter and receive the church into the Association with Item No. 2 of the Credential Board report which concerned this motion. Motion carried.

The by-laws of the Association were read by the Assistant Moderator.

The Divine Service committee was approinted, as follows; Mr.

Henry Ruth, Jean Myers, Mrs. L. E. Devary, Opal Lee, and the Assistant Moderator who is chairman by virtue of his office.

The report of the General Board was read. Motion made to adopt the report and place it on the table until the afternoon session. Carried.

The report of the Divine Service was read. They report Rev. Herb Wutzke and Rev. Bill Ketchum to bring the 11:00 a.m. message.

The meeting was adjourned, and the benediction prayed by Rev. Tommy Roberts.

Morning Worship

The Morning Worship Service was opened by singing "Higher Ground," directed by Rev. Waldo Young, Peggy Royal as pianist. Rev. Floyd Test led in the prayer of Invocation.

The congregation sung the hymn "Stepping in the Light." Special Song "What a Day That Will Be" by Mr. and Mrs.

S. P. Yocham.

Rev. Herbert Wutzke brought a message on "Boldness," using Acts 4:13-21 as the text. After this message, Rev. Bill Ketchum led in singing "I am Bound for the Promised Land." He then brought a message "These All Died in the Faith," using Hebrews 11:13-15 as the Scripture reading.

An invitation to accept Christ was given. Announcements were made, and the benediction was prayed by Rev. Bob Ketchum.

Wednesday Afternoon

The afternoon session opened with singing, "I Am Resolved," directed by Rev. E. J. Wilson, with Mrs. Melvin Bingham as pianist.

Rev. J. A. Sadler led in prayer.

The congregation then sang, "I Am Thine Oh Lord."

The Devotion was given by Rev. Conn Sadler. He read II Corinthians 5th chapter and led the congregation in prayer.

The report of the Credential Board was read. Item no. 1 adopted. Item no. 2 was adopted with the petitionary letter from Central church. Items 3 through 21 were adopted. Item no. 22 was read, and Motion to defer this item unless a letter from this church is received during this Association. The motion carried. Item no. 23 was received for information. Item no. 24 adopted. Item no. 25 was adopted.

A motion was made that churches who need to, be allowed to insert requests in their church letter for the Credential Board.

The report of the Trustees Board was read and accepted for

information.

The Treasurer's report was given by the Treasurer, Rev. N. R. Smith. The report was adopted.

The Divine Service Committee reported that Rev. Don Payne

would bring the evening message.

The resignation of Rev. Bob Ketchum from the Executive Board was read and accepted.

Motion made to adjourn until 9:00 A. M. Thursday. Motion

carried.

Wednesday Evening

The Wednesday Evening Service opened by singing directed by Rev. Waldo Young, Doris Jean Whitten, pianist. "I Am Thine, On Lord" was sung followed by prayer led by Mrs. Burl Halliburton. Songs, "He Hideth My Soul," and "Jesus I Love Thee." Rev. James Cearley led in prayer. After singing "I Am Bound for the Promised Land," Rev. H. E. Staires led in a testimony service.

The special songs were a solo by Mr. Wayne Payne, "I Was there When It Happened," and a solo by Mrs. Don Payne, "He'll Understand and Say Well Done."

The Christian Education Board report was read by the chairman Rev. Don Payne. Motion carried to accept the report and adopt it item by item. Item no. 1 adopted. Item no. 2 adopted. Item no. 3 adopted. Item concerning having two youth camps carried. Item no. 4 adopted. Item no. 5 lost.

The motion concerning the camp meeting and youth camps was brought from the table. The motion carried.

Motion to Adjourn carried. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. E. M. Kennedy.

Thursday Morning Worship Service

Rev. Ray Gwartney read from Psalm 51:7 and brought a message "Purge Me with Hyssop and I Shall Be Clean." Rev. Roy Bingham followed him with a message, "Wash Me and I Shall be Whiter Than Snow."

Announcements were made. Benediction by Rev. John H. West.

Thursday Afternoon

Services were opened by singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" led by Adrain Condit, Waldo Young at the piano.

Bro. Andy Fipps led in prayer.

The devotion was given by Rev. E. J. Wilson. He read Romans 15:1-7 and called on Mr. E. D. Williams to lead in prayer.

Resoultion no. 2 adopted Resolution no. 3 adopted. Resolution no. 4 adopted. and Resolution no. 5 adopted.

A letter from South Grand River Association was read, and received.

The District Woman's Auxiliary Report was read and accepted. The Temperance Committee Report was read and accepted.

The report of the Cemetery Committee was read and accepted. Rev. Adrain Condit was elected to bring the Memorial Message on May 21, 1961.

The Obituary Committee Report was read and accepted by standing and being led in prayer by Rev. E. M. Kennedy.

The proposed budget was read and adopted.

the table. Motion failed.

Rev. E. M. Kennedy gave a report of the work of the State. Rev. H. E. Staires gave a report concerning Rev. Harry Beatty going to Bartlesville, and called on the congregation to assist Rev. Beatty. Motion was made that we raise the money from our churches to pay the first 3 months rent, for a place of worship at Bartlesville. Amended to read, "permit the Association Mission Board to raise the money." Motion carried. The total amount raised in pledges was \$314.00.

Nominations were opened for the Chairman of the Camp

Meeting Committee. Rev. John H. West was elected.

Motion was made that the reports be on a calendar year basis, the Quarterly meetings be left as they are. This motion was tabled. Motion made that the minutes be allotted according to the

amount of money sent in by the churches. This motion carried.

The minuutes were read and approved. A motion was made to adjourn,

The Association was dismissed with prayer.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

ANNUAL ASSOCIATION:

The meeting of the General Board of the First Mission Association opened with prayer by Rev. H. E. Staires.

1. Motion carried that we refer the following men to the Credential Board in accordance to Article 2 of the General Board report, First Quarterly meeting 1958, page 7 of the minutes. Paul Inbody, and J. D. Jackson.

2. Motion carried that since no other churches requested Quarterly meetings in their letters, we recommend that they be placed as follows; First Quarterly meeting, Madison Avenue, Tulsa; Second Quarterly Meeting, Drumright; and Third Quarterly Meeting, Bristow.

3. Motion carried to leave out Article 2 of the Second Quarterly

Meeting of the General Board Report from the permanent resolutions.

Motion carried to buy an adding machine to be used by the Associational clerk

Motion carried that we present the League with the project of

buying a permanent Public Address system.

Motion carried that we recommend to the District Woman's Auxiliary to accept the project of buying tables and chairs for the cafe.

FIRST QUARTERLY MEETING

1. Motion carried to accept the Petitionary letter from the Kellyville First Free Will Baptist Church and turn it over to the Credential Board for examination. Adopted.

Motion carried to recommend that the Executive Board compose a letter for Petitionary Letters and send them to the churches.

Motion carried to recommend Rev. N. R. Smith as a nomination for Associational Clerk to fill the vacancy of Rev. Homer Young. Adopted.

SECOND OUARTERLY MEETING

Motion carried that a filing cabinet be bought for the keeping of the records of the Associational Clerk and the Credential Board. Adopted.

Motion carried that the Association buy a small cafe cook stove from the Drumright Church for \$25.00 for the Camp Ground.

Adopted.

We recommend that the Yearly Business Month of the Association be changed from August to February. Tabled until the Asso-

Motion carried that the Mission Board be given the power to make up rules and regulations governing mission work and they be in effect upon approval of this Body. Adopted.

THIRD QUARTERLY MEETING

1. Motion carried that the former resolution be placed in the Permanent Resolutions that \$5.00 Delegate Fee be charged per Church, Adopted.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

ANNUAL ASSOCIATION:

Our board was called together three times. We met one time for the purpose of talking with the prospective pastor for the Black-well church. This man was later called as pastor. We met at Kellyville for the purpose of organizing a church

and did so with 22 charter members.

We met with the group known as the Central Church of Tulsa and organized a church with 45 charter members.

FIRST QUARTERLY MEETING:

I. We have examined the Associational Treasurer's books and find them in order.

II. We have examined the manuscript of the minutes and permit the printing of same.

III: The Executive Board and Credential Board met Sept. 18, 1959 for a joint meeting at the Camp Ground. A petitionary letter from the Blackwell church was read.

A. Motion carried that the letter be received and turned to the Credential Board and if they find the church in order that they be received into the fellowship of the First Mission Association.

B. Motion carried to grant Myrtle Pearson a letter from the Olive church to Bakersfield Church, Calif.

C. Motion carried that since we received \$650.00 from the Olive Church property that we pay 2 years payment to Jack Kaiser (\$1,200 plus \$360.00 interest) on the \$4,500.00 loan.

IV. The Executive Board met at Kellyville, Okla., Oct. 23, 1959 to help organize a Free Will Baptist Church. The services were opened by Gene Mayberry. Roy Bingham led in prayer. H. E. Staires, chairman, read Matthew 6:13-19 and spoke on "Christianity and the Church." He also read one section of "Organization" from the Treatise and called for members to come forward.

Twenty-two (22) names and addresses were received by Homer

Young, Clerk, to become charter members. Motion carried by the board to receive them in full fellowship.

Roy Bingham read II Timothy 2:12-15 and presented the Bible which was accepted by the church. Adrian Condit read the Free Will Baptist Church Covenant which was accepted by the church.

Melvin Bingham prayed the prayer of consecration and the hand of fellowship was extended by the Board.

Officers were elected as follows:

Pastor—Gene Mayberry Clerk—Josett Holman

Deacon—Henry A. Holman
Deacons on trial—Claude Mayberry and Jim Cleghorn.
"First Free Will Baptist Church of Kelleyville" was selected

as the name.

The church voted to unit with the First Mission Association. The charter was left open until the First Sunday in November. Dismissed in prayer by Melvin Bingham.

5. We have examined Bro. Nucl Brown from Owasso and recom-

mend that he be licensed to preach the gospel for one year.

6. We have examined the First Free Will Baptist Church of

Blackwell and recommend it be accepted into the First Mission Association.
7. We have examined the First Free Will Baptist Church of Kelley-

ville, and recommend it to be accepted into the First Mission

Association.

We the Credential Board have examined Buford Zinn, Kellevville, and recommend that he be licensed for one year to preach the gospel.

We the Credential Board recommend Bro. Strauther Youcham.

Blue Bell, to be licensed to preach for one year.

3. We the Credential Board recommend Bro. Nuel Brown, Owasso, to be ordained as a minister.

We the Credential Board recommend Bro, Jerry Kasse, Lewis

Ave., to be ordained as a deacon.

5. We the Credential Board recommend Bro. Wayne Patton, Lawn-

wood, for ordination as a minister.

6. We the Credential Board recommend that the license of Bro.

E. L. Kuns be revoked by the request of the Turley Church.

THIRD OUARTERLY MEETING:

1. We recommend that we accept Bro. Gale L. Stephens as an ordained deacon. Bro. Stephens is a member of the Lewis Ave. church.

 We recommend that Bro. Connie D. Cariker, West Tulsa, be licensed to preach the gospel for one year.
 We recommend that Bro. Olen Hinesley, Lawnwood, be licensed to preach the gospel for one year.

4. We recommend that Bro. Charles A. Bigger, West Tulsa, be licensed to preach the gospel for one year.

5. We recommend that Bro. Lee Ennis, Okmulgee, be ordained

as a deacon.

6. We recommend that Bro. Tom F. Anglin, Okmulgee, be deferred for three months.

We recommend that Bro. Robert Leonard not be licensed to preach on the basis of Article 8 of the constitution of the Association. Bro. Leonard is a member of the West Tulsa church.

3. That hereafter the November quarterly meeting begin Thursday night before the third Sunday, because of Thanksgiving holidays.

That our Churches not send any minister up for ordination until he has been licensed for one year from date of examination.

5. That is the examination of candidates for ordination and license, each question and answer be recorded and filed with the

clerk of the Association.

6. That we the First Mission Association, let it be known to all churches, new members of our Association, and all churches coming in hereafter, that their property is the property of this Association until dismissed by letter from this Association.

7. That since we have grown to such proportion, we seat our delegates from the chair, without the usual lineup and hand shake.

That no person can be an active deacon or minister in this

Association who does not pay and teach tithes.

9. That the letters of all churches be in the hands of the Associational Clerk at least one week before Conference convenes.

10. That we recommend that when the Association is in the worship services all on the grounds be asked to attend unless providentially hindered.

1. That the Credential Board be urged to act as quickly as possible on candidates for license or ordination. Be it further resolved that if the board cannot reach a decision at the quarterly meeting or association, that they be allowed to wait three months.

That churches having candidates for ordination or license send request to quarterly conference in session prior to examination. Examination date be set at a date between sessions of the quarterly conference by the Credential Board.

That all of our Churches use the letter forms furnished

by our clerk.

That since we have grown to such proportions, and the demands of service are heavy, that no member of this association be permitted and or required to serve on more than two boards at a time. This ruling effective only as vacancies are filled.

That we give the Credential Board the privilege of examining preachers and deacons on the Woman's Auxiliary day at the quarterly meetings and the Association so that hereafter members can be present in the sessions.

16. That the Assistant Moderator of the Association here-

after be chairman of the pulpit committee.

17. That no Minister be received into the Association from another denomination unless accompanied by a letter of recommendation.

That the Moderator with his assistant appoint all com-18.

. inittees.

That the Clerk be in charge of all Insurance Business. That all boards submit expense in writing to be approved by the Executive Board before being paid.

21. That the Associational Moderator be chairman of the

General Board

2. That no ordained Minister or Deacon be recognized as active in the Assn. until they have appeared before the Credential Board.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give our selves to one another by the will of God in this solemn coveant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men.'

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the scriptures secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship, and by self-denial, faith, and good works endeavor to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ."

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences, public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the Gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and seek to strengthen the week, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able to promote the success of the church and of the Gispel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principle sacred and Christian obligation, and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His

will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprise, the suport of missions, the success of Sunday School and evengelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the infallible Word of God, and the only safe rule of faith and practice. II Tim. 3:16-17; II Peter 1:20-21.

2. That there is but one true and living God and in the God Head of Divine Essence, Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Gen.

7. Baptism (the imersion of believers in water), the Lord's Supper, and Feet Washing are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel. The Lord's Supper, which is to be observed by all believer at night is followed by the contract of the lievers at night, is followed by the ordinance of feet washing, which teaches humility, of universal obligation, to be practiced by all Believers. Baptism: Matt. 28:19; Acts 8:36,39; Col. 2:12. Lord's Supper: Mark 14:17; Matt. 26-34; I Cor. 11:23, 34; Feet Washing; John 13: 4, 5; John 13: 12-13.

8. We believe in the sanctity of the first day of the week or

the Lord's Day, and that it ought to be observed and spent in public worship of God, and that on it, we should abstain from our worldly concerns except in cases of necessity and mercy. Ex. 31:15;

Deut. 5:12; Matt. 23:33

9. We believe in the resurrection of the body, both the just and the unjust, but every one in his own order; those who have done evil to the resurrection of damnation, and that God has appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness by Jesus Christ. I Cor. 15:34; John 5:28; I Thes. 3:16.

10. That is is our duty to be tender and affectionate to one

another, and to study the happiness of the people of God in general and to singly engage to promote the honor of God. John 13:35:

11. We believe that Jesus Christ, by grace of God, tasted

death for every man; yet none can partake of His divine benefit only by His repentance towards God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, infants and idiots excepted. Acts 20:21; I Tim. 2:5-6; John 3:14-16; I Peter 3:21:.

12. We believe that the Lord's people are one in Him, and therefore should be one at his table. I Cor. 1:1-11; 27-28; John 17:11.

CONSTITUTION To the property of the second s From long experience, we are convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches to perpetuate our union and to maintain a correspondence among our churches.

Therefore we have adopted the following Constitution and By-

aws for our government.

1. This shall be called the First Mission Association.

2. This Association shall be composed of such well regulated Free Will Baptist Churches maintaining Gospel order, agreeing with the denomination in doctrine and practices, favoring the enterprises that have been endorsed by this association.

3. The acting members of this association shall be the Ministers, Ministers' Wives, Deacons, and the Church Clerks belonging to any church, composing the body, also three delegates from each church chosen by the members of their respective churches.

4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator and Assistand Moderator, a clerk, and Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Board composed of five members. The Board members to be elected so as to require one to be elected each year. The Trustees shall be elected by and be subject to the Association. They shall act as custodians of all property belonging to the Association, and shall sign legal papers when authorized by the Association to do so. All officers shall hold office until their successors are elected.

5. The property of any church in this Association that should go down until they cannot rransact business because they are disorganized, shall become the property of the Association and the Executive Board has power to execute legal papers for the property.

6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be decided upon by the Association, also meet in regular Quarterly Meetings, and at such quarterly meetings shall have power transact business of the Association except to change the Constitution.

7. This Association may be called together by the Moderator

by giving the churches ten days notice of such meeting.

8. This Association shall not license or ordain any person to the Ministry or as a Deacon who has more than one living companion.

9. This Constitution may be changed at any Yearly Meeting by a two-thirds majority of members voting.

BY-LAWS

- The moderator or assistant moderator, or in their absence, the oldest minister present, shall call the Association in to conference.
 - 2. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Five members from two or more churches shall constitute a quorum. A less number may adjourn until such quorum is present.
 - Visiting brethren are invited to seats as advisory members.

- 5. Those who speak shall arise and address the moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and a vote taken separately.

7. Motion made and lost shall not be recorded.8. No one shall speak more that twice on the same subject without leave of moderator, many services.

9. The moderator shall not allow discussion when not carried

on, in Christian spirit.

10. The ruling of the moderator may be overruled by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

11. Any minister opposed to any of the enterprises endorsed by the Association will not be entitled to a seat in Conference and we will not seat any minister in this association that teaches the Baptism of the Holy Ghost separate from regeneration or the birth

of the Spirit.

12. No question from any church shall come under the consideration of the Association unless it has been first discussed in its
