Minutes—First Quarterly Session

Friday, November 15, 1974-7:30 p.m. Worship Service

Stan Pennington led the congregation in prayer and Mark Barnes, student at Hillsdale brought the devotion for the evening using Hebrews 11:14-16.

Special music of the evening was provided by a trio of girls, Laura Harper, Carla Coles, and Glenda Aubrey, all from the Noble church as they sang God's Last Altar Call.

Rev. Larry Norrell brought the message for the evening using Matthew 16:25, 26.

Dismissed in prayer by Gary Harper.

Saturday, November 16, 1974—9:30 a.m. Business Session

The business session of the First Quarterly Meeting began with Rev. Ted Wilbanks leading the congregation in singing He Keeps Me Singing and Standing On the Promises, Sue Mullins, piano; Rev. Rick Young, organ.

The morning devotion was brought by Rev. Ed Hollie, using John 9:24, 25, followed with Rev. Dan Harper leading the congregation in prayer.

The letters from the churches were read with a motion and second to receive the letters, seat the delegates and requests on the letters be given to the proper boards. Carried. The churches were: Capitol Hill, Earlsboro, Glendale, Grace, Lexington, Liberty, Moore, Mustang, Norman First, Northwest, Pleasant Hill, Spencer Road, Spring Hill, Straight Street, Trinity, Noble, Southwest, Southern Oaks, Western Avenue, and Yukon.

The delegates sent by the churches were asked to come forward and stand at the front while the standing delegates gave them the right hand of fellowship while singing When We All Get To Heaven.

MSC that letter from Glendale be received and delegates seated with

the other delegates.

Rev. Waldo Young, host pastor, expressed appreciation to the Del City Flower shop and LaDonna Flowers for the beautiful flower arrangements provided for the quarterly meeting.

Rev. Roma Stewart requested prayer for Sister Ruth Hightower's family who had recently lost a loved one and Rev. James Murray requested prayer for his wife's family. Marie's cousin (a daughter of Walter Woods) was found dead.

Rev. Jerry Rhoades gave a report about Hillsdale College, reporting on several items. (Increase in enrollment, improvement in the newsletter, new fourplex to be built, expect 30% increase in enrollment next year.)

MSC to acknowledge letter from Rev. David Sutton from the Jenks Church and that a letter of recommendation for Brother Sutton be sent to the First Mission Association.

MSC that the report from the Woman's Auxiliary be received as information and that the Auxiliary be commended for its fine work. (See

Reports)

MSC to receive the Credential Board report and vote on it item by item. Items No. 1 through 5 accepted. Item No. 6 had been referred to the Executive Board. Item No. 7 received as information. Item No. 8 accepted. (See Reports)

MSC to place Rev. Keith Woody on the Credential Board replacing Rev.

Clarence A. Bruce, Jr. who resigned.

Treasurer's report given by Ray Martin. MSC to accept the report.

MSC to receive letter from the Capitol Hill Church and seat the delegates. MSC to receive the report from the Executive Board and vote on it item

by item. Item No. 1 accepted. (Item No. 2 defeated.) (See Reports)

Motion that the Credential Board examine Rev. Shelby Greeson, pastor of the Mustang Church, and handle it as they would any other candidate and bring back a recommendation as to whether he be accepted or rejected. Motion to amend that the Credential Board investigate to see if Brother Greeson has had continual membership in the Capitol Hill Church or whether he had been dismissed by the church prior to his accepting the work at the Mustang mission.

MSC to adjourn for worship service and meet back to conclude the

business after worship.

Saturday, November 16, 1974—11:00 a.m. Worship Service

The 11:00 a.m. worship service opened with Rev. Ted Wilbanks leading the congregation in singing At the Cross and I Am Thine O Lord with Sue

Mullins, pianist; Rev. Rick Young, organist.

Rev. Frank Giles sang a special number, If That Isn't Love, followed by Rev. Frank Wiley, Assistant Moderator, introducing the speaker of the hour, Rev. Roma Stewart, who brought the morning message from Romans 15:6, "For a Church To Be What It Ought To Be, It Must Be One Mind, One Spirit and One Accord."

The worship service was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Waldo Young.

Saturday, November 16, 1974—12:00 Noon Business Session

The 12:00 business began with item concerning Brother Greeson. After

lengthy discussion, motion made, second and carried for previous question called for on amendment. Amendment carried:

After discussion on main motion as amended, motion, second for previous question which carried. Vote taken on main motion as amended. Carried.

MSC to receive report from Business Committee and vote on it item by

item. (See Reports)

The Divine Service Committee reported, recommending that Rev. Keith Woody be the speaker for the 11:00 a.m. service at the February 15 quarterly meeting. Motion, second, carried that this reported be adopted.

Offering from the Faith Free Will Baptist Mission sent to the association

was recognized.

MSC that we reaffirm to the local church our belief in the personal liberty of the individual church to discipline their own members, elect their own officers, without interference from higher authorities.

MSC that the CTS report given by Rev Dan Harper be accepted.

Rev. Jerry Dudley asked that if anyone has any information concerning the First Oklahoma Association prior to 1943, that he needs it desperately in order to keep working on the history of the association.

Rev. Waldo Young, pastor of Spencer Road Church expressed thanks to the association for coming to Spencer Road for the quarterly meeting.

MSC that the association give Spencer Road a vote of appreciation by standing.

MSC to adjourn. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Richard Robinson.

REPORTS

CREDENTIAL BOARD

The Credential Board met at the Sunnylane Free Will Baptist Church on October 20, 1974. Members present were Rick Duncan, Charles Murphy, and O. T. Dixon.

The board voted to recommend the following:

1. The approval of Johnnie Martin from the Grace Church for licensing as a minister of the gospel.

2. the approval of Jessie A. Wallis from the Spencer Road Church for

an extension of license as a minister.

- the approval of Keith Woody, new pastor at Norman Straight Street Church, for fellowship in the association as an ordained minister. He comes from Texas, where he was in good standing.
- 4. the approval of Herbert Benge from Mustang Church to be ordained as a deacon.
- the approval of Gerald Yandell from Mustang Church to be ordained as a deacon.
- 6. We have also examined Brother Shelby Greeson and have given our report to the Executive Board of the association for further disposition. This has been done because it relates to the work the Executive Board is doing with the Mustang Church.

8. November 5, 1974—The Board accepted the resignation of Clarence A. Bruce from the Credential Board. The resignation was given in

good faith.

(The clerk of the Board would like to request that the churches give the complete mailing address and telephone number of all men to be examined to the clerk of the association along with their names in order to facilitate easier and less expensive contact with the men in setting up an appointment for meeting with the Credential Board.)

EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Executive Board met on September 9, 1974 after being asked to meet with the Faith Free Will Baptist Church in Midwest City and did so on this date. Present were Jim Cearley, Ray Martin, Roma Stewart and Dan Farmer. After a service with the church and an examination of their facilities and records we met briefly and offer the following recommendation:

We recommend upon investigation that this group be recognized as a Free Will Baptist mission by this Association and remain such for awhile. We would like to commend them for their earnest, sincere work and their financial support to the Association.

On November 5, 1974, the Executive Board met with the Credential Board at Norman First Church.

Motion carried that the Executive Board wishes to acknowledge the report given to our board by the Credential Board concerning Brother Shelby Greeson, and we hereby acknowledge that he is a minister with credentials and was a member of the Capitol Hill Free Will Baptist Church before leaving with others to join the Mustang work.

BUSINESS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend that all Boards, Committees and auxiliaries making reports and recommendations, that their reports be submitted in duplicate, one for the moderator and one for the clerk. If possible this report should be typed.
- Be it resolved that we instruct our treasurer to send a monthly report of the giving of each church to each college and mission department.
- 3. Be it resolved that we give \$1,000.00 toward Project 55 of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.
- 4. We recommend that First Oklahoma Association purchase a full page ad in the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College yearbook "Harvester."
- 5. We recommend that "Article VI" of the Constitution be amended to read: "Any church that is a member of First Oklahoma Association, being without a pastor for an extended period of time; that the Executive Board give every assistance possible to that church, to maintain the services of that church."
- 6. We recommend that "Article VII" be amended to read: "When a church desires one of its members be examined for license to preach or ordained to the Gospel ministry, it shall be the duty of the Credential Committee to determine the candidates' qualification."

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The First Oklahoma Association Woman's Auxiliary met November 12, at the Spencer Road Church. We had a total of 41 present with 5 churches represented and 5 visitors. Our theme was "Be Ye Thankful," Col. 3:15.

We adopted the following state projects for 1974-75: (1) \$2.00 per member to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College to purchase a sound system. (2) \$1.00 per member to purchase a sewing machine and other needful items not covered by allotted monies, for the Dennis Teague family, foreign missionary appointees to France. Thomas, home missionaries to Greeley, Colorado, to purchase a piano. Craig Bickle, a student at Hillsdale brought our message from Eph. 5:20.

MSC that that this item would amend paragraph 1, of Article VII of the Constitution and the rest of the article would remain the same.

MSC that amendment to Article VII of the Constitution be postponed indefinitely.

MSC that the clerk of the association write for letters of recommendation for ordained coming into our association.

MSC that the Divine Service report be accepted and that Rev. James Murray be the speaker for the next quarterly meeting.

MSC to give a rising vote of thanks to the Tecumseh Church for their

hospitality during the quarterly meeting.

MSC that the moderator contact pastors and associate pastors (as amended) and make arrangements for a meeting to make recommendations necessary to change Constitution.

MSC that Rev. Waldo Young be elected Assistant Clerk to replace Rev. Bob Thompson who has moved to Texas.

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a group of churches, do hereby ordain this constitution for our progress and to perpetuate better association government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This Association shall be known as the First Oklahoma District Association of Free Will Baptists of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT: The purpose of this Association shall be to coordinate and unify the works of the member churches, to devise and execute measures for the extension of the kingdom of God, and examine for license and ordination prospective ministers and deacons.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP: Section 1—This Association shall be composed of area Free Will Baptist Churches that adopt the constitution and are accepted

by the body.

Section 2—The voting body shall consist of: a) standing delegates composed of officers of the Association, ordained ministers, deacons actively serving on the deacon board of the local church, members of all standing boards, church clerks, full-time associates of churches serving as pastoral assistants and b) no more than three lay delegates selected by each local church who shall be seated upon presentation of proper credentials.

Section 3—Any area church wishing to unite with this Association upon presentation of a petitionary letter and examination by the credential board shall be accepted by a majority vote of this body. Churches coming from other Associations are expected to present a letter of recommendation.

Section 4—Each church in the Association is to send \$30.00 to the annual session of this Association (\$10.00 for Association Minutes and \$20.00 for State Association expense).

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS: The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and a treasurer, all of whom shall be elected at the annual session.

Duties:

Moderator, shall preside at all sessions of the Association and shall have power to appoint special committees.

Assistant Moderator, shall preside in the moderator's absence or at his

request.

Clerk, shall keep careful records of all business sessions and handle other correspondence as directed.

Assistant Clerk, functions at the discretion of the clerk or in his absence

shall do the work of the clerk.

Treasurer, shall receive, and record all monies and distribute and make regular financial report of such. The Associational books are to be closed on the 20th of each month. The terms of the officers shall begin at the close of the annual session.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS: This Association shall meet four times yearly, the Friday evening and Saturday before the third Sunday in the months of February, May, August, and November, with the February meeting being the Annual Session.

ARTICLE VI

EXECUTIVE BOARD: Section 1—Composition: The officers of this Association shall constitute the Executive Board, along with five members

elected by the body.

Section 2—Duties: The Executive Board shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Association between sessions. The Board shall be subject to the recommendations of the Association and none of its acts shall conflict with the action taken by this Association.

Section 3—Meetings: Meetings of the Board can be called by the Moderator who serves as its chairman. The Board shall have power to collect funds as the means on hand may warrant. It shall as directed by this association have power to convey or mortgage any real estate or Associational property. This Executive Board shall keep a record of all work done, monies raised, meetings held, and make a full report to the next regular meeting of this Association and shall further receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey any property entrusted to said Association for the purpose in accordance with the purpose of the donors, and in no case

divert from its original object.

Section 4—Powers: The Chairman and Clerk of said Executive Board shall sign all deeds and bonds, notes, etc.; and any other papers by which the First Oklahoma District Association is to become legally responsible. It shall be the duty of this Board to meet as often as may be necessary. No member of the Executive Board shall delegate authority to any other member of said Board to cast his vote for him in anything. The Executive Board shall have power to call the Association into conference by notifying each church ten (10) days prior to the conference; and, they shall have the authority to change quarterly meetings or association if the place where said quarterly meeting or association is to meet is not able to care for the meetings; and, their decisions shall be final. This must be done in time to notify each church. No meeting of the Executive Board shall be legal unless at least three members are present.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: The following standing boards shall be elected at the annual session. Each board shall consist of five (5) members, elected as to have one member retiring each year. Vacancies may be filled at any regular

meeting.

Credentials Board: It shall be the duty of the Credentials Board to examine the church letters and recommend the seating of such delegates as are properly certified; to examine for license and ordination prospective deacons and ministers at the request of their respective churches and make recommendations to the Association; to examine deacons and ministers coming into this body from other associations and make appropriate recommendations to this body. This board shall examine any church and its ordained requesting membership in this association and report their findings to the association.

Church Training Service: The Church Training Service Board shall plan Church Training Rallies and youth activities of the Association. This Board shall also plan the annual Youth Encampment with the authority to appoint and employ necessary personnel.

Mission Board: The Mission Board shall be empowered to assist any worthy mission work within the bounds of the Association and supervise

missionary activities of the Association.

COMMITTEES: Section 1—Finance Committee: A finance committee composed of the treasurer and two other members shall be appointed by

the moderator. It shall be the duty of this committee to prepare a budget for the calendar year and submit it to the Association at its regular annual meeting. The Finance Committee can from time to time submit supplements to the budget for the current calendar year.

Section 2—Audit Committee: An audit committee of three members shall be selected by the Association at the regular annual meeting whose duty it shall be to audit the treasurers account at the close of the calendar year and to report to the annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

PARLIAMENTARY: The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with this constitution and any special rules of order the Association may adopt.

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS: This Constitution can be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the body, provided the amendment is presented in writing and laid on the table from the morning session until the afternoon session.

ARTICLE X

DISSOLUTION: Should this Association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

BY-LAWS

- 1. The moderator or assistant, or in their absence, the oldest minister present shall call the association into conference.
- 2. Each session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 3. A majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.4. Visiting brethren are invited to seat as advisory members without voting privileges.
- 5. Those who speak, shall rise and address the moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points. it shall be divided at the request of any member and a vote taken
- 7. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the moderator, or more than ten minutes at a time.
- 8. The moderator shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian spirit.
- 9. No question from any church shall come under the consideration of the association unless it has been first discussed in its own church.
- These by-laws may be amended at any meeting of the association by a two-thirds vote of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. The Scriptures are the Old and the New Testaments, inspired by the Holy Spirit and are the only infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. There is only one true and living Triune God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, three in personality, one in essence.
- 3. Man is a fallen creature and cannot save himself.
- 4. Jesus Christ, by the grace of God, tasted death for every man and all who repent and trust Christ as Saviour will be saved.
- 5. All believers in Christ, who through grace, persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 6. It is the duty of every Christian to unite with a visible church where through association with others he may share in the observances of the ordinances and the perpetuation of the gospel. The Lord's day is the first day of the week, commemorating the resurrection of Christ and should be spent in public and private worship and rest from secular activities. Upon this day Christians should bring their tithes and offerings into the Lord's house.
- 7. The Gospel Ordinances: Baptism is the immersion of believers in water by an ordained minister, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; the Lord's Supper is a commemoration of the death of Christ and is open to all believers and should be observed at night; feet washing, which teaches humility, follows the Lord's Supper and is the duty and happy prerogative of every believer.
- 8. There will be the resurrection both of the just and the unjust, every one in his own order, "they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation." The Lord Jesus, who ascended on high, sits at the right hand of God and will come again to close the gospel dispensation, glorify His saints and judge the world. Then the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment but the righteous into life eternal.
- 9. The definition and condition of the backslider:
 - A backslider is a regenerated person who has degenerated to a state of living in unconfessed and unforgiven sin. Such a person is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and cannot enter into sinless Heaven in such a backslidden condition. The following scriptures explain: Jere. 2:21; Jere. 2:32; II Peter 1:9; James 1:13-16; James 5:19-20; Romans 6:12; Matt. 6:24; Heb. 10:38-39; Heb. 3.12-14; Ezek. 18:24; I John 1:9; Rev. 21:27.
 - (a) We believe that salvation is a present possession by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as Savior and that a person's eternal destiny depends on whether he has this possession. This we hold in distinction from those who teach that salvation depends on human works or merit.
 - (b) We believe that a saved individual may, in freedom of will, cease to trust Christ for salvation and once again be lost. This we hold in distinction from those who teach that a believer may not again be lost.
 - (c) We believe that any individual living in the practice of sin (whether he be called "backslider" or "sinner"), must be judged by that evidence to be lost should he so die in his sins. This we hold in distinction from those who suggest the pernicious doctrine that man may live in sin as he pleases and still claim heaven as his eternal home.
 - (d) We believe that any regenerated person who has sinned, (again,

whether he be called "backslider" or "sinner"), and in whose heart a desire arises to repent, may do so and be restored to favor and fellowship with God. This we hold in distinction from those who teach that when a Christian sins he cannot repent and be restored to favor and fellowship with God.

"Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust. And beside this, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue; and to virtue knowledge; and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness and to brotherly kindness charity. For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins. Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure: for if ye do these things, ye shall never fall." II Peter 1:4-10.
