

Encourage our membership to read our church publication, "The Free Will Baptist", published at Ayden, N. C., thus acquainting ourselves with the nature and activities of our organizations as a whole, 3rd. We deplore the evil, vain, obscure and destructive trend of so called modern literature of what ever form, as books, magazines (of the true story type), screen sheets, etc., and uncompromisingly protest against their use by members of our church. We likewise condemn and discourage the attendance of our people to movies, dance halls and all places of questionable characters, for we are instructed to have no fellowship with the world for we are a people set apar."

## CONSTITUTION, MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

1. This body shall be known as the Ministers' Conference of the French

Broad Free Will Baptist Association.

2. Th's Conference is formed under and by the authority of the French Broad Association and shall be composed of licensed and ordained ministers.

3. It shall have entire jurisdiction over the ministry in said Association, ung license, prescribing qualifications for the ministry, conducting examina lons and ordaining ministers, working for the most harmonious and effective ministry,

4. The officent of this Conference shall be a Moderator and Secretary-Treasurer, who sha'l be elected annually and perform the duties usually

perforred by such officers.

5. This Conference shall have power to make such By-Liwn and other

result ions at may be necessary for the performance of its duties.

6. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting by a voice of two-thirds.

## BY-LAWS, MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

1. The regular meeting of this Conference shall be held annually in counsellon with the meeting of the Association.

2 Each member shall report each regular meeting either in areas

or he letter. 3. Five members shall constitute a quorum at all regular or legal meet-

4. The Moderator may call a special session at any time on request of

three members.

5. At each regular meeting there shall be elected an Ordaining Council, whose duty shall be to examine candidates, grant license, conduct ordinations, etc., and report at each regular meeting.

6. Licentiates shall pursue a definite course of study under the direc-

10. Each member, not excused from age or infirmities, is expected to do something to advance the cause of Christ and make a full report at each regular meeting.

11. Membership in the body shall be proof of good standing in the minis-

#### CHURCH COVENANT

Also we agree to be liberal with those that are afflected and needy, and especially those of the housecold of faith. 5. We also agree to attend the monthly meetings regularly, if not Providentially hindered, and to submit to all ordinances implied in a profession of faith. 6. We also agree to abstain from all sinful and vain amusement. 7. We also agree to abstain from all intoxicating I quers, not a use it as a beverage, nor aid or assist in the manufacture of tuch, nor furnish it to others. We also agree to encourage home and foreign mistions, education, Sabbath Schools, good morals, and everything that in for the gory of God, and to the welfare of men, and may the God of peace sanclify us wholly and preserve us blameless until the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, that we may be happily admitted into the Kingdom of God, where we can ascribe honor unto the Lamb forever. Amen.
- CONSTITUTION 1. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen and sent from each church. 2. The delegates chosen and sent shall be recommended by letter from the church to which they belong and shall include the ministers and some of the most able members belonging to the church. 3. The Association when met and formed, shall elect a Chairman and Secrolary. 4. The rules of decorum shall be read immediately after the Association is formed. 5. This Association will encourage a sound ministry, such as pre est Christ as an all sufficient Saviour, hav no Salvation possible to every human being on terms of the gospel, which is freely offered to all. 6. Any minister in good standing, whether a delegate or

not, may be invited to a seat and take part in the deliberation, and his name enrolled in our minutes. 7. The Association may appoint such committees as may be necessary for the expediting of business, and every committee appointed to attend to any particular business shall report their proceedings in writing to the Association while in session, and all reports made by committee may be adopted by the body. 8. All queries regularly presented to the Association by any church shall be attended to. 9. Any church may become a member of this Association by making application or letter or by delegates and adopting our articles of faith and course covenant, 10. The Association may withdraw from any church that becomes disorderly or refuses to be represented by letter or delegates. 11. This Association assumes no higher authority than an advisory council.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

1. This Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. There shall be no conversation by the members one with another so as to interrupt business while in session.

3. Every person wishing to speak shall first rise and address the

moderator.

4. No member shall interrupt another while speaking.

5. We shall admit no other title while in session but that of Brother. 6. Every member speaking shall attend to the subject under conideration.

7. No member shall speak more than twice on any subject.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall be attended to unless withdrawn by the person who made it. 9. No member shall absent himself from the body without leave of

the Moderator. 10. On all motions made where the vote of the body is taken,

major ty sha'l prevail.

11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege to speak as any other member, provided the chair be filled.

12. Any member transgressing these By-Laws shall be admonihed

by the Moderator.

13. No less than nine members shall constitute a quorum.

14. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a vole of two-thirds.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. GOD-We believe that there is only one true and I ving God, Who is personally the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, equal and harmonious in every divine perfection. There is one God and one Mediator between God and man, the man Jesus Christ, who gave himself as ransom for all to be test field in due time.—1 Tim. 2:5.

2. THE HOLY SCRIPTURE—We believe that God is the author of

the Holy Bible and its teachings constitute the only infallible dectrine for egovernment of His Church. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, in truction

in righteousness.

3. THE ORIGINAL APOSTACY—We believe that Adam was created holy but by voluntary transgression, fell into depravity and consequently involved his patterity in sin, and when the woman saw that the Iric was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a free to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat,—Gene is 3:6.

4. FREE GRACE—We believe the grace of God comprehends all reiritual blessings, that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation, that the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin, buil is the means whereby sinners are converted and made wise unto salvation, for thire

is no difference between the Jews and the Greeks, for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon Him.—Rom. 10:12.

- 5. CHRISTIAN FAITH—We believe that Christian faith is the belief in the Lord Jesus Christ as the Son of God and redeemer of the world and in the divinity of the Holy Scripture; that faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life and he that believeth not on the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him.—John 3:36.
- 6. REPENTANCE—We believe that repentance is sorrow of sin, and the kind of sorrow which produces Godly repentance must be preceded by effectual conviction of sin. Now I rejoice, not that ye were made sorry, but that ye sorrowed to repentance, that ye might receive damage by us in nothing. For Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of but the sorrow of the world worketh death.—II Cor. 7:9-10.
- 7. FREE AGENCY—IWe believe that the human will is free, and that men have the ability to accept or reject the conditions of Salvation as they are revealed in the Holy Scripture. He that showeth thee, O Man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God.—Micah, 6:8.
- 8. PERSEVERANCE—We do not believe, under Gospel dispensation, any soul is elected to eternal life unconditionally, but that those who by faith persevere to the end will be saved; that it is impossible for men who have been converted to make shipwreck of their faith, turn again to sin, and be finally lost, and Jesus said unbothim, no man having put his hand to the plow and looketh back is fit for the kingdom of God—Luke 9:62.
  - GOOD WORK—We believe that good works are the results of faith and not necessity; that those who have faith will do works of righteousness, while those who have not faith, cannot do anything pleasing or acceptable unto God. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them—Matt. 7:19-20.
  - 10. CHRISTIAN BAPTISM—We believe that Christian brottem is the immersion of a believer in water, in the name of the Father. Son and Holy Ghost, that baptism cannot be spiritually administered without faith a the subject who receives it. Therefore we are buried in Him by bapism into death; that like Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father even so we should walk in newness of life.—Rom.7:4.
  - 11. THE LORD'S SUPPER—We believe the supper was instituted by our Saviour as a commemoration ordinance, that it was instituted for Christians, and that all Christians should unite in sacred service, regardless of name or denomination. But let a man examine himself and to let him eat of that bread and drink of that cup, for he that eateth and drink-that unworthing, eateth and drinketh damnation unto himself, not discerning the Lord's body.—1 Cor. 11:28-29.
  - 12. FEET WASHING—We believe that washing the Saint's feet a command of our Saviour, and that His followers ought to practice the same. We urge the pastors of all our churches to encourage the practical obedience of this command, especially among the members of their churches.
