A New Way to Raise Money.

We have heard of "kissing socials" for the purpose of raising money for the church, but the papers report an advance even on this method. A certain church in Ohio arranged a "kissing social" to pay off its debt. Fifty cents was charged to hug a girl under twenty for two minutes. 75 cents for a girl between twenty and twenty-five, and one dollar for another man's wife. A charge of three cents was made for old maids with no time limit. Five hundred people were said to be in attendance at the first and seven five dollars the amount realized. We cannot see how money raised in any such way would be of any possible advance to the church. The base ideas and immoral influences set on foot would more than counterbalance the small amount of money raised. If they had raised \$1,000 the amount would have been too small for such a price. 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
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
