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PRAYER

Prayer is a 'reaching out' of the soul for God, or a deep longing of the soul, expressed or unexpressed, for help which can only come from above. It is not only a petition, but includes praise and adoration, confession, supplication, and intercession.

We think of Abraham as an example of persevering prayer, Moses of intercessory prayer, Nehemiah of confession in prayer and Daniel of regularity in prayer. On one occasion the children of Israel became convicted of their sin and said to Samuel, "Pray for thy servants unto the Lord thy God, that we die not." In his answer to them he said, "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you."

The earthly ministry of our Lord was begun in prayer (Luké 23:34). The heavenly ministry of our Lord was begun in prayer (John 14:16), and is now continued in prayer (Heb. 7:25). Prayer was more important than rest. for "in the morning, rising up a great while before day, He went out, and departed into a solitary place and there prayed'' (Mark 1:35). Prayer was more important than sleep, for "He went out into a mountain to pray, and continued all night in prayer to God" (Luke 6:12). Prayer was more important in securing workers than either money or machinery, for He said, "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into His harvest" (Matt. 9:38). Prayer is as important as His other ministries, for "He ever liveth to make intercession for us" (Heb. 7:25).

In reading the Bible we find several instances where the Lord rejected the worship of the Jews because they were not sincere. Saying a multitude of words will not insure an answer from God if the heart is wrong. Being right with God is the first essential for effective praying. A careful study of the Bible and a willing obedience to its commands are also necessary. When that is true in our lives, then the Holy Spirit will lead us in our praying.

We are taught in the model. prayer in Matt. 6:9-15 that the true order of prayer is God first and man second. His glory should come before our personal wants. Prayer is communion with God and much of our praying should be for the ear of God only. We can better resist the attractions of the world and tell our urgent needs to God when we are alone with Him. We are admonished time after time in God's Word to pray, and many and precious are the promises which God gives to His praying children.

What a tremendous responsibility is ours! What a unique privilege! For all the power of an omnipotent God is ready and waiting to be put in action at the prayer of His children. Praver is an exercise of the Spirit in which everyone can take part who knows anything about God. Even the most unlearned can pray, but there is so much to be learned about prayer, that it is always in order for us to say as did the disciples of old, "Lord, teach us to pray."

How sweet the hour alone with God, In earnest prayer we spend, Alone with Him who knows our needs, As friend would plead with friend.

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THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

What Wilt Thou?

"What wilt thou, queen Esther?" (Esther 5:3)

Perhaps queen Esther had dressed herself with great care and looked her best; for she was appearing before the king, not only uninvited but unexpectedly, and it would be too bad if her appearance should not please the king who deposed whom he would. But Esther's people the Jews were, according to an unchangeable decree, soon to be exterminated. Esther loved her people and would save them, even at the risk of her own life; so she intruded herself into the king's presence, that she might provide a way of escape for them. She knew that the decree which would on a certain day bring death to her people could not be changed, but the Jews could be warned and given the right to defend themselves, and fight against their enemies.

While the Lord's name is nowhere found in the Book of Esther, Esther and her uncle Mordecai must have been led and helped by the Lord. departed from the king, causing him to consider matters which brought Mordecai into favor. And Haman, the king's favorite, was exposed and deposed and hanged, and Mordecai the Jew was put in his place. Queen Esther obtained favor with the king who granted her petitions. Letters were written to the Jews in all the one hundred twenty provinces, permitting them to "gather themselves together, and to stand for their life, to destoy, to slay, and to cause to perish, all the power of the people and province that would assault them.

So on the thirteenth day of the twelfth month (Adar), when the enemies of the Jaws hoped to have power over them, the Jaws gathered themselves together "and no man could withstand them; for the fear of them fell upon all people." So the Jews wrought a great victory against their enemies and gained great favor in the kingdom of Ahasuerus

So the Jews had rest from their enemies and to commemorate their great victory, they instituted the feast of Purim, to be kept on the fourteenth and fifteenth days of Adar (the twelfth month) each year through all their generations.

The answer queen Esther was able to give to the question: "What wilt thou?" meant freedom and a blessing to her people; but if we should be asked the same question today, I wonder what the answer we could give would mean to ourselves and to others. Much depended on queen Esther, and perhaps Mordecai was right when he signified that Esther had come to the kingdom for just such a time as they had to face, when he asked: "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

Let us remember that the whole human race is under Satan's decree of death, except those who have received and obeyed the word of the King, signed and scaled in His name. There are a few who can appear before the King and, if they are willing to be used to deliver others from the ways of death, they may hear the question: "What wilt thou?" and the answer they can give will mean so

I sure do sympathize with them, for I know what it is to be poor. Doing deeds of kindness would be my motto. While I read about some folks that celebrate Christmas by dancing all night; but this Book I have been reading tells me about what dancing leads to.

Read Matthew 14:6 and see who this woman was that danced to please Herod and was the cause of John the Baptist's head being cut off, and her old mother instructed her daughter what to ask. I am sorry to say it, but there seems to be just such mothers today. Please begin at Mark 6:22 and read the remainder of the chapter. Now some people say there's ''no harm'' in dancing, even some preachers favor it, church members go too, but this Book tells us Christians not to go.

I am thinking just now about some good women. I have been reading about things they did that was pleasing to the Lord Jesus. First it was a good woman that gave birth to the dear Son of God and her name was Mary. All little Sunday school children know this. We find Mary at the marriage in Cana of Galilee with Jesus, where He did His first miracle, and His disciples were bidden too. mother said to the servants, "Whatsoever he saith unto you, do it.'' Jesus told them to fill up the water pots with water, the water that was made wine, which the master of the feast "knew not whence it was: but the servants which drew the water knew.'

I was at a temperance meeting one night and the question was asked: "When may we drink this wine?" One man in the audience rose to his feet and said, "When Jesus comes back to earth again and turns the water into wine." After this Jesus went down to Capernaum, He and His mother, and His brethren, and His disciples. You see His mother was staying with Him.

Read the second chapter of St. John and see what He found going on in the temple. If you will read this Book, you will find that they were there at the crucifixion (Matt. 27). Many women were there which followed Jesus from Galilee and the women also which came with Him beheld the sepulchre, and how His body was laid. Williams, by his first marriage, a Methodist minister at Smithville, Ark.; Charley Williams; Clement Williams, minister in the Free Will Baptist church; Amos Williams, all of Myrtle, Missouri; one daughter, Mrs. Leatha Doran of Granite City, He leaves his wife, four sons, one daughter, eleven grandchildren, many distant relatives, and a host of friends to mourn his death.

He joined the Free Will Baptist church in January, 1899. He was elected to the deaconship of Bethany church which office he held at his death. He was active in the church until sickness disabled him. He was a sufferer for several months. He served his church as deacon for most 32 years and was worthy of the trust committed to him. He will be missed by all who knew him. He was a faithful Christian, a loyal citizen, a good neighbor. He hore his suffering patiently, many times expressing his desire to depart to the beyond.

He was laid to rest in the Walnut Grove Cemetery September 28, 1931. Funeral service was conducted by Eld. H. C. Crase, assisted by Eld. J. R. W. Harbison, in the midst of many friends.

I spent all the money I had, borrowed \$1000.00 on my farm and spent it, helping to put the work over and went as far as I I'm not selling out now, but am forced could go. to go back to my old job, farming and dealing in stock, and as long as you hear from me, you will hear of me preaching the same doctrine that I started out preaching ten years ago. I hope that the way will be opened up, so that all the rest of our preachers will be able to stay on the field.

I am now pastoring two churches, my home church at Hall, four miles south and two miles west of Antlers, Oklahoma, and our Non church at Non, Oklahoma. May pastor one more church near home. Several are calling for me.

I'm not giving this report to get the sympathy of any one, but to let people know the reason that I'm not out in the evangelistic work. I spent five weeks in Alabama last summer, but my revival work this year will be close home.

I love the Gem and want to see it go on to success. Now you folks send in your reports to the paper, so I can read them. While I am farming and driving cattle I will want to hear from the field. And come and see us, not all at once, but come.

The pastor reviewed the parable of the rich man who asked the Master what he should do to be saved? who, when he refused, was told by Christ, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee."

A part of Eld. Perkins' sermon is quoted here:

"When we come to the last hour of life, we would give everything in this world for peace with God. I would rather have God in my home and heart and life than all of this world's goods that you can pile up. The rich man in torment could only lift up his eyes, but it was too late.

"What can a man get in exchange for his soul?" "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." My brethren, today I hope that you will take things into your hearts and open them to God.

I know that you have a hard time—I know that many of us have a hard time, but there is only one way to make it easier, and that is to have your heart right with God.

You, my friends, might wonder why I should choose such a text as this to preach upon to this congregation. You may say, 'but there are no rich people here, why not preach to us about something we know more about?'

"But, brothers, even though men are not rich, you know that every man has in his heart a desire for things of this world,—a desire which crowds out the thought of God." "In taking this text I want to show you the difference between serving God and striving after the things of this world. Why are there so few people serving God today?

Because too many people find time for everything else in this world before they find time for God. That, my brothers, is the reason why we are living in the greatest depression of the age. People's hearts are going out for worldly things and putting God and prayer in the dackground. In other words we are just leaving God out of life and going straight to hell, and that's the reason for this great depression.

Money No Help Hereafter

"It makes no difference if we accumulate a great sum of money in this world—it will not help us in the next. If we sow of the flesh we must reap corruption and if we sow of the Spirit we shall reap life everlasting.

'You find many instances of this among characters of the Bible King Nebuchadnezzar came to be a great king—the ruler of a great nation. But one night an angel from heaven came down and wrote upon the wall and the words of the writing were fulfilled and because Nebuchadnezzar had been proud and left God out, he was driven from his kingdom and had to go and live with the beasts of the fields. All this came to him because he had left God out.

"Great as Nebuchadnezzar had become, all his greatness availed him nothing. Why? Because he had left God out. How many are there today who realize that the God of Heaven is looking down upon their every word and act? How many have been giving God credit, for this?

"The same God is ruling in this day and this time who always ruled. God is the same, yesterday, today and forever. He may have to strike you down to eall your attention to your ingratitude because too many of us have failed to praise Him for food and raiment. Remember what Christ said to the rich young man who asked Him, 'What shall I do to inherit eternal life?' He said, 'Sell what you have and give to the poor.'

Hold Nothing From God

"Now you may not be so rich,

but if you are holding one thing back from God you will not inherit eternal life. And so it was that the rich young man went away sorrowfully and we do not find any record that he ever was saved. Remember the text, 'Hoard not up for yourselves treasures in earth where moth can destroy.'

"There is too much lust and striving after things of this world. We should get down to business and talk to God."
