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THE EDITOR'S COLUMN

I herewith quote from what assumes to be an advertisement in BREWERY INDUSTRY, November 19, 1932, published in New York City.

HALF THE EXPECTED MARKET FOR BEER DOES NOT EXIST TODAY

"When beer comes back, what is the first step brewers, will take to restore temperate drinking among the youth of our land? It is a responsibility the browers must assume under the new order.

"Obviously, there must be a campaign of education and the one field in which this can be conducted is, fortunately, the most important of all for our immediate and future business—the colleges."

"Not one-tenth of one per cent of the youth in college know what good American beer tastes like. To them it is little more than a name. They will have to be educated.

"But beer can be restored to its former favor in colleges, which means the youth of the land. It cannot be done, over night.

"So it seems that elemental reasoning makes it plainthat the brewers should begin their publicity campaign in the College Newspapers as soon as it can be done."

The Wets in the above ad, admit that our young people are free from the destructive appetite. They admit that there is no demand for beer. They admit that practically all the old soaks and topers are gone and the only way to create new ones is to invade our colleges; and debauch our children; ruining the wonderful young people who are the promise and hope of our land.

Colleges, like churches and homes, are sacred for our young people. Are you willing to allow their future to be ruined by the awful propaganda of such a destructive element?

I have heard many times that more young people were drinking, and that more booze was drank in prohibition days than in saloon days; but the Wets know that they must corrupt our young people by a campaign of education, if they are to have a market for their intoxicating liquors. They are telling us that 3.2% beer is not intoxicating; but there are some people still living when know that 3.2% beer used to intoxicate, it will yet, and the Wets know it.

I was talking the other day with a captain of the Salvation Army, and asked him if they had to care for many drunks. He said, "Only one now and then." Evangeline Booth who is at the head of the Salvation Army in United States says that in saloon days in New York City they cared for as many as 1300 drunks in one night, but under prohibition they seldom have over seven.

I tremble to think that it is almost certain that an unrestrained flow of alcohol will soon return to our own country. If conditions were bad before the Eighteenth Amendment was added to the Constitution they will be much worse after next March if the Roosevelt policy becomes a law.

Looking at the situation from a political point of viewit is very discouraging indeed. But we must not leave God out! Prayer still works, and with this powerful weapon it is possible to overthrow even the mighty brewers and the mighty-hidden powers behind the scene. Jesus said, "According to your faith, be it unto you."

INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lessons

First Quarter, 1933 Comments by B. F. Brown

Lesson III

Jan. 15, 1933.

Jesus at Work

Mark 1:21-45

Jesus Meeting Human

Topic: Needs.

GOLDEN TEXT-My Father worketh hitherto, and I work.-John 5:17. PRACTICAL TRUTH-Christ has power to meet every human need,

OUTLINE—I. Jesus teaching with authority (vs. 21, 22).

II. Jesus casting out demons-vs. 23.27. III. Jesus healing the sick (vs. 28-34) IV. Jesus praying in solitude (v. 35).

TIME-Early in A. D. 28. PLACE—Capernaum; towns in Galilee PARALLEL ACCOUNTS-Matt. 8:14-17, 2-4; Luke 4:31 to 5:16.

INTRODUCTION-In Mark's record of the life of Jesus we have the account of miracle after miracle in quick succession, Jesus is shown as the mighty worker. A larger portion of the Gospel is devoted to the supernatural deeds of Christ than is the case with any of the others. If one should cut out the miracles from Mark together with the discourse material that is connected with them, he would have left nothing but shreds. Gospel, and the others, give evidence of many miracles in the life of Jesus, yet we have no means of knowing how many miracles He performed. probably ran into the thousands, as Mark gives us several general de-scriptions of a great many miracles wrought, as in verse 34 of this lesson.

EXPOSITION—I. JESUS TEACHING WITH AUTHOR'TY (vs. 21, 2?). When, on a certain Sabbath, Christ went into the Jewish place of worship in Capernaum and taught He was probably invited to speak by the chief ruler of the synagog, who had charge of the service. This was a courtesy commonly extended to distinguished visitors. His address made a profound impression, partly because it contrasted with the teachings of the scribes. They spoke from tradition, their discourses being largely made up of quotations from the rabbis. Their teaching was dry and legalistic. They lacked independence. On the other hand, "Jesus was like a breeze from the hills in his originality, outlook and freshness of statement" (A. T. Robertson). He spoke with divine authority and with perfect understanding of the truth. He needed to quote no one to support His doctrines, for He was directly taught and instructed by the Father. Look up John 12:49, 50; and 14:10.

Jesus was both a teacher and a preacher but in the Gospels He is usually spoken of as teaching. Ministers today should be teachers as well as preachers and their messages should ring with authority-not because they speak as being inspired, but because their messages are based on the Word of God.

II. JESUS CASTING OUT DEMONS (vs. 23-28). While Jesus was teach. ing in the synagog, a demoniac interrupted Him by crying out, "Let us alone; what have we to do with thee, thou Jesus of Nazareth? art thou come to destroy us? I know thee who thou art, the Holy One of God." This was a peculiar occurrence, but it was one which often occurred. These people perceived at once what others failed to grasp-that Jesus was the Son of God. They perceived His holiness, and His authority over them. This knowledge cannot be explained on the theory that the supposed demon possession was mere insanity or sickness. How could crazy men or sick men know these hidden truths? That de. mon possession is a reality even today is indicated by an abundance of evidence, especially in the Orient. Missionaries have told of cases, and of cures as wonderful as those recorded in the Bible. A uniform evidence is that demoniacs are greatly agitated at the name of Jesus. They could not endure His presence of old, and they cannot endure even His name today. The power of Christ over demons is a striking manifestation of His supernatural authority. Even on the insan. ity theory, real miracles were perform. ed, but the insanity theory is insufficient. One liberal scholar in a recent book, says "I believe in the possibility of the invasion of alien spirits only because of evidence I could not evade" "Was Jesus (Elwood Worcester, in an Historical Person?").

"Not as the scribes"-The highest praise for a scribe was that he resembled a cemented cistern which lost no drop of water put into it. He was bound never to teach anything but that which he had been taught. Jesus. as a teacher was not a cistern, but a spring clear, abundant, and perenial.

III. JESUS PEALING THE SICK (vs. 29-34). When Jesus left the sypagos, He went to the home of Peter and Andrew, Mattrew and Luke call it Peter's house. Andrew very likely was a backelor who lived with his Peter's mother-in law lav brother. sick of a fever-Luke says it was "a great fever." Jesus raised her up, and at once she ministered to them. Here is some force acting which is far more potent than mere mind cure. Who ever heard of mind cure stopping a great fever and all its effects in an

That evening, when the Sabbath was past Peter's house was fairly mobbed by a vast crowd that assembled and brought their sick and demon possessed to Jesus. No doubt the cure of the demoniae at the synagos that morning had become known throughout the city and had created great excitement. Josus healed every sick person in that crowd, as Matthew and Luke expressly declare. Such results demonstrate the supernatural character of the cures.

No healer connected with any cult of mind cure has ever been able to cure all cases attempted. We know that with human doctors there are many failures. But Christ healed all kinds of sicknes and diseases, and healed every time. To have failed even once would have shaken the faith of the disciples in Him. The latter part of our lesson tells of a leper whom He instantly cured. Let any scientist or healer match that if he can.

IV. JESUS PRAYING IN SOLITUDE (VS. 35-45). Busy men sometimes have difficulty in finding time for their devotions. Jesus was busy, but He felt His need of communion with the Fath er. To escape the crowds He arose before day and went out to a solitary place to pray. Though He was the Son of God. He felt His need of the added spiritual strength that comes through prayer. He needed to receive spiritual refreshment from God in order that He might effectively give forth of Himself to men—and so do we. Possibly a reason for special prayer at this time lay in the fact that He was about to start on an evangelistic tour of the villages of Galilee. However, there is an element of mystery in connection with Jesus' need of

Jesus Forgiving Sin Mark 2:1-12.

Jesus' Power Over Sin. Topic:

GOLDEN TEXT-The Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sin-Mar. 2:10 PRACTICAL TRUTH-The fact that Jesus forgave sins shows that He is divine.

Outline-I. Persistent efforts-vs. 1-4 II. Vicarious faith (v. 5). III. Sins forgiven (v. 5).

IV. Critics answered (vs. 6.12). PLACE-Capernaum.

PARALLEL ACCOUNTS-Matt. 9:2-8; Luke 5:17-20.

INTRODUCTION In last lesson Jesus went to the home of Peter and Andrew, where He raised Peter's mother-in-law from her sickness of "a great fever," and that night He healed all manner of sickness and disease

In today's lesson He is again teach, ing in a private home, perhaps that of Peter and Andrew, when the four men carrying the paralyzed one let him down through a hole they made in the roof to be healed. What sort of house was it? What did it look like? From what searchers have told about the remains of homes in ancient Capernaum, and from a description of the houses in Palestine at the present time, we can get a fair idea of . the house and the scene pictured in . today's lesson.

The walls of the house were probably of stone hewn just enough to make them fit together by using plenty of mortar. There was but one door,

hardly wide enough for four men to enter carrying a cot. The small opening in the walls about two feet square served to admit light and air. The roof would be flat. It was constructed by laying branches of trees across from the top of one wall to the other, and this covered with a network of smaller branches, over which was plastered about a foot of mud. After it had been in place for a year or more it would be quite substantial.

On the outside of the wall, stone steps led up to the roof. These flat house tops afforded an excellent place for the family to enjoy the cool breeze at evening, and it afforded a lookout.

The average house contained but one room, sometimes quite large. There have been a hundred may be two hundred people crowded in and around the house in which Jesus was teaching. The only thing the four men who bore him who was sick of the palsy could do was to climb the stairs and dig a hole in the roof, then let their sick friend down before the Lord to be healed.

EXPOSITION—I. PERSISTENT EFFORTS (vs. 1-4). The story of the undaunted efforts of the four men to bring a paralytic to Jesus is interesting in. deed. Alas, it seemed a hopeless undertaking to even get near the door, and impossible to get on the inside where the Master was! The house was filled, the door crowded, and a throng surged outside. But these four men were determined. It was a matter of life and death. Their friend must be brought to Jesus. Such being the case, they were justified in not waiting for the usual way of entrance to be cleared and even in tearing up the roof of Peter's house. This was an exhibition of perseverance which one who saw the scence could never forget.

If people were as earnest to find Jesus today, or as earnest to bring their friends to Him, as were the men in this lesson, our churches would be filled to overflowing. The trouble is that many people, though they may be concerned about bodily welfare fail to realize the importance of finding Jesus as one's personal Savior. That, too, is a matter of life and deathnot physical, but of eternal life and eternal death. Well may we seek, and seek persistently until they find Him!

II. VICARIOUS FAITH (v. 5). "When Jesus saw their faith"—primarily the faith of the four men—He attended to the needs of the one they brought. This did not exclude faith on the part of the invalid. He must have had faith also, or the Lord would not have forgiven his sins; but that of his friends is especially noteworthy. Probably this palsied man never would have been saved and healed had it not been for their faith and determined efforts in 'his behalf. They proved their faith by their works. Likewise there are many people today who owe their salvation, humanly speaking, to the faith and prayers and efforts of others. In fact this is the rule. Then how great is our responsibility! We are workers together with God in this all-important business of saving men.

No doubt bringing the paralytic into the presence of Jesus increased his faith and expectancy. Likewise, while our faith and prayers and efforts can never take the place of repentance and faith on the part of one who needs salvation they may produce conviction for sin and may influence them to seek God, and also may greatly assist them in "praying through."

III. SINS FORGIVEN (v. 5). No doubt the men who brought the paralytic were concerned primarily about his bodily healing, and had no thought of anything beyond this. However, Jesus knew that his greatest need was something else. His most deadly malady was sin, and Jesus saw that his attitude of mind and heart was such that forgivness could be proclaimed. So He uttered the pregnant words, "Thy sins be forgiven thee." They sounded strange to those present. Never had they heard anything like that before. The scribes who were there were amazed and shocked. "Blasphemy!" they thought within themselves. "Who can forgive sins but God only?" The question was pertinent. Their theology was correct. If Christ were not God He would be guilty of blasphemy, for He was assuming authority over sin such as God alone possesses. The very fact that He undertook to forgive sins is proof that He was God, or else that He was an imposter or mentally unbalanced. But Jesus did have "power on earth to forgive sins," and brought relief to the people of His day by lifting the load of sin and guilt, and certainly His power is as great today as ever.

IV. CRITICS ANSWERED (VS. 6.12) Whether the countenances of the scribes revealed their thoughts to the Lord or whether His perception was wholly intuitive and supernatural, it would be difficult to say. At any rate, He read their minds, and He made a sufficient defense. To convince the people of His authority over sinHe demonstrated His authority over disease by instantly healing the paralytic before their eyes. While this miracle was not a formal or complete proof of Jesus' right to forgive sins, it involved such supernatural power that those who saw it were convinced that it supported His claim to authority over sins as well as over disease. The people were amazed and glorified God; and whatever the scribes may have thought or felt they were unable to openly criticise Him. The transforming power of God manifestly operating among men in any church or community constitutes a convincing answer to unbelieving critics.

INTRODUCTION-Of all the foolish and petty traditions, or rabbinical interpretations which clustered about the Mosaic law, there were none more senseless or more subversive of the true spirit of the law itself than those pertaining to the Sabbath, traditions were eventually written down, and may be found in the Jewish Talmud. In one place in the Talmud. for instance, there are extensive directions as to just what may be saved if a fire should break out in a house on the Sabbath. If it occurs on Fri. day night one may save food for three meals; if on Saturday morning, for two meals; if on Saturday afternoon, for one meal, If one were allowed more he might become so anxious for his possessions and so forgetful of the Sabbath that he would go so far as to extinguish the fire! If one has saved fine bread out of the burning house, he is not allowed to save afterward coarse bread, but if one has saved first coarse bread he may save afterward fine bread. If the Sabbath should come on with bread that has been baked yet in the oven, one may take out enough for three meals for one's self, and may tell others that they may come and do likewise; but it must not be taken out with a baker's shovel, which is the every-day way of doing, but with a knife.

The busy ministry of Jesus in to-day's lesson was spent amid the sus-pictous gaze of the "regulars" the "old guards," of religious piety. They virtually said, "Under no condition shall you disturb the traditions, even though men must go through life with withered hands, blind eyes emaciated bodies, and sin_sick souls." But Jesus saw through their merely "acted religion," which He called hypocrisy.

EXPOSITION—I. THE EXAMPLE OF DAVID (vs. 23-26). It was because of their peculiar traditions that the Pharisees criticised Jesus' disciples for picking and rubbing in their hands the heads of grain as they followed a footpath through a grain field. The picking of the grain was reaping, and rubbing it to get rid of the chaff was threshing-and Jesus had permitted this to be done on the Sabbath! Jesus answered this absurd criticism by referring them to their national hero David. He violated the Mosaic law, and not a mere tradition of manwhen he took of the showbread to satisfy his hunger and that of his followers. He rightly judged that the letter of the law must be relaxed in the presence of human need. The Pharisees did not find fault with the conduct of David, and why should they with the act of the disciples in satisfying their hunger on the sabbath? This principle of the letter of the law giving way before human need or distress is fundamental and well recognized. An ambulance rushing to a hospital will ignore the speed limit. If an automobile should turn over, passing motorists would stop and render assistance even if the street were lined with "no parking" signs. They would be criticised if they didn't.

II. THE SABBATH FOR MAN-VS. 27.28. Christ uttered a great and funda-mental truth when He said "The sabbath was made for man, and not man for the sabbath." God intended that the Sabbath should minister to man's physical and spiritual welfare by prophysical and spiritual welfare by providing a day of rest, which would also furnish time for public worship and spiritual culture. By their petty rules and regulations, the rabbis had turned it into an oppressive day, in which it was considered unlawful even to relieve a sufferer on that day. Of course Christ could not agree in such a perversion of a divine institution. He steadily pursued His course and relieved distress wherever and when ever He came in touch with it even though it were on the Sabbath. Surely the world honors Him for it today; yet this was one of the main reasons why the Pharisees became bitter in their animosity against Him, and finally brought about His crucifixion. It should be a matter of concern on our part to make such use of the Sabbath that the purpose of God in its institution will be realized. Parents should direct the activities of their children on Sunday along religious lines. Simply telling children what to do is insufficient; parents should plan for them and go with them to Sunday school and other religious activities, and not just send them.

III. THE SPYING PHARISEES (vs. 1-4). Already, at this comparatively early period in His ministry, Jesus had aroused the antagonism of the Pharisees and was being spied on by them. The latter part of our lesson tells how He was "in the synagog" again on the Sabbath: The people in Capernaum had great reason to be grateful for what Christ had done for them; but the Pharisees present were in no sympathetic mood. They were looking for something to criticise and they found it. Probably some of them had been sent from Jerusalem to Galilee for that very purpose. There was present a man with a withered hand -a pitiful case, for whom there was no human hope of cure. Jesus knew the antagonism that an act of mercy on that occasion would arouse, but He could not quail before His enemies and preserve His dignity and self-respect. He faced them with true heroism.

IV. AN EFFECTIVE ANSWER (VS. 5-6) According to Matthew, Jesus' critics asked Him whether it were lawful to heal on the Sabbath. The scene that followed was exciting. Jesus told the man to stand forth, and then asked the Pharisees some questions which were pointed and searching and appealed to the conscience. They could not answer without giving their case away and so they kept still. Jesus was indignant at their malice and obstinacy and their cowardly refusal to speak. He answered their question

and their silent criticisms by boldly healing the man on the spot. Yet this act of mercy, which was clearly wrought by the power of God, so filled them with madness that they went out to plot Christ's death. It is difficult, however, to see how the letter of the Pharisees' own regulations had been broken by the Lord; for He had performed no work in healing the man, and had not even touched him. But Jesus' spirit of independence and failure to bow down to their authority cut them to the quick. Both Pharisees and Herodians, inveterate enemies. joined in plotting against the Lord. Strange combinations have been made in opposition to righteousness.

PARALLEL ACCOUNTS—Matt. 10:2.4; 12: 15, 6, 22-32, 46-50; Luke 6:12-19; 8:19_21.

INTRODUCTION-We have in this lesson striking proof of the profound impression made by Jesus upon the people. His fame spread far and wide, until large numbers came to see Him. not only from all parts of Palestine, but from the countries round about, This evidence of Christ's popularity is the more striking when we remember that there were no newspapers, radios, telegraph fast mail, or even the telephone in those days to herald His achievements far and wide. Rather, the reports concerning Him must have passed on, if at all, by word of mouth. The various accounts of how great multitudes gathered quickly when Jesus' presence was discovered, illustrate the swiftness with which an Oriental crowd can assemble. Men were not engaged in occupations which held them until a certain hour by the clock; hence when some special excitement was on they would quickly gather together from all directions. However, the people who came from far, as related in verse 8, did not gather in an hour or in a day. They were willing to take time and put forth effort in order to see this wonderful man who was being talked about in all the surrounding country.

EXPOSITION—I. THE CAUSE OF JESUS' POPULARITY (vs. 7-11). The

chief cause of the excitement is plain. We are told that the multitudes came out unto Him "when they had heard what great things He did . . . For He had healed many; insomuch that they pressed upon Him." It is only natural that the numerous and astounding miracles which Christ performed should have this effect. They would have the same effect if performed today. Unless the police interfered, the jams would doubtless become as great and as dangerous as those that pressed upon Him at that time. Jesus had much experience with surging masses of humanity, but He tried to avoid crowds when possible. At the time of our lesson. He escaped the pushing of the throng by entering into a boat upon the Sea of Galilee. In spite of tendency today to minimize the evidential value of miracles, they were unquestionably what attracted and convinced the people of Christ's day. Many came to be healed, and pressed upon Him that they might touch Him, and large numbers came through curiosity to see what was going on, and some came to see what they might find to criticise; for all of these reasons people go to church now.

II. JESUS CHOOSING DISCIPLES (VS. 12-19). The plan which Jesus adopted for the propagation of the Gospel was wise and effective. If Christianity was ever to make much impression upon the world, men must be chosen. and trained to carry on the work which Christ began. The choosing of the men to do this was a very important matter. According to the account in Luke just before Jesus chose the twelve disciples, He spent the entire night in prayer. We can easily believe that part of those prayers, at least, were with regard to the important decisions He was to make in the morning. Look up Luke 6:12, 13. It is evident that there was a considerable group of disciples who were with Jesus more or less, and we know that some of these men aside from the twelve, accompanied Him much of the time until the close of His ministry. For proof of this sea Acts 1:21, 22. Indeed, it is difficult to think that Christ would turn any away who really desired to be with Him and learn of Him and serve Him. Even a group of women accompanied Him on at least one of His tours. See Luke S:1-3. However, Jesus chose twelve men to be Him more constantly and to have authority in a peculiar sense. They were to teach with authority, as the official representatives of the Master. They were also given power to work miracles. Paul indicates that this was one of the signs of an apostle though this power was not entirely limited to the apostles. One can easily learn the names of the disciples by memorizing the following rime:

Peter and Andrew and James and John The men He most depended on; Philip and Bartholomew,

Matthew next, and Thomas too; James the less and Judas the greater, Simon the zealot, and Judas the traitor.

JESUS TRAINING THE TWELVE (vs. 20_35) Men who were to bear such a great responsibility would need a thorough training. This is exactly what the Lord gave them. The apostles were men of humble rank, and unlearned in the schools; yet we must not jump to the conclusion that they were untrained. A theological course is usually three years in length, and that is just about the length of the course these apostles had, or that some of them had, at least. During that time they listened to the greatest theological teacher that the world has ever seen. They listened to words from Christ and saw deeds performed by Him, many fold more in number than those found recorded in the New Testament. Verily, these men were

One of the most valuable elements in training in schools is the personal influence of teachers of strong character upon the students. To make such influence strongly felt, the students need to be much in the presence of the teachers, and here the small schools have an advantage. Christ's School of Religion was a small one. "He ordained twelve that they might be with Him." How much is involved in these words! twelve had abundant opportunity not only to be instructed by the Master, but also to learn of Him. They were profoundly impressed by His marvel. ous personality. To a certain extent, at least, they absorbed His spirit. Just to be with Him was the greatest privilege in the whole world, and was the best preparation for their future work. In addition to their training during Christ's ministry, the apostles were guided by the Holy Spirit in the subsequent development of their ideas. It is the fact of this subsequent guidance which the Lord promised unto them, and as shown by the historical record, by the apostles' own claims, and by the character of their writings, that causes us to accept their teachings as authoritative.

INTRODUCTION—One is facinated with the simplicity of Jesus'teaching materials. To the learned scribes of

His time who with knitted brows and contentious language tried to tangle Him in a net of overlapping and contradictory questions, Jesus' clearness of insight and mastery of thought enabled Him to borrow the commonplace scenes and customs of daily life to give simple answers to their inquiries. Among other important things, Jesus observed closely. How many persons even in rural communities ever familiarized them. selves with the kinds of soil so thor. oughly that they were present in mind for making illustrations? Yet with Jesus it was not soils merely, but flowers, birds, sheep bread, clothing, wine, hens, swine, etc.—a wealth of commonplace things of life which. shallower minds overlook in their efforts to be profound. And this was all for a purpose. Jesus' message clung to people's minds because He taught in the terms of daily life. Who of those who heard Jesus give the illustration of the sower and the seed would fail to be reminded of its meaning whenever they saw a sower afterward? Bishop Edwin Holt Hughes said that one Sunday evening while pastor of a Boston suburban church he illustrated how the spirit of Jesus must be an integral part of one's life, by reference to commutation tickets which must be torn from the book by the conductor and which have printed across them in bold letters, "Worthless if detached." Many of his congregation were commuters and years later told Bishop Hughes that they seldom afterward used their tickets without thinking, "That is the way it is with the spirit of Jesus-worthless if detached from our lives." EXPOSITION-I. The Wayside Ground

Jesus likened the hearts of men to different kinds of soil. Some hearts are like the footpath across the field that has become hard through the tread of many feet: Seed sown there is wasted. It never gets into the soil. The birds that hover about quickly devour it. Likewise many people, usually as a result of sin, or neglect. or rejection of light, have reached such a condition of indifference regarding spiritual things that the truth makes no impression upon them. They may go to church, but the truth "goes in one ear and out the other." They do not seriously consider the matter of their spiritual welfare. After listening to a sermon that ought to stir them to action, they stand on the church steps and talk about the weath. er, then very much pleased with them_ selves go on their way as though nothing had happened. Matthew's account suggests that there is also Matthew's an application to people who fail to understand the Gospel message and who for that reason receive no permanent impression therefrom (Matt. 13:19). Probably many such people heard Christ's parables, and there are people of this sort still.

II. The Stony Ground. Another class of people is compared to stony ground, by which is meant soil that thinly covers underlying rock. Seed falling into such soil springs up quick-

ly after a rain. Later, when the sun is hot, the thin soil dries out and the. plant withers. The roots cannot penetrate down and get a supply of moisture. Just so some people are of a shallow nature spiritually. Shallowness and impulsiveness are often present together. A person hears the, word, seems greatly moved becomes very enthusiastic and perhaps is really converted. But he has not fully counted the cost and lacks depth of characterand deeply rooted convictions. Something happens ere long that he had not reckoned upon, and then he becomes discouraged and quickly gives up his religion. This superficial type of person is all too familiar to every. Christian worker. If people are ledto understand from the first what it. will mean to be a Christian, and if they make their decision after fully considering the cost, there will be less withering away after the sun is up. The Gospel should be preached in such a way as to inspire loyalty to Christ.

III. The Thorny Ground. Still an-. other class of people is symbolized by thorny ground. Some seed fell upon soil which already contained the seeds of thorns and when it grew the thorns grew also and choked it. The soil was rich, but it was preoccupied. This soil represents people who are so busy. with worldly affairs that they do not take time enough to nurture their spiritual life. The number of such people is legion. They are all around us. Many people are busier than they ought to be, and in that fact lies a grave danger. Some one has truly said that the person who is too busy to pray is busier than God ever intended he should be. In these days of hurry and rush it is surprisingly easy for one to allow the cares of life to monop. olize his attention; but God has a right to a portion of our time, and we should make sure thatHe gets it. Even being busy about church activities may be_ come a detriment if it interferes with prayer and meditation upon the Word of God. Jesus would not allow even His ministry of preaching and healing to deprive him of the spiritual strength that comes through prayer.

IV. The Good Ground. Finally, there is the good ground. After one has been working amid stones and thorns it is a relief to find some good rich, clean soil that is producing a satisfactory harvest. Such soil symbolizes the person who attentively listens to the Gospel message and then sincerely acts upon it. After making his decision, he will not be turned aside by trials or persecutions or worldly affairs. He attends to his devotions, and he brings forth abundant spiritual fruit. Fortunately, in the spiritual realm it is possible for defective soil to become good soil as it is sometimes possible in the natural realm. It is possible for an indifferent person to shake himself fout of his 'spiritual lethargy and seriously consider his spiritual welfare. It is possible for a shallow person to count the cost and become desperately in earnest. May God help us to properly prepare the soil of our hearts.

best to bring THE SCHOOL OF THE BIBLE work back to Nebraska. Since then it has been under the care of the two Yearly Meetings of Free Will Bantists—Kansas and Nebraska jointly

The Lord has wonderfully put His seal. upon this work and it is hoped that many more may take advantage of this opportunity.

the land of Judah, unto the utmost sea,

3. And the south, and the plain of the valley of Jericho, the city of palm

trees, unto Zoar.

- 4. And the Lord said unto him, This is the land which I sware unto Abraham, unto Isaac, and unto Jacob, saying. I will give it unto thy seed: I have caused thee to see it with thine eyes, but thou shalt not go over thither
- 5. So Moses the servant of the Lord died there in the land of Moah, according to the word of the Lord.
- 6. And he buried him in a valley in the land of Moab, over against Bethpear: but no man knoweth of his sepulchre unto this day.
- 7. And Moses was an hundred and twenty years old when he died: his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated.
- 10. And there arose not a prophet since in Israel like unto Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face,
- 11. In all the signs and wonders, which the Lord sent him to do in the land of Egypt to Pharaoh, and to all his servants, and to all his land,
- 12. And in all that mighty hand, and in all the great terror which Moses shewed in the sight of all Israel.

Here we have the closing chapter of a long and useful life on earth. We note in the fifth verse that Moses died, according to the word of God. He was not permitted to lead the children of Israel over the River Jordan into the promised land, because he disobeyed God's command. He smote the rock, instead of speaking to it as God had told him. You will find an account of this in Numbers, chap. 20. Aaron and Moses both were told that they could not enter the promised land. Had you thought about it, dear reader? had you thought what it means to disobey, ever so little? We might say, What difference does it make? When God had given Meses instructions for the tabernacle, and all the things that pertained to it, He said, "And look that thou make them after their pattern, which was shewed thee in the mount." Moses did all this according to the instructions of his God: yet rebelled against God's word at the waters of Meribah. God told him to speak to the rock; but Moses was so vexed with the murmuring multitude that he smote it; so failed to have the privilege of entering the promised land. How careful ought we to live! How prayerfully we should study God's Word! Why, you can get to talking with some Christians, and they will quote you a lot of scripture that is not inside the lids of God's Book. They have heard it quoted for scripture, but it is not; so let us be careful and search the scriptures daily In St. John 5:39, the Savior said, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me." We find Paul instructing Timothy, 2 Tim. 2:15, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." Let us contend earnestly for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints. Please get your New Testament and read "Jude." What a wonderful sermon written in just twenty-five verses!
