And when Moses came down from the mountain and saw the nude multitude worshipping the golden calf he called unto them, saying, "Who is on the Lord's side? let him come unto me." And to those who came he gave the command, "Consecrate yourselves today to the O, words of wisdom! They will be as potent at Armageddon as they were at Sinai. Patriarchs and Modernists By Eld. C. M. Dauber

"Remove not the ancient landmark, which thy fathers have set", (Proverbs 22:28).

I have been reading, with interest, the good letters and sermonettes in the Gem, and now I feel impressed to pen a few lines on the above subject.

In these days of modern inventions and scientific discoveries, topped off with international depression, we are apt to forget, or minimize God.

When God created man, and breathed into him the breath of life, and man became a living soul, he received more than the beast of the field, the fowls of the air, or any of the created life. His life was to be eternal, hence it was necessary for him to be guided by God's Word.

With Eve given to him for a wife, Adam and his wife were commanded, not only to care for the garden, but to be fruitful and multiply.

This sacred command was handed down to the patriarchs of old,

and no man in ancient history, or modern, has any right to interfere with God's plan. "What therefore God hath joined together, let not man put asunder" (Matt:19:

The modernists, however, are not only increasing the divorce courts, but are making the marriage vows less sacred. In some places the marriage vows are removed and free-love introduced. If we give up to the modern idea of free-love and birth control, we are helping to remove one of the great landmarks of God.

The patriarchs set up an altar unto the Lord, as far back as Gen. 8:20, and all down through the Old and New Testaments the altar was necessary in the worship of God. Our fathers and mothers held the altar sacred because it was the place where they met God, left their sin-pack, and shouted and praised God for the experience of salvation.

Today many theologians, with titles of D. D. and Ph. D. are removing the sacred altar out of the churches and substituting the hand shake and card-signing method instead.

It is possible for God to give new life to the sinner under this method, but not probable. As a result of removing the altar, a landmark of God, the modern church has become dead, cold and formal. Jesus Christ not only commissioned the disciples to preach, but to baptize, and left one example or landmark, by going down into the Jordan Himself and receiving this ordinance at the hands of John.

In John 3:23 we find that "John was baptizing in Aenon, near Salem, because there was much water there," but many of our modernists declare that the amount of water does not make any difference, so they remove the old landmark and substitute sprinkling and pouring.

When Jesus set up the church and declared, "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it," He did not only mean the invisible church, but the visible as well. Churches were established at different places, received members, and ordained elders and deacons for the overseeing of these churches. These churches were organized and had power to discipline their members. (Matt. 18:15-17). To refuse to join an organized church and influence o thers against the church, is attempting to remove one of the great landmarks of God.

These are only a few of the great, landmarks which some professing Christians in these modern days are trying to remove, but they point to the times just preceding the coming of our Lord. We find in 2 Tim. 3 that not only perilous times shall come, but men shall have a form of godlines, but denying the power therof. In the next chapter, 2 Tim. 4:2 we are charged to "preach the Word," and if we fail not to declare the whole counsel of God, we can say with Panl, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a erown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing" (2 Tim. 4:7.8

We Must Bear Tribulation By Elder D. R. Royster

By the help of the Lord I will try to write a piece for our paper from part of Acts 14:22, "We must through much tribulation enter into the kingdom of God."

It seems to be quite a task to get a very large per cent of Christian people interested in a subject of tribulations.

I think the reason for this is that we have lived in a great day of peace and in a nation that has feared God to a great extent were allowed to worship God by the leadings of His Spirit. Through the days of this great privilege, being great people in His name, we must admit that we have not esteemed Him as we should (Isa. 53:3).

According to the record we have

from God, a real Christian life (as a rule) was a rough and rugged voyage. Christians surrendering their lives as martyrs rather than surrender their faith in God. Time would fail us in going through the old dispensation of the many noted events that are recorded. But I want us to take notice to the day that our text was given, shortly after the ascension of our Lord, to the church at Jerusalem which the apostles organized. I believe it was more powerful then than it has ever been through the new dispensation.

My reasons are, that the members had better qualifications than I have been able to find elsewhere.

1st. They were of one accord. 2nd. They would not allow a member in it that would commit sin in any form.

3rd. They didn't seem to want to venture out and take a taste of the forbidden fruit.

4th. Their preachers did not covet popularity.

But after Saul (who later was named Paul) scattered the church by his persecutions to Christians, I don't find it so well united any more. Yet after his (Paul's) conversion he did his best to get the people to serve God with all their heart, and finally gave his life as a martyr for the cause.

The Apostle Peter warned us about wresting the Scriptures (2 Peter 3:16), which means to turn them about and change their true meaning. But we have been so disobedient that people can do most anything they want to and still be a member of the church; and this has driven God, to a great degree, from the church. And when God cannot have His way in the church, naturally the nation must begin to crumble into spiritual darkness.

At the time of the apostle Paul's ministry he could see the dark age that Christendom was stepping into, which lasted several hundred years.

Surely we too ought to be able, seeing Christianity at such a low ebb and our nation in such distress, to see that God is not dealing out His great wisdom as in the days of Moses, Solomon, and Joseph, and in the days of peace and prosperity that we have had.

This must be Satan's opportu-

nity to bring the final test to the people of God.

I am not saying that people have or will become altogether dishonest, but the time will come when they will take your life and think they are doing God's service (St. John 16:2).

One generation welds unto another with its deeds and self-justification until now, men and women are seeking for the real truth. But the possibility is there will be few that find it.

The Bible tells us that the world will wax worse and worse, deceiving, being deceived. When we see all these propecies coming to pass in our own day, then we must be ready to meet the rash demand from the enemy to "stop serving the true and living God.". I will not at this writing take up the form of the dreadful persecutions, but will write something later on these lines, if it is the Lord's will.

But I want to say that the cooperation of the faithful, consecrated minority is worth more to me than the so-called majority. "For in the days of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30).

So, brethren, let us make our peace, calling and election sure in declaring the truth if it takes our friends away and our heads from our bodies; then we can have the sweet assurance of victories in His name, which means it all.

Shall we tamely submit and leave the wets to sell their awful, degrading stuff where they please, and to whom they please, or shall we do and say all we honestly can against this gigantic enemy of the church, our church, our homes, our nation, society, and our young people? SALVATIONBy Elder Walter E. George

Dear Bro. and Sister Brown and the Gem Family: As I have just read the last copy of the Gem, I thought I would write a few lines about salvation. This is a great word and it means so much to me. When I think of salvation and what it has done for me, and what it will still do, it makes me really get happy by myself.

You know, as I am not able to work and make a living for my wife and children as I once did, it worries me. But as I read the Bible, I thank God for His mercy. How He is willing to bless when we let Him have His way with us! I know the devil can take all I have made and put me out in the street, and he can take my health, but he cannot take my soul, because God has blotted out my sins and I look to Him for help.

Now brethren, what is salvation? What does it do? When do we get it? Who gets it? How long will it last? We read in Exo. 14:13, "And Moses said to the people, Fear not: stand still and see the salvation of the Lord." The Bible teaches me that salvation is deliverance from or victory over sin, the devil, danger and our

enemies. The Red Sea parted and the Lord's children went across safely, while the enemies or sinners could not cross, God sees to that, He shuts them out. "Whosoever calleth upon (6) the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:21). This will bring salvation, and all that will repent will be delivered from sin. This is salvation and it will last thru this life and forever in the next world, if we walk as we should and do what God wants us to do. You know that we must be faithful unto death to be saved in the next world. (Matt. 24:13; Rev. 2:10; Rom. 11:20-21). Do you. know when we get salvation? Yes, I do, do you? fell from his sytematical state; hence the need of a reconcilor to reconcile man and God, or in other words,, the need of an arbitrater to arbitrate this confused case. Christ was the only able and qualified person to do this work. He does this work just as fast as He is called on with fairness to all and partiality to none.

Fourth. It is a regeneration-"Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:5). To generate is to put life within. Jesus said, "I came that ye might have life, and that ye might have it more abundantly." The reason for the prefix "re" in this word is this: before the fall in Eden man was in a state of spiritual life, or we might say he was generated; so since the fall it takes a regeneration. Re means again when attached as a prefix to a transitive verb, and it is so used in Titus 3:5.

When life is placed within it causes evidence without. Life is always demonstrative. Life is always gladness. The higher the quality of life, the greater the demonstration. There are many phases of life, but eternal life is the highest in quality; so the giving of eternal life brings the greatest gladness. The quantity we receive depends on our faith, as Paul says, "As is your faith, so be it unto you."

Fifth. It is a conversion—"Except ye be converted and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 18:3). Convert means to change, and David says this: "The law of the Lord is perfect converting the soul." In these words of Jesus, the possibility of our entering into the kingdom of heaven is placed emphatically upon the term convert. Nothing but the saving grace of God will cause a man, with his sinful nature, to become as the little pure, innocent dependent child.

Our Christian experience is all these we have mentioned and far more, if time and space would permit us to tell. It is all and all to the saved man. It is just as the prophet said, "A Rock in a weary

land," and as the kong writer said, "A shelter in the time of storm." It is comfort in sadness, strength in weakness, company in loneliness, food when we are hungry, and drink when we thirst. It keeps us in life and saves us in death.

Is It Sin to Smoke Cigarettes?

The occasion, the opportunity, and my feelings co-operate for this writing. Bear with me for a few lines, then you may call me "Holiness," but remember, God said, through his apostle, "Follow peace . . . and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord" (Heb. 12:14).

Recently a young man sought my counsel, earnestly desiring to know, "Is it sin to smoke cigarettes?" We may also consider other forms of usage. Come, let us reason together!

I have given this subject a fair, impartial study, and what I have to say is based upon chemical research, experiment activities, and upon the Bible. What I believe isn't worth any more(as far as proof is concerned) than what any other man believes. Facts are facts, and when I began studying this subject, I found that some of my beliefs had no base, thus, rendering them worthless. . I am established upon the fact that it is sin to smoke eigarettes as well as other forms of the habit. Bear with me yet another line.

Tobacco is a narcotic. According to language, narcotic is something that produces sleep or stupor; suspension of feeling, insensibility, inactivity. Tobacco contains from 2% to 8% nicotine, which is a colorless, intensely poisonous liquid, and when it is exposed to the air, it absorbs oxygen, turns brown, and ultimately solid. Nicotine evolves a very offensive and irritating odor, especially upon an application of heat. (No wonder that a tobacco user has an odor like a piece of spoiled beef). Pure nicotine does not appear in tobacco smoke because the fire chemically changes it to glue-form substances and nicotinic acids. Cigarette smokers

inhale these gases into the lungs, which are especially adapted to absorbing gases and putting them into the blood flow. So there it is in a nut shell.

Tobacco is not essential to life, it is not a stimulant. On the contrary, it is a hindrance to efficiency. Investigations carried out on healthy men and on men effected by "tobacco heart" by Parkinson and Koefod (second edition of Personal Hygene Applied by Dr. Williams) show the following immediate effects of cigarette smoking on such individuals:

- 1. Immediate effect upon the circulatory system and upon breathlessness of exertion was noticed upon 30 smokers, each smoking five eigarettes in a period of 40 minutes. 20 of these smokers were suffering from "tobacco heart" and ten were healthy men.
- 2. A marked effect was recorded in 17 of the "tobacco heart" patients, the three less effected were non-inhalers. Nine of the ten healthy men, all inhalers, were influenced in the same fashion, though not in the same degree.
- 3. The average pulse-rate among the patients was nine beats higher than before smoking, in the healthy men, it was six beats higher. Blood pressure was raised accordingly.
- 4. These effects appeared within five minutes; with the first eigarette they almost reached the maximum, which was maintained througout the smoking period. These observations show, that in health, the smoking of a single eigarette is, by no means, a paying proposition.

Here is the testimony of a war correspondent, while visiting the Italian trenches during the last war: "As we pushed on, all our old sins of pipes and eigarettes began to be expiated in our middle-aged hearts.... So we struggled, on, the easy perspiration bathing our bodies. Hiatt was doing better than I, being younger and less guilty of eigarettes. I could force myself until I could go no further; would stop; would droop over my alpenstock and pant like a netted fish."

There are men who are strong physically, keen mentally, and sound morally who at times use tobacco. If they use it moderately, they may reply to this dis-

course by saying, "Smoking does not hurt me." In the report of the experiment, one out of the 30 had no perceptible harm recorded. It is true that the use of tobacco forms a habit that tends to increase the amount of tobacco used This is the special danger of cigar-"Whosoever comette smoking. mitteth sin is the servant of sin' All athletes who (John 8:34). seek to excel in sports, do not use tobacco. Will not the same apply to the one who seeks to glorify God in his body more perfectly?

"What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? for ye are bought with a price: therefore GLORIFY GOD IN YOUR BODY and in your SPIRIT, WHICH ARE GOD'S" (1 Cor. 6:19, 20). When men willfully decrease their physical and mental efficiency by the use of tobacco, thereby rendering themselves unable to give their best to the Master, and fail to glorify God, to them it is sin. God has established physical laws whose benefits we shall enjoy if we conform to them; and which cannot be violated with impunity. Doubtless much of the physical suffering disease, and premature deaths experienced, comes in consequence of the conduct of the individual sufferers—the natural consequence of their mistakes or sins-the violation of physical laws. This is an important fact and should be duly considered. Still, nothing that we can do will preserve us from the evils incident to our condition or avert the stroke of death.

Smoking is expensive; men are robbing God to buy tobacco. God

said, "Ye are cursed with a curse because ye have robbed me" (Mal. 3:9). God said through Paul, "If meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no meat as long as the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend" The young man that questioned me said, "I know some young preachers who smoke eigarettes." Listen to me, brother ministers, God said, 'Take heed lest by any means this liberty of yours become a stumbling block to them that are weak. For if any man see thee which hast knowledge sit at meat in the idol's temple, shall not the conscience of him which is weak be emboldened to eat those things which are offered to idols; and through thy knowledge shall the weak brother perish, for whom Christ died? But when ye sin so against the brethren, and wound their weak conscience, ye sin against Christ' (1 Cor. 8:9-12). "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink

sin" (Romans 14:21-23).

Who is it that uses tobacco in faith? Who is it but that first began to use tobacco because he saw some "big guy" using it and thought it "looked big," and having a weak conscience was "emboldened to eat of the meat offered to idols?" "What agreement hath the temple of God with idols? For ye are the temple of the living God wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord" (2 Cor. 6: 16, 17).

Some people are asking, "What is Sin?" Sin is the darkest word in the English language, for he that abideth in sin is in darkness.

The fact that there is sin in the

world is being made light of by lots of people. They say there is no evil, they deny that sin is in the world. But that it is just a shadow of the good, it is a vacuum ready to be filled with good. Ignore the vacuum and it will drop out of our life.

We know that God's word is very clear that the natural man is in a sinful or fallen state. It says, "There is none righteous, no not one" (Rom. 3:10). "All have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:10).

We know that Satan is always questioning God's Word. He comes in the form of man today. He can quote the Scriptures right, or he can quote them and leave out part. In this way he gets people to believing his way. He usually gets them to believing that there is no sin. If there is no such thing as sin, then there is no need for the Savior or of a new birth. The atonement is superfluous and Jesus is merely an example for us to follow in our gradual process of evolution upward.

That cuts the heart out of the Gospel and leaves only a system of morality, which can easily fraternize with Buddhism, Confusionism and Mohammedanism. That is just where the modern Christianity is drifting to right now.

It is a human weakness to deceive themselves, they want to believe they are better than they really are. They want to follow something that they think is easier; but in reality is harder, if their conscience gets to hurting them, which it will at first. In believing that the way of the devil is easier, they think they are wise. They will be turned to fools. In Proverbs it says that "Fools make a mock of sin." In the end the tables will be turned and sin will make a mock of the ones that have been foolish enough to be deceived by it.

What is this thing which is so lightly denied and yet is so deadly that it ends in destruction? We are told that "Sin is the transgression of the law" (1 John 5:7). It is also said that "Whatsoever is not of faith is sin" (Rom. 14:23), and "To him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17).

According to these statements unbelief is as much a sin as the breaking of the law. If we neglect our duty, that is as much a sin as committing an unrighteous deed. Whatever alienates me from God is sin; disobedience does this; lack of faith does this; breaking of the law does it. One is sin just as much as the other.

The barrier of sin which shuts me out from the presence of God and it cannot be passed except by His forgiveness. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins; and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

God is too pure to look upon iniquity. If our stubborn wills refuse to bend to the conditions of confessing our guilt and acknowledging our sins, we must continue to stay outside of God's flock, with a continual looking forward to judgment. We dread this judgment, but we know it is coming.

somewhere that hinders, but where and what is it?

Of course, once in a while, some one has a vision and a work for God is accomplished. A church or a Free Will Baptist league is organized, or some of our ministers report a revival meeting with a number of souls saved, etc.—all that is fine, but is that as far as the vision goes?

Now, I fully believe that at least a few have a broader vision than that. "Just look at the Free Will Baptist churches we have," is what a lot of people will say, but let's look again and see how many places we find where we do not have a Free Will Baptist church, neither has any other denomination. There are thousands of people in the state of Missouri and only a small per cent of them are Free Will Baptist, and a large per cent have no dealings with any church.

Here is where we need ministers not only to see the vision of such a great work, but who will go and help spread the Gospel.

No longer does it seem strange or even unusual to hear of another starting out to preach, yet when God really calls some one to go preach, we all rejoice and feel that God has sent another laborer into the vineyard, but why do all want to work on the same row, or where it is easier?

When the husbandman sends forth his hired men to gather the grapes, each one must take his own row, or perhaps two may work on one row. In this way all the fruit is taken care of, but what would happen if all would say, "I don't feel that I can go any farther than the first few vines," and all of them would stay close to the first few vines, gather the fruit, then sit down to wait for more fruit to ripen? Every one would call them foolish, and so they would be.

Now, listen to what I'm saying, We, as ministers, have been doing just that, flocking to the churches near home for a few nights' meeting, then back home to wait until next time, instead of reaching out to places where souls are dying without God, spreading the gospel.

What is the cause of all this? I am persuaded to believe that

there are two reasons for it all: First. There are too many preachers who are thinking more

of their farms, homes, business, etc., than they do of walking with God; therefore they fail to get the VISION.

Second. There are some who, no doubt, do have the vision, but those who could and should make it possible for them to go fail to do their part in supporting them with their finance, etc.

There are Free Will Baptist church members (I mean individuals) who alone could pay off the rest of the linotype debt, buy two or three big tents for the state evangelists, pay them a salary large enough to keep them, and yet the amount would make very little impression on their wealth, yet if you mention money to them they get nervous and uneasy. If they give anything it is fifty cents or a dollar and then complain about it ever afterward. Yet if that same Free Will Baptist church member wants a new autonobile or an extra forty acres of land, he can always make arrangements to get the necessary cash.

And this, I say, is one of the reasons why our denomination is not what it should be (If you are satisfied, there is something wrong with you). There should be several times as many churches as there are, but how can there be until something is done?

Of course you say, "Go by faith." That is fine, if we can have faith enough in God, but surely you do not expect us to have much faith in the man or woman who is guilty of doing such things.

How can God's cause spread when Satan himself comes in the form of a few old tight fisted church members, who wont get into the work and share the burdens with the few who are willing? I say such people are a hindrance to the church, rather than a help. Yes, God's cause will stand, but will it advance unless His servants work? Now, wake up, you who are asleep, get to work and share the responsibility of spreading the Gospel.

If you think this has been written too plain, then you are the very one I'm talking to; so just consider these scriptures for your own good and the good of our beloved denomination.

"As the partridge sitteth on

eggs and hatcheth them not; so he that getteth riches and not by right, shall leave them in the midst of his days, and at his end shall be a fool" (Jer. 17:11).

"And again I say unto you, It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God" (Matt. 19:24").

There's a great work to be done, will we do it, or let it go undone?

Let us strengthen our hands for this great work. If we have the vision, let's rise up and build: if we don't have the vision, then get closer to God, close enough that you will not only have the vision, but will be willing to make the necessary sacrifice too.
