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A WONDERFUL FOOD

This food was known to ancient peoples. It is often mentioned in the Bible. Milch (milk) is the name our German forefathers gave to this wonderful food.

Julius Caesar, who was one of the world's greatest generals, testified to the great food value of milk. Caesar easily defeated all the nations he met in battle except one tribe in Northwest Europe. It was with the greatest difficulty that he overcame this little nation. He said that people of this tribe were very hard to conquer because they were very strong, as they drank no liquor, but drank milk.

So today people, who want health and great strength, do not drink intoxicating liquors, but drink whole milk.

The more scientists study milk, the more its great food value is appreciated.

The chemist has found that milk contains butter fat, albumen, casein, sugar, ash and water.

Butter is the best form of food fat known and there is no real substitute for butter. Butter furnishes energy to the body and also provides the body with vitamines to fight disease germs. Scientists have found that butter is especially beneficial to the eyes. The drinking of new whole milk provides the body with the best form of butter fat. Each person should drink whole milk each day. Each child should have three glasses of whole milk each day. The skimming of milk takes out much of the flavor, as well as the butter. Nearly all children like milk if the milk is not skimmed, and is properly cooled immediately after being taken from the cow. Any one can cool milk easily by Putting milk in glass fruit jar and setting jar in a vessel of water so that water comes up on outside

of jar as high as milk does on inside of jar. It is perhaps as much the parents' duty to provide children with whole milk as it is to furnish them with bread.

Albumen and casein, the white part of milk, nourish the muscles and nerves.

Milk sugar furnishes the body with energy and helps in the digestion of other foods.

Ash is the mineral part of the milk. The lime in the ash of milk is the best source of lime for the building of the bones of the body. It is said that children assimilate or use practically all of the lime of milk. Milk for children should not be boiled as the heat in boiling makes the lime indigestible, and weak bones are the result. The pasteurization of milk, or heating to 160 degrees Fahrenheit does not seriously injure milk. Milk may be pastuerized in the home by putting jar of milk in vessel of cool water on stove and heating milk to 145 to 160 degrees and then removing milk from the vessel of warm water and cooled in air, and then set in vessel of cold water: A cloth should be put in bottom of vessel where milk is to be pastuerized so that milk jar will not rest on bottom of vessel.

All milk vessels should be thoroughly washed and placed in sunshine when empty to prevent bad flavors forming in milk.

FREE WILL BAPTISTS ARE DISTINCT

The question, "What are Free Will Baptists?" and, "What distinguishes Free Will Baptists from other Baptists?" is often asked by interested, but uninformed, people in communities where ALL of the Baptist groups are not well known. These are pertinent questions, and deserving of comprehensive reply, since the subject

of religion affects the social structure of the entire civilized world. I am not undertaking at this time, however, to perform the arduous task of an unabridged comprehension of such a broad and absorbing society as the Free Will Baptists are, for there are slightly divergent views on nonessentials, which fact holds good in all religious societies, including the other Baptist bodies, and sometimes on the subject of baptism, the tenet philosophy that merited our primative appellation. It is my hope, in preparing this abbreviated narrative, to give the busy man or woman that eannot take time for a lengthy investigation, but desires to know the distinguishing devotion that makes Free Will Baptists fundamentally different from other Baptists, the gist of tenet beliefs that identify Free Will Baptists as a distinct society of believers in Jesus Christ, and thereby intercept a possible ex-parte opinion on the part of some interested inquirer. The word "Baptist" immediately identifies the various groups to the common public, as immersers, but, in the ranks of Baptists there are divergent opinions on this subject. which holds good within the ranks of the individual groups. Therefore, I shall observe some Bible subjects upon which there is a broader difference between the Free Will Baptists and other Baptists. I shall not quarrel with our disagreeing brethren, but, with apologetic boldness, suggest that we are justified in an agreement to disagree.

THE NEW BIRTH

First, and above all things else, Free Will Baptists are Christians; born of the Spirit of God (John 3:7). This, we believe, is by grace, through faith (Eph. 2:8), wholly predicated upon repentance, and acceptance of Jesus Christ as the only medium of de· Page Two

liverance from sin, with no definitely pre-fixed day or hour that it must become operative in the andividual. We believe that the new birth will be evidenced by a desire of the convert to be received iby baptism, into the visible, or militant, church, and to walk in all her ordinances. By the new birth the individual is made new. Old things pass away, and all things become new (2 Cor. 5:17). Jesus Christ becomes the One altogether lovely (Cant. 5:16), the things that he once hated he now loves, and in this new life in Christ Jesus he is free from sin (Rom. 6:18), and free from the law of sin and death (Rom. 8:2), to live in the newness of this new life. His walk will be godly, his life will be fruitful in holiness, and subsequently a warm and strong impulse to entire consecration. He will not be a sinner by pracflice, but a colaborer with Jesus Christ for the salvation of sinners. Being born from above, he is a child of God, and will bear the image of his Father, and the likeness of Jesus Christ his elder brother. 4

FREDESTINATION

We believe that predestination has its fullest expression in the person and provision of Jesus Christ, who took upon himself a body of flesh that he might complete the predestinated purpose of God to redeem men from sin, for whosoever believeth in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life (John 3:16). Therefore, we do not believe that God predestinated certain individuals for cheaven and certain other individanals for hell, but that He predestinated in Jesus Christ full atonement for all men, and that every accountable person, at some time or times, is convicted of sin and can be saved then if they will. We believe that particular election is to the extent that God elected all men unto salvation through Jesus Christ, unto holiness and righteousness all the days of their (new) life, and that every one that will accept shall attain unto it through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth (2 Thes. 2:13; 1 Peter 1:2), for God has predestinated us unto holiness (Eph. 1:4), that we might be in Christ Jesus (1 Cor. 1:30),

to will and to do of His good upon the beautiful mansions of earth, pleasure (Phil. 2:13).

APOSTASY

We believe that man, being created in the likeness and image of God, fell from his holy estate by his own will and disobedience. His posterity, therefore, though they inherited his fallen nature, have their freedom of will, and their privilege to exercise their will is not taken away when they are redeemed from sin, because redemption is by grace through faith, conditional upon turning away from sin (repentance), and perseverance is, consequently, dependent upon continuing in the faith. Hence, we believe that a person that has been born of the Spirit, may lapse into involuntary sin, and subsequently commit final apostasy and be lost in hell, but the backslider that commits final apostasy will have to be deliberate and wilful in it, for God has said, "I am married to the backslider" (Jer. 3:14), and the backslider will have to get a divorce from God before he can be finally lost. We see. therefore. that there is a difference between backsliding and falling from grace; the former being a lapse into involuntary disobedience, and the latter being a wilful and deliberate blasphemy against the Holy Ghost, for which there remaineth no more sacrifice. We believe that children of God often lapse into unintentional straying away from God, and that the Spirit maketh intercession for them with groanings which cannot be uttered, and that almost all of them return to God, but we believe that it is possible for one to stray away and then blaspheme unto eternal death, tho it is very improbable.

to disband the Co-operative General Association, motion carried to table these two resolutions.

The Executive Board reported their meeting with the General Conterence at Bryan, Texas in June, 1932; their Special Board meeting at our Macedonia church; their meeting with the General Conference at Nashville, Tenn. in June, 1933; and their agreement with the General Conference to unite the two bodies, as published in the Gem for July, 1933.

Motion carried to approve the report of the Executive Board.

Motion carried to send representatives to confer with the Gen. Conference in the consideration of the proposed union of the Co-operative General Association and the General Conference.

Motion carried that the Executive Board, with such delegates as the board may see fit to appoint, represent this body at the General Conference when it meets at Jakin, Ga. in June, 1934.

The Finance Committee reported: "We find no legal indebtedness of this Association, nor any associational assets." After some discussion, motion carried to approve the report.

Motion carried that each member of the Executive Board be furnished with a copy of the proceedings of this conference.

After some discussion, motion carried that we take a firm stand against the Federation of Churches Movement, and that our Executive Board and as many as represent us at the General Conference, be instructed to take a similar stand.

Motion carried that a notice be printed in the Gem expressing our stand against the Federation of Churches.
